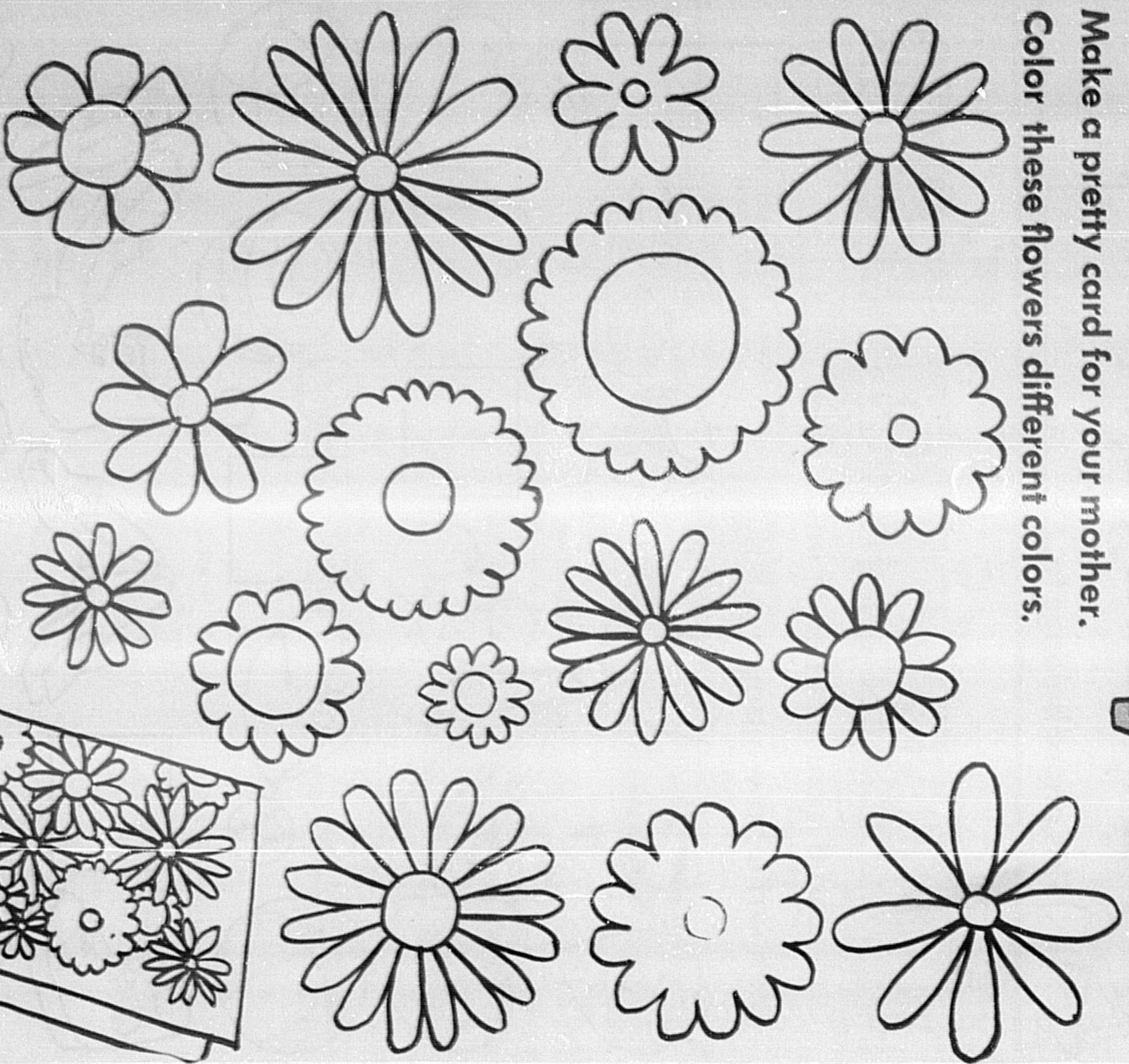
