Space Ferry
EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE Calif. (AP) — The wingless "lifting body" space ferry was five minutes away from its first rocket-powered flight Tuesday when a helium leak forced a postponement. No date was set for another try.

The 22-foot-long, wedge-shaped craft named the HELIX is called a lifting body because it gets aerodynamic lift from its shape not from wings. It has made 11 unpowered glide flights.

For the flight under its own power it was carried eight miles high in a B-52 bomber. Space agency officials said the leak was in helium used to pressurize the craft's alcohol-oxygen fuel system.

Cuban Accent Pervades U. S. Beauty Salons

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Cuban exiles are helping make American women prettier as the Spanish accent increasingly pervades U.S. beauty salons.

When you enter a salon in Miami, where exiles live and tourists visit, the chances are excellent that your beautician will be a Cuban. Most are.

With two-thirds of the refugees who stream into Miami moving on to other cities, the Cuban cosmetic accent is reported spreading to many parts of the nation.

Your Spanish-language beautician may not be able to gossip with you, but she will know enough English to talk about beauty. Many study from a beauticians' dictionary. It shows for example, that a champu de color is a color shampoo, a peluca is a hairpiece, and argunas are wrinkles.

"Beauty is the same in any language," said non-English speaking Blanca Sanchez, who has been operating a salon for three years in a non-Cuban neighborhood. She added: "My hands speak for me."

Vernice Adams, who operates a beauty school which graduates Cubans at the rate of one each weekday, said: "They are creative and have an artistic touch and a love for beauty."

The city beauty board, which issues licenses, reported that 14,000 of Miami's 22,000 beauticians are Cubans. The same ratio is reported in Miami Beach and other cities in this tourist area.

"We are getting more and more Cubans, it seems they are coming in by the carload," commented Miami beauty board supervisor Gilbert Dagher.

Mrs. Sanchez, who came here as a refugee in 1962 after operating a beauty parlor in Cuba for 12 years, said: "One of the first things women do now when they arrive from Cuba is to go to a beauty salon. They have nothing in the way of beauty products in Cuba now."

Adkins, an American who operated a beauty academy in Havana for 15 years, said many of his graduates here go to New York, California, New Jersey and Illinois to practice.

He added: "In the Miami area, it's hard to find a salon that has no Cubans employed."

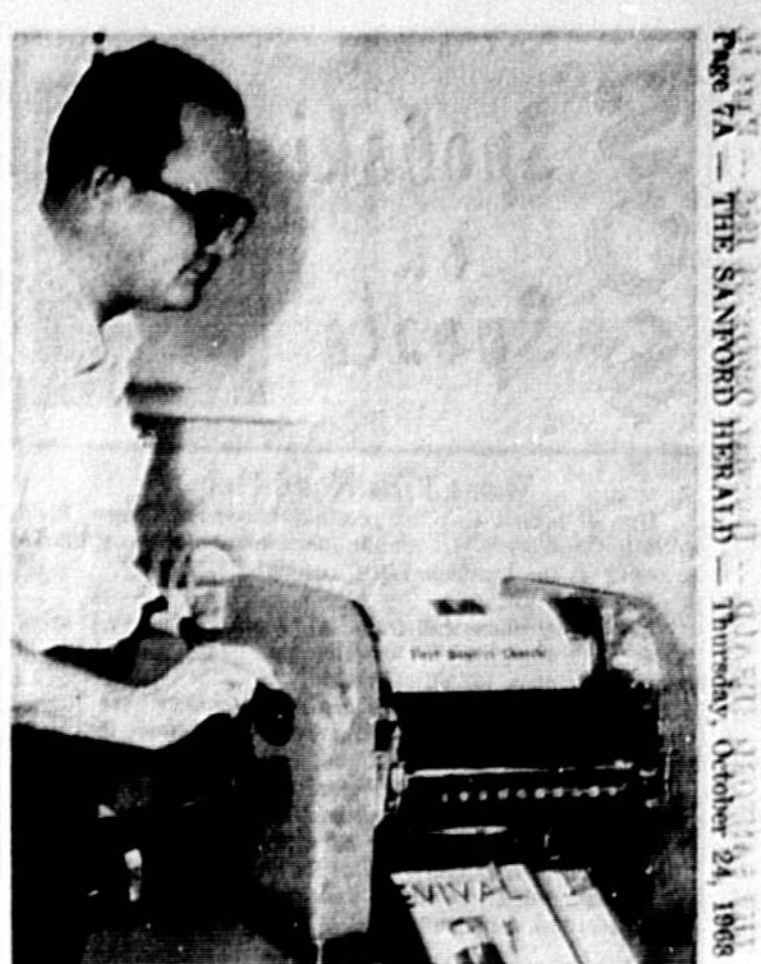

Golden Cascade... Payoffs Rumored In Olympic Tests

MEXICO CITY (AP) — A breath of scandal, a hint of under-the-counter payoffs around the world, threw another darkening cloud over the 1968 Olympic Games today, while the United States continued to gather a golden cascade of medals.

