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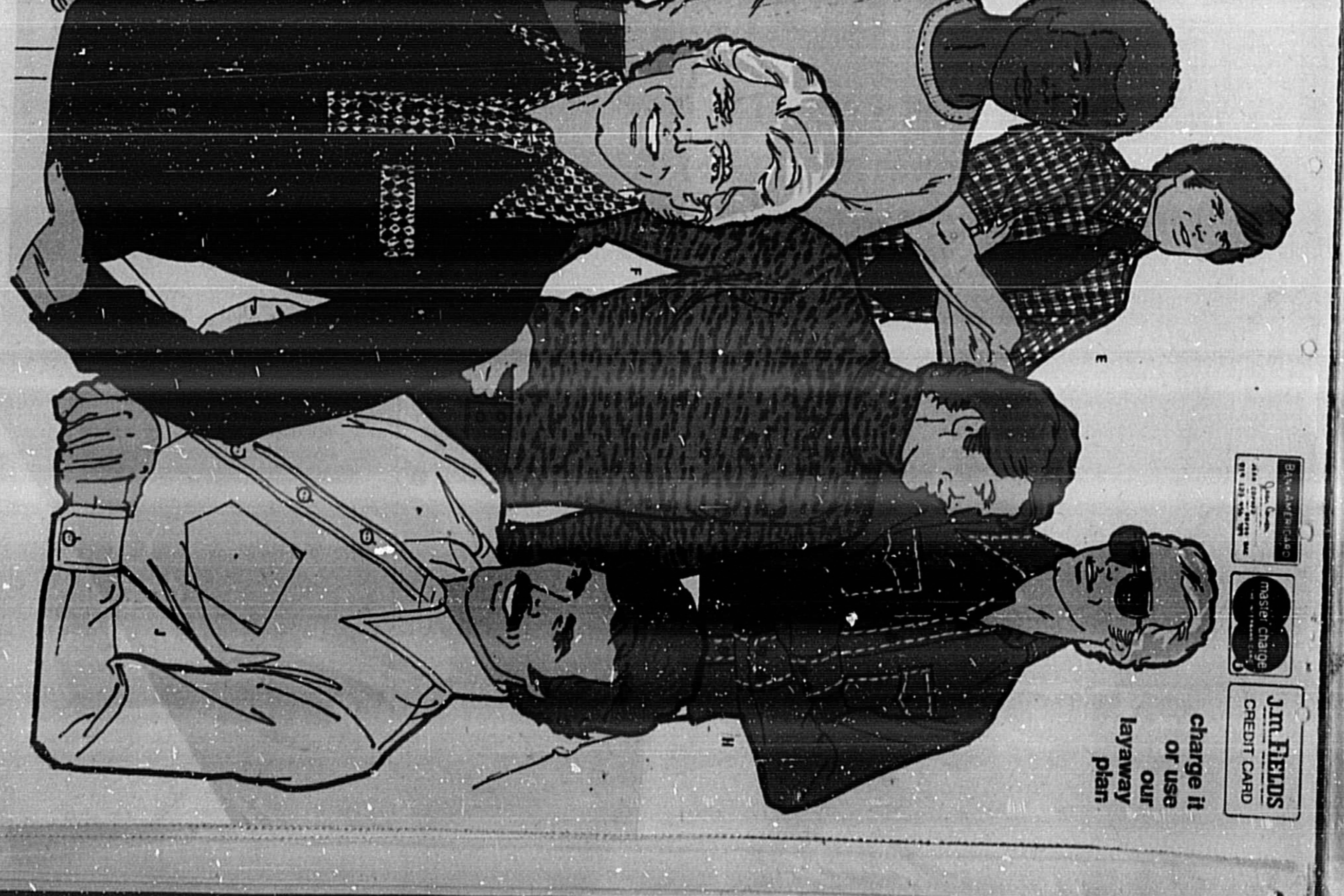

