'Stalling Charges' Erupt At Board-SEA Negotiations

Amid charges of "Mickey Mouse Routines" on the part of county school officials, the Seminole Education Association (SEA) has presented it 75-page master contract calling for a \$10,000 beginning salary for teachers. In the first official bargaining session yesterday, SEA presented the lengthy document listing everything from "grievance procedures" to "class sizes" to the county's chief negotiator, Harry Pelley. Immediately, Pelley called for 19 working days to study the SEA proposal, and SEA Chief Negotiator Steve Rosenthal said, "I'm willing to give you eight days." But Pelley was adamant and announced, "I'm taking 19."

\$10,000 For Beginning Teachers SEA Eyes Hike In Salaries

Some three years in the making, the Seminole Education Association's (SEA) master contract proposal is a 75-page document listing everything from "grievance procedures" to "class sizes" to the county's chief negotiator, Harry Pelley. Pelley says the contract "looks like it's pretty thorough" and that it covers "an awful lot of territory and an awful lot of money." Pelley said he only has had a chance to glance over the SEA proposal. School officials will begin today taking it apart piece by piece, and Pelley will come back with a counter proposal. Ernie Cowley, assistant director of personnel, said specialists, compensations and expenses, support of teachers, substitute teachers, promotions and reduction of personnel. SEA officials say the reduction in personnel section is important because of the state's reduced funding. It specifies which teachers will be laid off in the event of a reduction of funds. Also included is a section calling for a cost of living increase for the educational community. As the cost of living goes up a teacher's salary would rise accordingly. At present, SEA says no cost of living increase exists in the county. Other items in the document include association and teacher rights, teaching days and hours, curriculum and instruction, professional

Banks' 'Secret' Political Fund Tied To Local Elections

By DONNA ESTES Herald Staff Writer. Money from a secret bank political fund, controlled by ComBank Corp. President E. G. (Jerry) Banks, was funneled into at least one Seminole County election campaign in 1972. Jack Toole, president of ComBank Casselberry said Tuesday a \$200 contribution was made from the fund in 1972 to Seminole County Tax Collector Troy Ray's (ret.) campaign in the name of then bank officer L. Col. (ret.) Campbell A. Kidd of Casselberry. Toole did not recall whether he or someone else made the contribution in Kidd's name. Kidd, from his Casselberry home, said he did not make the contribution dated Oct. 30, 1972 and noted in Ray's 1972 election reports. Kidd said he was told by Toole \$100 or so would be given in his name. "I had nothing to do with it," he said. Ray said Toole, whom he has known for a long time, called him during the campaign to say the bank wished to make a donation "in the interest of good government." "I told him I could not accept a contribution from the bank," Ray said. "My impression was that I could not do it."

