

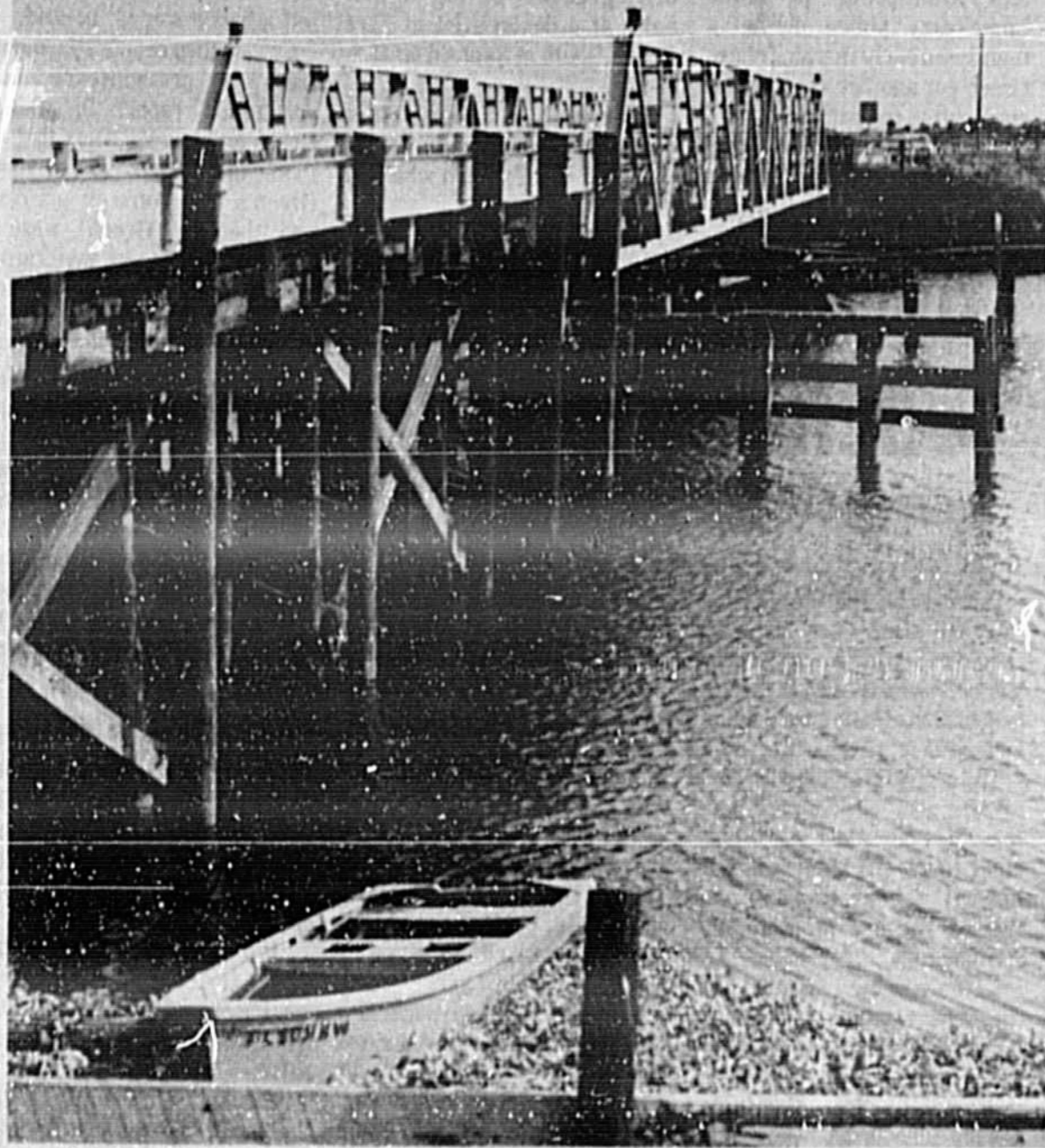

DOT Action Cheers Chamber

Osteen Bridge Bids Opened



Osteen Bridge, SR-415 east of Sanford, will be replaced by a \$2.6 million span scheduled to be completed by the Fall of 1976

During the last 20 years the citizens of Central Florida have been pleading with the state to replace the antiquated wooden Osteen bridge on SR-415, east of Sanford, where it crosses the St. Johns River and serves as a connector between Seminole and Volusia Counties.