The Americans picked up six more gold medals Wednesday, including their first two in sports other than track and swimming, and the Russians began to make their move in gymnastics, in which 35 gold medals are awarded.

In all, the Americans now have 81 medals, including 39 gold, and the Russians have 45, with 15 gold.

Dan Ferkis, 79, white-haired secretary emeritus of the U.S. Amateur Athletic Union and a newly elected member of the Council of the International Athletic Federation, ruling body for track and field around the world, dropped the bombshell about commercial firms paying athletes to use their products.

"Indications are that payoffs have been made to athletes of virtually all countries," he said, and added that an "investigation centers around those athletes who did not see fit to notify their superiors of the payments."

He said the payoffs range from five hundred dollars to six thousand dollars.

Everett Barnes, acting director of the U.S. Olympic Committee, said in a prepared statement that "at this time we have nothing to substantiate the rumors with respect to athletes subject to our jurisdiction."

"If anyone has any concrete evidence to offer about U.S. athletes in this connection we shall be pleased to follow up the information."

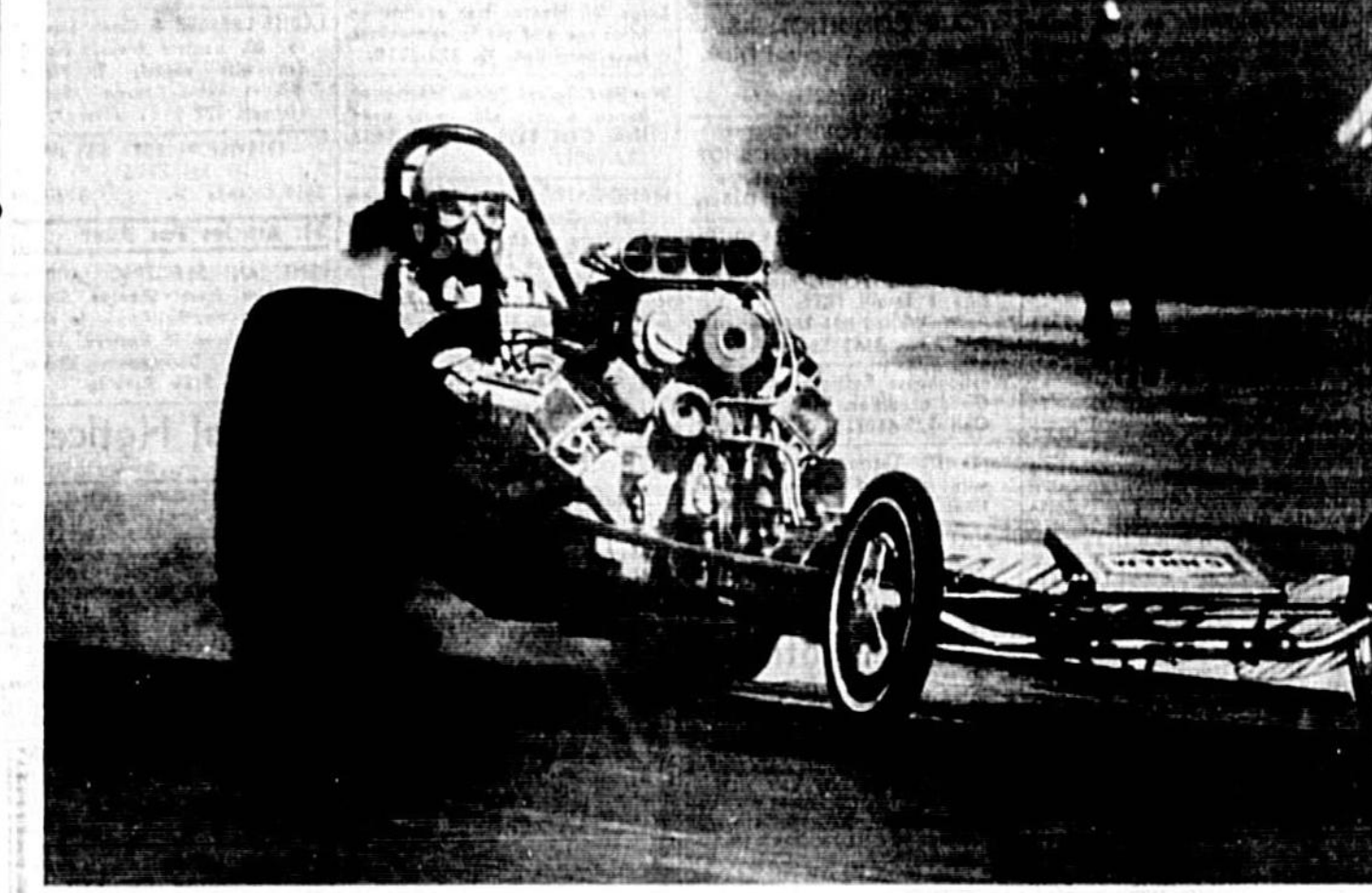

'Queen Elizabeth' On Final Voyage To U. S.

SOUTHAMPTON, England (AP) — The 26-year-old luxury liner Queen Elizabeth was on her last voyage to New York today and eventually will wind up at Fort Lauderdale, Fla., to become an entertainment and convention center.

But Cunard Lines said in a statement Wednesday the 82,000-ton ship would remain under British control for 16 years and Cunard will have control of her board and management.

Cunard said three American businessmen—Charles Willard,

Robert Miller and Stanton Miller—will have a financial interest in the new contract with the Elizabeth Corp. of Florida superseded an agreement made last April.

The corporation to pay Cunard \$2 million a year for 16 years, then the ship will pass to the Elizabeth Corp. for a nominal sum.

Cunard will invest \$1 million in the corporation and will manage management consultants to insure the project is "well structured," the announcement said.

The Elizabeth makes a return run to Southampton Nov. 4 and two days later Queen Mother Elizabeth, who launched her in 1952, will pay a farewell visit.

After that, the vessel makes a final cruise to Gibraltar and the Canary Islands Nov. 8-11, then returns to Southampton while dividing and shore work goes on at Port Everglades, near Fort Lauderdale, where the ship will be docked.

City-County Merger Evaluation Proposed

Majority of preferences voiced during the meeting of local personalities representing various municipalities and governmental groups invited to a session devoted to discussions of city-county consolidation evolved around the need for some sort of study.

