## City Manager Asks County For Drainage Review

## County Hears Four Recommendations

County Commissioners were presented a list of four preliminary recommendations from the County Government Study Commission at Tuesday's meeting.

Under planning and zoning. Additional inspectors have been approved in the building department. Further improvements will be accomplished in that building and zoning will be two separate departments by October 1. Drummond said that if more careful job assignment were carried out, as he expects that there will be, then there won't be a need for more inspectors as the time will be more wisely used.

He said that he did not feel that enough inspections are being carried out today, but does expect that with a more efficient scheduling system, there will be more inspectors per inspector.

Approval for the consultant's (George Cody Associates) recommendation for salary scales for the planning, zoning and building departments should be approved.

Drummond then told him that no inspections are carried out under planning and zoning. He referred to David Farr, county planner who according to Drummond is being much sought after by other entities requiring the services of a planner. He said that he fears Seminole might lose Farr and that this would mean another year to train a replacement if they could find one with Farr's qualifications, which includes a Masters degree in planning. He said that no county employee, however, is unreplaceable, but some are definitely less expendable than others.

Estes said that the study group recommends approval of funds for in-service training, salary and additional personnel, additional vehicles, and that every consideration should be given for additional space for the sheriff's department.

"These are very general recommendations, sir," Drummond replied. We rather expected more specific recommendations," he said that the sheriff won't get all the additional personnel he asks for. "I expect that we will get criticism for approving personnel but not in the areas where this is most needed. I believe that the department is being run very efficiently."

"Space for the Sheriff's department has been under study for quite some time. Drummond said that he had not expected more specific recommendations."