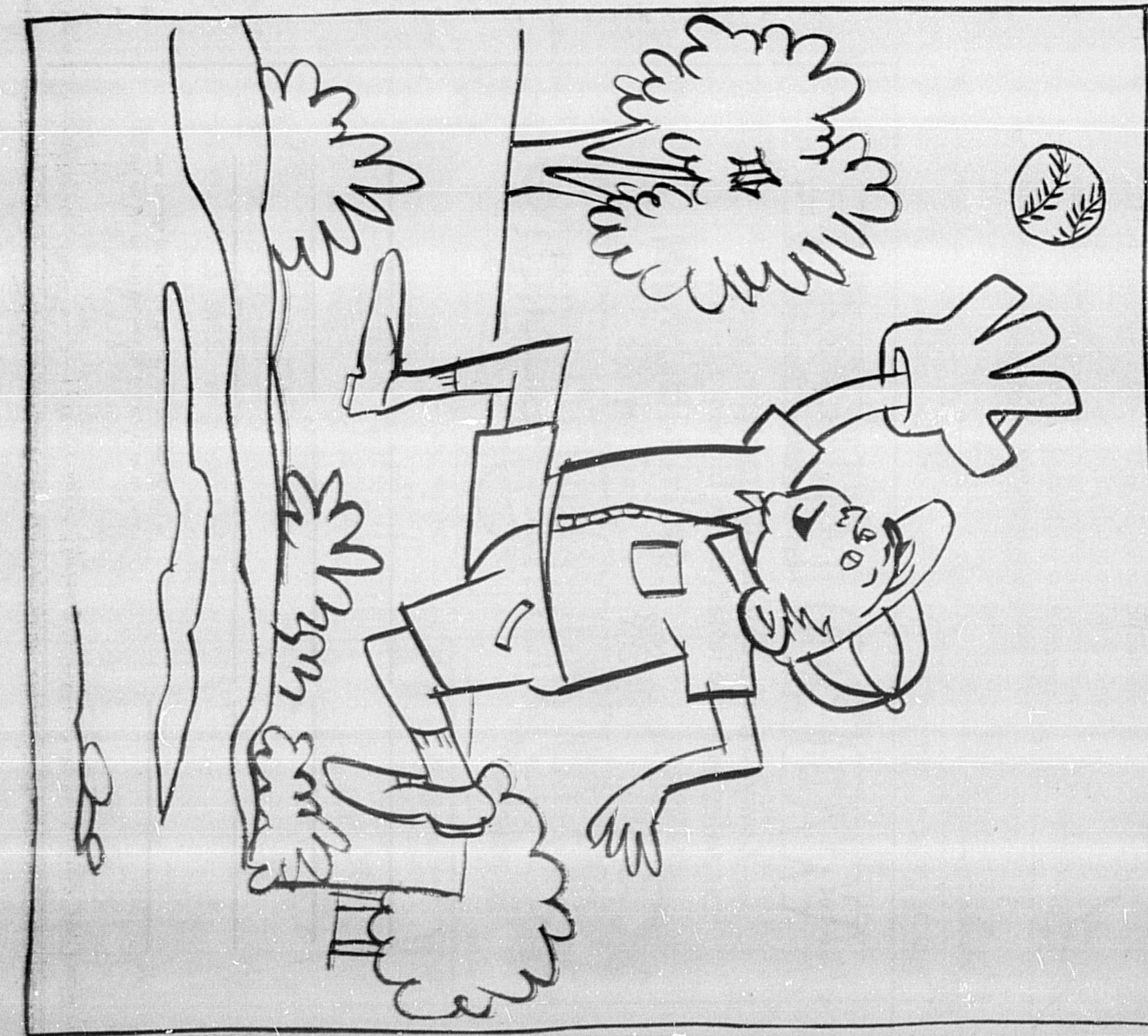

