

## Democrats Warming Up For Miami

When the results of the California, New Jersey and New Mexico presidential primaries of this week are analyzed and placed in perspective there are two viewpoints which must be

One is the impact on the Democratic nominating convention which convenes in Miami Beach next month to adopt a platform and select

The other is the graver and more significant contest which will end in November when a president and vice-president of the United States

Perhaps one general conclusion is allowed about all of these state presidential primaries. This is that they have served notice that they are fallible, misleading and far too expensive in terms of money and manpower.

Whether or not a national presidential primary, as proposed by those two senatorstatesmen, Democrat Mike Mansfield of Montana and Republican George D. Aiken of Vermont, is a remedy for this political ill needs attention before 1976.

For the Democrats this has been a season of change. In no other candidate has the change been so interestingly embodied as in the fortunes of Senator George McGovern of South Dakota who has skyrocketed into an arc of delegate strength which could make him a first-ballot winner in Miama Beach.

Even if the degree of victory which this Senator enjoyed over a brother Democrat-Senator Hubert H. Humphrey-has dwindled from the 20 per cent so glibly forecast by some pollsters to about five per cent, this is enough to nail down the total delegate strength which California enjoys of 271.

Thus Candidate McGovern occupies the front-runner seat which was so comfortably occupied by Senator Edward S. Muskie of Maine until the state primaries gave him a rather unceremonious "Heave-Ho!"

The McGovern situation, so far as his own fortunes are concerned, could not be more favorable in terms of delegates. What the Democratic party must now face is

nevertheless, the need to nominate a candidate who is the best to represent the Democratic party and with enough party support to mobilize this majority party and to attract enough of the newly enfranchised voters, independents and dissidents to prevent President Richard M. Nixon to have a second term in the Wnite House. We have commented before and repeat that

this sort of treatment by the American electorate - the denial of a second term - is almost without precedent. It was the economic crisis



## Businessmen and Ecologists Unite

SALINAS, Calif. - When development-oriented Chamber of Commerce types and environmentally concerned young people sit down together at a conference table, there is usually all the warm cordiality of a dogfight. Although true of many American communities, that statement does not apply to this agriculturally rich city of 60,000 on California's central

Salinas, through its newly founded Environmental Committee, is dispelling the myth that business is business, and ecology is ecology and never the twain shall meet. Formed by the Chamber of Commerce about a year ago,

- Launched a glass recycling program that returned ions of old glass to new use;

- Begun a mixed metal recycling project that saved valuable and irreplaceable metals from waste; Initiated a newspaper salvage program that recycled 121/2 tons of newsprint on its opening weekend;

- Offered recognition to industries making efforts to conform with pollution control regulations. Those who wonder how an infant committee could ac-

complish all that in a single year, need look no further than its chairman and driving force, Ruth Andresen. A homemaker, mother and geologist with an advanced degree in marine geology, Mrs. Andresen has the tough job of bridging the gap between conservative businessmen and farout young people who tend toward eager activism. It is the balance between foot dragging and unbridled crusading that has kept the Environmental Committee in fairly good standing with both sides.

There was some resistance to the committee at first. Mrs. Andresen recalls that when the committee was proposed, "One city official was scared to death that we would become some kind of militant organization. The rest probably thought we would do a bird census." Both extreme views were incorrect. The committee drew

up a position paper and began investigating the possibility of recycling nonrenewable resources. Glass came first on the committee's battle plan for the environment because there was a ready market for crushed

glass in Oakland, Calif. The J. M. Smucker Co. plant offered its loading dock area for use as a weekend recycling facility, and company employes donated their free time to operate forklifts and other equipment. Manpower for the projects came from nonprofit civic and youth organizations, which received proceeds from the sale of recycled materials.

