FDR said he suggested to Roosevelt that the original omnibus measure be discarded in favor of separate bills covering individual phases of reorganization. He pointed out that the original bill was killed in the house after it barely squeezed through the senate.

By dropping the entire plan into one bill it goes before congress on a "take it or leave it" basis. This enabled a coalition headed by former representative C. O. Cannon, Democrat, New York, chairman of the powerful House reorganization committee, to muster enough strength to beat it.

Cannon was defeated in re-election in November and is expected to be succeeded in the committee chairmanship by Representative Nathan, Democrat, Illinois, an ardent new dealer. Nathan concurred with the President today but was not among the reorganization group.

Premier's Regime Wins Vote Of Confidence Following Oratorical Storm Jaycee Delegates Begin Arriving For Conference National President To Get City's Keys On His Arrival Here

Delegates from Paraguay, Key West are expected here today for the annual constitutional convention and winter session of the Florida Jaycee Chapter of Commerce.

Philip C. Ebeling, president of the United States Jaycee Chapter of Commerce, and Dr. James Hollidock, National Director from Tampa, will arrive from Tampa this afternoon at 1:00 o'clock along with other members of his party.

They will be escorted into the city by a local group of Jaycees to the Municipal Pier where M. Ebeling, and his party will be welcomed and presented the keys to the City by Mayor Edward Higgins.

Delegates from Jacksonville are expected to arrive tonight in time for the cocktail party at the Mayfair Hotel which will be convention headquarters. Approximately 50 delegates will attend from Orlando, about 25 from Miami and vicinity and 10 delegates from St. Petersburg will fly to this city in a chartered plane.

Registration will open at the hotel at 1:00 o'clock this afternoon and continue until 10:00 o'clock this evening. A cocktail party will be held from 8:00 until 10:00 o'clock tonight and the annual Jaycee dance will be held from 10:00 until 2:00 o'clock tonight.

Procedure For New Market Is Given At Meet

Would Provide Outlet For Souvenirs Made Of Natural Products

The procedure necessary for setting up a market in Sanford for souvenirs and articles made from natural products, such as pine needles and palm leaves, was explained to a group of Seminole county women by Miss Julia Mae Sampley, who is an assistant to State Markets Director William L. Wilson, at a meeting in the Chamber of Commerce building.

The market, Miss Sampley pointed out, would be a part of the State market system and would be operated under the supervision of the State Marketing Board. A 20 percent commission on all articles would be charged by the board to take care of the expenses in operation of the market.

Miss Sampley explained that similar markets have been established in several other cities, particularly on the east coast, and had met with unusual success. She pointed out that as yet no market of this kind has been established in this part of the state and she expressed a desire to have a market established in this city if enough of the articles made from natural products can be obtained to assure a continual supply.

Miss Sampley pointed out that making these articles provides a valuable source of income to those who are able to do this work and can devote their time to it. Seminole Teachers Paid \$168,732 By State Last Year

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Seventy-eight percent of last year's expenditures for salaries of Florida teachers and transportation of pupils was provided from State funds, according to a state wide summary of county reports submitted to State Superintendent Colin Egan.

Teachers in Seminole County received \$177,200, of which \$168,732 was from the State. The county's share was \$8,468, which was from local revenue. Seminole County transportation of pupils cost \$21,500, of which \$14,040 came from State sources and \$7,460 from county sources.

Expenditures from State funds are limited to teachers' salaries and transportation of pupils. All other school expenses, except the cost of textbooks, are provided from county and district revenue. These expenses include all of administration, janitors' salaries, maintenance and repair supplies, insurance, library, health service and debt service.

Salaries paid to Florida teachers during the 1937-38 school year totaled \$11,388,401. Seventy-nine percent was provided from State sources and 21 percent from local revenue. The cost of transporting pupils in Florida schools was \$1,471,974, of which 70 percent was paid from state funds and 30 percent from local funds.