Courtroom Violence Feared Robbery Trial Security Tight

By BOB LLOYD Herald Staff Writer. Amid tight security measures, prospective jurors were questioned today by Circuit Court Judge David U. Strawn, defense and prosecution attorneys about their possible exposure to pre-trial publicity as selection of a jury began in the trial of a 23-year-old Kentucky man accused of robbing a Winn-Dixie supermarket Jan. 5 at Brantley Square, Altamonte Springs. Four Deputy Sheriff's were placed in the courtroom, two of them near the defendant in leg irons near the defense table, and deputies were patrolling the corridors outside the courtroom. Also a deputy at the rear of the courtroom had a hand-held metal detector, apparently checking the few spectators who attended the opening of the trial. Gary Lynn Gilvin, unemployed electrician from Mt. Sterling, Ky. has already received two life sentences in Indian River County for robberies, a five-year sentence in Orange County and faces additional robbery-connected charges here in Seminole. He has also been charged with third-degree arson in a March 26 mattress fire in his cell in the Seminole County Jail that investigators say may have been set to mask an escape attempt. Gilvin received minor hand burns in the incident. Defense attorney James Graham yesterday moved to postpone Gilvin's trial after a news article detailed Judge Strawn's request Monday to county commissioners that a telephone buzzer alarm be installed in courtrooms to alert armed deputies at the adjacent jail in case of courtroom violence. Strawn indicated his concern about possible violence at trials was catalyzed by reports that Gilvin has threatened "to leave bodies all around the courthouse" with help from outside sources at his trial. "With a buzzer system on phones," Strawn told commissioners, "we could alert armed deputies who are stationed in the jail." Strawn declared, "We'd like not to rely on a shotgun blast as a first warning" of any trouble. In describing the potential crisis that could arise in the Gilvin case, Strawn invited the commissioners to sit in on the trial to "see first hand what it looks like when a situation can develop." Strawn yesterday denied Graham's motion for postponement of the Gilvin trial and Graham said in light of the publicity he feels obligated to discuss with Gilvin a possible motion to have Strawn disqualify himself from trying the case. Strawn read the Herald article on his request for the alarm system and said, "It's true, that's what I told the county commissioners." He said he fails to see grounds, based on the article, to disqualify himself. However, Graham was told if he intended to file affidavits needed for disqualification to do so this morning because Strawn anticipated starting the Gilvin trial today. Strawn then went from chambers to the courtroom and instructed waiting jury members who will be used in the election, and Davis, who was defeated in his bid for reelection to the county commission, all deny receiving contributions from the fund. Hattaway's campaign report showed a contribution of \$200 on Oct. 30, 1972 from Allen Jones, Longwood-Markham Road, Longwood. Hattaway, when asked about the Allen Jones contribution, said, "I think you are talking of an old friend, Verlan Jones, whom I have known forever." Hattaway said he has had an account at ComBank Casselberry where Jones is an official since the bank opened. Hattaway said Jones made the contribution personally. He said Jones' use of the name Allen is not unusual, pointing out although his (Hattaway's) name is James, he is known by his middle name Mike. Jones, an officer at ComBank Casselberry, said his contribution to the Hattaway campaign "was from me and not from this bank. I have not made any contribution on behalf of ComBank." "I never received a dollar from Banks," Davis said. "I could have used the money at the time, but now I'm glad I did not receive any from there." Davis' file in Seminole Circuit Court Clerk Arthur Beckwith's office did not include a final report from the 1972 election. The last report in the file showed contributions of \$17,878 and expenditures of \$12,943.90. However, Davis said he did file a final report and there was no balance in the campaign account after the election. "I didn't get it," Layer said of the reported contribution and none is recorded in Layer's campaign report from the Casselberry bank, the ComBank Corp. or its officers.

Fine Arts, Tech Buildings Okayed

Seminole Junior College's board of trustees yesterday approved construction of fine arts and vocational-tech buildings at a cost of \$2.5 million. SJC President Earl Weldon said today the final approval of funds has been budgeted, he said. When that approval arrives, Weldon said the construction bids will be let for the two buildings. Also, Weldon told trustees that the school's financial position is pretty much the same and won't change until it's known exactly how much money is forthcoming from the legislature. One item Weldon said he does fear is an elimination of the school's "open door" policy. Basically, the "open door" policy allows anyone with a high school diploma or its equivalent entry to the college. Weldon said many junior colleges across the state are considering abandonment of the "open door" because of a predicted reduction in funding. However, he says he hopes it doesn't happen at SJC. If it does, Weldon said he would set up some type of "amended open door" which would ensure those students presently enrolled at SJC a place in next year's classes. After those students are securely enrolled, Weldon said school officials would have to determine an admissions policy for the remainder of those persons seeking entry to the school. Weldon said in addition to an anticipated decrease in state funds, enrollment at SJC is soaring. School officials have been preparing a report on austerity measures to enact in the event SJC's budget is reduced by \$450,000 next year.

Father Of Three Sobs With Relief At Innocent Verdict Jury Exonerates Weirwein Of Sexual Assault Charges

Herbert Weirwein, 50, of Lake Moore, sobbed with relief as he buried his head in his arms at the defense table, then slowly rose saying, "Thank you all!" to heartily shake hands with each person on a six-member Circuit Court jury here yesterday afternoon.

Atlatomte Springs man charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony and grand larceny in a burglary at Sobik's Warehouse, SR-436.
Circuit Court Judge Roger Dykes ordered Willie Rogers Holmes, 19, of 151 Lennard Street held in jail pending a pre-sentence investigation. Holmes received a maximum sentence of 15 years in prison in the case. Assistant State Attorney James E. Figgatt dropped charges last week against a defendant in the case, Odell Banks, 22, of 409 Rosewood Lane, Altamonte Springs, as part of a negotiations for a guilty plea in a separate case.

