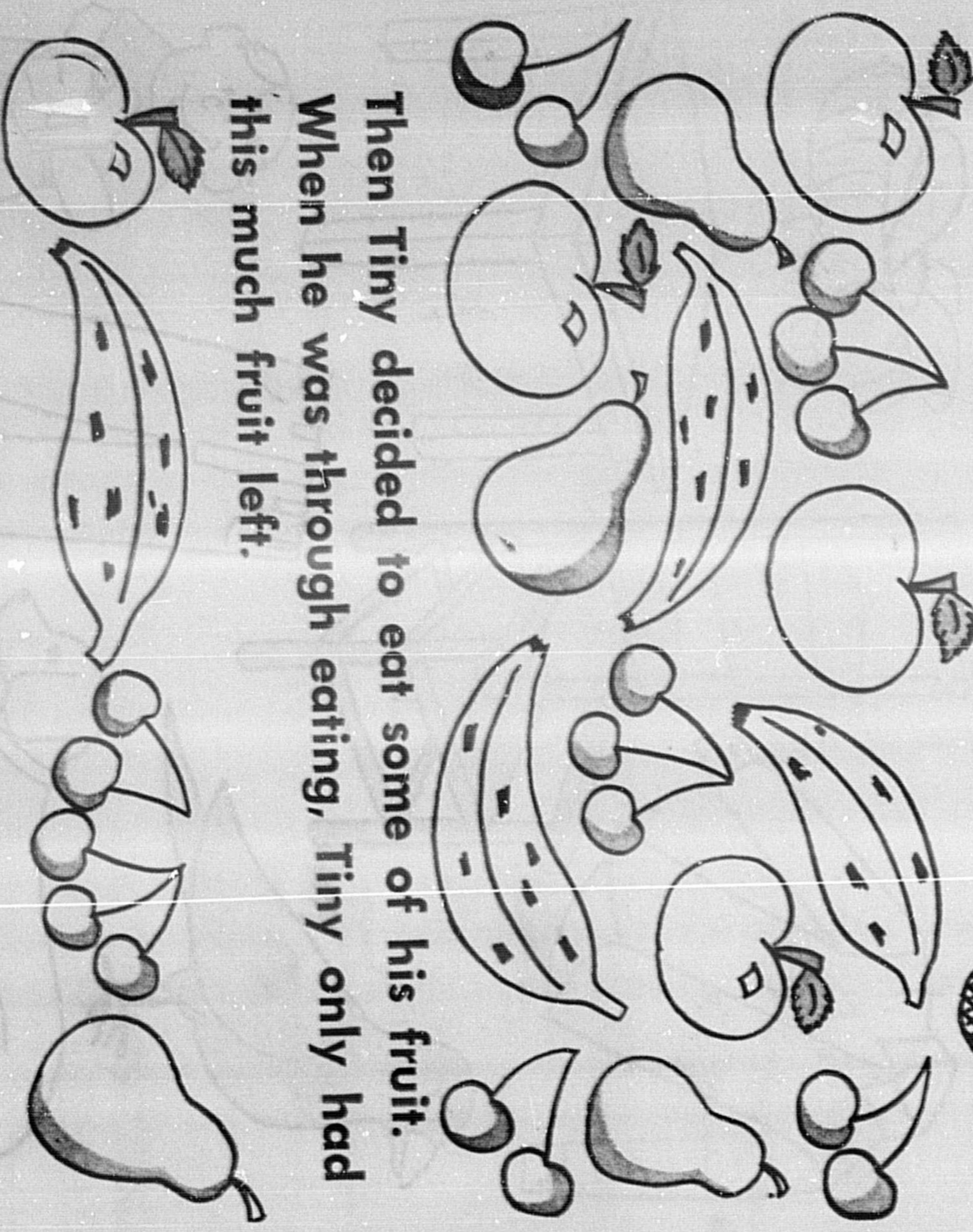

Midway Man Killed; Sanford Man Is Jailed

A Sanford man has been jailed on murder charges after the shooting death of a Midway area resident in a Sunday morning incident. Stephen E. Boston, 31, 1720 Strickland Avenue, was charged by Seminole County investigator L. J. Kriz with murder after Tyrone Henderson, 23, was killed in a 4 a.m. affray that occurred on U.S. 17-92, south of Sunland Estates.

Kriz reported Henderson was dead on arrival at Seminole Memorial Hospital at 4:30 a.m. from a gunshot wound.

