TAKE MEXICO IS THE ADVICE OF GOVERNOR

FERGUSON OF TEXAS THINKS WE SHOULD HAVE MEXICO IN POSSESSION

Austin, Texas, May 12.—Governor James E. Ferguson of Texas, on his return to Austin issued a signed statement, in which he declared that now was the proper time for United States intervention in Mexico.

Governor Ferguson said in his statement: "We may as well finish the job. Temporary protection of the border will accomplish nothing. If we catch and punish one bandit horde, another takes its place.

"A ruler put in power today is betrayed tomorrow. Loyalty to any leader is lacking and patriotism is unknown. The ruthless spillings of American blood on American soil now gives us justification, and it is our duty to do whatever is necessary to permanently prevent a recurrence of such outrages against our people.

"Millions of starving people in Mexico are for food and protection from the assassin band. As one who has hoped against hope that a ruler might arise at the right time to restore peace, I have reviewed the situation from time to time. As one who has seen, as one who has witnessed and now endorses the policy of the present administration, as one who has measured his word, and now mindful of the position here announced and its consequences, I have come reluctantly to the conclusion that it now is the solemn duty of the United States to enter Mexico and assume control of that unfortunate country and give to the Mexican people that stability of government which they are now in need of.

Columbus, Ga., May 10. The Industrial Index says in its issue for this week:

**TEXT OF PRESIDENT'S NOTE**

**WHICH WILL DETERMINE THE CRISIS PENDING.**

Washington, May 11. Following is the text of the note called by Secretary Lansing to Ambassador Bernstorff at Berlin with instructions to present it to the German minister of foreign affairs.

The note of the imperial government of Germany under date of May 4, 1916, has received careful consideration by the government of the United States. It is especially noted that the purpose of the imperial government as to the future, that it is prepared to do its utmost to bring to an amicable settlement the critical questions arising from that policy. Accepting the imperial government's declaration of its abandonment of the policy which has so seriously menaced the good relations between the two countries, the government of the United States will rely upon a scrupulous execution henceforth of the new altered policy of the imperial government, such as will remove the principal causes of an interruption of the good relations existing between the United States and Germany.

The government of the United States feels it necessary to state that it takes it for granted that the imperial German government does not intend to imply that the maintenance of its newly announced policy is in any way contingent upon the course of result of diplomatic negotiations between the government of the United States and any other

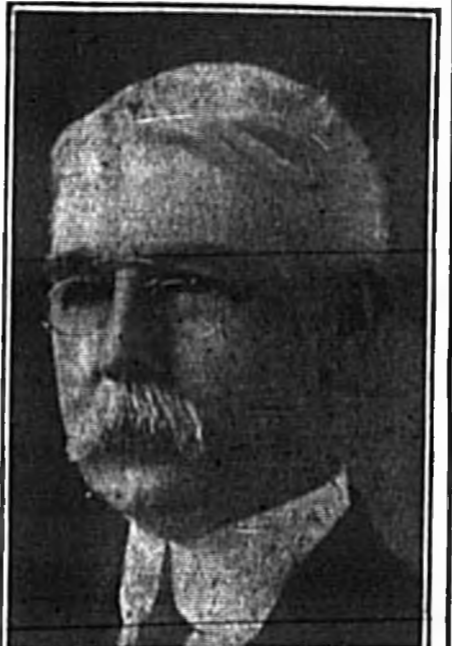

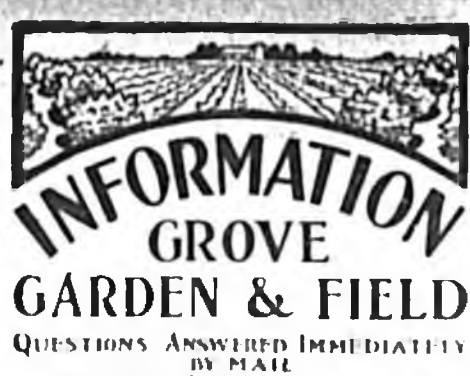

Are there other than climate reasons for bananas in the center of the state not setting full bunches?

ANSWER: Your trouble is probably largely climate. The banana flourishes on organic matter, much ing, stable manure, etc.

There are spots on our place where shrubs will not grow for several years then without any apparent reason die.

ANSWER: We, of course, cannot say for certain that this is the trouble at your place.

Home Made Lime Sulphur. How should I mix my home made lime sulphur for my citrus grove?

ANSWER: We do not know the formula you are using and even if we there is a vast difference in the finished liquid product.

We consider the purchase of a good concentrate of proper strength, free of sediment and a thoroughly dependable mixture all the way through.

Pruning For Winter. I had my citrus grove pruned last year for winter but I notice the same dying back of the limbs on many of the trees.

ANSWER: Perhaps in pruning your trees the cuts were not made in a way to prevent the rotting of all the portions.

Fertilizer For Peach Trees. What kind of fertilizer is best for peach trees?

ANSWER: Practically every source of plant food is congenial to the peach tree. For best results the sources should be proportioned to give a steady supply of available ammonia.

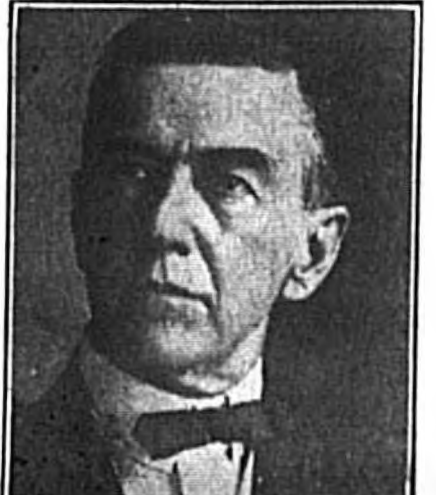
Friendly Rust. What causes the rust spots on the top of the leaves and the spots of mold on the wood of the twigs?

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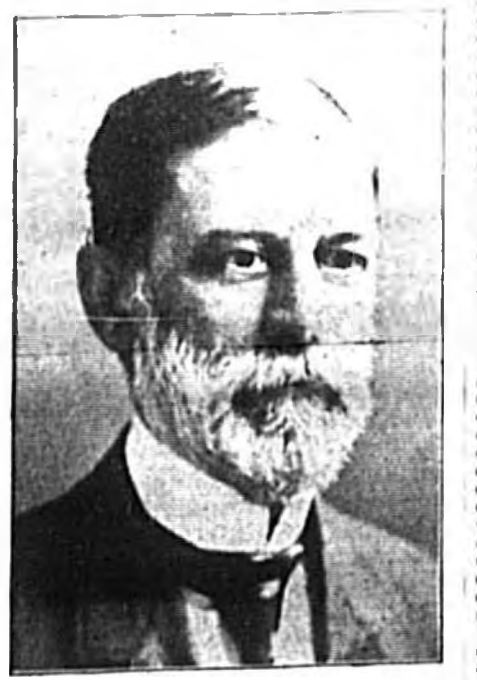