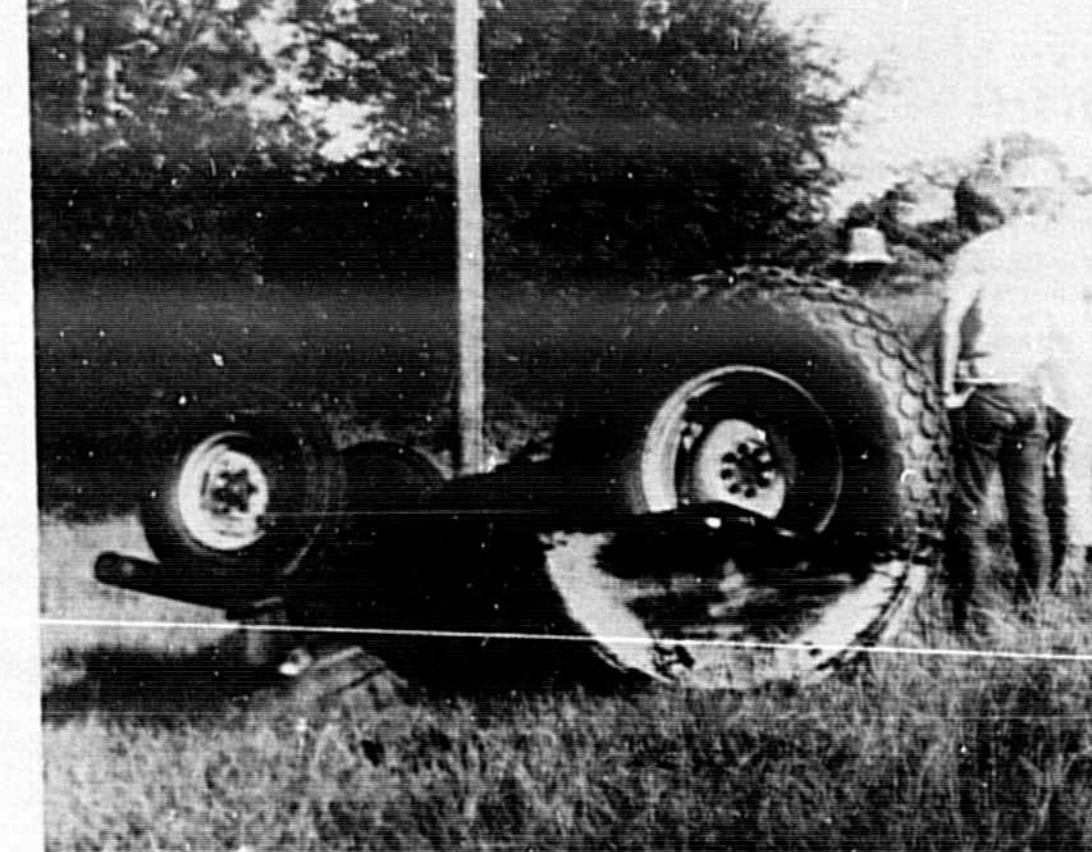

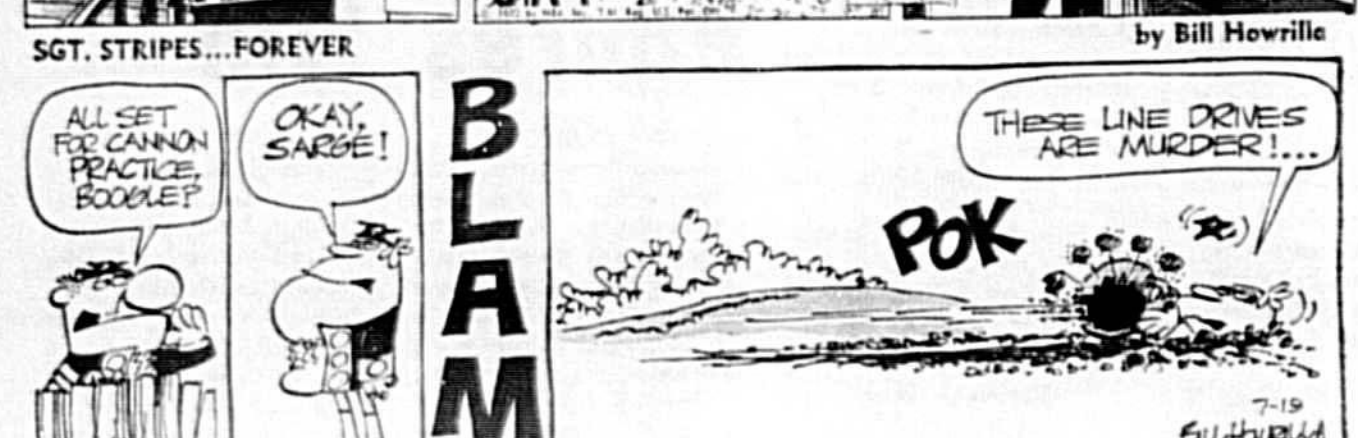

Pat Neal lives for tomorrow

HOLLYWOOD — Patricia Neal says she'll always walk with a limp, but she is proud of her warmth and beauty of spirit, her handicap becomes invisible.

She's a woman who has met more than her share of tragedy with much more than average courage and now uses her knowledge of adversity to help others.

She talks freely but not whiningly about the disasters which have beset her. Her thinking is positive.

The Oscar-winning actress, recipient of the Academy Award for her work in "Hud," returned to Los Angeles recently to narrate the television presentation "Life, Death and the American Woman." She had spent time in interviews during her brief stay in the United States, but during a brief interview in her Beverly Hills home she seemed relaxed and confident, a far cry from the woman she'd been before three massive strokes almost killed her. "I don't believe that misadventures are blessings in disguise," she said. "I was just born to have a stroke when I was 35. There was something in my brain that was going to burst at that time, and so it did."

"I do believe, though, that things go better for you when you are not afraid," she says. "I had seven years ago, because we've almost equaled the Kennedy's in that respect."

Actually it was more than seven years ago, nearly a dozen, that tragedy first struck Patricia and her British writer-husband Ronald Dahl.

She was wheeling their infant son, Theo, in his carriage when a New York cab ran them down, striking the buggy and injuring the baby so severely that repeated surgery was required to save him.

"When Theo was injured," Miss Neal remembers, "I almost died. But you get used to a New York cab running them down, striking the buggy and injuring the baby so severely that repeated surgery was required to save him."

"I remember how, just before the first Christmas after I had my stroke, I walked to the village with my son, and I was in such pain I was weeping. Now I'm fine except for a limp which I'll always have."

Even though more than a decade has been shadowed with disaster for the Dahls, Pat experienced one of the happiest moments of her life on Aug. 4, 1968, when her youngest child, Lucy, was born beautiful and healthy despite the fact that the mother had been paralyzed early in pregnancy.

Pat grew up in Knoxville, Tenn., went to school at Northwestern and is deeply attached to this country. Yet she is also deeply attached to England.