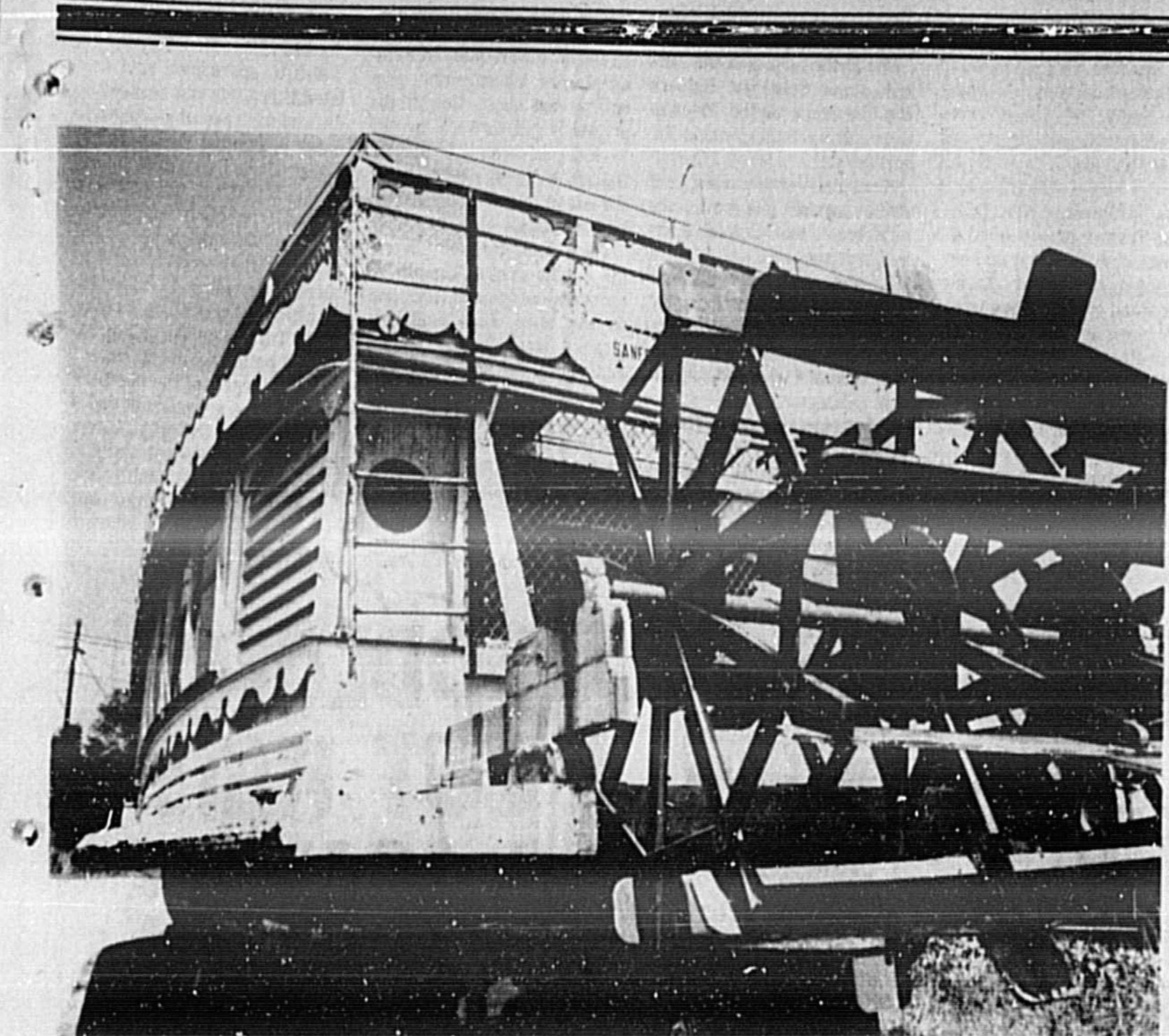

Cost Of Buying Home Continuing To Spiral

WASHINGTON (AP) — The cost of buying a home, particularly the crucial cost of borrowing money, is pushing upward relentlessly.

Rising interest rates for home buyers were reflected Tuesday in the government's decision to raise the maximum allowable rate on federally insured home loans to a record 9.5 per cent.

The rate had been 9 per cent for more than two months. The increase was twice the government's usual quarter of a percentage point adjustment.

Meanwhile, the Senate Tuesday approved a compromise \$11.3 billion housing and community development bill that, among other things, authorizes \$8.6 billion in block grants for urban renewal, model cities, open spaces and other community development programs over the next three years.

The bill also increases from \$45,000 to \$65,000 the maximum amount of mortgage loans that federally chartered savings and loan associations can approve. It also increases the ceilings for FHA-insured and VA-guaranteed loans on single-family homes from \$33,000 to \$45,000.

The government's decision on the higher interest rate followed two other government reports detailing record interest rates.

The first showed that the effective rate on conventional loans—those not insured by the government—increased to 8.1 per cent for new homes in July and 9 per cent for previously occupied homes.

The higher interest rates, higher prices and more restrictive terms mean the average cost of buying a new home has increased from a purchase price of \$55,700 with \$8,400 down and payments of \$200 a month in March 1973, when the current surge started, to an average price of \$60,700 with \$10,500 down and \$241 a month in July.

The second report indicated interest rates would continue to rise for home buyers, probably to 10 per cent or so over the next four months.

The shape of things to come was in the results of the auction of home loan commitments reported by the government's Federal National Mortgage Association.

The FNMA, known as Fannie Mae, commits itself periodically to buying a certain number of mortgages over the next four months, selecting from among the lenders who offer the best return.

Fannie Mae said the latest auction produced an average yield of just over 10 per cent for loans insured by the Federal Housing Administration and the Veterans Administration. The average rates for conventional loans was about the same.

And at 10 per cent, that means FHA-VA home buyers and sellers would have to pay about 7.5 "points" to make up the difference between the 9 per cent in their loan agreement and the 10 per cent return the lender probably would be demanding.

In cold cash, the buyer would have had to pay his maximum permissible one point, or \$300 on a \$30,000 loan, and the seller would have to forfeit 6.5 points.

FPC Executive Hints Blackouts

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — Customers of Florida Power Corp. face an "increasing possibility of power shortages and blackouts" because of cost-cutting programs by the utility, the company president says.

Andrew H. Hines Jr. made the comment while testifying before the Public Service Commission during a Tuesday hearing on a temporary \$14.5 million rate hike.

He said customer service will deteriorate because of delays in construction of new generating facilities in the company's necessary drive to cut costs.

Last month, he said, the company had to implement phase two of its three-pronged cost-saving plan and mothball a generating facility at nearby Tarpon Springs.

Also, Florida Power is reducing its fuel inventory to a "thin operating margin," he said.

"Future oil boycotts or shortages, a severe and prolonged hurricane in the Gulf, a truck drivers' strike or any number of occurrences could leave one or more of our plants without fuel," he added.

Ten people testified, most of them opposed to the rate hike and contending that the "ordinary citizen cannot afford another increase."

Single Fire District Ordered By County

Seminole County commissioners are moving towards abolishing individual fire districts by authorizing creation of a single countywide fire district.

Approximately 30 per cent of the unincorporated areas of the county are currently without any fire protection service.

The board set a Sept. 10 public hearing on an emergency ordinance it directed be drawn up over the objections of County Atty. Howard Marsee, who said he fears a referendum might be necessary to ratify the action.

Marsee said he has asked the attorney general's office for an opinion, but that in the meantime, "No one in Florida really knows whether a referendum is needed."

Immediate action to set up the single district was urged by Commissioner Mike Hattaway, who shot down Marsee's words of caution, saying "Meanwhile we have areas of the county unprotected, and we are endangering life and limb, and personal property."

"I'm willing to take the chance (on having the single fire district action thrown out in the courts because the voters were bypassed) in this particular instance," Hattaway said.

Vice Chairman Dick Williams and Commissioner Sid Viblen Jr. agreed, giving Marsee the three votes necessary to begin drafting the ordinance.

Fire Administrator Gary Kaiser, whose plan for a single fire control district has been protested by several of the smaller departments in anticipation of an Aug. 28 meeting of the county firemen's association, praised the commissioner's action in not ordering a referendum.

"This will let us provide nearly immediate protection for 30 per cent of the county which, incredibly, has no protection at present save that which other departments might voluntarily provide," Kaiser said.

In a related move, the commission authorized Kaiser to immediately purchase six trucks and five "slip on" pump tank units so that service can commence Oct. 1.