Municipal Swim Pools On Agenda

To swim or not to swim? As far as the municipally-owned Sanford swimming pools are concerned this subject will be discussed at tonight's City Commission meeting beginning at 8 p.m. The county chapter of the American Red Cross is expected to present arguments to the Commission advocating the summer opening of the two pools located in city park areas at Fort Mellon and Goldboro.

Pools were opened last summer as the result of a number of persons converging on the commissioners.

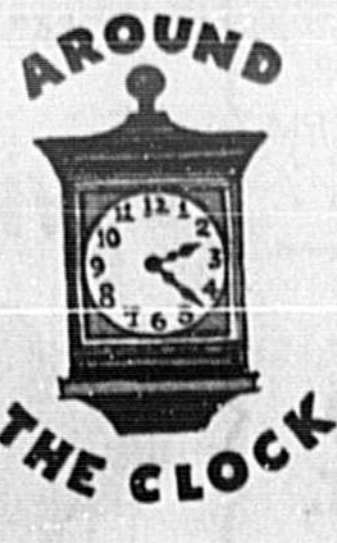
City pools were kept closed for two years previous to last summer's opening.

Several commissioners have expressed the desire to have the facilities leased to private individuals or groups to operate as they maintain the city loses money in the pool operation.

Another subject to be presented to the Commission involves the cancellation of an airport lease.

Sanford Pair Hurt In Crash Brevard Couple Killed In Collision

A Merritt Island couple was killed in an automobile accident Saturday night on SR 46, approximately four miles east of Sanford.

Kenneth Lee Bailey Jr., 23, and Pamela Jean Bailey, 22, his wife, were dead on arrival at Florida Sanitarium and Hospital after a rear end collision involv-

ing the Bailey car and a vehicle operated by John Robert Wansley, 21 and containing Lotie Mae Wansley, his 39-year-old wife. The Wansleys reside at 1183 East Ninth Street in Sanford.

The Sanford couple was re-

moved to Seminole Memorial Hospital for treatment of injuries suffered when the Bailey car struck the Wansley vehicle in the rear, police said.

Hospital sources this morning described Wansley's condition as "good" but listed his wife's

as "poor."

The bodies of the deceased were sent to Charleston, W. Va., for funeral and burial. Bryson Funeral Home was in charge of local arrangements.

Hollenback Trial Set This Week

A damage suit will be brought to trial this week in Circuit court in which the plaintiff is Gov. Claude Kirk and the defendants are Peter Millitt, former sheriff of Seminole County, and the Shady Mountain Insurance Company.

In reality, it is Mrs. Lee Prescott who is suing Millitt and the company. Legal technicalities require the use of the Governor's name. Mrs. Prescott was the mother of Robert W. Hollenback, 15, who hanged himself Nov. 18, 1968, in the county jail.

Following three days of hearings, former School Supt. R. T. Milwee lost his bid to acquire damages from William Laffler, who was alleged to have assaulted Milwee on Aug. 30, 1966.

The verdict was returned by a six-man jury late Friday afternoon in Seminole County Court House. Milwee had sought damages in excess of \$500.

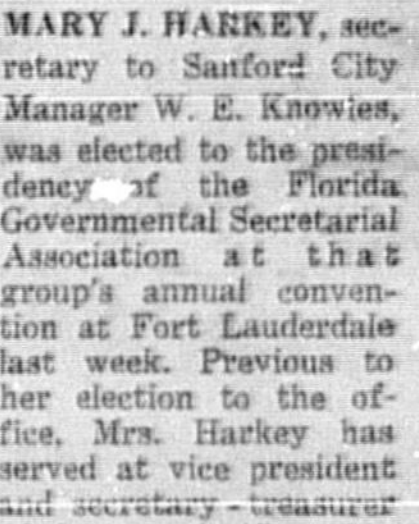
The incident, according to published reports at that time, occurred over a confrontation between Milwee and Laffler on the placement of a Negro teacher at Seminole High School.