The state's key witness against Holmes, supermarket stock boy Calvin Watson, testified that he had watched in the darkness as Holmes had loaded meat, hams, and other items from the warehouse into a car.
Figgatt said Holmes apparently took the stolen items to his residence "and marketed them from his home."
Holmes testified he wasn't at the burglary scene the night of Jan. 15 and defense attorney Allan Dickey charged Gordon Dickey questioned why Gordon Dickey had waited until Banks and Holmes had been arrested on burglary charges to tell Sheriff's investigators that he saw the pair steal the food-stuffs.

Trio Maintain Their Innocence

Judge Sentences 3 Sanford Men For Grocery Robbery

Three Sanford men found guilty of robbery and use of a firearm in commission of a felony in a December trial at Sanford have been sentenced to prison terms by Circuit Court Judge A.J. Hosemann Jr.

Eric Earl Williams, 21, yesterday received a 30-year sentence and Clayton E. Eubanks, 18, and Hervon Carter, 20, both received 20 year sentences.

The trio continued to maintain their innocence and Eubanks said he'll appeal the conviction and sentence.

A jury found the trio guilty in the Oct. 5 armed robbery of Jolly Charlie's Grocery on SR-49 east of Sanford. The clerk who was robbed identified the defendants as the three men who robbed her and said Eubanks was armed with a small revolver.

Each defendant presented alibi witnesses who testified he was elsewhere at the time of the robbery.

Carter was the driver of a car in which Williams was a passenger earlier after a robbery in Brevard County. Williams was also convicted in that case.

Yesterday, Carter told the court, "I didn't do the crime I was convicted of. I feel I haven't been given justice. I don't think I should get any

'Loaner' Receives Probation

A 24-year-old former Altamonte Springs resident, arrested last August on loan-sharking charges, was put on two years probation yesterday in the states of Ohio and Michigan by Circuit Court Judge A. J. Hosemann Jr. at Sanford.

Carl D. Cammerucci, 24, resided at Altamonte Springs when arrested by Sheriff's agents. He entered a plea of no contest Dec. 16 to three counts of the lesser and included offenses of attempted loan-sharking. Maximum sentence on the third-degree misdemeanor pleas could have been three years in jail.

Cammerucci said he is now working in Cincinnati, Ohio, and is required to travel to Michigan each week. The court withheld adjudication of guilt on the pleas and placed him on probation in the two northern states under a reciprocal probation supervision compact.

"It is the conclusion of the court," Hosemann said, "that you just exercised bad judgment."

When Cammerucci was arrested, detectives said the arrest resulted from a two-and-one-half month investigation after a complaint by a Seminole-Orange County businessman. Agents would not comment on the size of the alleged loan-sharking business, or any possible link to organized crime.

Detectives explained that loan sharks operate on the principal of large, short-term loans paid back at an exorbitant interest rate.

In a separate case, Hosemann sentenced 18-year-old Arvester Holly to three years in prison for violation of probation in a burglary case.

"I made a mistake," Hosemann said. "Your probation supervisor has had to chase you down 60 or 70 times. You wouldn't even go to his office when requested."

Holly pleaded guilty to violating probation by failing to file required monthly reports with his probation officer since last November.

time for a crime I didn't commit."
"I gave you as fair and impartial trial as possible," Hosemann answered. "And I don't appreciate you saying you've been railroaded by the court. Two witnesses at your trial identified you and the two co-defendants as the robbers."

"You've got a chip on your shoulder," Hosemann told Carter, "and if you don't get it off you'll spend the rest of your life in prison. There's no way I can't give you any time but you'll be able to get parole if you get the chip off your

shoulder."
In a separate case, Judge Hosemann sentenced John Hess Young, 21, of Orlando, to three years in prison on a guilty plea to attempted robbery in a purse-snatching.

"You actually robbed that woman," Hosemann told Young. "You knocked her down, took her purse and ran. Then you got two kids to take the purse back for a reward and then you split the reward money."

Young claimed "he'd learned his lesson" but the court noted he hadn't been a model prisoner in county jail during the present investigation.