Several opinions expressed contained the following comments:

Lawrence Swafford, county commissioner from Altamonte Springs said "there is a need for services to urban areas but where would you draw the line for a rural area that asked for sewer lines and utilities."

He continued with observation that county does not have the means to provide the many types of services requested and observed and suggested that potential home buyers disregard real estate advertising that promises all city conveniences without city taxes. "They just don't come that way," he concluded.

Possible consolidation among four municipalities in the southern portion of the county was brought into the discussion by Casaberry Mayor Curtis Blevins, who reported "I am favorable toward de-centralization more than centralization, but I also feel that Longwood, Altamonte, North Orlando and Casaberry will shortly move for consolidation unless the county does."

North Orlando Mayor Clifford Jordan observed "It is a position similar to 30 towns, but I also feel we should proceed with the study to improve government — not just consolidation."

It was shortly after that Ernie Kimball of Altamonte moved with the resolution which

after amendment was eventually passed.

The meeting was opened by Kenneth McIntosh, Seminole Chamber of Commerce president, who turned the session over to George Touch, chairman of the chamber's consolidation study committee.

Touch asked each person the views of their area toward consolidation and the prevailing opinion concluded that a study was now needed.

Treasure Ship Found After 380 Years In Sea

DUBLIN (AP) — The remains of the Spanish Armada ship sank in 1588, have been found, but hopes of recovering her reputed treasure must wait until next summer.

When Lt. Cmdr. John Gratlan, 31, of Britain's Royal Navy, surfaced in the middle of Blasket Sound with the cry, "We've found her!" it ended a four-month search in which 15 divers covered 3,000 acres.

The Santa Maria de la Rosa was one of 24 ships of the Armada which sank off the Irish coast in September 1588 after Philip of Spain's abortive attempt to invade Elizabethan England.

Sydney Wignall, 65-year-old Welsh businessman and chief sponsor of the search, said: "You'll get some idea of the difficulty if I say that we were like 15 Batmen flying over a town of 40,000 population peering into everybody's backyard to find a 'big haul'."

Blasket Sound, at the tip of the Dingle Peninsula, is pounded by Atlantic combers. Powerful currents stream between three bays, uninhabited by generations. In Spain there are documents describing exactly how the ship sank. In London are accounts of how she sank with only a single survivor of the 233 soldiers and 64 sailors on board. The divers are silent about any discovery of treasure. Documents in London, dated 1588, say the galleon carried 50,000 gold ducats and 50,000 silver coins. Today that would be worth around \$2 million.