"At first, after we settled there," she says, "whenever an American came to London, I couldn't wait to get in and see him. But now England is my home. Life there is much easier than in New York."

Her children, including Theo, are thriving, with Theo showing signs of becoming a professional athlete.

"The day before I left," Pat said, "I saw her in a play at school, and she was very good. As for Theo... he's a great runner. Simply great. He may not run quite so fast as some of the other children, but he's a delight. Everyone loves a Theo."

## Grand Jury Probes Vietnam Veterans Organization

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Last week it may have been easier to slip a machine gun through the metal detector in the Tallahassee Post Office than to extract information from the Justice Department officials who occupy the second floor.

The metal detector appeared

about the same time a federal grand jury began probing the activities of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War. It was then that the federal prosecutors suddenly became mute.

Neither William Stafford, U.S. attorney for the Northern District of Florida, or Assistant U.S. Atty. Jack Carrouth, head of the Tallahassee office, would discuss any aspect of the case.

Carrouth would not even comment on the size of the grand jury, why newsmen and witnesses were required to ask a U.S. Marshal's permission to go to the rest room or why former Atty. Gen. John Mitchell's picture still hung on the wall.

When six indictments against six of the antiwar vets were handed down on Friday, the clerk's office said they were a matter of public record and could be examined by the press. However, what wasn't men-

tioned was that they were kept under lock and key in the U.S. Marshal's office.

The wall of secrecy culminated in a closed-door arraignment before the local U.S. Magistrate.

Deputy U. S. marshalls not only blocked newsmen from entering the hearing room for the usual open hearing, but they told one he couldn't even wait outside the door.

"You have to go down to the other end of the hall until we're done conducting our business," he directed.

The marshal's office also refused to tell newsmen who had been arrested on the indictments, what charge they were booked on or where they lived, although the U.S. attorney's office eventually came across with names and charges.

The antiwar activists, many of whom spent the week waiting outside the grand jury chambers, may have picked up a trick to two from the feds.

The funds were cut as the Cabinet passed a disputed Canal Authority budget providing \$71,300 in state funds for operation and administration and \$70,775 in local tax funds for right-of-way expenses connected with the halted Cross Florida Barge Canal.

Natural Resources Director Randolph Hodges, acting in the face of Cabinet reluctance over the agency's budget, had trimmed \$16,505 from operation and administration funds, and \$38,225 from the right-of-way budget.

Protesting the budget apparently carried duplicate funds for right-of-way legal fees, Atty. Gen. Robert L. Shover moved that the \$312,000 contingency fund be struck from the budget. His motion passed 64, but with the provision that the money be restored if necessary to settle legal claims resulting from the halting of barge canal construction ordered by President Nixon.

Some Good Eating

By TOM HOGG, Associated Press Writer. One day a number of years ago, the Pennsylvania Dutch housewives of Kutztown whipped up a batch of pigs' knuckles, caraway dumplings and shoofly pie and held open house. Since then, nearly a quarter of a million tourists visit the region every year to sample the food.

Eating is an important matter in the land of the Pennsylvania Dutch, that fertile area in the eastern part of the state whose inhabitants are not Dutch at all, but of German descent.

The folk of this region still follow old German customs, speak a German dialect and cook German dishes with names like Schnitz and Gnepp (dried apples, ham and raised dumplings).

A Pennsylvania Dutch dinner leads off with the traditional "Seven Sweets and Seven Soups," an assortment of jams, preserves, pickles and relishes. Most of the main dishes come from the rich farmland, dishes such as potash, which means oatmeal scrapple, twissavia koocha, or hot onion pie stuffed pig's stomach which tastes much better than it sounds, and flannel cakes drowned in thick milk gravy.

Anyone will be able to manipulate a fork is piled with a rich assortment of desserts. There is funnel cake, butter forced through a funnel into a bath of sizzling fat, and shoofly pie, an intriguing mixture of brown sugar, egg and molasses.

The Pennsylvania Dutch style of cooking is unique. The jams are cured over smoldering fires of sawdust and hickory wood until they are charred black on the outside. And the local sausages which, with sage and coriander, are out of this world.

It's hard to single out one recipe as characteristic of this fare, but I guess shoofly pie is as close to the mark as any. SHOOFLY PIE: Pastry for 9-inch pie unbaked. 1 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour. 1/2 cup sugar (preferably brown).