He stated Boston was arrested shortly afterwards by Deputy O'Dell Hunt and placed in the county jail without bond.

The incident occurred, Kriz said, after Henderson, accompanied by Boston's wife and four other persons, including a sister-in-law, were riding in Boston's car to Eatonville to a night club.

When they returned, they met Boston in another car just south of Sanford and turned around. Boston also saw his car and he stopped on the highway to allow Henderson, the driver, to return.

According to Kriz, Boston is alleged to have shot Henderson after the man alighted from the car.

The dead man reportedly had been dating Boston's sister-in-law and had been permitted to drive Boston's car by the accused man's wife.

Tom Speer, assistant state's attorney, has requested an autopsy in Henderson's death, Kriz said. In another incident, Odessa Delpha Oliver of Midway was jailed on aggravated assault charges after she is alleged to have stabbed Beatrice Davis, Hughey Street, Midway, with an ice pick.

The Davis woman was removed in "fair" condition to Seminole Memorial Hospital.

State's Attorney Has Re-Charged Six 'Hippie' Narcotic Offenders

Six persons have been re-arrested and charged with narcotics violations as a result of direct information filed by Seminole County State's Attorney Abbott Herring, last Friday, said Judge Hall would file the direct charges after a new ruling on the legal definition of possession became known when the Florida Supreme Court overturned a verdict from the Second District Court of Appeals.

County Judge Wallace Hall had previously dropped eleven cases brought after search investigators on May 29 raided a 2032 Orlando Drive apartment at Fern Park, on insufficient evidence. Judge Hall said the charges were dismissed by him "as a result of the evidence presented and the laws of Florida and the United States," after June 15 and June 19 hearings.

Arrested in the May 29 raid were Vicki Dale Williams, Leonard Schilderhouse, Charles Robert Cloud, Debra Lynn Fritch, Dwight Moore Mason, Joe Fuller Cloud, Debra Lynn Capps, Charlotte Christine Thompson, Richard Thomas Helms, Charles Harold King, Richard Dale Hash and Tom A. Fisher.

Only Hash was bound over on a possession of marijuana charge by Judge Hall. As a result of the filing of direct information, the following have been re-arrested on possession of narcotics and possession of control of a central nervous system stimulant charges.

Noted Speakers At FTU

Two of the most popular causes taken up by students across the country are scheduled for some professional comment at Florida Technological University this coming school year.

Mrs. Friedan, who created a stir with her book, "The Feminine Mystique," is expected Jan. 15. Her subject is expected to relate to "the battle of the sexes."

Two Separate Meetings School Busing Stirs Parents

Fourth and fifth graders living adjacent to Pinerest Elementary School will be bused to Goldsboro Elementary and first, second and third graders living near Goldsboro are to be bused to Pinerest so the two schools can achieve a 50-50 white majority ratio and thereby eliminate the Goldsboro racial identifiability. This was confirmed today by Andrew Bracken, administrative aide, who acknowledged that he was informed by Seminoles County School Supt. John Angel that a meeting of Pinerest parents had been scheduled for Tuesday night and he (Angel) had been requested to attend.

In the meantime, a group of parents whose children will be affected by the transfer of students have scheduled a Tuesday night meeting at the Sanford American Legion Building and Bracken is expected to explain the detailed plan to the aroused parents, who oppose the busing of their children away from their neighborhood school. Supt. Angel advised The Herald he would be unable to attend the parents meeting since the school board is meeting at 7:30 pm on the same night (Tuesday). A special School Board meeting has been called for 8:30 a.m. Tuesday, in addition to the regular night meeting, to expedite strategy in dealing with the federal government in getting the board's desegregation plan approved.