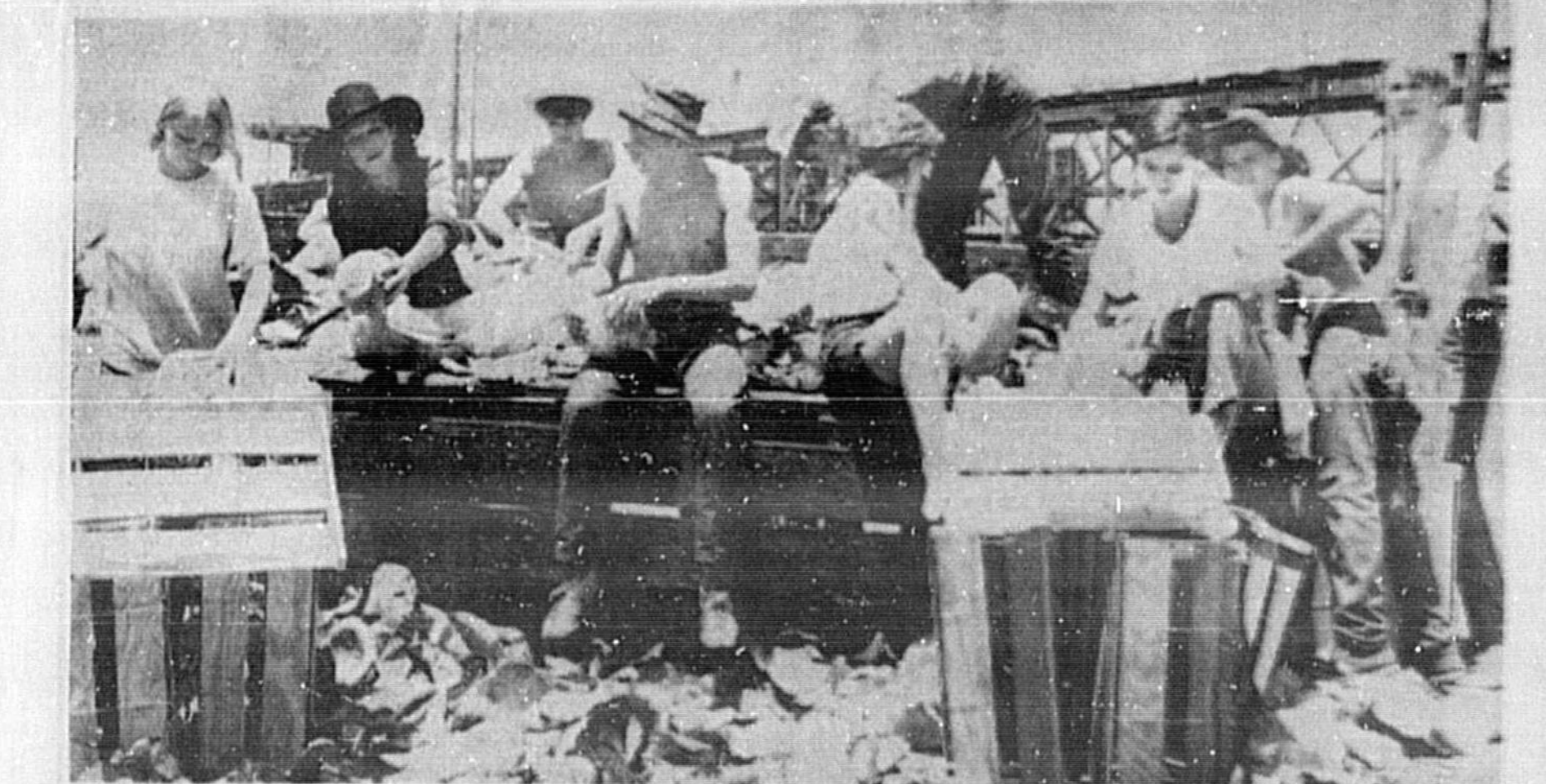

The band who has greeted many of the Apollo crews on their return to Houston and who has played for parties at the White House will present the seventh and final concert for the Seminole Mutual Concert Association at 8 p.m. Tuesday at the Civic Center.

Free to the public, the attraction is the Band of the Air Force Reserve and will serve as an appreciation gesture by the Association to the community for their support. President Misreads Protests

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. J. Lee Fulbright says the Nixon administration misreads the extent of national discontent with the Vietnam war but last week's massive student protests will convince it to change policy.

"I don't know how they can ignore it altogether," the chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee said in an interview with The Associated Press.

The interview was conducted before Saturday's massive demonstrations and before President Nixon told his news conference Friday night that "it has not been surmised that the activities of the protesters... have not been surprised by the intensity of the protests."

The Arkansas Democrat also said "events would indicate" the United States is sliding into a commitment to support the new government of Cambodia. And he charged administration officials "have been less than candid in informing the Congress what their intentions are all the way."

Q. Do you think the Nixon administration understands the extent of discontent with the war in the country?

A. No, I think they misread it. Their own reports all indicate that, saying their telephone polls are 10 to 1 in favor, I think that they're wrong. I agree with what they say, but I think they can ignore it altogether. George Fredrickson's observation that presidents, not just this President, his predecessor and others, are so surrounded with what used to be called the palace guard, the royal court, it insulates them from reality.

