

First X-Ray Photo Of Sun Is Shown In Science Exhibit

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The first X-ray picture ever taken of the sun was exhibited at the National Academy of Sciences Thursday.

The photograph, taken by a rocket fired last week at White Sands, N. M., shows that the sun is surrounded by a vast halo of X-radiation within its super hot corona.

Scientists attending the academy's annual meeting called the X-ray picture a tremendous technical achievement. They said it will provide new understanding of radiations which govern radio communications on earth.

The photograph was obtained by a Naval Research Laboratory team, headed by Richard L. Blake, with the help of an Aerobee-II rocket fired 130 miles into the sky.

It shows the sun rimmed by a bright X-ray halo and several intense spots of bright X-ray emission distributed over the halo's disc.

Dr. Herbert Friedman, superintendent of the atmosphere and astrophysics division of the laboratory, explained the photograph at a symposium on solar emissions.

The surface of the visible sun has a temperature of about 10,000 degrees Fahrenheit. Stretching millions of miles into space is the sun's coronal atmosphere, very thin but very hot.

The corona's average temperature is about 1,000,000 degrees Fahrenheit with local hot spots reaching perhaps 18 million degrees.

At this temperature the gas is ionized into electrons and positively charged heavier particles.

"The electrons race about at such high speeds," Friedman said "that their collisions with the heavy nuclei generate X-rays."

Friedman said the X-ray intensity "has been found to play an important role in the formation of the ionosphere," the charged regions of the upper atmosphere, "which in turn controls long-range radio communications."

Franco May Announce Plans Soon To Return King

There is speculation in Spain that Generalissimo Francisco Franco may be about to disclose one of his most closely guarded secrets.

That would be something about

his own plans to step down and when or if a king is to return to the Spanish throne.

The speculation arises from a recent meeting between Franco and the royal pretender, Don Juan de Borbon. Officially unconfirmed reports from that meeting say Franco recognized the Borbon's royal claim, thus eliminating other possible claimants.

Within the Borbon family, there are two possibilities—Don Juan de Borbon, or his son, Prince Juan Carlos.

The son, under Franco's guidance, has been given the education of royalty—attendance at all three of the nation's military academies, army, navy and air.

He now is embarking on a term of civilian studies under tutors. Monarchist sources say the father allowed his son to return to Spain only upon assurance from Franco that the Borbon dynasty would be the chosen one.

Don Juan is the man on whom monarchists currently are placing their bets.

Spanish law now provides that whoever takes the Spanish throne must be more than 30 years old, a Catholic, a Spaniard and from a recognized royal family. The 47-year-old Don Juan fits the description. His son still is too young.

Monarchist sources in France and Portugal expect Franco to give a hint of his plans during a forthcoming visit to Barcelona where he is expected to make at least two important speeches.

These sources believe one of Franco's first moves will be to bring forth a law establishing the rights and powers both of a chief of state and a chief of government, roles now filled by Franco.

Franco himself has said repeatedly that Spain is a monarchy but that he has a lifetime mandate to direct Spain's destiny.

Only one thing would cause him to abandon what he considers a providential duty. That would be ill health.

In Portugal, where the pretender lives in exile, royalist sources expect nothing concrete for two years. But they also believe it might come earlier.

Anti-Missile Test A Success

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Army successfully fired its powerful Nike-Zeus anti-missile from underground for the first time at the White Sands testing range in New Mexico.

An announcement here said the huge missile, packing 450,000 pounds of thrust in its first stage, roared aloft from an underground "cell" or "silos."

The test rocket carried a dummy second stage and warhead. Five previous Zeus firings have been conducted from the surface, three of them successfully.

Motels In Trouble?

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—State Hotel and Restaurant Commissioner Richard Edgerton said today an estimated 14 to 16 Florida resort hotels and motels will go bankrupt this year. Edgerton said this is more than usual, but is not an indication of a decline in tourist business.

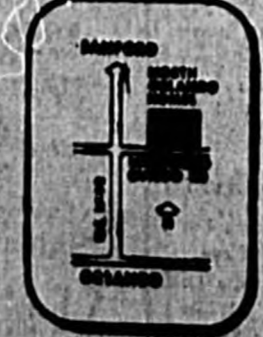

State's Citrus Groves 'Good' Mutual Reports

LAKELAND (UPI) — Florida Citrus Mutual reports that the state's citrus groves are "generally in excellent condition."

The report was based on 16 counties and, according to General Manager Robert W. Rutledge "is a representative sampling, and not all inclusive." Excerpts:

Polk: Most groves experienced a very extended bloom period. Some trees have more fruit than they can carry and must shed a good portion sooner or later. Consistent rains have helped set a new crop of fruit.

Lake: Harvesting of valencias showing some increase but has not reached peak volume. Growing conditions continue good with rain over the county last week. Too early to tell much about the set of next year's crop but trees are in good condition and bloom very heavy.

Martin: All varieties of citrus had a very heavy bloom and a good crop appears to be in prospect for next season. Small green fruit are beginning a normal drop. Practically all young true valencias have been picked as they made rate earlier.

Hardee: Most growers are on their regular post-bloom spray and cultivation programs. An extremely heavy bloom on all varieties and prospects are good for a full crop next season. Very little buying activity at present.

Orange, Ocala and Seminole: Mature trees in this area have had ample moisture but recent rains needed on young trees. Most growers busy with spray programs. Fruit slowly improving in solids and ratio.

