He contended that charging the tax would cause big New York banks to withdraw from the \$5 billiona-year Florida mortgage market and since they now lend 40 per cent of the money, Florida mortgage lending institutions would have to seek funds from other sources at higher rates.

However, revenue director Ed Straughn, who submitted the tax proposal to the Cabinet, said imposition of the tax would have minimal effect on Florida home owners.

"There might be some extra cost involved if (the Altamonte Springs, I believe the New York banks) are taxed but it would only be a short time before they adjust their overhead costs,' he said. "I have no way of knowing whether they will decline to invest.

Jury Sets **Evans Free** Of Murder

O. H. (Bill) Eaton, assistant state attorney, expressed disappointment at the Tuesday afternoon innocent verdict brought in by a six-member all-white jury in the murder trial of Albert Evans, 58, of Sanford.

Eaton, who handled the state's prosecution of Evans in the shooting death of Damon Jones, also of Sanford, over the attentions of Dessie Mae Jones, a widow and no relation to the deceased, said the jury might have been confused over what constituted a second degree murder charge.

Evans admitted he shot Jones on the evening of April 15 after the man had driven to the home of Dessie Mae Jones on 12th Street and asked to talk to his "girl friend."

Evans, who was sitting on the porch with the woman, followed Jones back to his parked truck and after a brief conversation suddenly produced a .22 caliber pistol and allegedly shot Jones in the chest, killing him instantly according to Mrs. Jones, an eyewitness, who testified Evans fired three shots into Jones.

However, the jury found Evans was innocent of the

When questioned today how a jury could render an innocent verdict after Evans had admitted shooting Jones in a confession, prosecutor Eaton said "it may have been they took into consideration the environment in which the incident happened," in an apparent reference to the predominantly black area of the city.

"It may have been the statement by Evans that he didn't mean to kill Jones that persuaded the jury to reach its decision," Eaton added.



Law Enforcement And Court Reform

If this is the midsummer doldrums - which is where the calendar is heading us - it is almost frightening to think what hes ahead.

Not that the usual uproar in the political tent has not been well advertised and well indicated. But there are so many other areas from the chess game in Iceland to the beauty contests which get and deserve attention.

One of these which is entirely grave and critically important. It is that of law enforcement, court reform and the controversial matter of penological processes.

It is in this general area that the ruling which Attorney General Robert Shevin made, in reversing a former opinion, that now allows offduty law officers to carry concealed weapons is most welcome.

Quite characteristic of this action-motivated attorney-general is this comment: "I believe that the carrying of concealed weapons during off-duty hours by police officers is not only authorized anywhere in Florida but is good policy for the safety of the public as well as the officer and his family."

It is not the carrying of concealed guns by these disciplined and efficient law enforcers that troubles the public. Far from it. From time to time it is one of these alert policemen uniformed and plainclothes alike - who turns the trick of detection and arrest of those who would harm the law-abiding.

The unhappy trend towards violence which shows no signs of retreating makes such a bold support of the police, as this Shevin opinion now bestows, more than a matter for commendation such as this comment provides.

It is one more indication that the tide has turned from the time when the fate of the lawbreaker was of more apparent concern then the fate of his victims. It is also one more indication

Global Report Captive Nations Week Is Important

By Public Law 86-90, unanimously adopted by Congress in 1959, the third week in July each year is designated as Captive Nations Week.

The purpose of this designation is to provide an appropriate context in which Americans may manifest their continuing concern for the plight of some 100 million East and Central Europeans captured by and living under the Communist rulers of the Soviet Union.

Each year since 1959 President Eisenhower, Kennedy Johnson and Nixon in succession have issued presidential proclamations so designating the third week in July. These have been supplemented by proclamations issued by governors of many states and mayors of many cities, who agree with one of the pronouncements in Public Law 86-90: "The desire for liberty and independence by the over-

whelming majority of the people of these submerged nations constitutes a powerful deterrent to war and one of the best hopes for a just and lasting peace."

This year Captive Nations Week will be observed against the background of the Moscow summit meeting, the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty (SALT) and the interim agreement signed in Moscow on May 26. This is fortunate and appropriate, because it can serve as a forcible reminder of the necessity for extreme caution in dealing with the Soviets. Their record with respect to international agreements is amazingly consistent. They have broken them whenever it has suited their purpose to do so. There is no ground for supposing that this pattern will change.

The Captive Nations are captive because although World War II Soviet Premier Joseph Stalin assured the Western Allies that Russia sought no territorial aggrandizement, the USSR nevertheless proceed in 1940 to occupy and annex Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania.