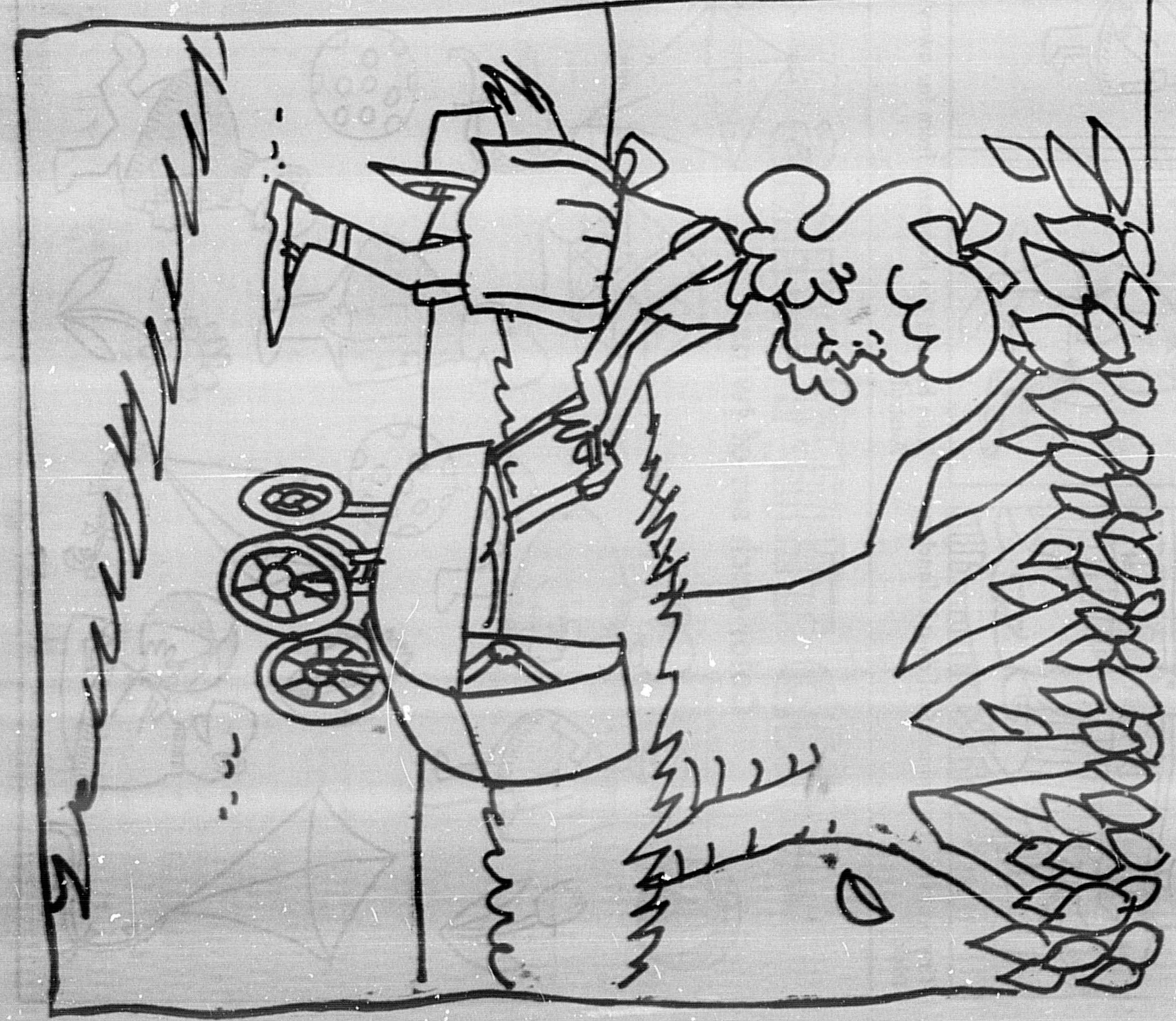

Conner's Is A 'Shoo-In' Since No One's Running

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Politically, they're this year's untouchables: Commissioner of Agriculture Doyle Conner, 41, Starks; Supreme Court Justice B. N. Roberts, 63, Sopchoppy; and Public Service Commissioner William T. "Billy" Mayo, 53, Tallahassee.

They were the only statewide officials to breeze into another term of office without opposition at the polls in 1970. All are Democrats.

Very few political waves roll out of his office, staffed with everything from formaldehyde-pickled giant African snails (the warrior's grim reminder of 1969 North Miami Center—mail battle), to porcelain Brahmin bulls, to kangaroo-foot back scratchers.

He extends the "speak no evil" treatment to Republicans as well as Democrats, unless provoked. That goes for Republican Gov. Claude Kirk, too. "I'd have no way of knowing how to evaluate his office. He has evaluated our office several times. When he speaks about milk and areas where he has no knowledge, I would respond," Conner said in an interview.

Conner drew rare praise from a Republican leader, party chairman Duke Crittenden, last week. Crittenden said Conner was Florida's most popular Democrat and a conservative.

"I'm not ambitious," Conner declared. "I'm not always out sampling the political water. Doing these other things may be doing the same thing."

