The 'Heathrow' of transient camps has shower and television

SANFORD — Prostitution and drugs plague Sanford's inner city, but south of Airport Boulevard a different problem looms larger. Transients stand on corners

holding cardboard signs tipsy from their alcohol binge the night before. Homeless peeter customers before they can even put their vehicles in park, tapping on the window asking for loose change.

"I tell them repeatedly it's not good for business," said Kevin Gibbs, owner of the Chevron gas

station. "They just don't care who they hurt or even if they go to jail."

Sanford police Officer Shawn Kelley — the transients refer to him as "Robocop" — patrols the south side. He diligently keeps track of where they seek shelter.

Body found at scene of fire

Departments join forces to battle DUI

SANFORD — Christmas is four months gone, but Friday night French Avenue looked like a well-lit tree.

Flashing blue lights dotted Sanford's main artery as more than 40 officers from around the county participated in a driving under the influence saturation operation. In the past, police departments have relied on the standard DUI roadblock, but according to Sanford Police Sgt. Pete Jankowski a "rolling roadblock is much more effective and less dangerous to the public and the officers."

Officers from Sanford, Lake Mary, the sheriff's office, Longwood, Winter Springs, Altamonte Springs, Oviedo and Casselberry met at the Sanford Police Department at 8:30 p.m. for a briefing.

"You have the freedom to roam, but it's zero tolerance tonight," said Jankowski to the collection of officers. "Thanks a lot for being here. Let's see if we can do something good tonight."

The operation was "very successful," said Jankowski Monday. Approximately 140 traffic tickets were issued, 14 motorists were arrested for driving under the influence, seven

felony arrests, six misdemeanor arrests, and one handgun and stolen vehicle was recovered.

Four-year veteran Sanford Officer Tom McCall was one of the participants of the DUI operation. He took advantage of the extended boundaries for the operation and spent most of his night patrolling the area of Midway. Normally, Midway is

Time capsule records Longwood's history

LONGWOOD — In fifty years Longwood residents can look forward to opening two time capsules placed Monday in the new Longwood Community Building.

The 9,900-square-foot, \$1.1 million community building, on the corner of Warren Avenue and Wilma Street, is about two months away from completion, said city administrator John Drago. The time capsules will be tucked behind the spiral stairwell.

Items in the capsules were donated from the Central Florida Society for Historic Preservation, Christ

Episcopal Church, Longwood Tourist Club, City of Longwood Historic Preservation Board, nine local schools, several city departments and the community building's architect and contractor.

After the ceremony concluded, city commissioners moved across the street to begin the regularly scheduled commission meeting.

Commissioners unanimously approved an ordinance that places wastewater assessments for 45 parcels on the property tax rolls. The properties were connected to the city wastewater system between 1993 and 1999, but the owners did not prepay the assessment fees. Fees range between \$2,000 and \$26,000.

Owners who applied for financing agreements, but did not make the required payments to the city will now be charged via their property tax bill. The wastewater assessment billing will commence Nov. 2002 and the total will be split over a 10-year period with a 2 percent interest.

A half-dozen business owners pleaded with commissioners to reconsider the action as they had recently purchased their properties unaware money was owed to the city.

"It just looks sloppy to come back years later," Commissioner Dan

Wells unsure of business' future in Sanford

Jack Wells figured he hit pay dirt last June when he invested in a Sanford business. He had no illusions on becoming rich, but he knew Billy Boy's Famous Chili Dogs was a steady money-maker with a loyal clientele.

"I'd say 70 percent of our customers walk here," Wells said. "They've been coming here for years."

Wells doesn't expect them to show up much longer, at least not at his current location.

The property owner, W.G. Lassiter Jr., of

West Palm Beach, is close to inking a deal with the U.S. Postal Service that would relocate the Post Office to the west side of his building at the corner of Sanford Avenue and 1st Street — space currently being used by Billy Boy's and the former Second Image costume store.

Wells was unaware of the negotiations with the Post Office.

"All I've heard is what I see in the paper," Wells said. "Mr. Lassiter didn't tell us nothing and the property manager, Robert Johnson of Flagler Realty, didn't tell us nothing. The first

Gardeners prepare for Spring Fest

SANFORD — Flowers are blooming, crops are producing and Seminole's master gardeners are making final preparations for Saturday's Spring Fest/Earth Day event at the Student Museum.