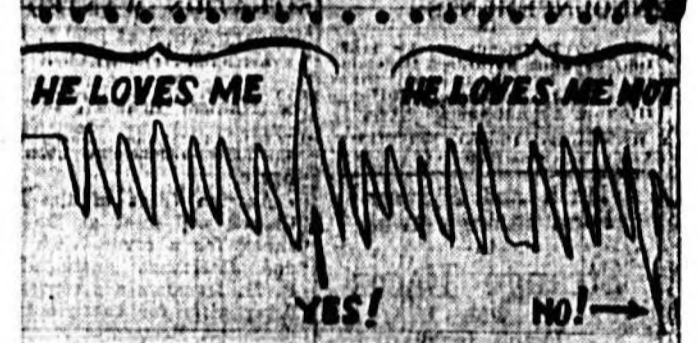

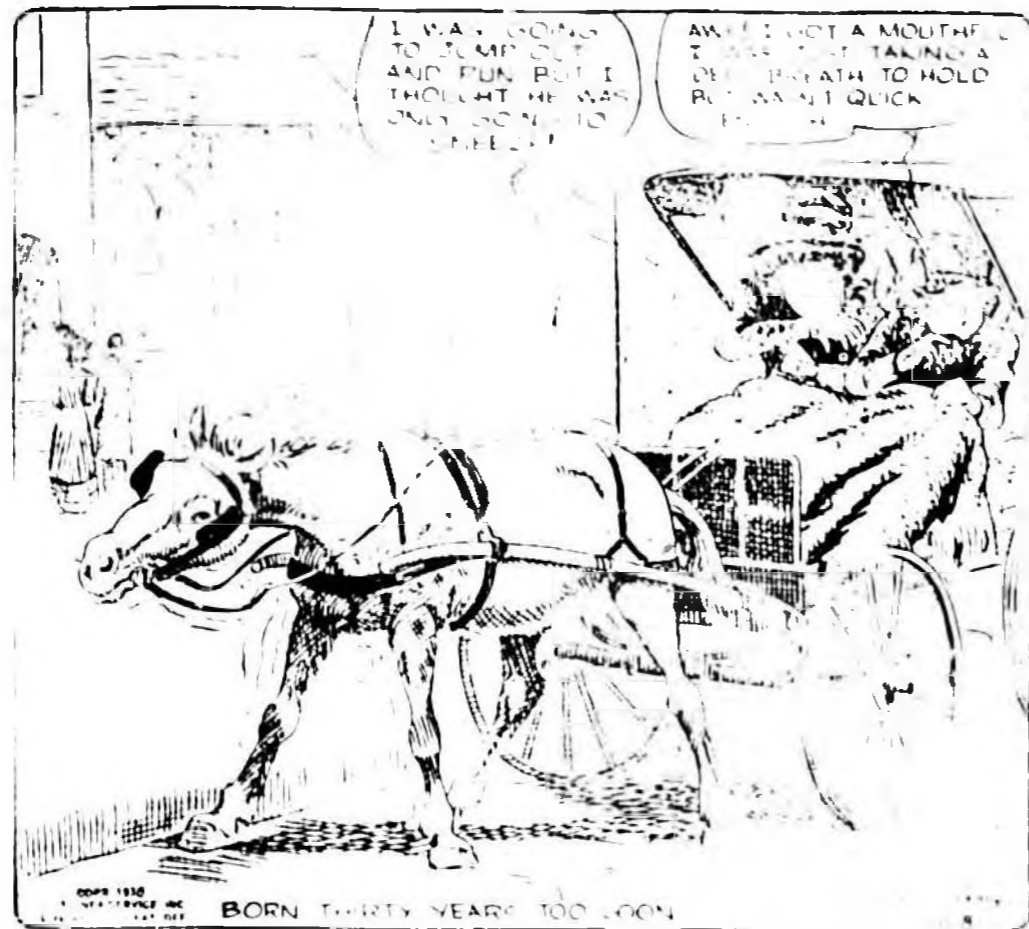

## Walker States Citrus Brings Lowest Prices

### Testimony Given At Hearing On Proposed Marketing Agreement For Industry

### 1,000 Fruit Men Attend Parley

### Secretary Of Trade Group Foresees Even Larger Crops

LAKELAND, Dec. 12 (AP)—Mary H. Walker of Lakeland said today that Florida oranges, grapefruit and tangerines this season have been bringing the lowest prices in the history of the state's fruit industry.