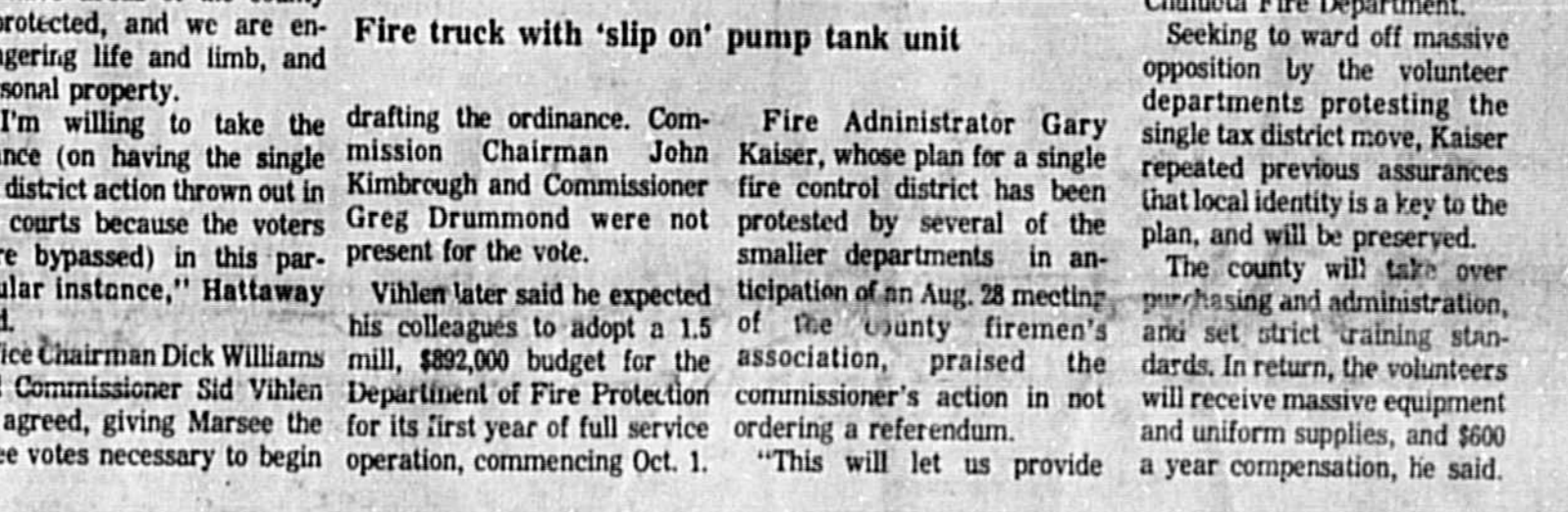
Kaiser said waiver of the bid policy because of the emergency ordinance will not mean loss to the taxpayers because he has recently gone through the full bid process for a truck and slip-on unit for the Midway Ginderville department.

The equipment to be ordered will provide stop-gap service until larger trucks can arrive for six areas without any equipment at present, Kaiser said, including:

- SR-46-Panola, the "buffer zone" between Langwood and Lake Mary, areas south of Lake Jessup, south of Oviedo, and territory not covered by the Chulavita Fire Department.

Seeking to ward off massive opposition by the volunteer departments protesting the single tax district move, Kaiser repeated previous assurances that local identity is a key to the plan, and will be preserved.

The county will take over purchasing and administration, and set strict training standards. In return, the volunteers will receive massive equipment and uniform supplies, and \$600 a year compensation, he said.

Shevin Halts Hospital Notes And Interest

Public hospitals may not accept notes on bills and may not charge interest for late payments, Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin said in an opinion Tuesday.

"At Seminole Memorial Hospital the 'note' we accept is nothing more than what the patient signs on admission to the hospital—an agreement he is responsible for paying his bill," said the county hospital's controller Richard Smith.

"When a patient is discharged, he sits down with the hospital counselor to work out how his bill is to be paid—by the week, by the month, and so on," Smith explained. "But these notes are not notarized or recorded in the county courthouse nor would a judge accept them in court."

"We're a county tax-supported hospital and as such are serving the people of this county in as many ways as we can. We understand that few people can sit down and write out a check for the full amount of their treatment on being discharged," Smith commented.

Smith said the type of promissory note referred to by Shevin was in no way the same as Seminole Memorial Hospital's regular billing system.

Assistant administrator Reid Brodie added that the hospital had never charged interest on overdue bills although the proposed 0.06 mill would only fund the year's obligations of about \$47.75 on hospital construction bonds.

The \$193,000 requested by the hospital would require a tax levy of about 0.22 mill.

Hospital trustees has asked for an additional \$23,336 for plant improvements and \$92,885 to cover a projected operating deficit for the current fiscal year.

