Seminole County Students Have Chance Scholarships For Two Florida Colleges

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 12.—Thirty-seven scholarships to state institutions of higher learning will be awarded to high school graduates on Aug. 20 by competitive examinations given under the direction of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. Under the provision of an act of the 1923 legislature two scholarships are awarded in each county, one to the University of Florida and one to the Florida State College for Women which have durations of four years. At the end of this time, or when a vacancy occurs for any reason, another is awarded in that county. The examinations deciding the winners of the scholarships are held at the time of the regular teacher's examinations in the county from which the scholarship is given. The competitor who makes the highest average grade on Algebra, Rhetoric, General History, American History and Civics, and American and English Literature is awarded a scholarship equivalent to \$200 a year for four years. Each holder of a scholarship must be registered either in the Teacher's College of the University of Florida or in the School of Education of the Florida State College for Women, and no change of registration is allowed unless the holder of the scholarship refunds the entire amount of money previously used from the scholarship fund. Under provision of the law made in 1923 quarterly reports must be made to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction on each scholarship student, showing the scholastic standing and quality of his work. In case the holder of a scholarship fails for two consecutive months in half of the subjects in which he forfeits his scholarship and may be required to refund the amount of the fund used for his stipend. Examination question on which the examination is based are made out and graded in the office of the State Superintendent. Counties in which there are vacancies are: To the University of Florida in Baker, Bradford, Broward, Citrus, Collier, Dixie, Duval, Escambia, Franklin, Glades, Hamilton, Hardee, Hendry, Levy, Monroe, St. Lucie, Sarasota, Seminole, Union and Wakulla. To the Florida State College for Women in Bradford, Calhoun, Collier, Dixie, Flagler, Highlands, Monroe, Orange, Putnam, St. Lucie, Santa Rosa Taylor, Walton, Seminole and Wakulla. Scholarships are eligible to both male and female from the next session by the 1925 legislature, Indian River and Gulf. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction is mailing out blanks to which to make application for the competitive examination to county superintendents in all counties in which there are at present vacancies to be filled by examination on August 20.

### Electric Lines Are Run To Oviedo By Public Service Co.

Another central Florida town has just been added to the system of the Florida Public Service Co., now extending its line over 150 miles of additional territory, in the provision being made to supply Oviedo, about 12 miles northwest of Winter Park with light and power.

Plans have been made by the Public Service Company to extend its high tension, transmission lines from Longwood, southwest to Oviedo, a distance of 12 miles.

Oviedo has never before had the facilities of electric lighting and a five year contract has already been signed for street lights. The initial street lighting installation will be approximately fifty-five 100 candle power lamps. Every effort will be made to have the street lighting installation completed early next month.

Many of the small towns in central Florida will take on a much more attractive appearance this fall as the result of street lighting and in many instances modern white ways are being installed. Several towns have disposed of their municipal plants to the Florida Public Service company to be supplied with current from modern steam electric generating stations at Orlando, DeLand, Eustis and Lake Wales. 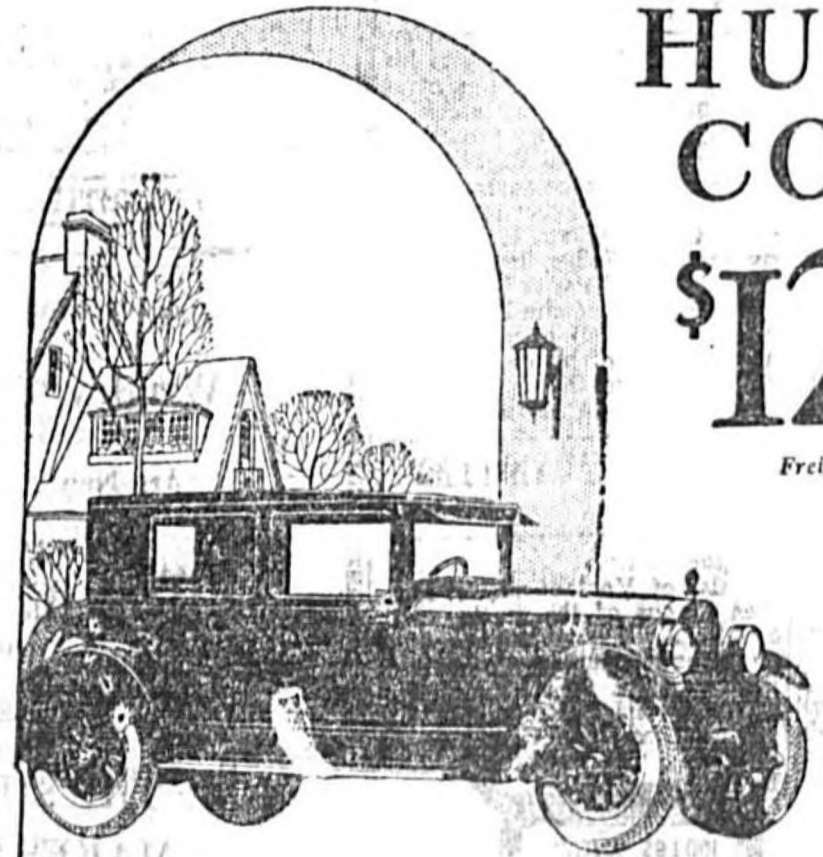