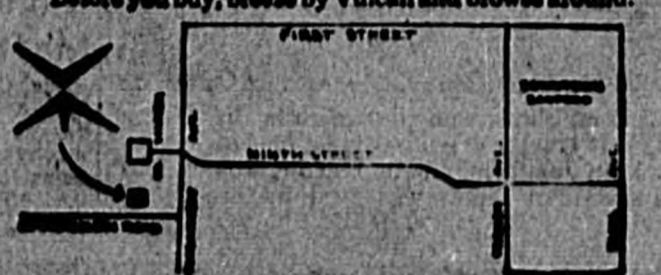

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Kennedy May Have Hurt Bid, GOP Chairman Says

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republican National Chairman Thurston B. Morton says Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) may have hurt his bid for the presidency with his recent remarks on the religious issue.

Morton and two other Republican senators commented Sunday on Kennedy's recent statement that now was the time to find out whether his faith would bar him or any other Catholic from the White House.

Vice-President Richard M. Nixon said religion would not be a proper issue in the 1960 campaign. He said in a Chicago speech he was sure that Kennedy, if elected president, would "put the government and Constitution above other issues."

Sen. John Sherman Cooper (R-Ky.) said he thought the Democratic presidential aspirant had delivered "a very forthright and fine statement" in the recent speech to the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

But Sen. Homer E. Capehart (R-Ind.) accused Kennedy of injecting the religious issue into the political campaign. He said Kennedy had made it a point to "argue about it, continually talk about it."

Morton said the editors first were impressed by Kennedy's speech "but by the next day they were a little suspicious that he was actually using this as an offensive tool himself, rather than as a defensive cloak."

The GOP chairman said he thought Kennedy would increase the damage to his campaign if he continued along the line he laid down in his speech to the editors.

Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell made it plain he would accept the GOP vice presidential nomination if it were offered to him. He said he was not seeking the second spot on the Republican ticket but that it would be too great an honor for any man to refuse.

Former Sanford Man's Invention In Use By Army

M/Sgt. Herman D. Gano, formerly of Sanford, has invented a new electrically actuated pistol for the army's advanced marksmanship unit. The new pistol will be used by the U. S. Olympic Free Pistol Team in Rome this fall.

The electric pistol, working on an electro magnet and powered by 15 volts of electricity is said to operate at the speed of light. This is possible through the elimination of extra springs in the side arm by the electric unit concealed in the handle grip. When the trigger is pressed, there is an almost instantaneous release of the bullet by the striker. The gun has been tested by leading gun manufacturers. A newly designed barrel gives the greatest possible accuracy.

Gano reported that it took two and one-half years from the first idea to the finished gun.

Gano is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Gano of Sanford. He attended Seminole High School and from there went into the army to be in World War II and the Korean fighting. He is now stationed in the Army Advanced Marksmanship Unit in Ft. Benning, Ga.

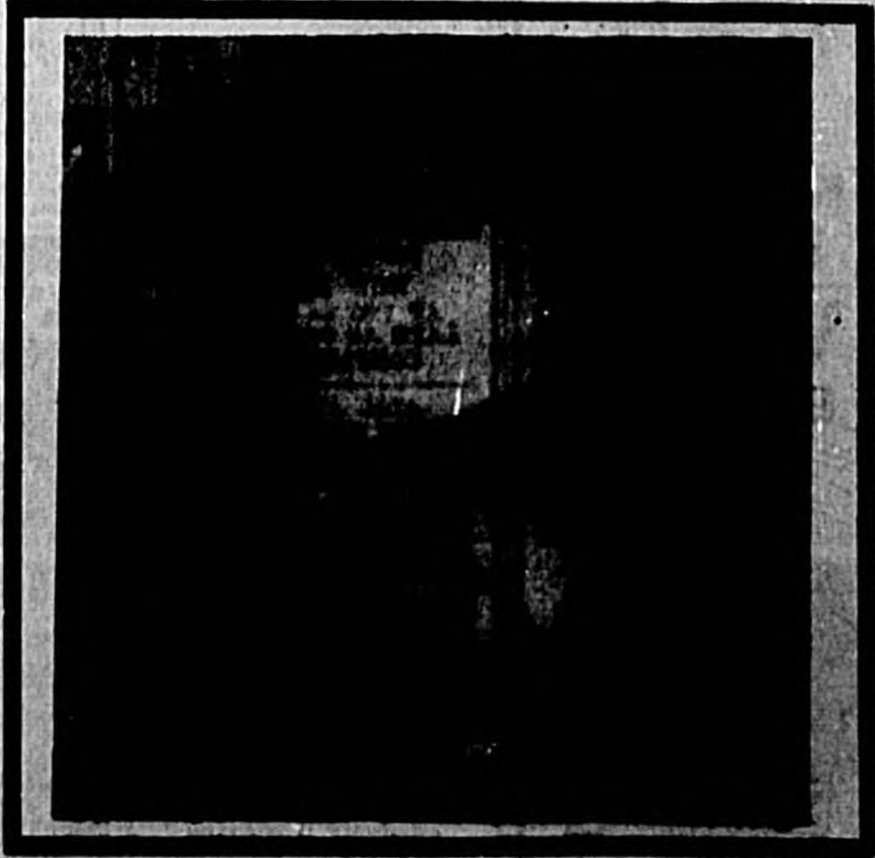

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More Comedy Needed On 'Accent On Comedy'

NEW YORK (UPI)—“Accent on Comedy,” a title that never could serve to describe TV programming, served a more limited purpose Thursday night.