Yesterday, the Florida Department of Transportation (DOT) opened bids for the construction of a new span which will be approximately one-half mile long and be a part of a 1.6 miles overall road project.

Low bidder of 12 different companies was Houdaille-Duval-Wright, (HDW), Inc., Jacksonville at \$2,615,255.21. DOT had estimated the bid at \$3.3 million.

The bid will be scrutinized by the DOT to determine its validity and accuracy. This should be completed by next Tuesday. After the bonding of the low bidder, the contractor should be on the job sometime in July and the bridge replacement completed in the Fall of 1976, according to DOT.

At a meeting this morning of the Road and Bridges Committee of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, co-chairman Douglas and Julian Stenstrom led a jubilant conference at which time it was jokingly recalled that "not too long ago there was talk of 'burning' the bridge," and forcing the state into replacing what is probably the oldest wooden span in use in the entire state.

After hearing of the low bidding yesterday, the old bridge came back into focus by those wanting to know "what do we do with it now?" Continuing in the jocular mood, some were heard to suggest, "calling the Smithsonian Institution;" to "elevating it on steel structures and place it over the railroad crossing on SR 46, west of Sanford;" to "somehow tying it in with next year's Bicentennial plans;" to calling the same

individual living in Arizona who was reported to have purchased the London Bridge for three-million pounds (\$7.5 million)."

Board Member Garnett White told the Committee that "Houdaille is the same company which pumped the island for the present Sanford Marina."

Cal Conklin, board member,

said HDW is a reputable and well-known firm which has its main offices in Jacksonville, but also has an office in Orlando. Also, one of its employees, Robert Unkefer, contracts administrator for the work at the marina site, was a resident of Sanford.

County Engineer Bill Bush Jr. said a park is planned on the eastern side of the St. Johns River opposite where the present 'old bridge' is located. The park would retain the concrete span on the Volusia County side of the river permitting area anglers to fish from its rails.

In other action the Committee agreed to place as its No. 1 priority seeking the completion of SR419 leading from Oviedo to Sanford. The state said a lack of funds is delaying work on the project.

The Committee also:

— Appointed Frank Wheeler and Ben Ward of Oviedo to a sub-committee which would contact the DOT district office

in DeLand to help facilitate the completion of both phases of SR419. First part includes the four-laning from Oviedo to SR434 in Winter Springs, and the second part is the continuation of SR419 from SR434 to U.S. 17-92.

— Agreed to contact Sen. John Vogt (D-Cocoa Beach), chairman of the Seminole Delegation to prepare the necessary arrangements for a meeting with DOT Secretary Thomas Webb, either here in Sanford or in Tallahassee, to discuss the construction of an overpass at the railroad crossing on SR46, west of Sanford.

— Requested of Senator Vogt to be notified when the plaque would be presented honoring the late William Kratzert of Sanford. The House recently approved a name change for SR46 in his honor, recognizing the many years Kratzert worked for the DOT.

A commemorative ceremony is planned for the event.

Howell Branch Road Link Top Priority

41,000 Autos Cross U.S. Highway 17-92, SR436 Daily

(Ed. Note — An interview with Seminole County Engineer William (Bill) Bush Jr., has produced an in-depth review of the state roads within the county, and the projections for expansion of the system in the future.)

Are there more automobiles

on the county's roads lately, or is it an imagination created by a desire to move more quickly from one place to another?

According to Bill Bush Jr., Seminole County engineer and based on information supplied to him by the Department of Transportation (DOT), as well as statistics provided from within his own department, it was learned —

— There is an average of 41,000 autos which pass daily in front of the Zayre's Shopping Center on the intersection of U.S. Highway 17-92.

— Highest DOT priority in the county is the completion of a link on Howell Branch Road, between the Orange County line and SR-436 (Turkey Farm Corner), because of its ultimate

connection with the new Maitland interchange on I-4 to the west.