This weekend's third annual festival will highlight the demonstration gardens surrounding the Seminole County School Board's Student Museum, located at 301 W. 7th Street, said Urban Horticulturist Al Ferrer. Master gardeners worked throughout the

weekend to guarantee the plants and flowers will be ready for the event.

"This is the main event of the year for us," Ferrer said. "Everything needs to be ready for this weekend."

The Seminole County Extension Demonstrations Gardens program began in 1998 to create a community service project and to transform an empty space with sparse landscaping into a series of demonstration gardens. Today, 15 demonstration gardens with varying themes, including herbs, pioneer vegetables and sub-

tropical, cover about 10,000 square feet around the museum. Seminole's master gardeners and volunteers maintain the gardens, working several times a month throughout the year.

According to Ferrer, not just anyone can call themselves a master gardener. A person must first complete 11 to 12 weeks of training and instruction and be willing to volunteer 50 hours of volunteer service per year to obtain the status.

"The basic requirement is a love

Engineered Homes sells 97 homes, eclipses \$18 million in sales during first quarter

Anchored once more by The Sanctuary in Oviedo, Engineered Homes of Winter Park sprinted out of the gates quickly by ringing up \$18.3 million in new home sales volume during the year's opening quarter.

Engineered Homes Sales and Marketing Director Marilyn Anderson reports that the company chalked up 97 home sales at six different Central Florida communities during the January-March period at an average sales

price of \$188,351 — led by its flagship community, The Sanctuary.

This year's sales volume was the third best in company history. Only the \$20.9 million registered during the opening quarter of 1999 and \$20.1 million posted during last year's opening period were better.

The Retreat at Wekiva, located near Lake Forest, and Buckingham Estates, which is situated just north of Heathrow, are still in the early stages of sales activity and are expected to have significant impacts on the company's sales numbers in the near future.




"I can be myself around the kids," she said. "We can play and have fun while learning."


There's no telling what the students will be up to on any given day. Recently, Reece's classroom was transformed into a grocery store to help the fifth-graders learn some math formulas.

 I knew about it was when I read it in the Seminole Herald." For Wells, the news gets worse. "Businesses can gain some protection through the protection of a lease; however, Wells doesn't have a lease."

Mr. Johnson told me nothing about it, but he said if they do get into a fight with the Post Office, we'll probably get a 30-day notice to vacate the property," Wells said. "I don't know what we'll do then."

 The original "Billy Boy" is Sam Richards of DeBary. He is known for serving his Coneys Island chili dogs and soft-serve ice cream in the 1960s. He'd still be in business if it weren't for a serious head injury he received when he fell off a step-stool. "I didn't really want to sell it because I loved the customers," Richards said. "There was just no way for me to go through rehab; the care of my wife, who is

severely handicapped; and run Billy Boy's." Richards knew Wells through church, and Wells had asked several times about buying the business. After his injury, Richards contacted his friend, and the deal was sealed on June 15, 2001, in just a matter of minutes.

Wells didn't mess with success. He left the hot dog recipe alone, but he did begin making changes to the facility. He power-washed the front and side of the building, replaced windows and spent \$4,500 for a new air conditioning unit.

That's one reason Wells is upset about being caught off guard by the news of a possible relocation. Because of the improvements he made, Wells thinks Johnson or Lester "out of courtesy" should have informed him of the pending lease agreement.

"If it hadn't been in the paper, I think Flagler Realty would have never told us anything until they

gave us notice to move out," Wells said. "They should have told us so we could at least make some plans."

Wells agrees he should have had a lease but said the business did not have one for years.

"I never had a lease for a long, long time," Richards confirmed. "In my opinion, our landlord did us an injustice," Wells said.

Searching For Help

Since the proposed Post Office relocation was announced, Wells said business has dropped off 50 percent.

"People think we're closed already, but we're not," he said. "We're open for business now, nothing's changed for the moment."

Wells would like to continue serving chili dogs in downtown Sanford, but he's not sure that will happen. He's already been contacted by an Apopka organization to move his business there. Plus, his past experiences with

Sanford City Hall have not been encouraging.

"We're probably one of the oldest businesses on 1st Street, but they don't seem to care," Wells said. "The way they act, you'd think 1st Street ended on the west side of Sanford Avenue. It's like this part of 1st Street didn't exist."

Wells said he asked the city about placing a garbage can in his center similar to the ones in the Magnolia Square portion of 1st Street.