It was the tag given to the latest Revlon special on CBS-TV, an hour supposedly devoted to the presentation of prototype comedy forms. More form and more comedy, with less prototypes, would have improved things.

Prototype also can mean anique, of course, and there is no comedy more antique than Smith and Dale's “Dr. Kronkhle” sketch from which Rebels drew his inspiration.

The routine remains a remarkable collection of highly-polished, over-age comedy nuggets. The clock also proved Al Kelly, Mr. Double-Talk, from appearing as scheduled. Maybe it was just as well.

The Goofers, an acrobatic troupe of young musicians, were on hand as representatives of zany comedy. Actually, the Smith and Dale routine had more zany fun as much free-wheeling motion.

Dorothy Loudon, representing the comic song brigade, displayed a hard-working, clever, smooth act that somehow failed to hang together and sounded odd hat. If that sounds contradictory, it could mean Miss Loudon needs better material.

Herb Shriner appeared as a monologist and promptly turned on some more of his wild old film clips of days, and scenes, gone by. Now those wery zany comedy acts.

Explaining each facet of comedy and exchanging a few trivial words with the performers was Mike Wallace.

The format ignored completely the new, refreshing directions that comedy has been taking. It seems that while the accent was on comedy Thursday night, it was a muted accent.

This was the week the unwanted documentary, “The Race for Space”—subtitled “This Is Your Life, Werther v.n Braun”—had its showing on scores of TV stations.

The hour-long story of rocket development, produced by David Wolper, was rejected for network air. For to put these shows on their own, rather than scrap the show, the sponsor and producer offered it around and managed to line up about 100 stations.

I'm glad they got it on air. As a primer of rocketry, it was a sturdy presentation, one with both feet on the ground. Many absorbing film clips from American, German and Russian files were shown and Mike Wallace's commentary was illuminating. The program also had many poignant and ironic moments.

Congress May Vote On Voluntary Health Plan For Aged This Week

CHICAGO (UPI)— Vice President Richard M. Nixon says the administration will present to Congress or the American people this week a voluntary health insurance plan for the aged.

Nixon said a democratic sponsored plan of compulsory insurance through broadened Social Security coverage is not the answer because it would fail to protect the people who need it the most — some of the four million persons over 65 without Social Security.

Moreover, the vice president said, the Democrats' compulsory program compels people who don't want and don't need health insurance to take it.

"So, what is the answer?" Nixon asked. "We are now working on the answer. We are going to present it to Congress or the country this week."

The administration program, Nixon said, was developed with these principles in mind:

— "That everybody over 65 who wants health insurance should be able to get it and the federal government should subsidize him to the extent so that he could buy it if he couldn't afford it."

— "That nobody who doesn't want or need it is forced to get it against his will."

— "And that everybody who ought to have it is encouraged to get it."

Nixon was in Chicago Sunday in speak to Polish Americans gathered to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the signing of the Polish constitution. He also addressed a news conference and appeared on a television interview show.