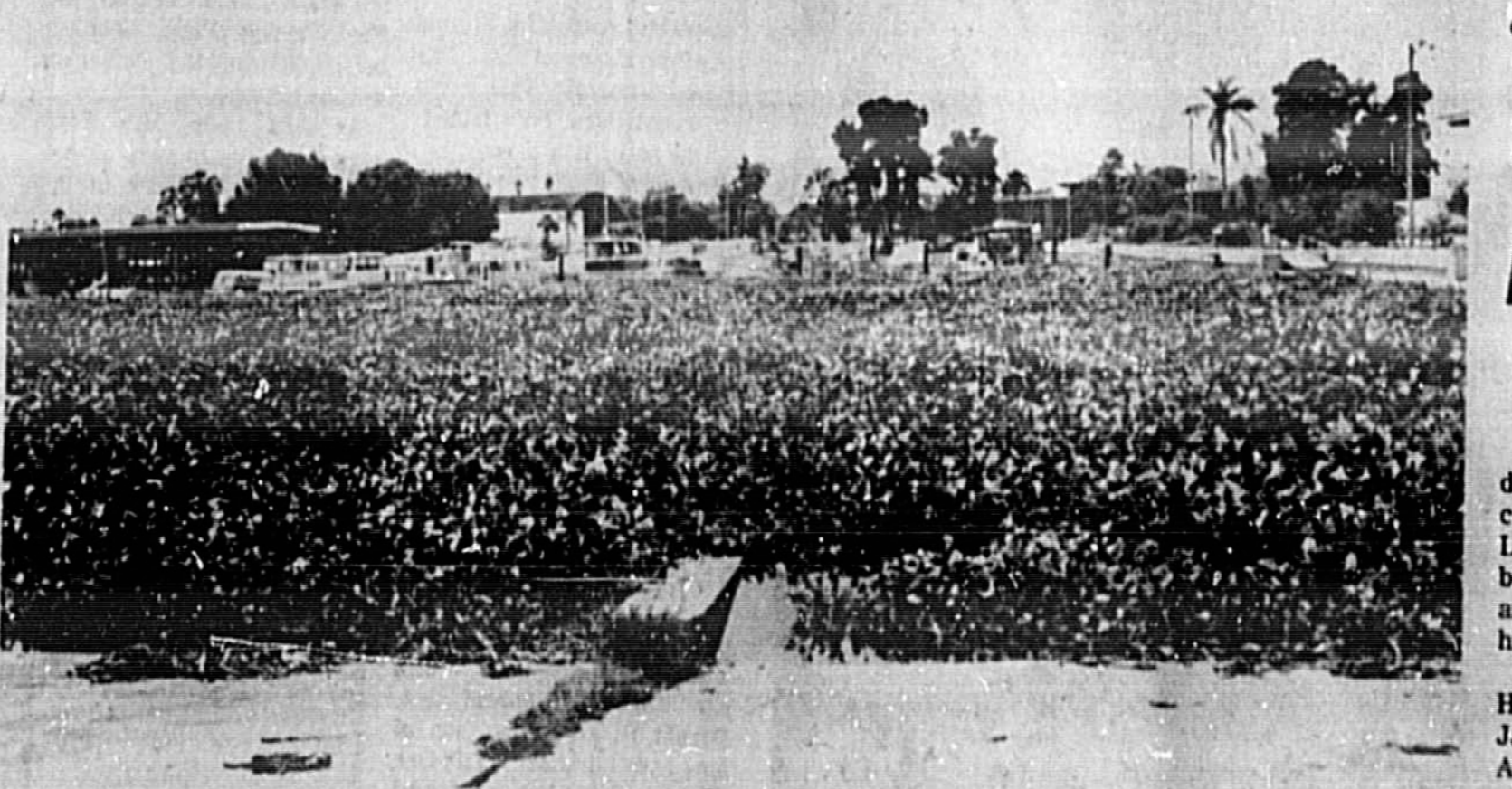

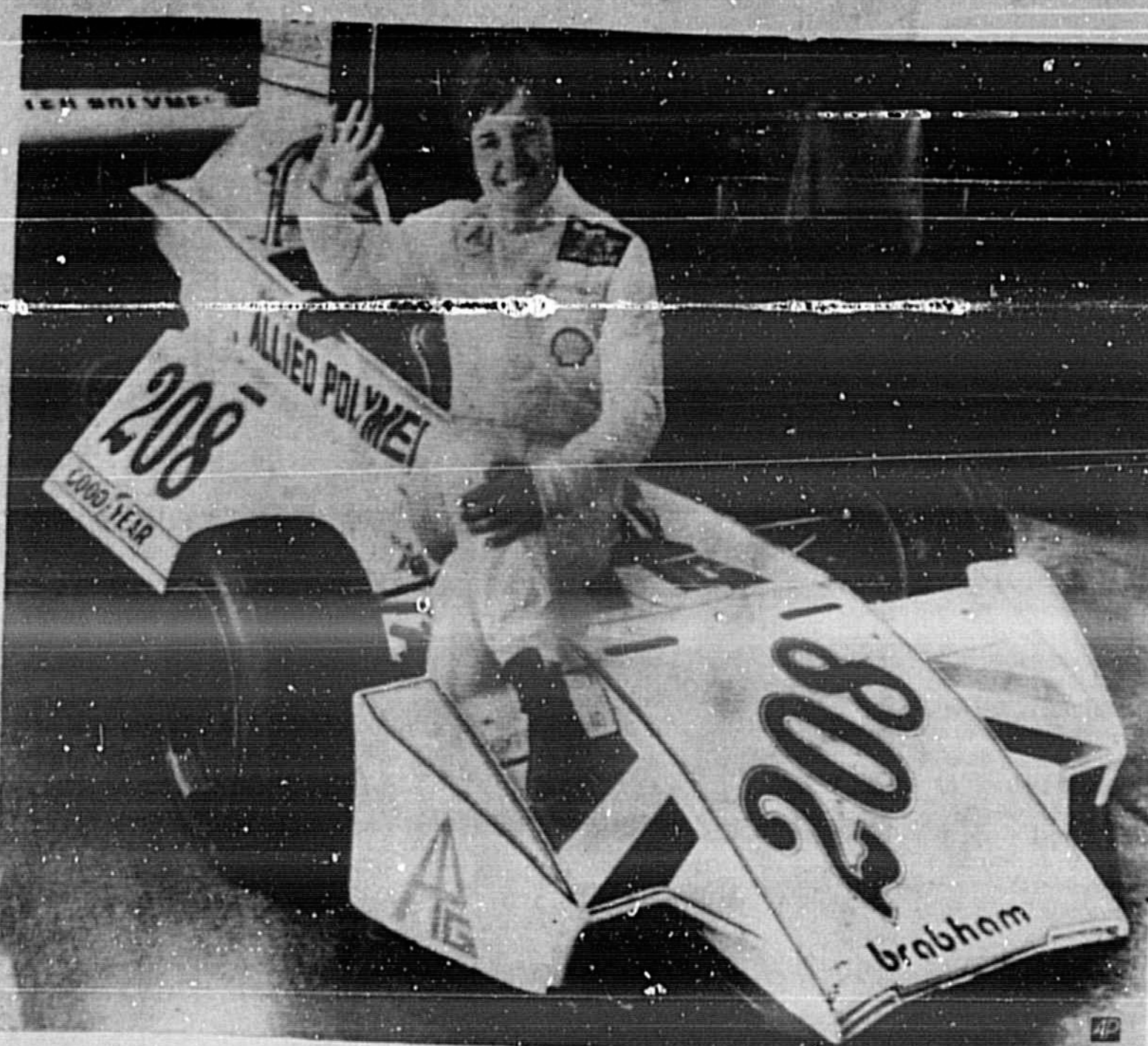

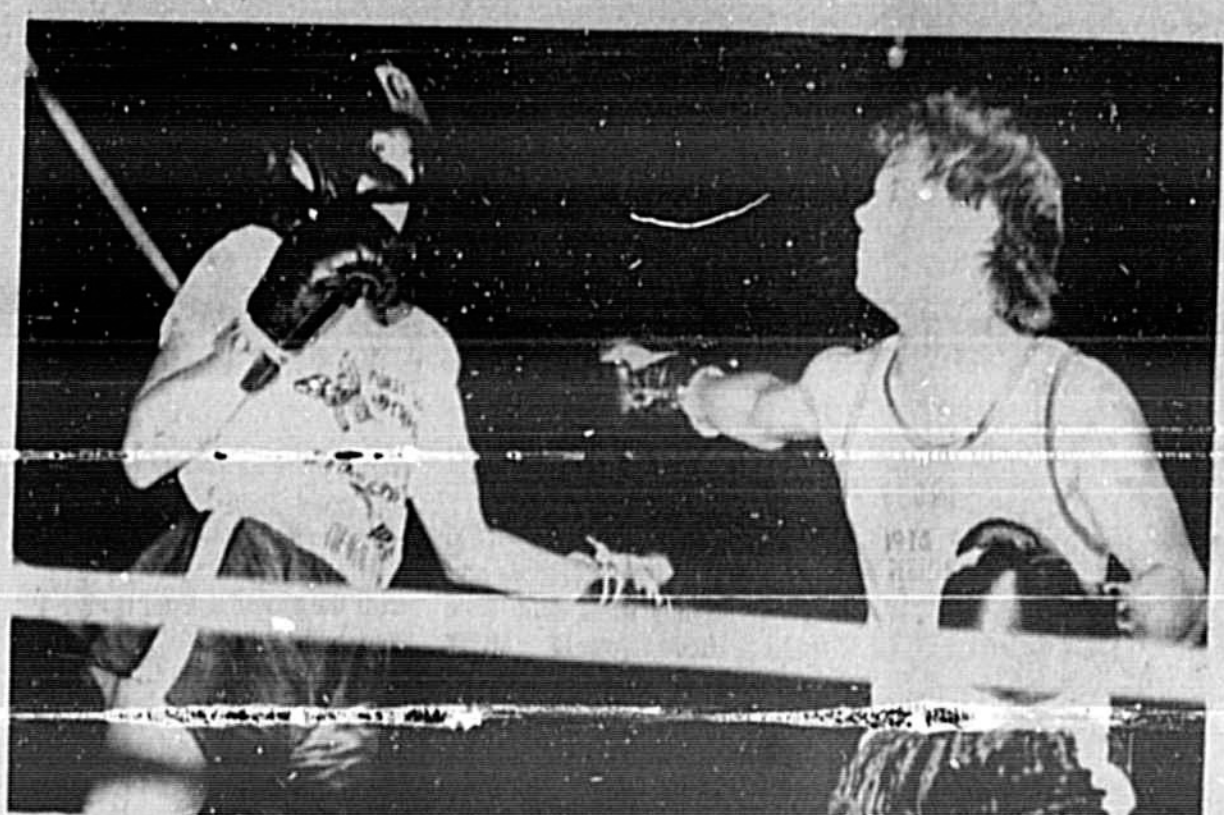

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Executive Finds Room At Top

Her introduction to the job market 15 years ago lasted six months. That was when she hit upon a profound truth which became very clear from the beginning that I should work for myself," she said with a smile. With that purpose in mind she ventured out on her own and says she experienced first-hand the difficulties faced by a woman intent on a career in the advertising world formerly dominated by men.

But that's all changed now, Miss Cadwell explains. "At the present I run Cadwell-Compton, which is operated as a subsidiary of the 14th largest advertising company in the world." Filling in the gaps in her career, Miss Cadwell said that when she started her own independent agency in 1960 it was tough for a long time.

"People found it difficult then to hire an agency that was headed by a woman. Now it's much easier. Three years ago I had a company because I wanted to change the kind of advertising I was doing. I had been selling such things as cosmetics and perfumes and I wanted to get into the main stream of advertising—like mass products. But I didn't have the wares to do this on my own. I had to go someplace where they had a department that was expert in buying mass media, had a research department and so on. It's worked out very well," she says.

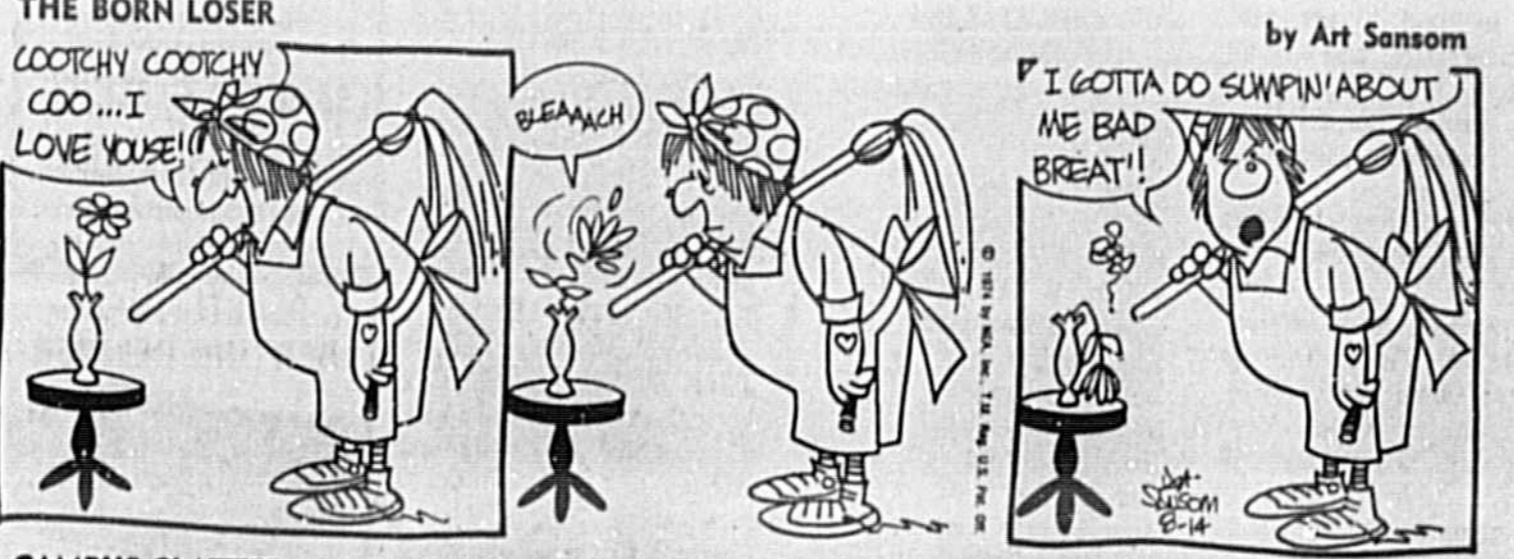