"They told me they didn't have any money to put a garbage can in our center, but gave me the telephone number in case I wanted to buy one myself for \$750," Wells said. "Now that the Post Office is moving in, the city's going to put in \$27,000 worth of landscaping. We pay taxes and can't get a garbage can, yet the city will spend thousands of dollars to landscape property for another government entity." Wells said the city also rejected

his suggestion to allow an entrance from Sanford Avenue into the retail center. At one time, there was an entrance but it was closed when Richards still owned the business. Preliminary plans show a right-in, right-out entrance on Sanford Avenue as part of the renovations for the Post Office.

"That's all we were asking for, but the city said it was a safety hazard," Wells said. "My question is this: If it was too dangerous for us to have a right-in, right-out entrance on Sanford Avenue, how is it going to be any safer for the Post Office? They'll have 10 times the traffic we had."

Deputy City Manager Roger Dixon is the city's liaison on the Post Office relocation. He said the city is committed to assisting Wells.

"We're going to set up a meeting to find out what their needs are," Dixon said. "There are a number of ways we can assist, including technical assistance.

We can work with Main Street to help them identify properties that are available."

Dixon said he wasn't sure if the city could waive or reduce any permitting fees required by a relocation.

"That's a policy decision that would have to be made by the City Commission," Dixon said, "but we're going to do everything we can to help them."

Whatever happens, Wells isn't upset with the Postal Service. The corner of Sanford Avenue and 1st Street is prime property, and he admits it's a good site for the Post Office.

"I don't want to go against the citizens of Sanford," he said, "they've been good to Billy Boy's. The citizens need a better Post Office."

"We're going to remain open and serve all of our customers as long as possible. If we can find another spot close, we'll do it, but I really don't know how much longer we'll be here."

only patrolled by the sheriff's office, but because of the operation, officers were free to roam in parts of Lake Mary and Seminole County that surround Sanford.

The change of scenery did McCall well as he cited three different drivers in the area of Brisson and Celery avenues. Writing traffic tickets is McCall's specialty. He issues about 150 a month. After checking a few of his regular hiding spots around the city, where he likes to catch speeders, he returned to the area of Midway.

"We could just stay out here all night," McCall said as he turned on his flashers to pull over another speeder on Brisson Avenue.

This speeding ticket would be a little different as McCall immediately smelled alcohol emitting from Sanford resident William Thompkins' breath. McCall asked Thompkins how much he's had to drink tonight, he responded, "I don't know. I've had a few beers."

Later Thompkins would confess to drinking a few shots of liquor in Tampa and then having a few beers when he arrived in Sanford. McCall found an open tall boy of Natural Light beer in the front seat and half-full 1.75 gallon of Seagram's gin in the trunk.

McCall arrested Thompkins and transported him to the Sanford Police Department. Normally, suspects are sent to the jail, but with an Altamonte Springs command center set-up in the Sanford Police Department parking lot officers were able to process suspects there.

Thompkins was charged with driving under the influence, reckless driving, open container and speeding. He was transferred to the county jail by way of sheriff's office paddy wagon.

He even keeps a picture book full of their Polaroids so he can easily recognize and identify them.

"This side of town is a lot different," Kelley admits.

Kelley's shift begins at 6 p.m. and it will be close to sunrise before his day is done. He's a night owl — just like the transients he tracks. Accounting for the estimated 50 Sanford transients is a full-time job. Kelley, unfortunately, is only able to spend a limited amount of time as other police duties take precedence.

On a recent evening, Kelley responds to a runaway report, a gasoline drive-off report, a disorderly Wal-Mart customer and escorts a man charged with domestic abuse back into his home to gather belongings.

Finally, three hours into his shift, Kelley calls for back up as he approaches the dead end of Southgate Avenue off Airport Boulevard next to Fairwinds Credit Union. For a couple hours, Kelley is able to do some proactive police work.

Past the dead end of Southgate Avenue, a town of tents and shacks is but one of many in the city, but this one is special. With a homemade shower and other amenities, Kelley refers to it as the "Heathrow" of transient communities. Back up arrives and Kelley sets off into the expansive woods between State Road 417 and French Avenue.

"We never go into the woods by ourselves," Kelley said explaining the reason for the two additional officers.