Walker, secretary and manager of the Florida Citrus Producers' Trade Association, testified at a public hearing called by Secretary Wallace on the proposed Citrus Marketing Agreement designed to control interstate shipments, regulate the quality of the fruit sent to outside markets and bring growers and shippers better prices.

Approximately 1,000 fruitmen heard Walker declare that "pink" prices and a record crop had brought the industry face to face with a serious situation.

Walker presented a lengthy statement augmented by a number of statistical reports which outlined the present situation as complicated by the fact that every town factor points to still larger crops for the coming five to ten years.

He said the Florida orange and tangerine crop had increased about 11 percent over last season and grapefruit crop 25 percent.

As hundreds of fruit men began assembling for the session, indications were that much of the testimony to be submitted to the AAA would involve suggested volume control of Valencia orange shipments.

The pact as drafted by shippers and grower groups calls for control and size regulation of orange, grapefruit and tangerine movements and for Valencia volume control.

Although both groups agreed some form of an agreement was needed to prevent market congestion and bolster prices depressed by a bumper fruit crop, there was a sharp division of opinion on the projected control provisions.

Growers generally sought volume regulations for Valencia while shippers, especially cash buyers, expressed opposition to any volume restriction of the Valencia crop.

The Florida industry operated last year without an agreement. Under the proposed new pact, growers and shippers each would nominate eight members to a committee and alternate for appointment by Secretary Wallace to one-year terms. The grower group would handle administrative problems. Marketing restriction and quota recommendations would be made by the shippers' committee. Marketing orders would be issued each week during the season by the secretary of agriculture.

Secretary Wallace also would fix a levy on interstate fruit shipments to finance administration of the agreement.

## Sanford May Be Principal City On Inland Canal

### Cross State Waterway To Tampa Is Party Favored In Report

In the event that certain proposed inland waterways for Florida are constructed, Sanford will become a key city on a system of inland canals with water north to the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic Ocean.

The War Department reported today favorably toward the proposed canal improvement of a waterway from the St. Johns River at near Sanford to Tampa and Tampa Bay. The report was received by the Board of County Commissioners from United States Army Engineer J. E. Bain of Richmond, Va.

The proposed navigable route through the heart of Florida's citrus producing section is being given the backing of large citrus growers and shippers.

Completing the picture for an intra-coastal canal is the proposed St. Johns River Canal from Sanford to the East Coast, and the proposed \$115,000,000 port at Cape Canaveral, which is being backed by numerous prominent leaders over the State and was given the endorsement of the Seville County Commission at its last meeting.

A group of Army Engineers spent some time here with members of the St. Johns River Improvement Association and Senator C. O. Andrews Saturday discussing the proposed canal route to the East Coast which, according to present plans, would open into the Indian River at a point near the proposed port from which products could be shipped in international commerce.

It has been pointed out that these proposed canals not only have a commercial value in affording transportation but also have flood control and drainage features.

For the proposed water route to Tampa, the canal would follow natural waterways, small lakes and rivers, from the St. Johns River to Tampa Bay, necessitating little dredging through the open, flat country enroute.

While the proposed improvement for the upper part of the canal did not receive the recommendation of the engineers, the report provided that any interested parties have the privilege to appeal the conclusion of the department.

The report from Col. Bain reads in part as follows: "It having come to the notice of the undersigned that you have expressed an interest in the pending proposition for the improvement of a waterway from the St. Johns River at or near Sanford, Fla., to Tampa by way of the Kissimmee and Alafia Rivers and Tampa Bay, you are hereby informed that I have followed a quarrel."