Justice Roberts, Dean of the Supreme Court, speaks in such slow, measured, judicially-constructed words that he could be dictating to a monument engraver. His victory by default, he said, "I consider an inspiring challenge to rededicate myself to the proposition that all persons are equal before the law, and that the proper administration of justice is the keystone in the arch of freedom."

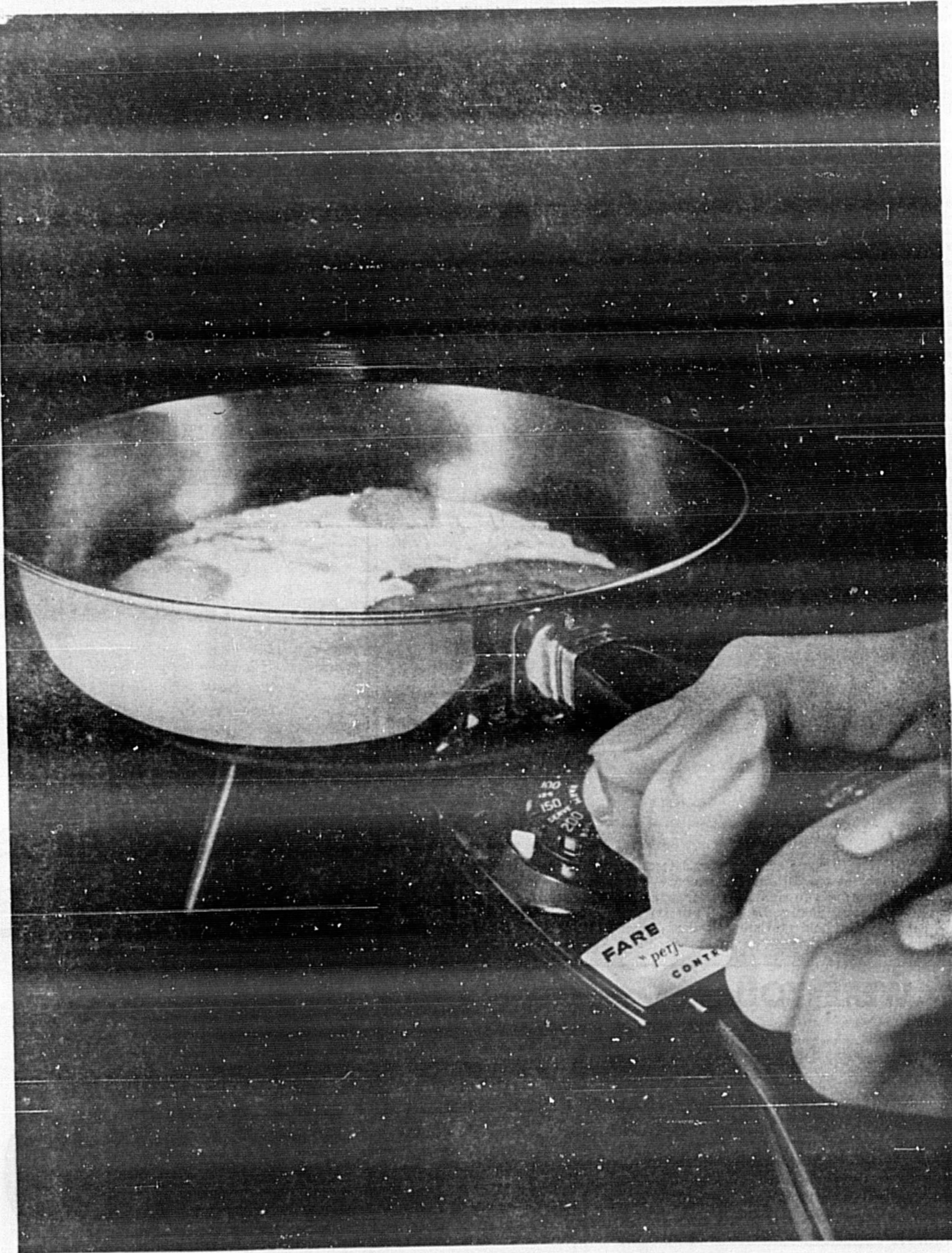

The Sanford team, coached by Dean Smith and Joe Pickens, will likely call on Robert Smith for the mound duties in the opener.