Several hundred yards into the woods, officers follow a path that leads to the homeless city. Calls of laughter and an unidentifiable stench become more evident as the officers move closer. After moving through several low hanging branches and heavy underbrush — the light from a Tikki torch shines through.

"Sanford police," Kelley announces. "We're here to help." No one moves. The six people, four men and two women, stay seated in their easy chairs and couches. They've been through this drill before.

They continue to watch a small television, powered by a car battery, and sip beer. Officers ask for the identification and after checking with dispatch to see if they have any warrants they move on.

"That's not even the tip of the iceberg," Kelley said as he emerges from the homeless community. "All they need is a patch of woods. Look around, how many patches of woods are in Sanford."

Sanford police, in the past, have broken up several homeless camps including one behind The Seminole Herald at French Avenue and Fulton Street. But Kelley said that tactic has disadvantages.

"It's just like an ant hill," he said. "If you kick it, you're going to spread them all over the place."

Business owners disagree. "They shouldn't be allowed to live out there — that's the problem," said Gibbs, the Chevron owner.

It's a difficult balancing act, according to Sanford Commissioner Whitey Eckstein.

"There is great compassion for the homeless," he said. "We have to try and balance both of them. You're kind of between a rock and hard spot."

"It is hard to determine who is truly needy and who is not," Eckstein added.

Those behind Southgate Avenue may not be the "truly needy." One man openly admitted to having a full-time job.

Another acknowledged he could make close to a \$100 an hour by standing on the corner of a busy street asking for money.

In such cases, handouts hurt not help the problem, but there aren't any clear answers, Kelley admits. There are legitimate needs that must be addressed.

"If people have a closed eye to the homeless, nothing will get done," Kelley said.

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

of gardening with a lot of experience, particularly at the 'dirt under the fingernails' level," Ferrer said. "Second is the willingness to volunteer in Extension coordinated projects."

Currently there are 14 master gardeners in the Seminole County Extension Service's program.

Leslie Martino, master gardener and co-coordinator of the program, was one of numerous vol-

unteers working fervently last weekend preparing the gardens for the Earth Day observance. One of her favorites is the Florida native garden.

"Everybody does butterfly and herb gardens," Martino said. "You won't find many Florida native gardens. It is rather unique."

The garden contains plants and flowers that grew during the time Florida was first settled by

Europeans, she said. Plants include the American Beauty Holly and the Dwarf Yaupon Holly.

"Some people call Florida plants weeds," Martino said. "They may not be very useful in the landscape. But, some are very beautiful and useful. The American Beauty Holly, for example. Birds like to eat its berries."

The most difficult gardens to grow, according to Martino, are the vegetable and sub-tropical gardens.

"The vegetable garden needs constant maintenance and the plants in the sub-tropical garden are tender to lower temperatures," she said.

The volunteers' hard work and maintenance to the various gardens has created some publicity for the area. Seminole's demonstration gardens have earned numerous awards, including the 1999 Florida Master Gardener Award of Excellence. The city of Sanford has also awarded the garden its Beautification Award.

The gardens aren't just for adults. More than 6,000 students visit the Student Museum and tour the gardens each year. Many children, for the first time, learn how certain crops and plants are grown during their tour of the facility and its grounds.

"In what once was the center of

celery production, many children don't realize how and where it grows," Ferrer said. "We have it growing in one of our gardens."

Along with the demonstration gardens, this weekend's event will feature entertainment, various vendors and museum and

Anderson said about how it appears the city has been slow in recovering the fees. "Some of this makes me feel bad for the people because they're stuck in a bad spot."

"Admittedly for years we allowed people not to pay their bill," responded Commissioner Steve Miller. "What we had was a heart back in those days. I see the error of that now like a big festering sore."

Commissioners did agree to allow the handful of properties that have recently changed hands to pay the wastewater assessment fees over a 15-year period with no interest. "That's not a compromise,"

said State Road 434 business owner Robyn Ghasson. "This is the first time we have heard about this and we've been there two years."

In other business commissions approved the first reading of new Land Development Code. Commissioners have been debating over the new code book since December. The code book defines design standards in several corridors including the Historic District.

Commissioners approved several amendments including allowing 8-foot tall fences in the city and allowing 7-foot side setbacks for homes. A second reading date is set for May 6.

The Sanford Historic Trust plans to form a partnership with the city of Sanford to make historic street lighting in the historic residential district a reality.