— All of the road requests, either for improvement or expansion, must adhere to "Orlando Urban Transportation Plan, 1990 Update" (OUTP)

— Although there are projects which would seem to demand immediate action — such as a railroad overpass at Rand's Siding (SR-46 W. of Sanford); four-laning Lake Mary Boulevard; an interchange on I-4 for SR-46A — none of these can be added to the overall roads plan 1990, without first having the necessary projected funds to cover the costs on same.

Bush emphasized the importance of complying with the OUTP comparing it with conditions of 10 years ago when the planning was done on an annual basis as opposed to the present where a five-year road program is required by the state.

No longer is it possible to carry a local group of "boosters" to the DOT office in DeLand and try to "influence" the state road officials. The DeLand office is responsible for state road control and planning in 12 counties throughout Central Florida.

When a proposal is made to be included within the five-year

road program, in addition to the total funds being anticipated sufficient to cover the costs, it is reviewed and either approved or disapproved by planning organizations such as the East Central Florida Planning Commission (ECFPC).

"It's highly unlikely there'll be any deviation from the five-year plan, unless it was something catastrophic — like

Disney World," said Bush.

Bush said he was not critical of the OUTP. In fact the plan represented the "best efforts of the citizens, computers and planners. It represents a utopian approach to the roads' problems," said Bush.

"Unfortunately, the overall program would cost \$700 million and the projected revenues amounts to only \$450

million!"

One of the proposals contained in the OUTP calls for an inter-county beltline connecting Seminole with Orange and Osceola counties. According to Bush it's not going to be built in the near future due to a lack of the necessary funding. Additionally, there has not ever been a feasibility study on the proposal which would justify its

success as a toll facility. And as long as a belt line is shown in the OUTP, it distorts traffic projections for all other roads shown in the network.

(Ed. Note — Tomorrow's series will deal with actual state traffic counts on various heavily travelled roads within the county and compare them with comparable statistics of 10 years ago.)

Overcrowding Cited As Top Problem

Parents Told Lawsuits Hold Fate Of Woodlands

A group of miffed South Seminole parents heard School Supt. Bud Laver tell School Board members yesterday that the fate of troubled Woodlands Elementary School is "fraught with dangers and lawsuits."

The Board also heard its attorney, Doug Stenstrom, explain that the fiasco could cost Seminole County taxpayers an additional \$159,000 "unless all possible litigation is eliminated."

But parents weren't as concerned with the financial picture as they were with students who are attending an overcrowded Sable Point Elementary School in anticipation of getting into their own facility. "It's obvious 1,100 students at

Sable Point ain't hacking it," Ray West, a parent, told officials. And Mrs. Candy Hester, president of the Woodlands PTA, recommended the use of portables as opposed to "farming out our children to four different schools."

"In the event of a one to four month delay, we recommend the number of portables be expanded at the Sable Point

location to relieve overcrowding or that a portable school be established at a site to be determined," she told officials.

Another parent told board members that school children form their "opinions" of school during their early years and implored school officials to correct the fiasco.

Laver told parents not to

"equate physical facilities with quality education." He said "quality education" always has and always will depend on the abilities of the teachers.

Although parents are demanding the school be opened by September, Stenstrom said there's a "strong possibility" the school will not be "open for a long time if it goes to litigation."

Laver has called a meeting for 10 a.m. Monday to try and arrange a meeting of the minds between attorneys of persons involved in the issue.

All work on the ill-fated school drew to a halt more than two months ago when Builders Movers Inc., a Winter Park firm, turned over the entire project to a bonding company — Surety Financial Indemnity

Co. — and school officials thought the sailing would be smooth.

But the low bidder on completion of Woodlands is George Saunders, the former president of Builders Movers Inc. Saunders has come in with a low bid of \$115,000, while the next lowest bid is \$269,000.

So, while school officials don't particularly relish the idea of

having Saunders do the work, that may be the only solution because he is low bidder.

Also, the school could be rebuilt. And, Stenstrom said, the bonding company can always point to Saunders' low bid of \$115,000 and only pay out that amount. Of course, then the school system would have to file a lawsuit for the difference.

But in the meantime, parents are worried about next year and their children. They implored school officials to get moving on a school for their children.

School officials estimate about 85 per cent of the job was complete before Saunders' firm defaulted. The project was set for completion in September, and parents say they have been promised a school for more than two years.