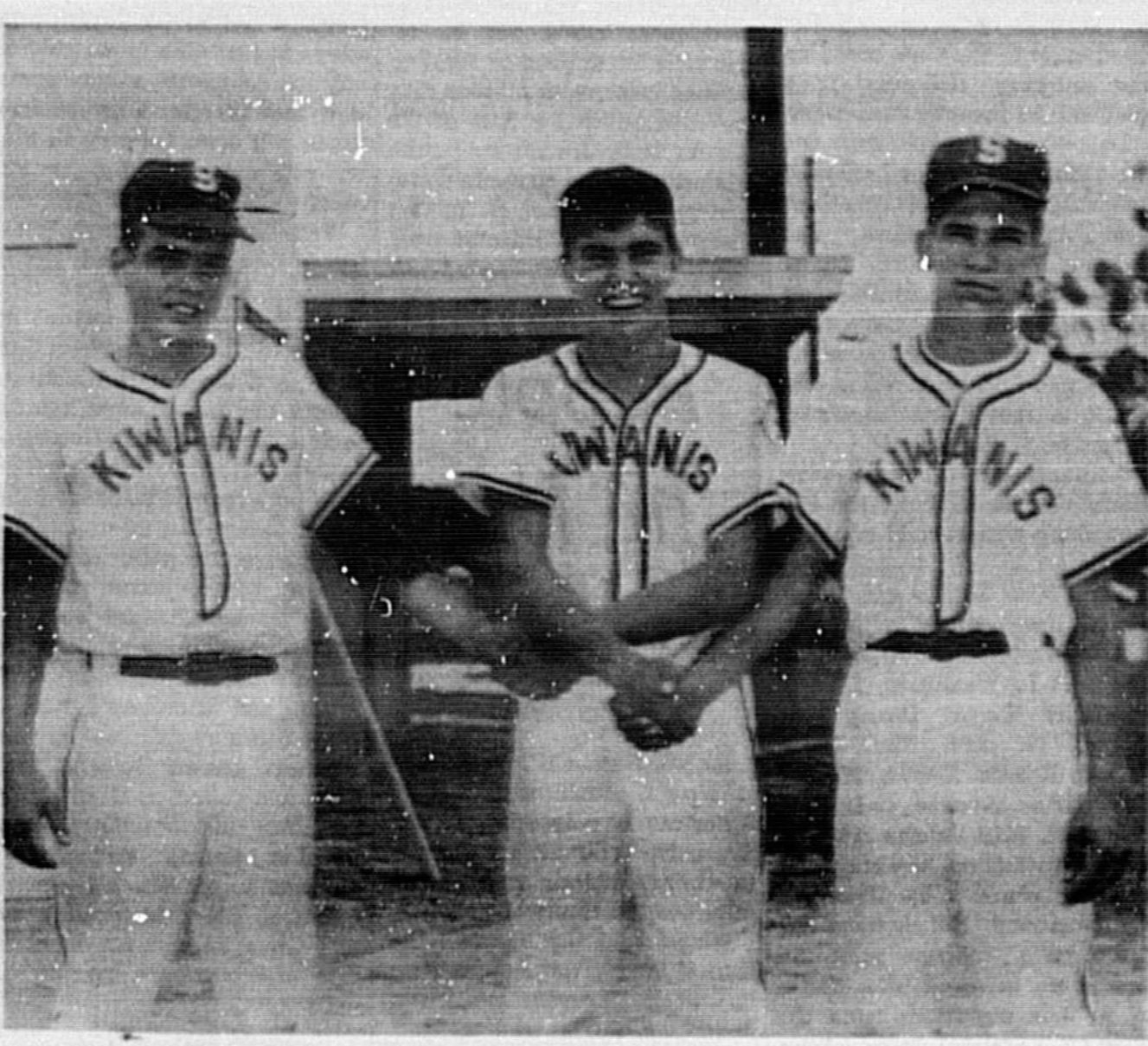

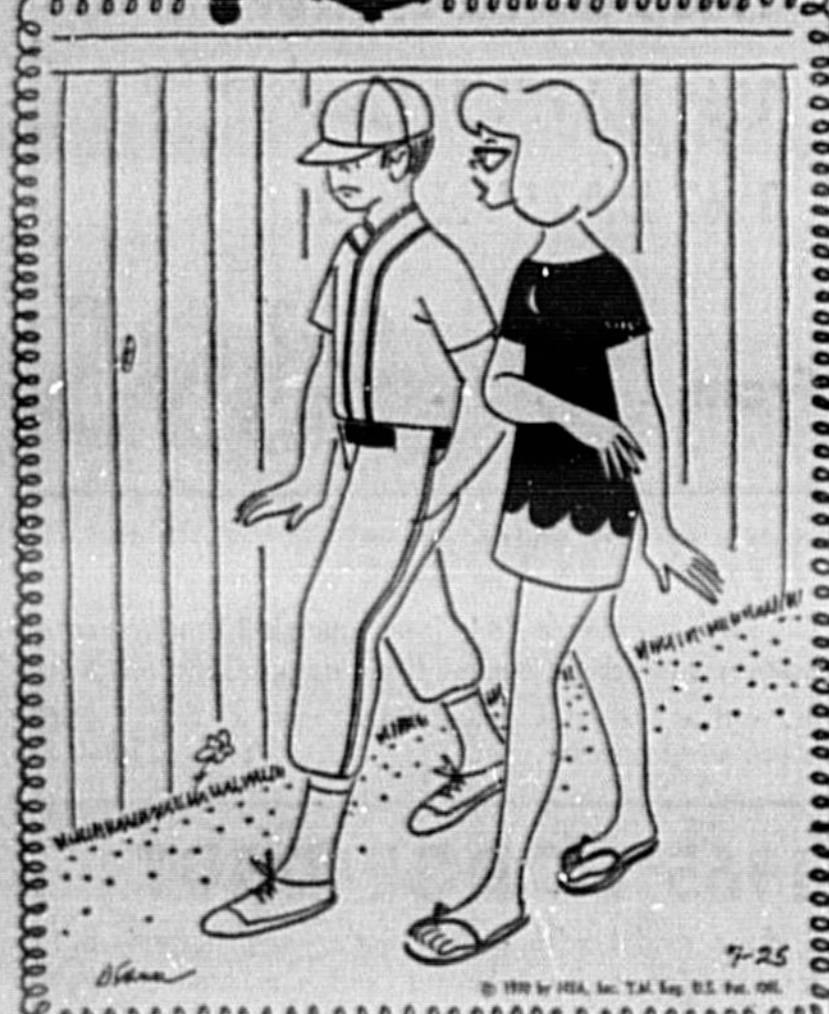

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According To Survey...

Today's Florida College Students Are Mostly Law Abiding Citizens

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Contrary to popular belief, a social majority of Florida's college students are not anti-establishment and believe in qualifying for respectable jobs. Atty. Gen. Earl Faircloth said today.

Faircloth said a follow-up on a college-wide survey by his office shows that college students are more law-abiding than many people think.

The survey, part of a \$15,000 study authorized by the State Cabinet, also shows, he said, that "hard-core student radicals make up only 4 per cent of the total college population in Florida."

Other results of the survey, Faircloth told a news conference, showed that: —Students living at home, such as the hundreds of students going to junior colleges, are less inclined to use marijuana.

A sizable percentage of students remain unwavering in times when it is difficult to remain unwavering by the rhetoric of dissent.

A large number of students are against proposed anti-crime laws which contain "no-knock provisions."

Faircloth said that while the survey continues to show that use of marijuana by college students is shocking, "they appear to be far more law abiding and respectful of constituted authority than most of us have been led to believe."

He described the latest results as parts two and three of the survey, which he said is the first of its kind in Florida. He issued the first part two months ago. It revealed that 70 per cent of all college students in Florida regularly use marijuana.

Faircloth, a Democratic candidate for governor in 1970, said the third part "dispels some myths about the degree and intensity of student activism bent on violence."

"Contrary to the belief that most college students are anti-establishment, a solid 64 per cent believe their most important reason for attending school is to qualify for a respectable and prestigious job. Only 7 per cent disagree with this view," Faircloth said.

Faircloth said the follow-up reports reveal that about 25 per cent of junior college freshmen said they would use marijuana if it were available and 35 per cent of senior college freshmen polled said the same thing.

"The study shows that the gap begins to close in the sophomore year. About one of every five junior college sophomores, or 20 per cent, have used marijuana once or more," he said.

Faircloth said the report shows that living at home, such as is done by most junior college students where some degree of parental control is featured, "makes a significant difference in the degree of marijuana usage."

The surveys have been conducted through Faircloth's office and results announced by him. However, the actual polling was conducted by experts at Florida Atlantic University and professionals in psychology and medicine associated with Drug Research Foundation Inc., a non-profit corporation.