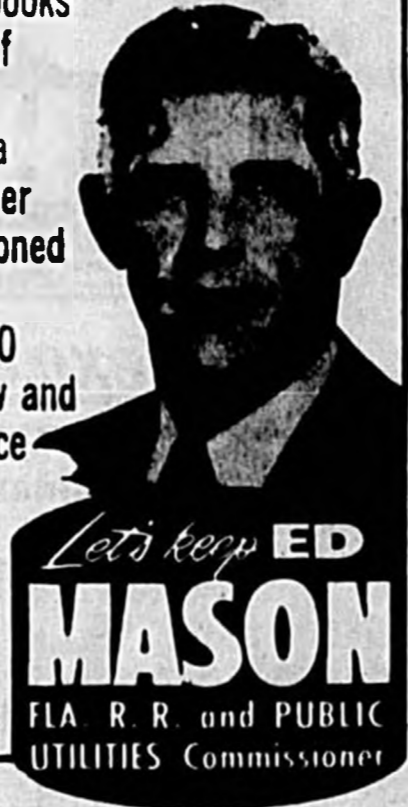

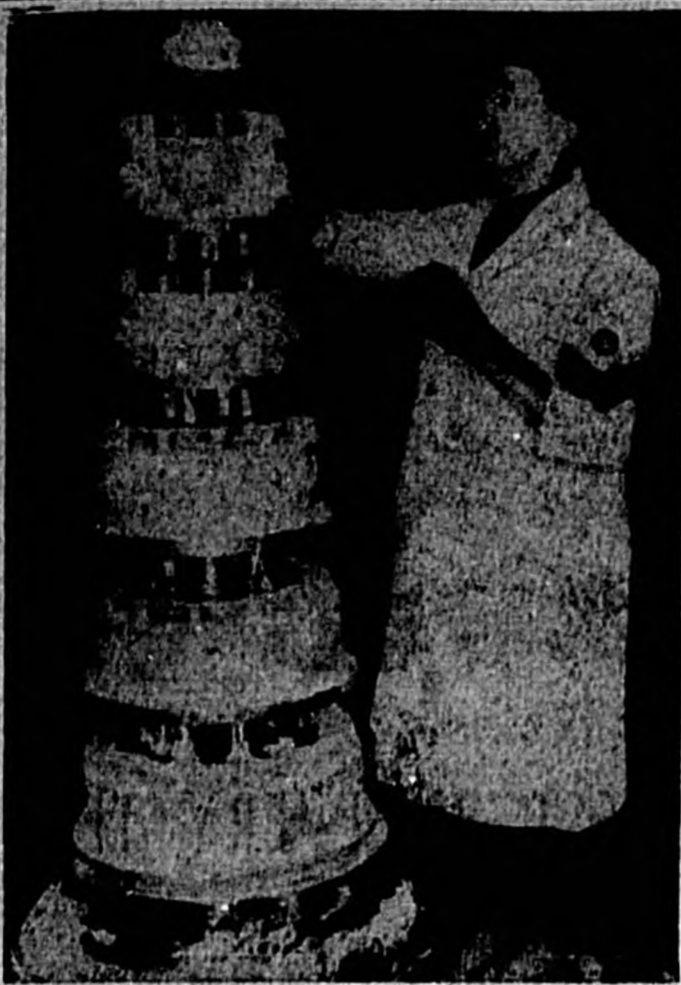

Flying Watchmaker Missing On Attempted Record Flight

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Placed to the door of a darkened watch repair shop is a note reading "I hope to reopen towards the end of April."

But it became increasingly ap-

parent today that owner Peter Gluckmann would not return to the watches, clocks, jewelry and music boxes that crammed his neat little shop on a downtown San Francisco side street.

The portly, balding watchmaker is believed to have crashed in the Pacific. He disappeared last Wednesday after he took off from Tokyo for New York in an attempt to set a non-stop light plane distance record.

"I may make it and then again I may not," Gluckmann said in Tokyo before his takeoff.

Gluckmann, who wore a business suit when he flew, bore little resemblance to the popular conception of a daring aviator with a penchant for crossing oceans in a single-engine aircraft.

But since learning to fly in 1948 the 34-year-old amateur pilot set these light plane records:

- Crossed the Atlantic with the smallest plane on record in 1953.
- First to fly round-trip from San Francisco to Hawaii in a light plane in 1957.
- Set a round-the-world record in 1959.

Born in a suburb of Berlin, Gluckmann went to London with his parents before World War II. There he learned watchmaking and at the age of 21 he came to this country and became a citizen. His father died several years ago but his mother, Erna Gluckmann, still lives in London.

Massive Display Of Might Featured In Red May Day

MOSCOW (UPI)—Russia's May Day parade this year featured a massive show of military might including a 1,000-mile ballistic missile and a self-propelled 16-inch atomic field gun.

Altogether, about 40 rockets of varying sizes were shown, building up to the "mammoth" intermediate-range missile. The parade also included amphibious armored troop carriers, tanks and field artillery.

The big rocket and the atomic gun resembled weapons displayed in the 1947 May Day parade. Military experts were uncertain whether they were the same weapons or improved models.

Premier Nikita Khrushchev and other Russian leaders watched the parade from the top of the Lenin-Malin tomb on Red Square. Foreign diplomats and military attaches were in boxes to the left of the mausoleum.

Defense Minister Rodion Malinovsky, principal speaker of the day, declared that Russian and its armed forces "are always ready to rebuff any aggressors."

He said the world hopes this month's summit meeting in Paris will be able to reach agreement on disarmament and "liquidation of the remnants of the Second World War"—apparently meaning the German problem.

Elsewhere in the Communist world:

—The Communist radio reported that leaders of Red China "journeyed separately to various parts of the country" for May Day observances.

—Polish Communist leader Wladyslaw Gomulka said the world hopes the summit talks will lead to peace, out adding that "one conference cannot destroy all of the walls erected by the cold war."

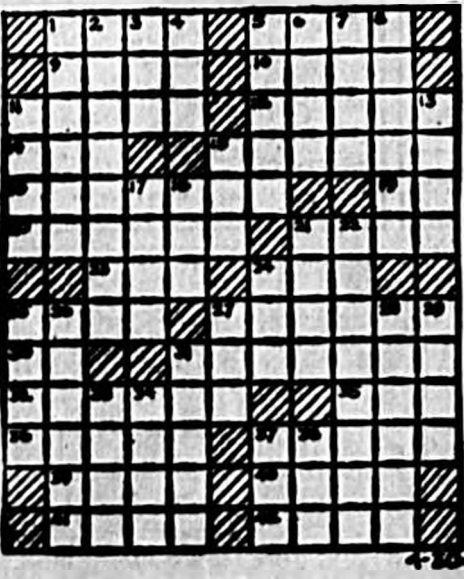

ASSIGNMENT WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON — The State Department man who learned Chinese ended up in London. The man who was taught German was assigned to Turkey. And the man who became fluent in French was transferred to Austria.

This linguistic fiasco of foreign assignments had Congressman John J. Rooney, the Democrats' fiscal fanatic from Brooklyn, rising half out of his seat. He was fit to be tied. He was mortified.

The lawmaker had scanned the zoning State Department expenses—up 11 percent in one year to a quarter-billion dollars—when his eyes fell upon the taxpayers' bill for the Foreign Service operation.

There was this item of \$16,618 per student (these were 171 of them) for a nine-month course in the French language at a plush place at Nice along the Riviera. So what happens after the Foreign Service Institute tutors its subjects at inflated rates?