NATION IN BRIEF

Ford Gets Congress Okay

To Use Troops In Saigon
WASHINGTON (AP)—Turning aside fears of new U.S. combat deaths, Congress early today voted to give President Ford authority to use American military forces, if necessary, to evacuate Vietnamese as well as Americans from South Vietnam. But Ford is prohibited in separate bills approved by the House and the Senate from evacuating any endangered South Vietnamese with any U.S. forces other than those needed to get out Americans and their dependents.

Liquor, Sterility Linked
PITTSBURGH, Pa. (AP)—A panel of doctors studying alcoholism says it has found a definite relationship between alcoholism and male sterility. Dr. Joshua Ferber, chief forensic pathologist for the Allegheny County coroner's office, says severe testicle damage was found in men with a history of alcoholism and it could result from two causes. He said damage to the liver could prevent the liver from neutralizing female hormones produced in the male, or the alcohol itself may be toxic to the testicles.

Women Warned Of X-Rays
WASHINGTON (AP)—Routine X-ray examinations for breast cancer in women under the age of 35 should be avoided because the screening procedure itself may cause tumors, a Food and Drug Administration advisory panel says. The advisory committee also called for more strict regulations on the safety and effectiveness of such X-rays called mammography, in women aged 35-50 years. The panel also urged physicians to determine whether female patients are pregnant before taking abdominal X-rays.

Comedian Says Job Easier
MEDAN, ON (AP)—Comedian Mark Russell says the job of a political humorist is a lot easier with Richard M. Nixon out of the White House and the Vietnam war fading into history. "Last year was tremendous polarization. This year, the anger is gone. We're all uniformly frustrated," Russell said in an interview.

Three Arrested In Burglary Of House

Sanford police have arrested three men in connection with a burglary yesterday in which antique coins, walking canes, a shotgun and stereo radio were taken from a house at 228 W. 19th St., owned by former Sanford postmaster Joel S. Field.

Detective J.A. Cash said today that most of the items, including 65 rolls of antique pennies, have been recovered. Being held in county jail on \$5,000 bond each on charges of breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony, grand larceny and larceny of a firearm are Jesse Lee Allen, 24, and Edward Lewis Bond, 19, both of 224 W. 19th St., Sanford. A third suspect, Robert Russell Brock, 18, of 220 W. 19th St., posted \$5,500 bond on charges of possession of stolen property and possession of marijuana.

Annexation Leaves Longwood Confused

LONGWOOD — City Council's attempt this week to clear away the maze of confusion concerning the two-year-old annexation of an 88-acre tract on the Longwood Hills Road is more confused than ever today. Told by Attorney General Robert Shevin's office to perfect the annexation of the parcel or have it ousted from the city by the courts, Council appears to have stepped into another web — this time concerning the zoning designation given the property.

Regardless of which way the city goes with the zoning, it appears court action will come. Even the current owners of the property, Cameron Brown Mortgage Co. which acquired the tract via mortgage foreclosure has changed its mind concerning the rezoning.

City Approves Storm Drainage Crew
A five-man crew plus new equipment to maintain clear storm drainage lines at an annual cost of \$57,114 to the City of Sanford has been approved by the City Commission.

The commission this week instructed City Manager Warren Pace Knives to include the storm drainage program as an item in the next fiscal year's budget.

In a report on what it would take to establish the program, Knives suggested hiring a crew leader, equipment operator and three laborers. Equipment necessary for the program included a one ton truck, 1,000 feet of fire hose and \$600 worth of hand tools. Estimated cost of the truck is \$5,000 and the fire hose at \$5,000.

High Cholesterol Concern

DEAR DR. LAMB — While I was in Florida I had my blood pressure and heart tested by a machine in a store. The man told me my heart was beating 90 times more than it should every minute.

When I asked what caused it he said cholesterol around the heart. He seemed to think it was serious. I have been trying to find out what foods are high in cholesterol but haven't succeeded. I am overweight. Would loss of weight relieve this condition? Can you tell me where I can find out about cholesterol?