Young was one of three inmates charged this week with third-degree arson in a March 25 cellblock fire that investigators say they believe was started with a mattress to mask an escape attempt. There was no escape, but six men from the 12-man cellblock were treated for smoke inhalation and a seventh inmate was treated for minor hand burns.

"I can't put you on probation but I think in hurting you (prison) I can help you in some way," Hosemann said. He said the court will recommend to the Department of Corrections that Young be placed in a youthful offender camp for the three-year sentence.

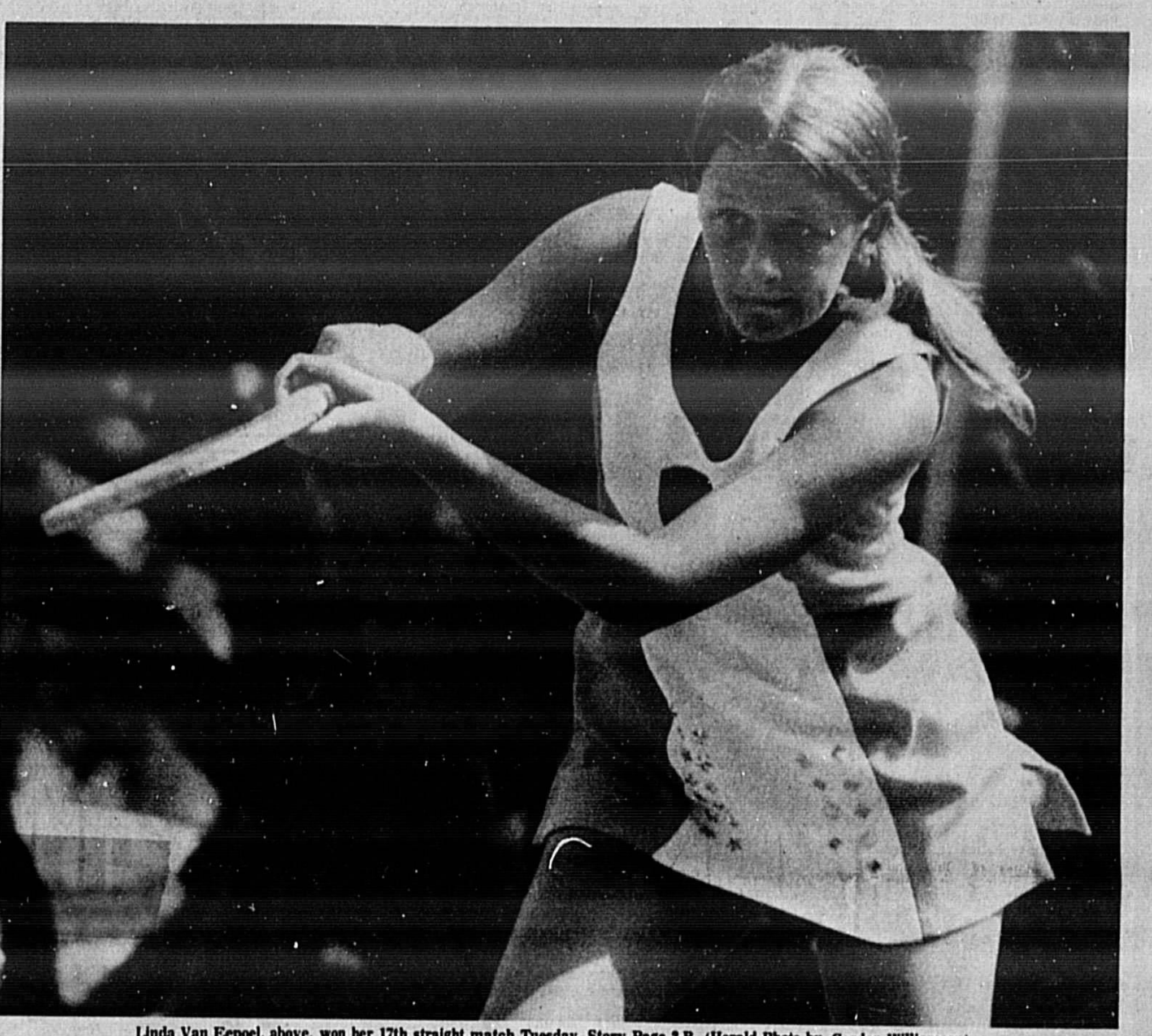

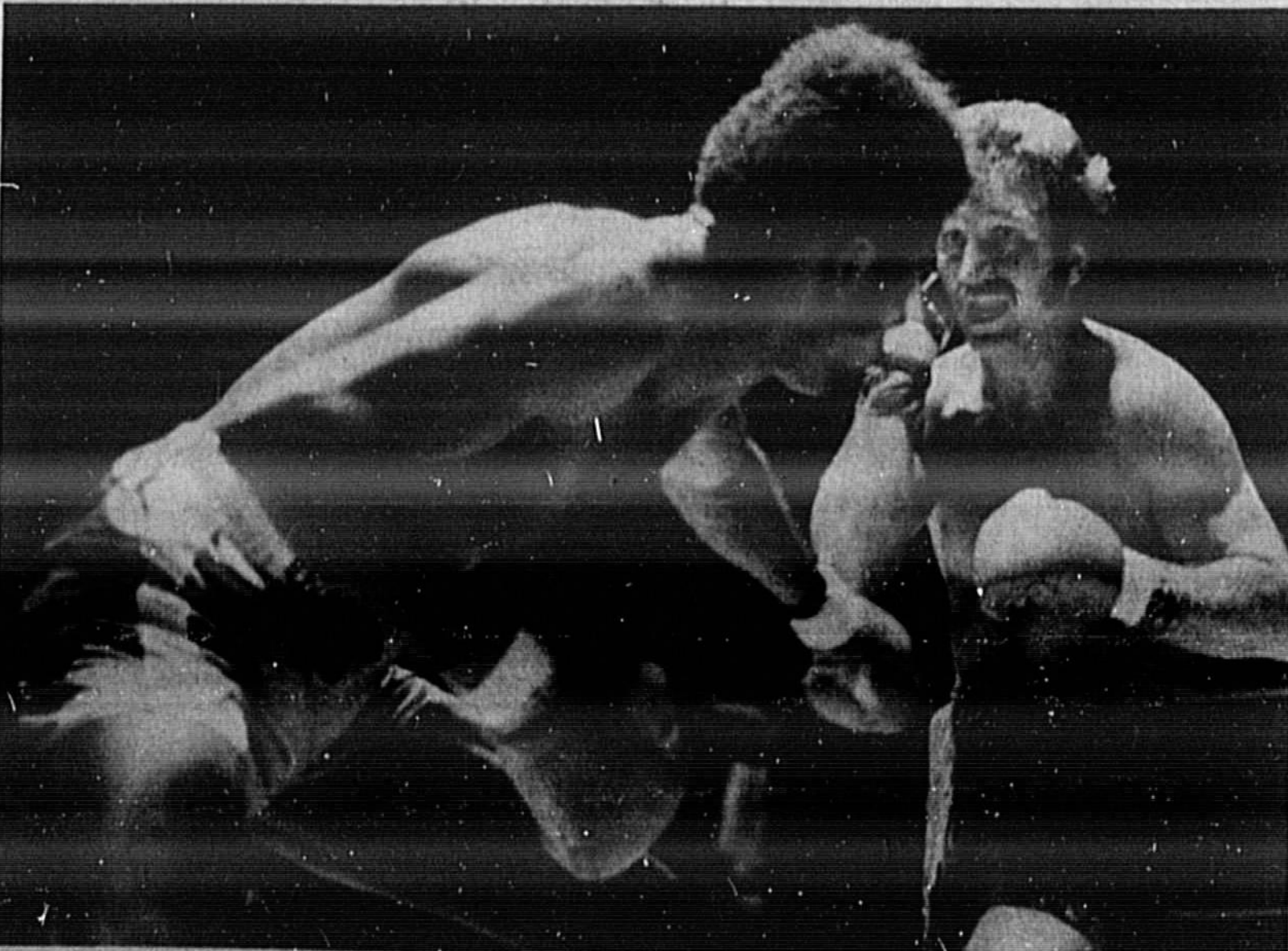

Bread Pudding Can Be Elegant

MINI-BUNDT MARBLE CAKE
Small version of the self-marbling cake recipe that readers keep asking us to repeat. 1½ cups cake flour, stir to aerate before measuring. 1½ teaspoons baking powder. ¼ teaspoon salt. ¼ cup butter or margarine. 1 cup sugar. ½ teaspoon vanilla. 2 eggs. ½ cup milk. 2 ounces sweet cooking chocolate, melted and slightly cooled.