1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg. 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon. 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger. 4 ounces soft butter. 2/4 cup molasses. 1 egg well beaten. 1/2 teaspoon soda. Combine first six ingredients. Add butter and cut it in with a pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Set aside. Mix next four ingredients and pour into the unbaked pie crust. Sprinkle the crumb mixture over the top. Bake in a preheated oven of 450 degrees. Bake 40 minutes, or till filling is firm. Can be served hot or cold.

PICNIC SUPPER Cold Fried Chicken/Potato Salad Carrot Sticks Olive Fresh Fruit Sour Cream Loaf SOUR CREAM LOAF A porous texture distinguishes this hot-sweet cake. 1 3/4 cups sifted flour. 1 teaspoon baking powder. 1 teaspoon baking soda. 2 eggs. 1 1/4 cups sugar. 1 teaspoon vanilla. 1 container (8 ounces) commercial sour cream. 8 squares (1/2 of a 4-ounce package) sweet cooking chocolate, finely grated. 1/2 cup finely grated walnuts. Line bottom of a 9 by 9 by 3 inch loaf pan with wax paper; grease paper. On another sheet of wax paper sift together flour, baking powder and baking soda in medium mixing bowl; beat eggs until thickened and lemon color; gradually beat in sugar; then vanilla, until thick and ivory color; beat in sour cream. Gradually fold in flour mixture. Turn half the batter into prepared pan; sprinkle with chocolate mixed with walnuts; add remaining batter. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean - 1 hour. Place cake in pan on wire rack and let stand 10 minutes; with a small spatula loosen edges; turn out on rack; remove paper; with another rack turn right side up. Cool completely. Note: Use a hand-operated rotary nut grater for grating chocolate and nuts.

# This Unique Peruvian Fare Will Tempt Your Taste Buds

LIMA, Peru — The recently opened Tambo de Oro is one of the most unique restaurants and shopping compounds in all Latin America. And some of the menus' offerings are beyond compare.

Historically, Tambos were inns that dotted the roads of this Inca empire where couriers could stay and rest and eat when crossing the mountains from coast to coast.

This Tambo, however, is different. Not simply a huge room or shed as in the old days, it offers a shopping area, boutiques, bookshops and restaurants, all in one great historic house, its passageways and courtyards.

The superb food inspired by the Tambo de Oro — international in influence but based on Peru's fruits of the sea and land — is now being served by a major air carrier (Brazil International) on its South American flights.

Here are some recipes that you can "taste" from the kitchens of the Tambo de Oro.

**ALCACHOFA CON CONCHITAS**  
2 cans artichoke bottoms (approximately 16 to can)  
6 ounces bay scallops (fresh or frozen)  
1 teaspoon shallots or 2 finely chopped green onions with tops  
1 tablespoon butter  
4 tablespoons white wine  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Dash white pepper  
1 lemon (juice of)  
1/2 cup sauce herbaise or rich cream sauce with Parmesan cheese topping or 1 package of Hollandaise Sauce mix with Tarragon vinegar substituted for regular vinegar

Slice scallops. Saute gently in butter. Add chopped onion, seasonings, wine, and cook gently about five minutes. Arrange artichokes on broiler pan. Spread center gently. Top each center with scallop mixture. Top with 1/2 tablespoon sauce. Bake in 350 degree oven for seven minutes. Glaze under broiler, about 6 inches from heat.

**ANTICUCHOS**  
1 pound beef heart or beef sirloin  
12 ounce can whole button mushrooms  
1 green pepper  
1 red pepper or 2 whole canned pimientos  
1/2 cup vinegar  
3 clove garlic, minced  
1/2 teaspoon cumin  
1/2 teaspoon marjoram  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 teaspoon ground chili powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon monosodium glutamate

Cut beef into 1/2 inch cubes and place in bowl. Mix vinegar, garlic, cumin, marjoram, ground chili powder, salt, and monosodium glutamate and pour over meat. Cover and marinate in the refrigerator overnight or as long as 24 hours. Remove meat from marinade.

Place meat on 4 inch skewer, alternating with 1/2 inch squares of green and red pepper (or pimientos). Top anticuchos with button mushrooms. Broil over heat about 2 minutes on each side.

Note: One pound of beef makes about four dozen 1/2 inch skewers. Allow four cubes of meat per skewer, and one to two skewers per person.