DEAR READER — If you are overweight it would be a good idea to correct. The problem. You should have some tests done to find out whether you really have a high cholesterol count and what your blood fats picture really is. That may have a lot to do with what you need to do in terms of a low cholesterol diet. For more information about this, write to me in care of this newspaper at P.O. Box 1851, Radio City Station, New York, N.Y. 10101, and ask for my report on cholesterol. Send a long stamped, self-addressed envelope and 50 cents to cover costs.

Let's look at your real question, your heart rate. You can't tell much about the circulation from a casual heart rate. Many normal people have higher rates during the day. In general I believe those people with relatively slow heart rates during the entire day are in better health. If they don't have a heart condition like heart block that causes the slow rate. Many healthy persons have a sharp rise in heart rate when they are excited. As an experiment take your heart rate when you first wake

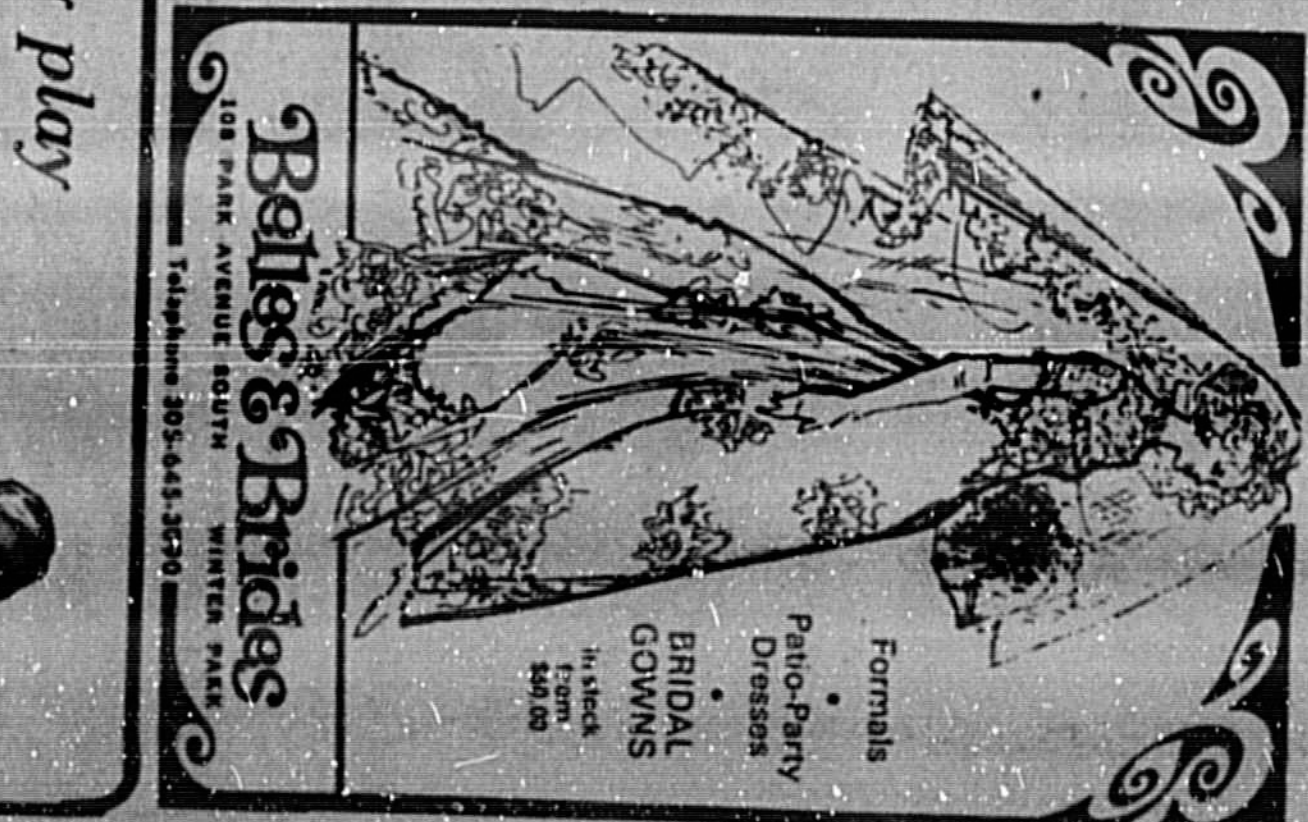