Q. Will the events of this past week help convince them?

A. That's what it's designed to do, and I suspect it will have an effect. Because they are so ob-

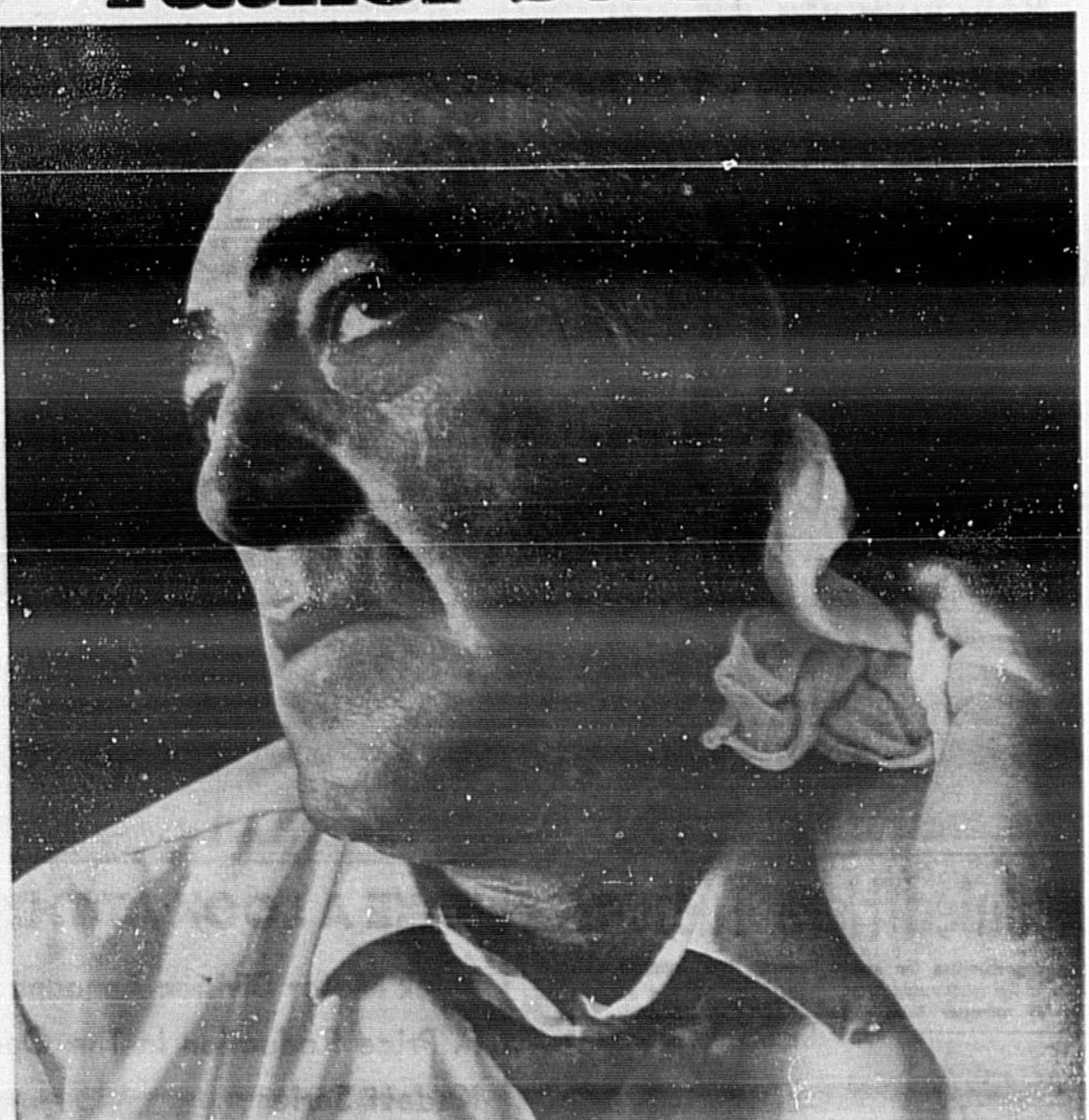
vious, and the physical evidence is there, they go off to Camp David, and there are other mechanisms. President Nixon has four homes. He can go other places and isolate himself from the pressure of students and others. I'm not trying to be petty about it. This is a very small aspect of it. All presidents are isolated. Q. If they don't understand the opinion in the country, what makes you think that even ap-

Last Saturday afternoon at the University of Florida track, Lyman's only addition to the Florida High School Athletic Association Class AA track meet, Wilbur Ferguson, proved his merit. Ferguson qualified in the morning preliminaries, and in the afternoon, streaked to a sixth place finish in state competition. The time of his 220 yard run was 21.9 seconds. This was a new school record at Lyman, breaking his own previous school record of 22.2 seconds flat.