Nothing is official and many details remain unresolved, but both sides have agreed in principle to move forward with a plan to install antique-style street lamps in the historic district over a three-year period, beginning later this year with a test installation.

Under terms of the tentative agreement, the city will purchase light poles and the trust will assume responsibility for installation and materials costs of the poles at most locations, using proceeds from its annual holiday home tour and other fund-raising events.

If plans are approved, about 200 of the 11-foot, double-globe cast aluminum fixtures would be installed four to a block on city right-of-way along avenues running north and south.

To minimize cost, existing lighting fixtures would not be affected and the new fixtures

would be wired to homes of selected homeowners, with their approval.

Plans call for the lighting to be installed prior to completion of a downtown Sanford Streetscape improvement project and a planned Riverwalk project along Lake Monroe.

Reproduced in an antique style, the double acorn lighting fixtures will enhance the neighborhood's historic appeal, provide ample light and cost far less than a lighting proposal narrowly defeated by historic district residents in a referendum vote last year, according to Sanford Historic

Trust President Russell Lord. That plan called for residents to pay a monthly fee for lighting installed and maintained by the city. Trust members ranked street lighting second highest behind code enforcement among priority concerns in a recent poll.

To trust member Alec Then, the lighting proposal demonstrates resident commitment to the community.

"It shows that the residents in this area of town really care about Sanford, and it demonstrates what can be accomplished if people are motivated," he said.

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
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
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

The origins of Earth Day ...

All About Earth Day
 By Ben. Gaylord Nelson,
 Founder of Earth Day

"What was the purpose of Earth Day? How did it start? These are the questions I am most frequently asked.

Actually, the idea for Earth Day evolved over a period of seven years starting in 1962. For several years, it had been troubling me that the state of our environment was simply a non-issue in the politics of the country. Finally, in November 1962, an idea occurred to me that was, I thought, a virtual cinch to put the environment into the political "limelight" once and for all. The idea was to persuade President Kennedy to give visibility to this issue by going on a national conservation tour. I flew to Washington to discuss the proposal with Attorney General Robert Kennedy, who liked the idea. So did the



President. The President began his five-day, eleven-state conservation tour in September 1963. ...

"After President Kennedy's tour, I still hoped for some idea that would thrust the environment into the political mainstream. Six years would pass before the idea that became Earth Day

occurred to me while on a conservation speaking tour out West in the summer of 1969. At the time, anti-Vietnam War demonstrations, called "teach-ins," had spread to college campuses all across the nation. Suddenly, the idea occurred to me — why not organize a huge grassroots protest over what was happening to our environment? ...

"At a conference in Seattle in September 1969, I announced that in the spring of 1970 there would be a nationwide grassroots

demonstration on behalf of the environment and invited everyone to participate. The wire services carried the story from coast to coast. The response was electric. It took off like gangbusters. Telegrams, letters, and telephone inquiries poured in from all across the country. The American people finally had a forum to express its concern about what was happening to the land, rivers, lakes, and air — and they did so with spectacular exuberance. For the next four months, two members of my Senate staff, Linda Billings and John Heritage, managed Earth Day affairs out of my Senate office. ...

"In mid-January, three months before Earth Day, John Gardner, Founder of Common Cause, provided temporary space for a Washington, D.C. headquarters. I staffed the office with college students and selected Denis Hayes as coordinator of activities.

"Earth Day worked because of the spontaneous response at the grassroots level. We had neither the time nor resources to organize 20 million demonstrators and the thousands of schools and local communities that participated. That was the remarkable thing about Earth Day. It organized itself."

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Classic Hamburger Gets a Makeover

What constitutes the ultimate burger? For some, it's a quarter pound of juicy sirloin topped with lettuce, tomato, pickles and a zesty barbecue sauce. Others prefer something a little less traditional: something that strays somewhat from the basic burger norm — a veggie burger.

Made from any variety of ingredients — grains, vegetables, tofu, beans, mushrooms — these meatless delights offer a change from standard hamburger fare, not a replacement. They can even be appropriate where standard burgers do not often tread, like at a dinner party.

Enjoy this recipe, courtesy of "Your Organic Kitchen" (Rodale Press), by Jesse Ziff Cool, in time for National Hamburger Month and throughout the year.