Use a cooking spray to cover the inner surface of a small (6 cup) bundt pan, even if it has a no-stick lining. Thoroughly stir together the flour, baking powder and salt. Cream butter, sugar and vanilla; beat in eggs one at a time. Stir in flour one-third at a time, alternately with milk, just until smooth. Turn half of the batter into prepared pan. Fold chocolate into remaining batter and spoon over plain batter, being careful not to spread it thickly around tube. During baking, chocolate batter (heavier than plain) will sink to bottom, creating a marble effect. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean — about 45 minutes. Loosen edges and around tube using a small plastic knife if pan has a no-stick lining; cool.

RYE QUICK BREAD
Raisins, dates and walnuts stud this exceptionally good loaf.

1 cup white flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1½ cups medium rye flour
Large egg
1-3rd cup firmly packed dark brown sugar
¼ cup milk
¼ cup raisins
½ cup pitted dates, cut up
1 cup coarsely broken walnuts

Thoroughly stir together the white flour, baking powder, salt and rye flour. Beat egg until foamy; add brown sugar and beat until thick; add milk and beat to blend; add flour mixture; stir until moistened — mixture will be thick. Fold in raisins, dates and walnuts. Turn into a well-greased loaf pan (8½ by 4½ by 2½ inches); allow to stand 20 minutes. Bake in a preheated 325-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean — 50 minutes. Turn out on wire rack; turn right side up. Cool completely. Wrap tightly in plastic wrap and let stand (to soften crust) 4 to 6 hours before slicing thin. Serve with butter or margarine.