Strange things happen, that's what — as the following dialogue describes so vividly.

Congressman Rooney is in the chair of the Appropriations subcommittee. Facing him in the witness seat is Aaron S. Brown, deputy assistant secretary of personnel.

Rooney: I believe you said that you assign them to a post where they will be able to follow training in the language that they learned at the institute?

Brown: With respect to the difficult.

Rooney: I imagine Chinese would be pretty difficult.

Brown: Yes, sir.

Rooney: I find a gentleman here who got an "A" in Chinese—and you assigned him to London?

Brown: Yes, sir. That officer will have opportunities in London. Not as many as he would have in Hong Kong, for example.

Rooney: What will he do? Spend his time in Chinatown?

Brown: No, sir. There will be

WASHINGTON CALLING

WASHINGTON — Hearings are to be held shortly on a modest proposal that might contribute in this presidential year to two highly desirable ends. One is to foster serious debate between the presidential candidates on the grave issues of the day and the other is to reduce the high cost of politics.

The proposal is to require the television and radio networks to give an hour and a half or two hours a week of prime time to a debate between the candidates during the last eight weeks of the campaign. The free time would be limited to the presidential nominees of the major parties. The bill specifies that to be eligible the nominee must be the choice of a party that at the last election received more than four percent of the vote east.

As initiated by Senator A. S. Monroney, taking up an idea advanced by Adlai Stevenson, this is a modest proposal indeed. It has no overtones of government ownership or operation of the TV and radio networks which no one wants, since the dangers of political domination and government censorship are too great. But it would require that a small fraction of the time given over to entertainment to the great profit of the networks be devoted to a public service.

Monroney's original idea was for an hour and a half a week to be carried on all networks. The two candidates would each have half an hour for an initial presentation on a given issue and then an additional 15 minutes for rebuttal. The current bill, which is sponsored by a dozen senators, including one Republican, calls for two hours of time each week. But in the hearings before Senator John O. Pastore's subcommittee of the Interstate and Foreign Commerce committee it is likely to be modified.

In the 1956 campaign the Republicans spent \$4,036,000 on radio and TV and the Democrats \$2,971,142. The total of \$7,007,078 came largely from favor-seekers who never fail to try to get a return on their investment after the election is over.

This is one reason the American political system is so costly. It's not the original cost but the upkeep—the constant pressure for governmental largesse in one form or another, with the consumer ultimately paying the bill for

the favors handed out as a quid pro quo for campaign contributions.

A vivid recollection of this reporter's campaign travels some years ago was a talk with the governor of one of the poorest states in the Union. He was about to run for re-election in the primary for a two-year term. The office at the time paid a salary of \$7,500 a year.

How much would his campaign cost? About a half-million dollars, he allowed. And who would pay the bill? The highway contractors and the liquor people. His opponent would be financed by the big utility company that dominated the state and he would spend rather more than a half-million, the governor guessed. So here was at least \$1,000,000 which the consumers of the impoverished state would unknowingly be paying out several times over as the contributors pyramided the cost of their investment in passing it on to the public.

The clean elections bill adopted by the Senate early in the session through the efforts of Senator Thomas C. Hennings Jr. of Missouri is still held up in the House. There is strong opposition from the southerners because it covers primaries as well as other elections and it will almost certainly be stopped. With prime TV time costing from \$70,000 to \$90,000 a half hour the proposal for a national debate on the networks would help to cut down the high cost of politics.

A number of measures have been put in to give free time to representatives and senators campaign years. Obviously the airways would be hopelessly cluttered if this were carried very far.

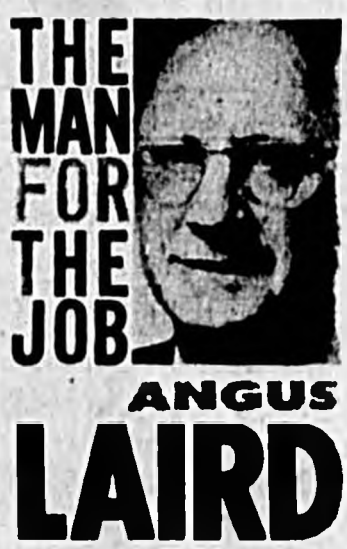

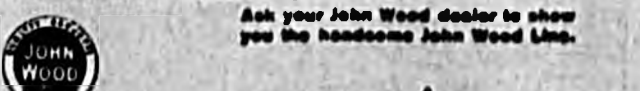

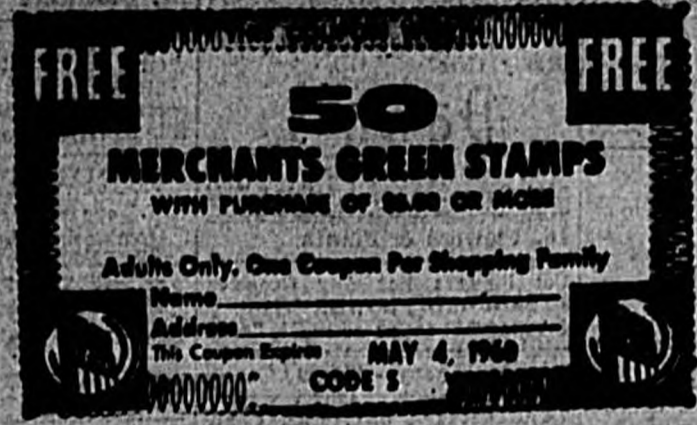

Turnout Indicates Record Vote Here

Seminole County voters started early and voted steadily today and clerks at the precincts estimated at noon that about one-third of those registered had cast ballots.