Part of her success she credits to the change in climate spurred by the women's movement. She says the other part of it is attitudes among women in advertising. "I don't think that people are nineties. I think that people have a desire for information—they like to read something in advertising that would contribute to their knowledge. So we try to talk to people and try to interest them in an idea, tell them why products can help them," she says.

"Anyway we looked at the problem and came up with the name body shirt, which is a slimmer fitting kind of shirt. It was compatible with pants and was good with shorter skirts. It really turned the blouse industry around. So, how you help your clients depends on what they need," she says.

"For instance, a firm that supplies fiber to the apparel industry came to us six years ago," she said. "But the blouse industry was going very poorly. Women didn't seem to want to wear blouses. Tight fitting sweaters were much more popular. So they said to us, 'You know, we don't just want advertising, we want you to begin with helping us to tell blouse manufacturers what direction they should be going in, and then help them promote and advertise it.'"

"All this has been helpful to me as a woman because those men who before would say, 'Well, we have a certain formula, and we do things this way,' are now more respectful and less sure they understand what women want."

She believes now there's an advantage in being a woman because she is accepted, but points out there are very few women who are at the top in advertising. "Hopefully in another few years this won't be true. Girls are starting to come up much faster now, and I think it will be less of a peculiarity to find a woman as a head of an agency, if not in 10 years then hopefully in 15," she adds.