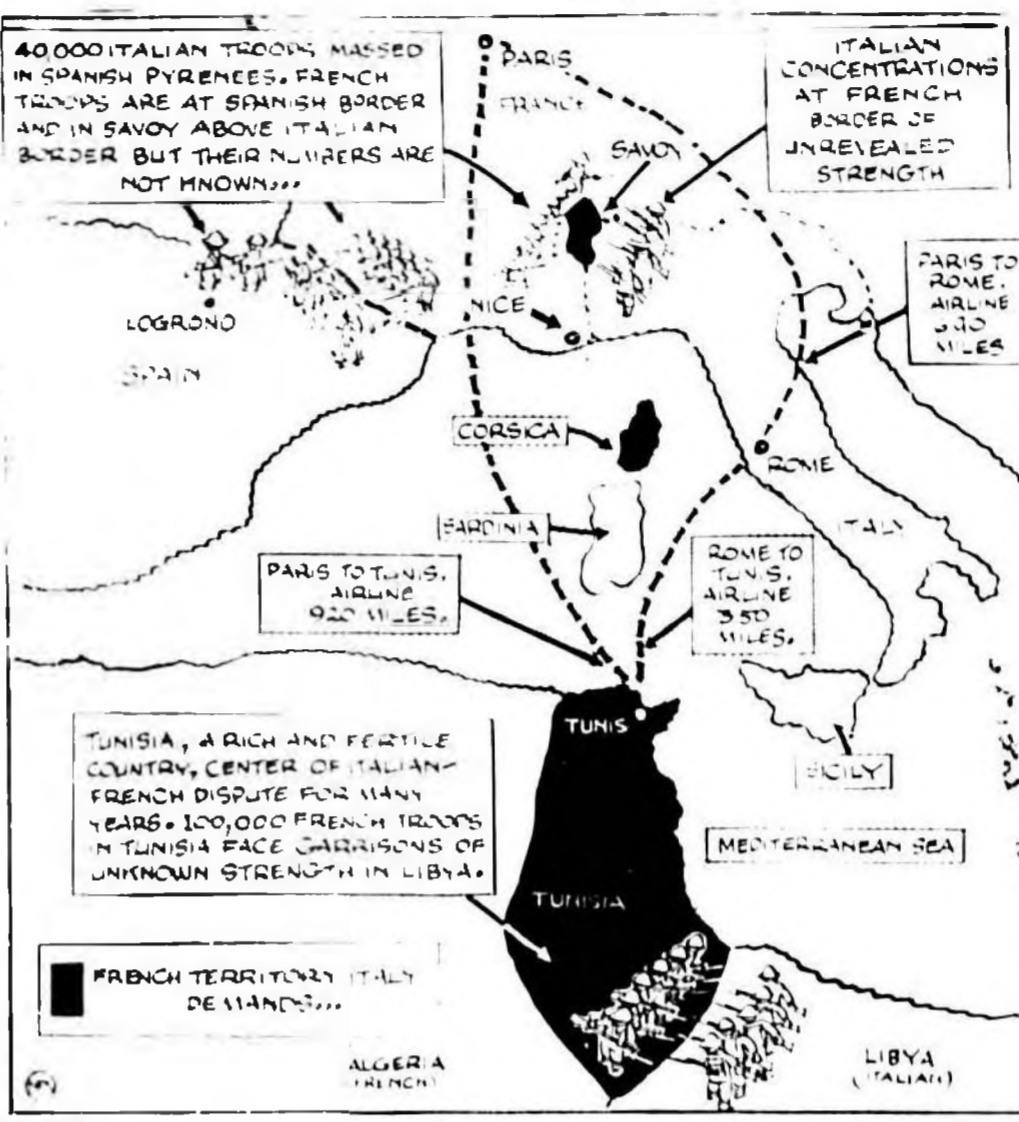
A huge hallelujah cake was cut in honor of the National president at the dinner.

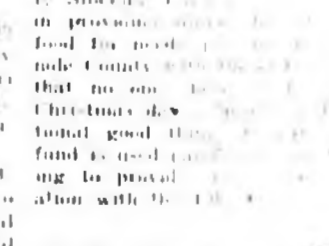