Polls opened at 7 a. m. to long lines of voters and balloting was reported the steadiest of any primary morning in recollection.

Some of the voters answered enthusiastically that their interest was greater in this primary than in the previous one and most of them said they were concerned mainly with the county races in which 20 positions are being contested.

Opinions as to the eventual winners were almost as many as the number of voters.

There appeared to be considerable interest in the governor's race, with most people expressing a good vote for Doyle Carle and Farris Bryant in the county.

The three big Sanford precincts, 1, 2 and 15, with 7,800 registered voters, had accommodated about 2,300 of them by noon, clerks reported.

Altamonte Springs, Precinct 1,000 on the rolls in Precinct 14, reported 316 ballots cast.

Precinct 14 at Fern Park had an unofficial total of 250.

The Oviedo precinct clerks said that 200 of the 546 registered there had made their choices by the lunch hour.

Longwood's Precinct 9 has 948 on the roll and 280 of them voted early.

Lake Mary reported that 230 of its 350 registered voters were in and out of the voting by noon.

A total of 128 ballots had been cast in Precinct 12 at Forest City, which lists 505 voters.

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'Steady' Voting Throughout State

MIAMI (UPI)—Florida's big city voters moved to the polls in steady numbers today to cast ballots for governor and other offices in a primary with racial problems and reapportionment the main issues.

In smaller populated areas, however, voting ranged from light to moderate by mid-morning as a long ballot and threatening weather discouraged the turnout.

New Violence Threatens Korea

SEOUL (UPI)—The Republic of Korea's National Assembly today formally accepted President Syngman Rhee's resignation and continued its government cleanup under the threat of new violence by more than 10,000 student demonstrators.

U. S. Couple Rescued

BOGOTA, Colombia (UPI)—An American couple, half-starved and ailing after being lost for 32 days in the jungles of south-eastern Colombia, were rescued today. Mark and Mary Sue Cantrell of St. Louis, already had received aid of food and medical supplies.

Resolution Rejected

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI)—The 10th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, U. S., Southern rejected a resolution Monday opposing a Catholic for President of the United States. A committee said the assembly did not believe it was appropriate to endorse or condemn any political candidate.

Paving The Way

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Gov. LeRoy Collins and a federal official signed final papers Monday giving Florida \$1,500,000 in federal disaster funds. The other signer was Thomas M. Goodman of Thomasville, Ga., civil defense mobilization director. The money is available to 13 counties hit by floods following heavy March rains.

Combat Alert

TAIPEI, Formosa (UPI)—The Nationalist Chinese government has placed its warships on combat alert in the Formosa Strait because of signs of an "imminent" Communist Chinese attack, it was announced today. The Agency said the Communists were "intensifying their activities along the mainland coast" opposite the Nationalist-held islands of Quemoy and Matsu.

Boaters Safe

CHARLESTON, S. C. (UPI)—A 28-foot yacht which had been the object of a Coast Guard search since Monday sailed into Charleston under her own power today with all five persons aboard safe. The "Kildeer" had been the object of a search off the South Carolina coast since an oil tanker, the "Esso Bethlehem," Monday picked up five survivors from the 45-foot ketch "Dutch Treat," which had been traveling in the company of the Kildeer.

President Raps Electioneering By Congressmen

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower today called upon Congress to avoid "electioneering" and give swift approval to his foreign aid program, new farm legislation, gas tax and postal rate increases and other priority matters.

The chief executive said in a special message that amounted to a mid-session State of the Union report that the administration's new proposal on health care for the aged will be sent to Congress this week.

He urged Congress to exercise restraint and prudence in examining programs designed to provide benefits for large groups of Americans or sections of the country.

Noting that there are only about two months left in this session of Congress, the President said:

"We should jointly resolve that the shortness of time and political rivalries will not be allowed to prevent us from serving the American people effectively."

"Matters are still pending that are vital to the health of our economy and to the nation's security and world peace; none of us can afford to electioneer at the expense of these."

In his two-paragraph remarks on health care, the President said the administration program will take advantage of and support progress made by private plans and "enable older people truly in need to meet the calamity of catastrophic illness."

He said it would recognize traditional federal-state relations in such benefit programs and be far superior to what he termed "compulsory schemes which over a period of years would blight America's unexcelled medical standards."

The President has vigorously opposed Democratic proposals for compulsory medical insurance as part of the social security program.

Eisenhower stressed these items in his message:

Minimum wage. He backed extension of the federal floor under wages to about three million more workers and supported a moderate increase in the dollar-an-hour minimum. But he urged rejection of an "excessive" increase.

Judgeships. He asked Congress to create 60 new federal judgeships to handle a greatly increased caseload and reduce delay in federal courts.

U. S. Criticized For Execution

U. S. embassies have been mobbed and American tourists threatened and insulted by foreigners agitated by the execution of Caryl Chessman.

The death of the convicted kidnaper-pervet was headline news around the world, largely as a result of the side circulation of books he wrote in the death house.

Protests were inspired in some measure by opposition to capital punishment, but for the most part what horrified foreigners was the judicial delay that kept Chessman in the shadow of death for 12 years.