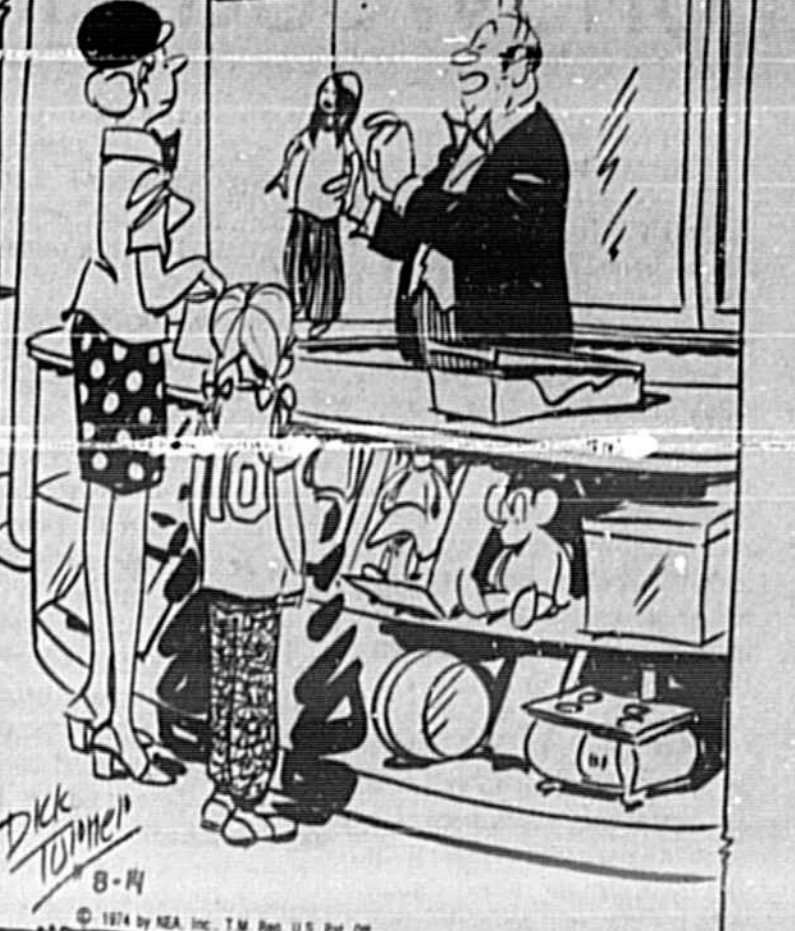

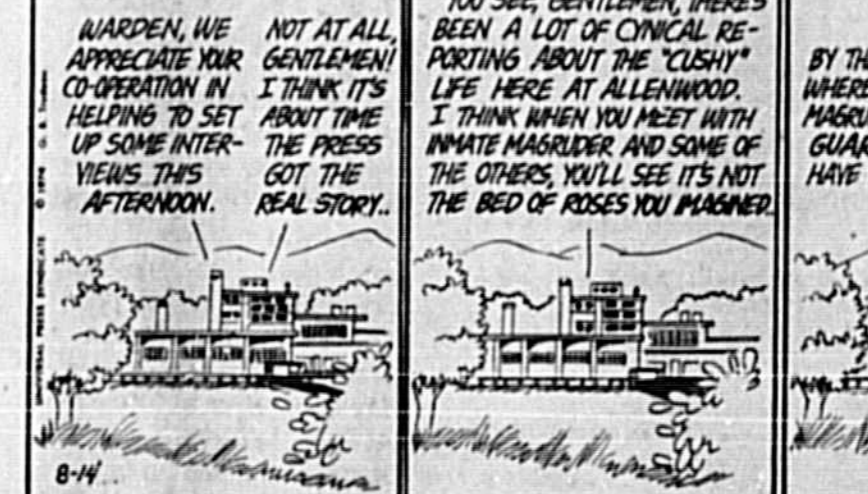

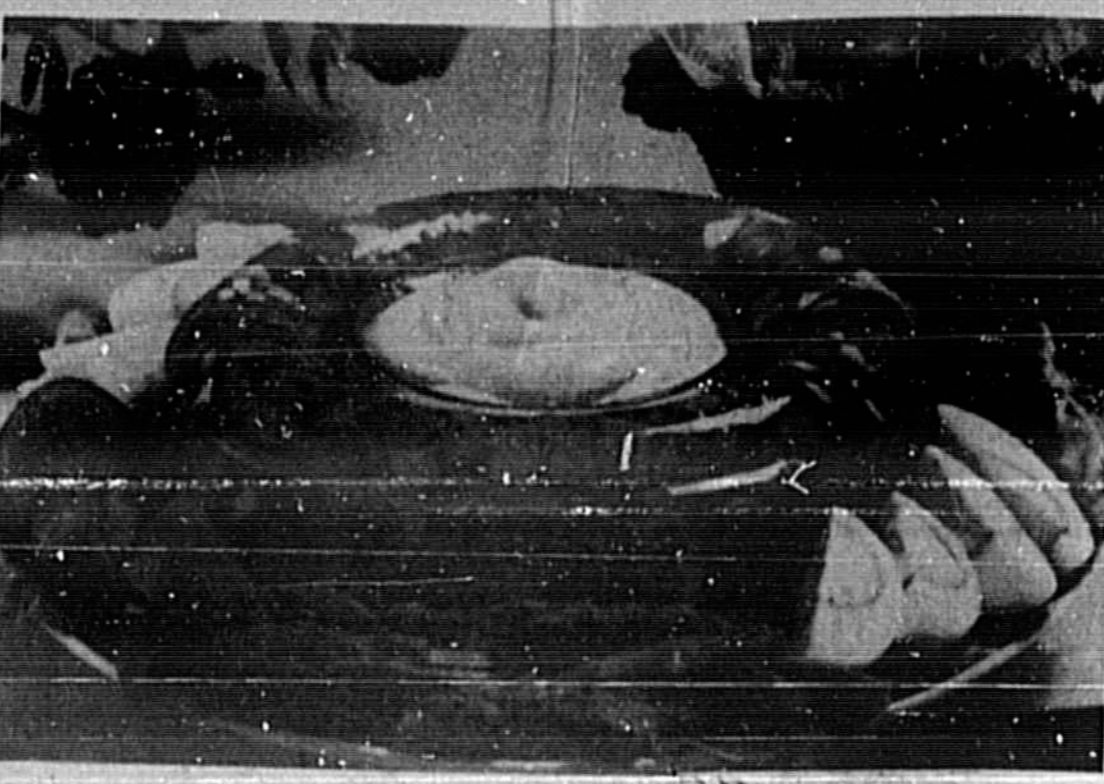

Home Jams Really Are A Peachy Idea

The peach crop is at its peak. Even though lovers of this sweet fruit indulge themselves to the fullest while the fresh fruit is at its tastiest, it is always a pleasure to have a few jars of jams and jellies put up for the fall and winter months. A different approach to canning fresh peaches is to make jam.

Peach freezer jam then can be removed from the freezer, placed in the refrigerator to thaw for use when needed. Recipes for both freezer jam and for peach powered and liquid fruit pectin.

- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1 1/2 cup lemon juice
- 1/2 (6 ounces) bottle liquid fruit pectin

Rinse, peel and remove pits from peaches. Fully crush peaches, one layer at a time, to let juice flow freely. Measure 2 cups crushed fruit; turn into bowl. Add sugar and corn syrup, stir thoroughly. Mix lemon juice and pectin, pour

over peach mixture; stir three minutes. Leaving one quarter to half-inch headspace, quickly ladle into washed and scalded jars or freezer containers (half pint sizes are ideal). Do not use containers that hold more than one pint. Cover at once with right lids (no paraffin needed). Let stand at room temperature until set (this may take up to 24 hours), then place in freezer for at least 24-hour period. Remove from freezer as needed and store in refrigerator. Once thawed eat within three weeks. Makes 6 (half pint) containers.

Peach Freezer Jam (using 2 ounces size powdered jam and jelly pectin) 3 pounds fully ripe peaches (about) 1/4 cup lemon juice 1 package (2 ounces) powdered jam and jelly pectin 1/2 cup light corn syrup 4 1/2 cups sugar

Rinse, peel and remove pits from peaches. Fully crush peaches, one layer at a time, to let juice flow freely. Measure 3-and-one-quarter cups crushed fruit; turn into large kettle. Stir in lemon juice. Slowly stir in pectin, stirring vigorously. Set aside for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add corn syrup, stir well. Gradually stir in sugar. Warm to 100-degrees to spread on toast. Do not heat any hotter than 100-degrees. Use food thermometer. When sugar has dissolved, the jam is ready. Leave about one quarter to half-inch headspace, ladle into washed and scalded jars or freezer containers (half-pint sizes are ideal). Do not use containers that hold more than one pint. Cover at once with light lids (no paraffin needed). Store in freezer. Remove from freezer as needed and store in refrigerator. Once thawed eat within three weeks. Makes 7 (half pint) containers.

Elephant In Your Kitchen?

You may be skillful in the kitchen and capable of making almost anything you want. But the chances are you never created an elephant, right?

Yet it can be done. Using kitchen flour, water and a spot of white paste, you are well along the way to your elephant. Also, you'll need some old newspapers, a coffee can and some matchsticks. It's really simple enough, according to Linda and John Cross, whose new book "Kitchen Crafts" tells you how. (Collier Books: \$8.95 cloth, \$3.95 paper).

"Kitchen Crafts" shows you how to use flour, eggs, fruits and vegetables, nuts, beans, seeds and pasta to produce delightful crafts. You also will need patience and persistence. This book is a fascinating thing to play around with during hot, leisurely days.

The authors apparently have fallen in love with paper-mache. "The whole idea of paper-mache is that by mixing plain old everyday kitchen flour with plain old everyday water, you get a very simple but very strong glue paste. Mache is nothing more than strips of paper glued together with flour paste. For most things you can use strips of torn newspaper soaked in the paste then wrapped mummy-style around a form you've constructed. Lots of times we use wadded-up newspaper (dry, not mached) as the basic form held together with masking tape until we are ready to work. Other times we use cans, containers, sticks, straws, etc. They aid."

To make that elephant you need one-pound size coffee can, four pieces of cardboard tubes each six inches long, several full sheets of newspaper, masking tape, cardboard, matchsticks and a pot of flour paste.

When the elephant is completely dry, paint the entire animal white with tempera. When paint is dry, color according to what an elephant of your dreams should look like. Remember, all this craft making is for fun, relaxation and nothing terribly serious.

The book takes you along a creative path that insures you of many crafts for the making—another is a seashell and pasta mirror frame.

Men Will Like This Easy Dish

COOKOUT NOODLE SKILLET

- 8 frankfurters
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1 clove garlic, halved
- 2 tablespoons salad oil
- 1 quart water
- 2 beef bouillon cubes
- 4 cups medium egg noodles
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon each: basil, oregano leaves, powder
- Dash pepper
- 1 can (1 1/2 ounces) condensed tomato soup
- 1 can (8 ounces) cut green beans, drained

In large, heavy skillet, lightly brown frankfurters with onion and garlic in oil. Remove frankfurters. Keep warm. Discard frankfurters. Add water and bouillon cubes to skillet. Bring to boil. Stir in noodles and seasonings. Simmer, covered, 10 to 15 minutes or until noodles are tender. Stir frequently. Mix in tomato soup and green beans. Top with frankfurters. Cover and cook 5 to 10 minutes. (Add a small amount of water if necessary to prevent sticking). Serve immediately. Makes 4 servings.

TUNA PATTIES

These savory fish patties prove that something special can be made of canned tuna. They make a perfect luncheon dish. Or, made quite small, they can be served as a first course at dinner. They are good when served hot, warm or cold.

- 2 cans (7 oz.) tuna and its liquid
- 1/2 cup partially creamed cottage cheese
- 1 medium onion, grated
- 1/2 cup fine bread crumbs
- 1 egg white
- 1 teaspoon soy sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon each salt and pepper
- Polyunsaturated oil for frying

Place the tuna in a bowl along with its liquid. Mash the tuna well with a fork, adding the cottage cheese as you continue mashing. The mixture should be quite smooth and free of lumps. Mix in the grated onion, bread crumbs, egg white, soy sauce, and salt and pepper. Make certain that everything is well blended. Let the mixture rest at least 15 minutes so the bread crumbs will absorb the liquid and act as a binding ingredient.

Pour oil in frying pan to a depth of 1/4 inch and heat until quite hot. Take 2 tablespoons of tuna mixture and shape it with your hands into a little flat patty almost 1/2 inch thick. Repeat. Place patties in hot oil and fry 2 to 3 minutes; turn carefully and fry 2 minutes on other side. The cakes should be a nice brown color. Remove to absorbent paper. There should be eight patties. Serves four.

SWEET AND SOUR TUNA

This Oriental dish is best with albacore tuna, water packed.

- 2 tsp. Polyunsaturated oil
- 2 cups diced green pepper
- 1 1/2 lb can pineapple chunks
- 1 cup chicken bouillon, fat free
- 2 tsp. cornstarch
- 2 tsp. cider vinegar
- 1 tsp. soy sauce
- One-third cup sugar
- 2 1/2 oz. cans tuna
- 3 cups cooked rice

Saute the green pepper in the oil until soft, then add the pineapple with its juice and 3/4 cup bouillon. Bring to a boil. Dissolve bouillon and add to the boiling sauce. Add the vinegar, soy and sugar; simmer until it thickens and clears. Drain the tuna well and fold into the sauce. Serve on a bed of rice. Serves six.

