

A Stunning White Serge Coat

A coat of white serge made without a lining and trimmed with a hit of black moire about the waist and neck is a very smort outer garment for young lailies of fashion. The model pictured today has one piece ragian sleeves, made with turn-back cuffs. The front of the cont closes to the neck, though the fronts may be turned back to form revers. The belt to slipped through the underarm seam and lapped at the front. Wing pockets are added to the front decoration of the coat, but these may be tucked inward, if desired.

In medium size the cont requires 31, yarde 5t inch serge, with 3, yard silk for the trimming. Although the importance of studying the guide has been frequently emplicated, there are home dressmakers who overlook this step in their auxiety to finish a garment and, unless they have had wide experience in sawing, the result serely falls to prove disastrous. But little time is required to study the guide barefully. Note how the cuff and pocket are placed into position first, each on a lengthwise thread, of the goods, with the underfacing next. The cotfar and belt, in fact, are the only sections of the pattern that are laid on a lengthwise fold of the material.

The front, sleeve and back are placed on a lengthwise thread of the serge. If a shorter length coat is desired, cut off the lower edge of the front, back and underfacing the desired amount. The belt may be shortened by cutting off the front edge along the two small "o" perforations.

Guy Morton of Cleveland Whiffed Quartet in One Inning.


Game With Athletics-Willie Mitchell Claims He Fanned Seven Batamen in Same Inning.

Guy Morton of the Indians was the only major-league pitcher of 1910 to strike out four men in one luning. The Alabama Arrow performed this unusual feat in the sixth frame of the gant of June 11 against the Athletics, his victims being Lawton Witt, Charley Pick, Napoleon Lajoie and Jack McInnis. Witt reached first because his Ahlrd strike also was a wild pitch.

To strike out four men in one session is not a novelty for a major-league pitcher, though the occurrence does not often crop up. Willie Mitchell, who started the season an Indian and finished it a Tiger, says he once fanned seven men in one chapter, his oppohents meanwhile gathering four runs. He claims to have done this in 1909 for San Antonio against Houston. Willie says his catcher that day was Dolly Starke, one time Superba shortstop. Mitchell says Dolly broke the record for passed balls and that this was the reason he was able to fan seven.

The day Morton had the Athletics thoroughly on his staff only 3 of the 13 Mackmen who batted against him escaped being whiffed. They were Reuben Oldring and Billy Meyer, who were in the controversy from start-tofinish, and Bill Stellbauer, who ripped off a single when he batted for Jack Nabors in the eighth.