Only one tenuous link remained in the recycling chain transportation of materials from Salinas to recycling plants in the San Francisco Bay Area, about 100 miles northward. The hurdle was negotiated when several Salinas area trucking firms donated their vehicles and drivers to the environmental cause

Summit Crucial To Brezhnev Aims By RAY CROMLEY

WASHINGTON (NEA) Information trickling here from Moscow indicates President Nixon's visit was crucial to Leonid Brezhnev's drive for absolute power within the Politburo of the Communist party and the government of the Soviet Union. This was apparently one major reason that Brezhnev would not let anything-the mining of Haiphong harbor or pressures within the Communist world-prevent the Nixon meetings from taking place.

The Nixon summit session and its preliminaries have already enabled Brezhnev to goad P. Ye. Shelest, one of his four principal rivals, into an opposition so strong and so unacceptable by Politburo standards that Brezhnev was able to oust him as First Secretary of the Ukrainian Communist party, one of the most powerful posts in the U.S.S.R., and to put in his own man, V. V. Shcherbitsky, Thus Shelest's power base is gone, weakening seriously

The demotion of Shelest was step three in Brezhnev's four-stage program for pulling the fangs of the four men most likely to block his move toward one-man rule or to attempt a takeover on their own.

Brezhnev already had been successful in removing G. I. Voronov as head of the Russian Republic and Aleksander Shelepin as a Communist party secretary, leaving only Nikolai Podgorny, president of the U.S.S.R., with dangerous strength. While these rivals remain as members of the Politburo, Voronov, Shelepin and now Shelest have each lost his primary source of strength. At last report, Shelepin had been moved from seventh

to 11th place in the 15-man Politburo, Voronov down from fifth to 10th place. Podgorny held firmly to the number two spot, up actually from a few years back.

Where Shelest now ranks is not yet clear, but he is undoubtedly close to the bottom of the Politburo ranking. The U.S. economic aid and trade concessions, if they come through as anticipated, will enable Brezhnev to move in with more solid power over the economic ministries. These operations in theory should be in the hands of Aleksei Kosygin, as head of the government. But Brezhnev had previously taken steps to increase

the power of the party men directly in industry and agriculture. The increase in party direct management, or course, gave more power to Brezhnev, as First Secretary of the Communist party of the U.S.S.R. The economic deals, when they come through, should also enable Brezhnev to avoid the economic crises which

led to Khrushchev's fall. The prestige given Brezhnev by his arms deal, by West German recognition of crucial East European borders and the rising prospect for some American withdrawals in Europe, coupled with the demotion of Shelest and the others, will enable Brezhnev to expand considerably the careful party purge he has been carrying on-removing the proteges of his rivals down the ladder and putting in his own men in critical areas.

What this growing Brezhnev power will mean for the United States is not clear. With less rivalry, the theory is that he could have more strength to move toward settling outstanding issues with the West. Or he could make bold moves not at all to our liking. Only time will

It is a liturgy we learn as children in America. And many of us never forsake it. Such is our devotion to firearms, in fact, that despite countless personal and national tragedies in recent years, we have taken, on the national level, no substantial steps

to combat the gun menace. The attempted assassination of Gov. George Wallace and the subsequent mass shooting in Raleigh, N.C., have led to the expected demands for gun control. But we are in the melancholy situation of having undergone enough of these atrocities to have created a set of ritual reactions, which includes pleas for more restrictions on the

As the weeks and months go by, though, we forget.


The pleas become fainter and fainter. Until next time. The availability of guns is, of course, only one factor in the unhappy combination of circumstances that has made assassinations such a common occurrence. But it is a

To argue, as the opponents of gun control do, that "guns don't kill people, people do," is ridiculous. Nuclear weapons don't kill people, either, but we have placed restraints on them because they make it temptingly easy to kill people, as guns do on a smaller scale. As a murder weapon, a gun is relatively reliable, relatively easy to use, relatively independent of the killer's size, strength or skill. More than 10,500 Americans were murdered by firearms last year. We have some existing controls. The federal Gun Con-


trol Act of 1968 bans importation of cheap firearms (though not the importation of parts for assembly here) and requires buyers of guns and ammunition to furnish identification. And many states have their own laws, such as New York State's Sullivan Law, which requires buyers of handguns, the most dangerous of firearms, to obtain a license

But existing laws are obviously insufficient.