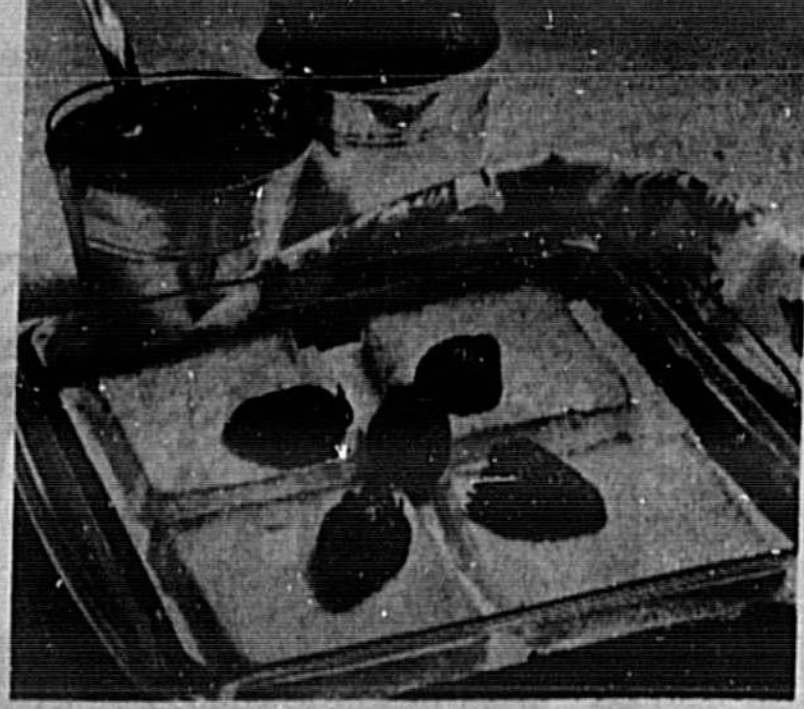

2 cups flour, stir to aerate before measuring.
1 cup sugar
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ cup butter or margarine
1 envelope active dry yeast
¼ cup warm water
1 egg
¼ cup lukewarm milk
2-3rd cup sliced almonds
¼ cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Stir together flour, salt and sugar; cut in butter until particles are fine. Dissolve yeast in water. Beat egg slightly; remove 1 tablespoon and set aside. Combine yeast, milk and remaining egg; stir into flour mixture — dough should be soft. Cover and let rise in warm, draft-free place until doubled — 1 to 1½ hours. Punch down; divide into 12 equal pieces. Roll each on a lightly floured board to a 4-inch round. Set aside 2 tablespoons almonds. Divide remaining almonds and the chocolate among the rounds placing on center of each. Fold over edges to enclose filling; pinch together to seal. Place seam side down about 2 inches apart on lightly greased cookie sheet. Brush tops lightly with extra melted butter. Let rise as previously until doubled — about 45 minutes. Brush with the reserved egg; sprinkle with reserved almonds. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until browned — about 20 minutes. Serve warm (chocolate will be gooey) or cold (chocolate will stiffen). Makes 1 dozen.

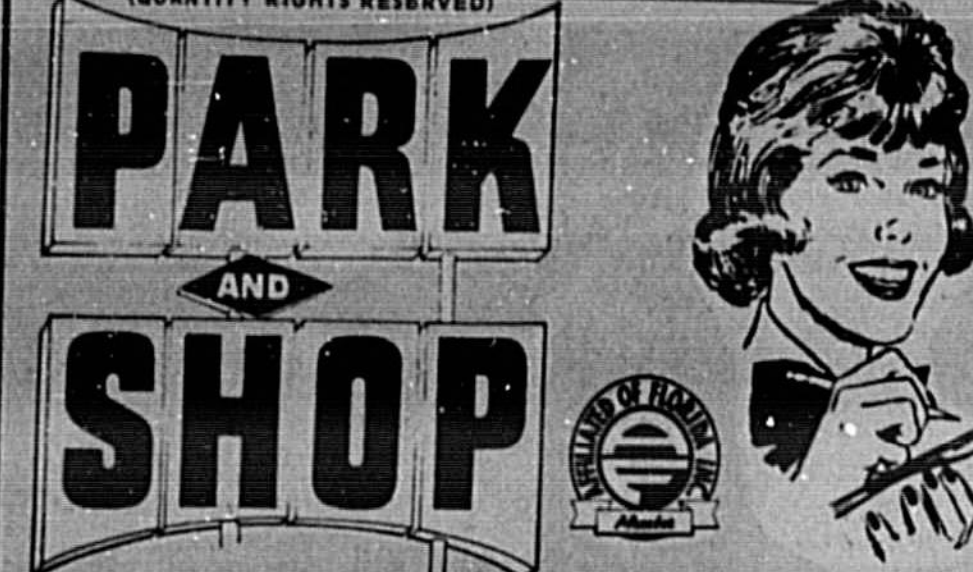

MOLDED SALMON SALAD
It stretches the high-quality protein of the fish.
1½ teaspoons unflavored gelatin
7½-ounce can salmon
¼ cup finely diced celery
1 tablespoon minced onion
1½ teaspoons lemon juice
2 tablespoons sweet pickle relish
1½ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
½ cup mayonnaise

In a 1-quart metal mixing bowl or saucepan soften the gelatin in 2 tablespoons cold water. Drain salmon. To the salmon liquid add enough water to make ¼ cup; add to gelatin and over very low heat stir with a rubber spatula (especially around sides of bowl) until gelatin dissolves. Remove skin and large bones from salmon; add to gelatin mixture with remaining ingredients; mix well but do not mash salmon. Cover and keep chilled until serving time, then unmold. Serve with lettuce, sliced cucumbers, oil-and-vinegar dressing and radishes.

1 tablespoon prepared hot mustard

Place riblets, bone side up, in single layers in 1 large and 1 medium roasting pan. Bake on 2 center racks in a preheated 325-degree oven for 1½ hours. Remove riblets in large pan to small pan. Pour off fat from large pan and place all the riblets, bone side down, in a single layer in it — riblets will have shrunk. Stir together the remaining ingredients and pour over riblets. Tightly cover pan with heavyweight foil. Continue baking in the 325-degree oven until meat is very tender — 45 to 50 minutes longer. Remove riblets and keep warm. Pour sauce into a small bowl and skim off as much fat as possible. Reheat sauce and pour over riblets. Or chill riblets and sauce separately; remove hardened fat from sauce and heat riblets in it in a large skillet. Makes 6 servings.
