Proprietors Of Food Emporiums Add To "Life" Of Students

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Oct. 23.—If a student at the University of Florida has capital amounting to five cents, "a good line," or an honest looking face, he can—and generally does—eat when the urge for food calls him to one of the several eat shops on University Avenue facing the campus. If for instance, you should drop into the College Inn, Drum's Waffle Shop, College Park Inn, or the Black Cat between ten o'clock and the hours of the "vase sm's", you would see an almost endless stream of hungry phlegms coming and going to these mecca's of food and drink.

"The boys will eat almost anything at any time," says Dale Drum. Dale has been running the Drum Waffle Shop for four years and knows a great deal about students and their nightly search for food. Without a doubt, the universal night campus food is the lowly hamburger, a favorite usually "polished off" by sweet cakes and coffee.

Most of the night trade at the Waffle Shop comes in between the close of the library and midnight. The desires of customers are usually simple and inexpensive, but during these hours, the business amounts to from 10 to 20 dollars.

"Say, Dale, could you let me have a 'dope' on credit until I get home this week-end?" The questioner was visibly embarrassed, but cheered as Dale passed the required 'dope' across the counter with an assenting smile.

"We give credit to everyone just like that," said Dale after the customer went out.

"And that fellow will be in to pay for his 'dope' the first of next week." He spoke with the surety born of long observation of student character.

"It's the big fellow who beats me," he smiled, "the jolly good fellow who always wants to eat the whole crowd up and flourishes his money."

Dale thinks college students are mighty fine fellows, but he philosophically maintains that in 2000 men any where there are always some who are not as upright as they should be. He adopts a friendly attitude towards them and is secretly thankful there are not more of this stripe.

"Pop" Oliver and family reside at the homey College Park Inn. "Pop" too has long been in the business of feeding folks and likes boys.

"There's a fascination in the work," he says, "but it gets monotonous too."

"Sometimes the boys get 'griped' and 'gripe' us too, but it doesn't mean anything."

Any night you can find "Pop" satisfying late appetites. Often Mrs. Oliver, one wants to call her "Ma," sits at the cash register with a cheery smile of a bit of good-humored jest for those whose midnight nickels and dimes play the tune of the cash box. "Pop" and his boys, Lester and George, are always busy supplying the ever popular egg sandwich; and they pour out literally barrels of steaming coffee.

The College Inn is almost as old as the university itself. "Eddie" is "dean of the cats" there and all the boys say he "turns out a mean toasted sandwich." "Eddie" loves all the fellows, especially the football boys. Next to those, "Eddie" loves his trombone best. During the war he played with one of the American division bands and spent a part of his spare time seeing that the boys were fed. Strangely enough, he was peeling potatoes when the city in which he was stationed came under German fire. "Eddie" tells a very lively story of how high he kicked that bucket of potatoes in leaving there for safer territory.

The favorite food of "Eddie's" late callers is toasted cheese sandwiches and the popular "sahc." They combine their eating at the "inn" with social activity. There is always a crowd "bulling" on the bench around the oak trees outside, or else talking with "Eddie" and playing cards or checkers on his tables.

From Toothbrushes to Ford's Parts "Eddie" and "Old Man Mann," as the boys fondly call the proprietor of the "inn," try to have everything a college boy can want. Anything from a toothbrush to Ford parts can be bought there. College Inn is one of the centers of campus life and the center of nightly prowls for food by many of the students.

Pomerene Expects Jury To Find Fall Guilty Of Bribery

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—(INS)—Two men, who but a short time ago sat side by side in the U. S. Senate, today played the leading roles in a dramatic scene in the criminal branch of the district supreme court.

One—former Senator Alton Pomerene, of Ohio—was before the jury and pleaded with the four women and eight men comprising it to find his erstwhile colleague guilty of accepting a \$100,000 bribe.

The accused—Albert B. Fall, secretary of interior during the Harding administration and one-time senator from New Mexico—sat huddling in a big easy chair wrapped in a blanket, with a nurse and a physician at his side, staring ahead as the special all prosecutor attacked his character and reputation.