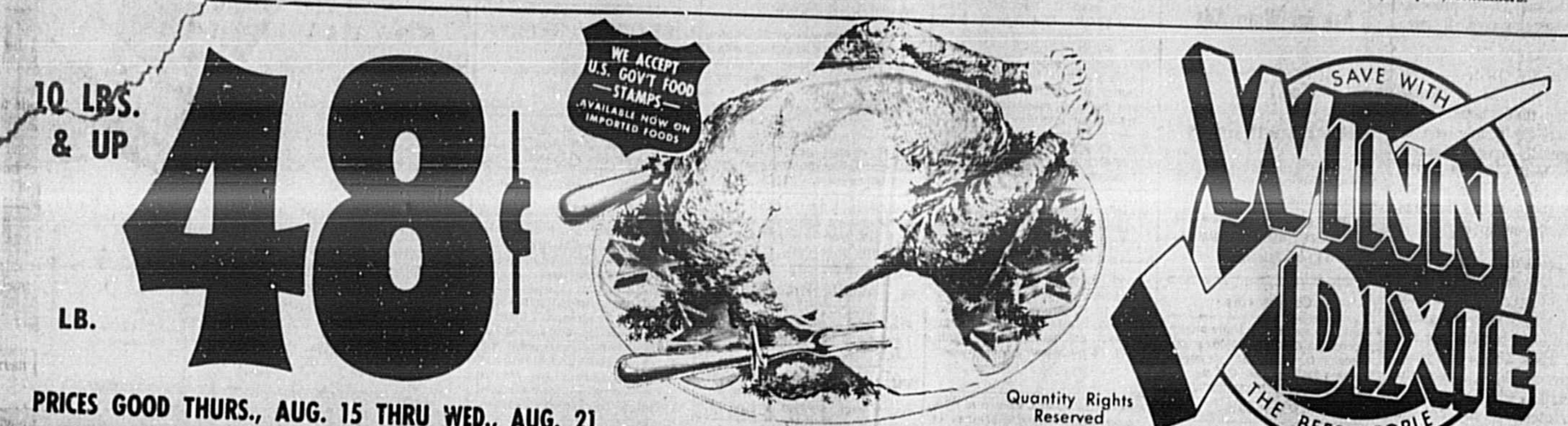

DEAR READER

In general, rheumatoid arthritis is an inflammatory disease with red, swollen, tender joints. It can be mild or severe. By contrast, osteoarthritis is a wear and tear process or degeneration of the joints, usually with overuse or increasing age.

In your case you might be able to tell the difference by which joints of your fingers are involved. In osteoarthritis the end joints of the fingers are involved. In rheumatoid arthritis the knuckle joint and the second joint are usually involved, causing the fingers to have a spike-like appearance.

Gout usually involves single joints to start with, and is caused by the gradual deposit of a salty-like material from uric acid. I think if you were having acute attacks of gout you would know it and your doctor would be treating it.

There are a lot of things that can be done for arthritis. When the involvement is minimal, as sometimes occurs with osteoarthritis, the sensible approach is to maintain motion and relieve pain. But, for more serious problems, even resection of damaged joints is possible. Korea's 1st Lady Killed

SEOUL (AP) — President Chung Hee Park escaped an assassination attempt today, but his wife was killed, possibly by one of the police bullets. Security guards shot the gunman and arrested him. A 16-year-old girl choir singer in the audience was killed, possibly by one of the police bullets. Park's 50-year-old wife was hit in the head and underwent two operations, a presidential spokesman said. The government said the gunman carried a Japanese passport, and the Japanese Foreign Ministry said it was issued in the name of Yukio Yoshii, 23, of Osaka. But Yoshii told a television interviewer in Osaka: "I am not the gunman. I am in Japan. Somebody must have taken advantage of my name."

Park was making an Independence Day address to about 1,000 persons in the National Theater to observe South Korea's 29th anniversary. Witnesses said the man ran toward the stage and opened fire from about the third row. The government statement said the man's revolver misfired, then he fired twice. One bullet struck the desk that protected Park. Another hit Mrs. Park, who was sitting behind her husband. The young girl was a member of a 200-voice girls' choir that was to perform for the celebration. She was sitting in the front row.

After Mrs. Park and the girl were carried bleeding from the auditorium and the wounded gunman was removed, Park said: "I will resume my statement." He talked for five minutes, then the girls' choir sang for a few minutes. The president received a standing ovation as he left the theater for the university hospital to be with his wife.

Park, who is 56, and his wife have a 14-year-old son and two daughters, 22 and 20. Mrs. Park is a former school teacher. The shooting was the first known direct attempt on Park's life. He became president in May 1961, but opposition has grown as his rule became more authoritarian. Late in 1972, Park amended the constitution to give himself virtually unlimited powers and permitting him to stay in office indefinitely. When demonstrations demanding a return to democracy mushroomed last winter, he banned all anti-government activities and made them punishable by death or prison terms.

Teachers To Take Board Into Court

The Seminole Education Association (SEA) has vowed to sue the county school board in a last ditch attempt to implement collective bargaining. "Unfortunately, again we will be forced to consult our attorney on this issue (collective bargaining) and you will be hearing from him," Rick Mossman, SEA spokesman told the board. "What does that mean?" Board Member R.G. Feather asked Mossman. "It means we are going to file suit against the school board and since you are a school board member I assume you will hear about it," Mossman replied. In April the SEA threatened to sue the school board for the right to bargain collectively, however, the suit was never filed when negotiations appeared imminent. But the negotiations, which will be mandatory by law Jan. 1, 1975, never came to pass. One session was held, but it collapsed due to a disagreement about guidelines for the talks.

"It has been the policy of this board to recognize the law," Board Chairman Davis Sims said, referring to the law recently passed by the Florida Legislature that gives the teachers the right to negotiate and establishes guidelines. Board Atty. Douglas Stenstrom has said despite apparent contradictions in the new law, "This law was written in the last legislative session and apparently the legislature grabbed part of this bill and part of that bill and put them together. I feel the board would be complying with the spirit of the law by recognizing the SEA as the official bargaining agent for county teachers."

Under the existing pay schedule as established by the board, first year teachers are scheduled to receive \$7,800 for the 1974-75 school year—a six per cent raise—but, the SEA is asking \$8,200 and is pushing for a master contract that would contain legally binding agreements on working conditions, hours, class sizes, grievance procedures and extra duties for teachers. John To Dick: See Ya' In Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Nixon was subpoenaed today to appear as a witness for John D. Ehrlichman in the Watergate cover-up trial next month. The subpoena was filed in U.S. District Court by Ehrlichman's lawyer, Andrew C. Hall. It said: "You are commanded to appear in U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia ... on the 9th day of September, 1974, at 9:30 a.m. to testify on behalf of John D. Ehrlichman ... and to remain until called." The subpoena was addressed to Nixon at the Presidential compound, San Clemente, Calif., where the former president moved after resigning his office last Friday. Ehrlichman, formerly domestic counsel to Nixon, had been one of the former president's closest advisers. There was no indication in the filing at district court that the subpoena actually had been served.