A stone-throwing mob broke several windows in the U. S. Embassy library in Lisbon, Portugal, Monday. Mobs besieged other embassies at points as far separated as Stockholm, Sweden, and Montevideo, Uruguay.

The mobs in Montevideo picketed not only the embassy offices but the ambassador's residence, shouting "murderers!" and "assassins!"

Chessman's final stay of execution was the result of a State Department report to California's Gov. Edmund Brown that Uruguay, an ally of the United States, might erupt into anti-Eisenhower riots if the kidnaper were killed before the President visited that country.

Charges Dominate 'Drug' Hearings

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate drug hearings resumed today amid angry charges, countercharges and even doubt whether they would last more than a few hours.

Chairman Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) called as the lead-off witness Dr. Samuel Loube, former president of the Washington, D. C. Diabetic Society.

Loube has made a detailed analysis of the application and case studies which the Brooklyn, N. Y. drug firm of Charles Pfizer & Co. submitted to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in 1958 for its oral anti-diabetic medicine called "diabinese."

The drug has been attacked by Dr. Henry Dolger, chief of diabetes at Mount Sinai Hospital, New York City, as being the cause of liver damage in some patients. Dolger criticized the FDA for approving the drug.

However, John E. McKeen, president of Pfizer, who also is one of today's scheduled witnesses, has insisted the drug is safe if used carefully.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen (Ill.) told the Senate Monday he felt Kefauver's anti-trust and monopoly subcommittee was getting out of its field by debating the merits of medicines. He said "this was a matter for doctors, not lawmakers."

Cabinet Rejects Brick Request

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The Cabinet today turned down a Board of Control request to substitute out-of-state brick for Florida brick in construction of a building at Florida State University.

Board of Control Architect Forest Kelly said contractor J. I. Lamb of Panama City, offered to use Chesapeake brick for the mathematics meteorology building in lieu of brick manufactured by the state prison system.

Scooter Hits Car; Boy Hurt

A 13-year-old Sanford boy whose motor-scooter ran into a parked car Monday was in fair condition at Seminole Memorial Hospital today.

Thomas P. Brooks of 1328 Meltonville Ave. suffered a broken right leg and bruises on his right arm in the collision. The accident happened when the scooter Brooks was driving ran into a parked car on 20th St. at Country Club Manor, police said. The youth is the son of James G. Brooks, also of 1328 Meltonville Ave.