Heading the research team were Dr. David Georff, Dr. Raymond R. Killinger Jr. and Dr. Barry J. Hersker. The Cabinet authorized the study last July.

Board Will Send Attorney To D. C.

Seminole County School Board at a special meeting this morning voted to send Douglas Stenstrom, board attorney, to Washington to consult with U.S. Justice Department civil rights lawyers to try and avert a possible cross-county school busing plan.

Stenstrom was tentatively scheduled to meet Wednesday with Herman Buckley, government attorney, charged with handling the county's legal confrontation with the federal courts over preparation of an acceptable 1970-71 desegregation plan for the county's 28 schools.

The attorney said there was wisdom in getting the Justice Department to withdraw its plan in favor of the county's, since it would eliminate hearings and cut down chances that Judge Charles Scott, Jacksonville U.S. District Court, would toss out both the government and local plan in favor of his own plan.

The local school system does not have enough funds available for cross-county busing and no federal funds would be forthcoming to pay for such a plan.

Stenstrom said in the event the county is ordered to cross bus, then the board would have to consider filing an appeal to the New Orleans Court of Appeals, since there is not enough money to fund the extra costs.

Landfill Site Studies Differ Over Pollution

Will the proposed Osceola Sanitary Landfill operation cause pollution of Lake Harney and the St. Johns River? No, there is no indication now that there will be pollution," said Paul Porter of Clark, Dietz and Associates, Inc., consulting engineers for the Seminole Board of County Commissioners.

Dr. Waldron McClellon, Ph.D., now teaching at FTU and an environmental engineer and consultant, did not seem quite as sure that no pollution would occur as he spoke at this morning's regular session of the commission, advising the board of a study he had made of the project.

McClellon spoke of the future use of the land, economy, and ecology (pollution) of the water. He stresses proper planning and monitoring of the water to detect possible pollution sources.

"A landfill operation is the lowest possible use of the land," noted McClellon. He suggested that the board save the land for such use in the future, in about 20 or 25 years. He said

that once the land was used as a sanitary landfill it would be good only for recreational use in the future.

Commissioner Greg Drummond noted (and McClellon agreed) that it was possible that the proposed use of the land could actually increase the value of the land. McClellon agreed, mentioning the proper spacing of the pits so that in the future founders could so build without interference of the pits.

Commission Chairman John Alexander, after listening closely to the details presented by the professor, noted that the report had turned up little that the board was not already aware of. "We would leave proper planning, including the monitoring, of course, or I would not be a party to the plan!"

The doctor also mentioned the expense of repairing and maintaining the access roads to the proposed site, and the need for careful control of both rain and the roads to guard against unauthorized dumping.

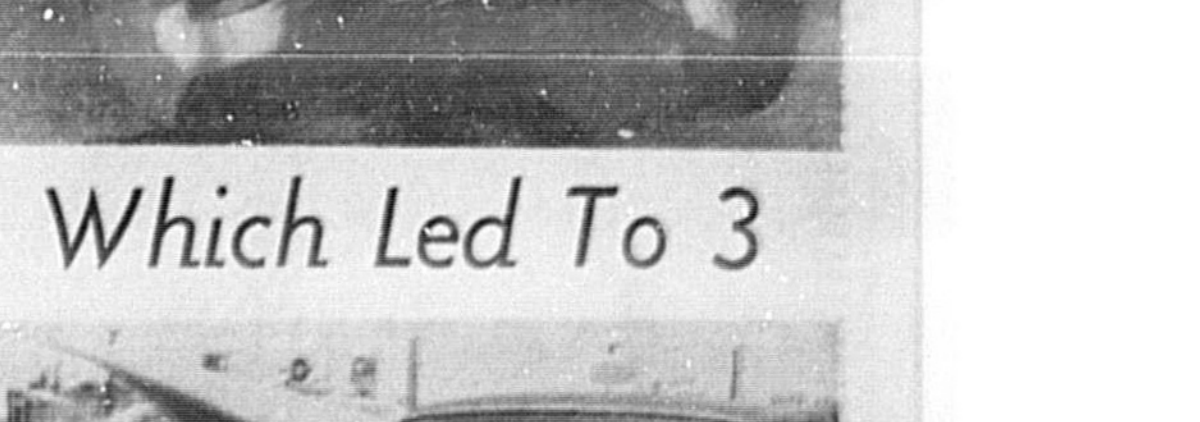