Ferguson did an outstanding job in representing Lyman this past Saturday, but he has done throughout almost all the 1970 campaign. He scored more points in regular season competition than any other Greyhound and in some meets was a double and triple winner, including such events as the 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash and the 440 yard run.

Everyone at Lyman is proud of Ferguson's efforts and the trend that the track team has taken the past two years. Last year Lyman qualified in three events in the Class A state meet. This year on the step up to Class AA competition, the Longwood finished, proved themselves once again. Ferguson's performance was only scored one first in the state meet, but that point will live as the first ever by a Greyhound in Class AA state competition, and it came in their maiden year.

Senators Pictured To Confirm Judge Blackmun

WASHINGTON (AP) — An apparently friendly Senate nomination of Judge Harry A. Blackmun today with no obstacles in sight to President Nixon's third try to fill the vacant seat.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, who said he expects to back Blackmun "unless evidence to the contrary is forthcoming," indicated the vote might be delayed until Tuesday, however. Asked if he thought the nominee would be confirmed, Mansfield said, "I hear he will be."

Blackmun, who lives in Rochester, Minn., and has served on the 8th U.S. Court of Appeals since 1959, won a 17-0 vote of approval from the Senate Judiciary Committee last Tuesday after no one testified against his nomination.

President Nixon submitted Blackmun's nomination April 15 following the Senate's rejection of two Southern judges—Clayton F. Hynesworth Jr. of South Carolina and G. Harold Carswell of Florida—for the Supreme Court vacancy.

After Carswell's rejection, Nixon said he had reluctantly concluded the Senate as presently constituted would not confirm any Southern judge "who believes as I do in the strict construction of the Constitution."

Doctor's Services, Salary Debated Hospital, Pathologist Haggle

Seminole Memorial Hospital trustees have scheduled a May 23 special meeting to delve into the problems involved with reading a new contract for hospital pathologist Dr. Fred Ionta.

Dr. Ionta at last night's night's meeting disclosed that he wants to bill patients himself for pathology services performed by him and not have the hospital making the billing.

He said he is not a hospital employee and is not asking for a salary increase. Under present contract, the physician gets 22 per cent of the gross taken in by the hospital for pathology services.

Board has been in process for several months in renewing the contract for Ionta's pathological services but because of problems involved with the mechanics of a new agreement, the contract has not been approved.

One of the contract provisions calls for the hospital pathologist to provide medical-legal autopsy services for the county. Ionta admitted last night, under questioning, that he had been hiring the Volusia County pathologist to come to Seminole Memorial to perform these services for \$150 fee, with the hospital receiving nothing for use of the facilities.

Robert Besserer, hospital administrator, advised he had been billing the county a \$25 facility charge for the examinations but these had not been paid. Gordon Frederick, hospital attorney, said he had been informed that Dr. Ionta had refused to do autopsies and inquired of the pathologist if this was true. Ionta replied, "Yes, said that." Frederick declined to reveal his source and pressed the point to the pathologist if this were true.

After some haggling back and forth, Dr. Ionta finally said he had recommended that someone else be hired to perform the medical-legal autopsies as he did not want to put his reputation on the line. "It's a great risk for such little disturbance," Ionta advised.

John Schirmer, trustee chairman, told Dr. Ionta that he was obligated under his contract with the hospital to perform these autopsies and he had thought the pathologist had been doing them as he was instructed over a year ago, when Ionta first expressed displeasure over having to perform the examinations for the state attorney's office.

Dr. Harold Miller, trustee, asked Dr. Ionta why he was quibbling over having to perform autopsies and inquired of the pathologist if this was true. Ionta replied, "Yes, said that." Frederick declined to reveal his source and pressed the point to the pathologist if this were true.

City Unhappy With CofC

McDonald observed again that Chamber should be told of the Commission's unhappiness with its industrial recruiting activities. Mayor Moore said he didn't believe either Meyer or the Commission had been unreasonable in wanting to know what is being done with city funds given to the Chamber.

Chamber, in an action taken several weeks ago, sought to obtain additional city funding from the SIC's budget appropriated for Don Rathel, SIC director, resigned.

Commission has made no decision on releasing the funds and has in the meantime hired David Kelley as new director replacing Rathel. It has been rumored that funds sought will be used to outfit a new downtown office for the city's industrial operations.

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