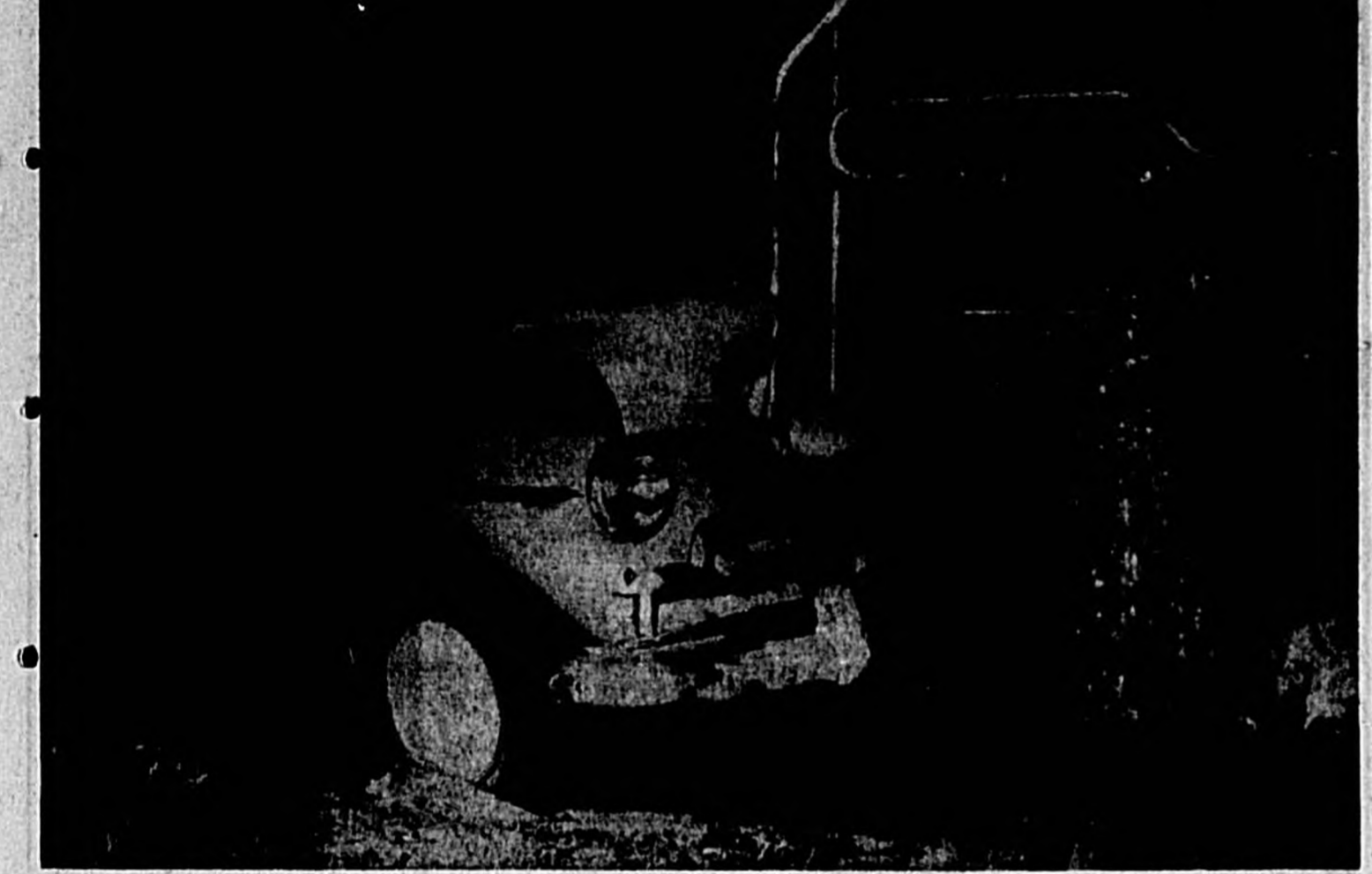
Dukes Murder Trial Wednesday

Firing Squad Pictures Win Pulitzer For Lopez

NEW YORK (UPI)—Fourteen winners of Pulitzer prizes for 1960 were announced Monday in the fields of journalism, music and letters.

Andrew Lopez, 80, veteran photographer of United Press International, won the news photography prize for a series of pictures on the Cuban revolt.

Lopez's photographs showed Cuban army Cpl. Jose Rodriguez receiving the last rites from a priest at Matanzas, Cuba, on Jan. 17, 1959, after being sentenced to death by a Fidel Castro tribunal for war crimes.

Immediately after Lopez's series of four pictures was taken, Rodriguez was placed against a wall in the courtyard of San Germino Castle, but received a 24-hour reprieve before the firing squad shot him. He was executed on Jan. 18.

The Broadway musical "Fiorello," based on the life of the late New York Mayor Fiorello H. LaGuardia, won the drama prize. It was the third time in the history of the Pulitzer prizes that a musical won. "Of Thee I Sing," in 1931, and "South Pacific," in 1959, were the previous named musicals.

Chessman Rites Are Held

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. (UPI)—Caryl Chessman, who ended his 12-year-battle for life with a smile and a wink Monday in the gas chamber at San Quentin Prison, was cremated today without ceremony just 24 hours after his execution.

Heavy Fire Damage At Cocoa Motel

STUART, Fla.—The first of Cocoa Beach's space age motels — was badly damaged by fire early today.

The blaze broke out in the kitchen shortly after 3 a. m. and before the flames were brought under control, the kitchen, dining room, coffee shop and cocktail lounge were destroyed.

The motel's owner, Vaughn Ladd, estimated the damage at between \$30,000 and \$250,000. Ladd said the building was insured and repair work would start immediately.

Three trucks from Cocoa Beach and two trucks from Patrick Air Force Base rushed to the scene. Firemen said the blaze started with a flare-up of burning grease on a stove in the kitchen. The flames were sucked up through the stove's ventilation system and caused a short-circuit in the electrical system.

The flames quickly spread through a cavity between the roof and the ceiling, but the fire did not spread to the motel's living quarters. However, firemen and motel officials evacuated all the guests because a south wind carried choking smoke into the rooms.

Miss Celeste Hickey, Goodman's secretary, got the number of the prison for the judge's law clerk but copied it wrong, getting only four digits instead of five.

At 10:01 a. m. she dialed the wrong number. She then got the correct one and reached San Quentin at 10:03 a. m.—the minute the pellets dropped.

Charges Dominate 'Drug' Hearings

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate drug hearings resumed today amid angry charges, countercharges and even doubt whether they would last more than a few hours.

Chairman Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) called as the lead-off witness Dr. Samuel Loube, former president of the Washington, D. C. Diabetic Society.

Loube has made a detailed analysis of the application and case studies which the Brooklyn, N. Y. drug firm of Charles Pfizer & Co. submitted to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in 1958 for its oral anti-diabetic medicine called "diabinese."

The drug has been attacked by Dr. Henry Dolger, chief of diabetes at Mount Sinai Hospital, New York City, as being the cause of liver damage in some patients. Dolger criticized the FDA for approving the drug.

However, John E. McKeen, president of Pfizer, who also is one of today's scheduled witnesses, has insisted the drug is safe if used carefully.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen (Ill.) told the Senate Monday he felt Kefauver's anti-trust and monopoly subcommittee was getting out of its field by debating the merits of medicines. He said "this was a matter for doctors, not lawmakers."

Cabinet Rejects Brick Request

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The Cabinet today turned down a Board of Control request to substitute out-of-state brick for Florida brick in construction of a building at Florida State University.

Board of Control Architect Forest Kelly said contractor J. I. Lamb of Panama City, offered to use Chesapeake brick for the mathematics meteorology building in lieu of brick manufactured by the state prison system.

Scooter Hits Car; Boy Hurt

A 13-year-old Sanford boy whose motor-scooter ran into a parked car Monday was in fair condition at Seminole Memorial Hospital today.

Thomas P. Brooks of 1328 Meltonville Ave. suffered a broken right leg and bruises on his right arm in the collision. The accident happened when the scooter Brooks was driving ran into a parked car on 20th St. at Country Club Manor, police said. The youth is the son of James G. Brooks, also of 1328 Meltonville Ave.

Dukes, a Negro, is charged with shooting a Negro woman in Altamonte Springs March 28.