John P. King, Dublin lawyer who acts for the diving team, says: "We have been granted a license by the Spanish government to salvage Armada wrecks. We deposited a bond of \$5,000 in return for which we may retain all objects of historical interest and 80 per cent of all coins or other treasure, the Spanish government retaining the remaining 20 per cent."

The treasure hunt starts again next summer, with underwater metal detectors, diver-to-diver and diver-to-ship telephones.

Lakeview Jr. Opens Monday

An Orlando couple, Donna Jene and Stanley James Smith, was arrested under Seminole County grand jury indictments early this morning at their home and released a couple hours later on \$5,000 bond each, Sheriff Peter Millot reported this afternoon. The couple was charged in sealed indictments with conspiracy to operate a lottery.

Long-delayed opening of Lakeview Junior High School will take place Monday — barring any unforeseen circumstances and approximately 800 seventh graders who have been attending afternoon double sessions at Sanford Junior High will have to adjust to arriving at an earlier hour to be ready for "books" at 8 a.m.

The setting of Oct. 28 for opening the new facility was forthcoming yesterday at three-hour sessions of Seminole County School Board.

Delayed for the second time a week ago because of "Hurricane Gladys" and muddy access roads, the Junior High school opening was set back until the passage to the school could be assured for last and walking students, by an extended effort this past week by the paving contractor.

School was originally set for opening with beginning of Fall term but because of labor strikes in the eastern section of the country, bad weather and materials having to be replaced after arriving in a damaged condition, the opening was set till Oct. 21 and finally for Monday.

The completion of this first phase of Lakeview at a \$537,312 total cost and the month-to-start second phase construction will bring the overall cost of the educational complex to \$1.7 million.

School day at Lakeview will begin at 8 a.m. and continue until 2:30 p.m.

There will be no cafeteria facilities in the first phase, so students will be required to bring their lunches from home; milk and orange juice will be provided at the school. Classroom partitions are still to be erected and the school reports an expected delivery date of Nov. 1.

Lack of the movable walls means three classes will be conducted at same time in the same large room.

Composed of two pools with 20 total classrooms, the school is designed in modern concept, is completely air conditioned and carpeted with exception of industrial art areas.

Constructed on red brick inside and out, the school embraces a design which does not reach the ceiling, opening in stead of doors and corridors, all under one level roof.

Students will be able to consult with their teachers in the central circulation area, where student lockers are fastened.

Rooms will be labeled with numbers, teacher and subject taught within.

Second phase construction by John A. Burton IV architectural firm is expected to begin after first of year with a third pool of classrooms, a gymnasium, administrative offices and cafeteria.

Located adjacent to Lake Jennie and Seminole High School, the new school expects a projected enrollment of over 1,000 students when opened.

Tucker and Tucker would name officials who had offered encouragement to the group seeking to stop construction of a new courthouse in Sanford but did say some political help was offered.

A coming law suit to halt additions and construction to Seminole Memorial Hospital will be filed by a South Seminole group who object to the continuing use of county tax receipts to construct wings and add on to the Sanford-based medical facility, since the group contends the southern part of the county has no medical center to serve the bulk of the county population.

This was revealed by Robert Tucker, principal in the recently successful appeal of a Circuit Court decision relative to the naming of a permanent county seat for Seminole County.

Convention Bureau OK'd

Temporarily At SNAS

Voc-Tech School Site Eyed

Seminole County Board of Public Instruction at yesterday afternoon session approved a request from County School Supt. William J. Phillips that he ask City of Sanford for temporary use of certain buildings at the phased-out Sanford Naval Air Station to establish an area vocational-technical school.

Phillips requested that same buildings be used temporarily at location on same campus with Seminole Junior College. Buildings would operate temporarily at the defunct naval base until permanent buildings could be constructed at an approved site.

Phillips' request called for board's authority to seek city's cooperation in using the base buildings and replied to a question from the board as to whether city was in a position to allow use of the base since title had yet to be conveyed from U.S. General Services Administration.

Phillips replied that "City was in a position to allow private industry to go on the base and therefore they were also in a position to allow us."

Possibility exists that same buildings might be destroyed by some engineer's mistake by Phillips would be to approach city commission with a request.

The school board, in another action, authorized the payment of \$1,500 for nine months or a total \$9,000 to provide an on-the-job engineer to keep tabs on the construction of Lyman School now underway.

School board recently let \$279,000 contract to Graham Construction Company of Orlando to build the high school facility.

Action yesterday came after a request from Roland Lee of Watson and Company, an architectural firm located at Tampa, who asked the educators to provide a qualified man to stay on the site to check on progress of the school construction.

Lee said it would require \$1,300 to provide for a project representative. He told the board that he would take the \$1,300 proposal back to his firm in respect.