Soon thereafter Romania, Poland and Czechoslovakia were forced to hand over vast ...hunks of their territories to the Soviet Union. By the end of 1948 the Soviets had imposed Communist regimes on Albania, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland, Romania and East Germany, thus extending direct Soviet control over a hundred million more

The difficulty of ever extricating these 100 million increases with the passage of time. West German Chancellor Willy Brandt has accepted the Oder-Niesse Line as the eastern boundary of West Germany and in effect has recognized East Germany as a Communist state forever removed from the Federal Republic of Germany.

The Brezhnev Doctrine makes it clear that no attempt by anyone, anywhere, to upset any Communist government will

China Fears And Distrusts Russia

PEKING - China has repeatedly expressed her genuine desire to live in peace with all her neighbors. Her equally genuine suspicion of two of them may make this difficult, per-

haps impossible. The two neighbors are the Soviet Union and Japan. China's relations with Japan are still marked with deep distrust. Japanese suppression, humiliations and atrocities are still fresh in the memory of the Chinese. Stage plays, films and literature abound to insure that the memory will remain

However, those who have had a chance to observe China's foreign polcy firsthand and over a period of time believe that once men more to China's liking rise to power in Japan, Peking and Tokyo will eventually establish

It is the Soviet Union more than any other country in the world that the Chinese fear and distrust. For many years to come, the Chinese most cordial overtures from Moscow. China has learned her lesson. She cannot forget that the Soviet Union left

her alone at a time when she was sorely in need of assistance. In the years that have passed since the Soviets withdrew technical manpower and equipment from China, the ideological hassle over which the rift began has deepened and at this time observers do not see how it can be re-

Sen. George McGovern's amazing three-year journey from political obscurity to national prominence is far from completed. It is one thing-although no small feat-to have

snatched the leadership of the Democratic party out of the hands of the old pros and to have apparently begun : fundamental reshaping of the party into a broad coalition of youths and minorities and war opponents and assorted new and old leftists. It will be quite another thing, however, to translate the

superb organization and hard work and enthusiasm of his supporters, which enabled him to win primary after primary this spring, into a winning formula that will gain the coveted grand prize on Nov. It remains to be seen whether George McGovern is cor-

rect in believing, as he stated in a Life magazine interview, that "I am moving with an advance guard that the majority of American people are ready to rally around." For one thing, despite his meteoric rise, McGovern remains an unknown quantity in the minds of that majority he hopes to rally. (This is even more true in the case of his "Spiro who?" running mate, Sen. Thomas F. Eagleton

The latest poll by the Harris organization found McGovern trailing President Nixon by a 12-point margin in a three-way race (45 to 33 per cent) and by 16 points in a two-way race (54 to 38 per cent).

This may be remembered as the first blunder by a candidate in the 1972 campaign Nevertheless, those who blithely predict a Nixon walkaway in November may be in for some surprises. Much of the percentage-point difference between him and Mc Govern is simply a recognition gap and is bound to shrink Not only that, but any man who has shown himself to be a fighter like George McGovern has can be counted on o make a real race of it.



Scoop out ice cream by large spoonfuls and place in a large mixing bowl. After several scoops, sprinkle some of the peanut brittle over the ice cream. Continue scooping and sprinkling until the ice cream is all in the bowl. Stir just enough to barely mix, then return ice

BITTERSWEET CHOCOLATE SAUCE

Berry Lime

Fresh, colorful, tasty strawberries combined with the tang of fresh lime bring a special treat to the palate: of fresh-fruit pie lovers. This is a relatively quick dessert to make since only the graham cracker crust sheil is baked. Make ahead, refrigerate until serving time Then top with sweetened strawberry halves and whipped cream. Another easy dessert that a junior chef will enjoy making with California strawberries is a Strawberry Pudding-Pie. The crust is of whole vanilla wafers and requires no baking. The filling is instant pudding topped with sliced strawberries.

STRAWBERRY FRESH LIME PIE

2 eggs 1 can (15 ozs.) sweetened condensed

1/2 teaspoon grated lime 1/2 cup fresh lime juice 9 inch baked wainut graham pie shell 1 pint fresh California strawberries, chilled Sugar (about 4

tablespoons) 1/2 pint heavy cream

Thoroughly beat eggs, milk and lime peel together in bowl; gradually blend in the lime juice. Beat until mixture is thickened; pour into pie shell. Chill 2 to 3 hours.

At serving time, halve the strawberries and sweeten to taste with about 2 tablespoons sugar. Place around edge of pie. Whip the cream with 2 tablespoons sugar. Spoon into center of pie. If desired, garnish whipped cream with twist of lime peel. Makes one 9-inch pie.