**MONTANA DESANTOS**  
To make Chocolate Mousse:  
1 cup milk  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
1 egg  
1 package (6 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate pieces  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 cup heavy cream  
2 ice cubes (about 1/2 inch size)

Pour 1/2 cup milk and gelatin into electric blender. Blend at low speed until smooth. Heat remaining milk to boiling point. Pour hot milk into blender. Blend at low speed until gelatin is dissolved. Add brandy, egg, sugar and salt to gelatin mixture. Blend at high speed until smooth and creamy. Add cream and ice cubes. Blend at high speed until ice cubes dissolve. Divide mousse into 8 champagne glasses. Chill until set (about 2 hours).

To make Mocha Bavarian:  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
1 tablespoon unsweetened cocoa  
1 teaspoon instant coffee powder

one-third cup water  
1 egg, separated  
2 tablespoons Kahlua  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 cup heavy cream

Combine gelatin, cocoa, coffee and water. Let stand 5 minutes. Dissolve gelatin over boiling water. Cool slightly. Beat egg yolk slightly. Pour gelatin mixture into egg yolk.

Sift in Kahlua. Beat egg white with salt until foamy. Gradually add sugar, beating constantly, until stiff peaks form. Beat cream until stiff. Fold gelatin mixture and egg white mixture into cream until ingredients are thoroughly blended. Chill until set (about 2 hours).

VISALIA, Calif. (AP)—A 10-year-old girl has pleaded in a letter to a judge that her parents be refused a divorce.

The child, who was not identified, wrote: "Honorable Sir, My mom and dad is getting a divorce, please don't let them get a divorce. My momma loves my dad, if you could put him in the hospital he could quit drinking..."

"Sir, you are a judge and this is your job, to divorce people."

"Only where do ones go that still love the husbands? And how do you divorce a 10-year-old? Can you cut out my heart and stop it from hurting?"

The girl pleaded, "Please, please, please help a 10-year-old keep a mom and dad. I know if mom tried you probably wouldn't listen..."

"God bless you and let God be on this day the judge decide you."

Superior Court Judge Jay Ballantyne said Wednesday he sent copies of the letter to the attorneys representing the girl's parents and replied to her. "I am well aware of the tragedy which is involved every time parents separate where small children are involved...I can assure you that if either of your parents petition the court for an attempted reconciliation I will do all I can to help resolve their differences."

**O'Brien Will Head McGovern Campaign**

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. George McGovern today appointed former Democratic National Chairman Lawrence F. O'Brien to head his presidential campaign.

The nominee said O'Brien will be given a role concerned with unifying the support of Democrats and other "concerned Americans."

McGovern said O'Brien will be his "national campaign chairman" and in that role "will be a foremost consultant on the overriding goal which will be to unify the support of key Democrats across the country."

The senator said O'Brien will be his liaison with the Senate and juvenile prisoners in that capacity. Democratic governors, mayors, and state legislative leaders.

He said O'Brien will also be his chief contact with officials of the Democratic Party and organized labor.

"Larry O'Brien will be personally and directly involved in all major campaign decisions between now and Nov. 7," McGovern said.

"He will be a principal spokesman for this campaign and I am urging him to travel to every section of the country to speak in support of my candidacy."

McGovern made the O'Brien announcement after his arrival here from South Dakota where he has been vacationing, to cast a pro-labor vote in the Senate following his rejection by top AFL-CIO leaders.

**Florida Power & Light Gets OK To Use One Nuclear Generator**

MIAMI (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission has given Florida Power and Light Co., the go-ahead for full power operation of the first of its two nuclear generators at Turkey Point.

Licensing of the generator, originally scheduled to be in operation more than two years ago, was announced Wednesday.

Environmentalists had fought a five-year battle to stop the nuclear generators at Turkey Point going into production. They claimed there was a danger of thermal pollution and damage to the environment.

"We're delighted," said FP&L Vice President Gene Autrey. "We will do everything possible to see that the unit is put into production at the earliest possible moment."

He said it would still be several months before the generator would begin operating.

"We are ready to move into the testing, but it will take several months and this time lag precludes any substantial relief for present power pinch," Autrey added.

"There is, although, the possibility of some generation this summer during the testing period," he said.

Earlier this week the AEC cleared the way for licensing when it approved the \$35 million network of canals that FP&L is building to cool the millions of gallons of hot water the plant was expected to discharge into Biscayne Bay.

The commission said Florida's need for electrical power outweighed any environmental risks.