STUFFED PORTOBELLO BURGERS

Makes 4 servings

- 3 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 4 large portobello mushrooms
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 1 small red bell pepper, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup red wine
- 3/4 cup toasted bread crumbs or finely crumbled bread
- 1 1/2 cups Monterey Jack cheese, shredded
- 4 whole wheat buns

Lightly oil the grill rack. Preheat the grill. In a large bowl, combine the oil, vinegar, garlic, basil, salt, and black pepper. Spoon 2 tablespoons of the marinade into a medium skillet; set both aside.

Remove the stems from the caps of the mushrooms. Chop the stems into fine pieces. Place in a small bowl with the onion and bell pep-

per. Using a teaspoon, scrape out and discard the gills of the mushroom caps. Place the mushroom caps in the bowl of marinade, tossing them to coat all sides.

Place the skillet with the marinade over medium heat and warm the marinade. Add the onion mixture and cook for 3 minutes, or until soft. Add the wine and continue cooking for another 3 to 4 minutes. Remove the skillet from the heat, add the bread crumbs, and mix thoroughly.

Place the mushroom caps, stem side down, on the grill and cook for 3 minutes. Remove and place on a platter and generously fill with stuffing. Evenly distribute the cheese on top of each. Return the mushrooms to the grill, stuffed side up. Cover and grill for 8 to 10 minutes, or until warm throughout. Tuck inside the buns.

Eggs, Unscrambled:

Surefire Tips for Cooking Eggs

For many, eggs are the star of breakfast. They're great additions to lunch and dinner menus as well. But discovering the best way to cook them is often a mystery. So, doesn't it make sense to perfect your egg-cooking skills to ensure your egg dishes come out chef-perfect? Here's a look at how to create "egg"-ceptional scrambled eggs and omelettes before the eggs even hit the pan, courtesy of "The Good Enough to Eat Breakfast Cookbook" (Warner Books), by Carrie Levin.

THE PAN

To ensure perfect egg dishes, you first have to equip yourself with the right pan. Some pans are specifically designed for omelettes. The good ones are made of thick and fairly heavy stainless steel or aluminum. Nonstick pans do not necessarily produce the best egg dishes, so it's best up to you to season the pan so that eggs don't stick to the surface. There are two ways to do so:

1. Cover the bottom of the pan with salt. Put the pan with the salt on the range top over a fairly high flame. Let it sit over the heat until the salt turns colors (the colors depend on the material of the pan); this usually takes about 20 minutes. Repeat the process a second time and your pan is ready. If you never use an abrasive to clean your pan it will be years before it needs to be resea-

soned.

2. Cover the bottom of the pan with about 1/8 inch of vegetable oil. Put the pan with the oil over a high heat and let the oil smoke for about 7 minutes. Discard the excess oil and put the pan into a 500 F oven for about 10 minutes. Be aware that the handle will be very hot. If you have a pan with a wooden handle, use the first method.

BEATING THE EGGS

There's a trick to beating eggs for either scrambled eggs or omelettes — it's all in the click. Beat the eggs using a front-to-back, up-and-down motion, creating a little whirlpool on its side. The magical "click" is the sound of the fork striking the bottom and near side of the bowl or measuring cup.

CLARIFIED BUTTER

There are "impurities" in regular butter that can encourage your eggs to stick to the pan. These include milk solids, salt and water. Here's how to remove them: Heat a stick of butter in a 1/2-quart pot over a medium-low heat. As soon as the butter is melted, skim the foam from the top. Continue to simmer the butter for about 10 minutes. The excess water will burn off and you will be able to see the bottom of the pot. The result will be about 7 tablespoons of clarified butter. This is the healthiest form of butter, and eggs will not stick to the pan as readily as they do with regular butter. Now you're ready to try out an egg dish sure to be a masterpiece — so get cracking!

An apple a day may keep the doctor away, but it can also work wonders for your garden. Just as our bodies need nourishment to thrive, the healthiest gardens are the ones with a balanced diet of beneficial soil amendments. Compost — made up of organic materials like fruit and vegetable peelings, lawn and garden debris, as well as other things — can help a garden flourish. And, when combined with a proven soil amendment like peat moss, compost turns ordinary soil into the rich, dark, vibrant "black gold" that gardeners crave.

The combination of peat moss and compost is like a vitamin shot designed to build healthy soil. Think of peat moss and compost as two of the most important "food groups" for your lawn.

Separately, they're building blocks that supply soil with many of the critical elements of good gardening. But together, they're even more effective, providing a balanced, nutritious meal that can ensure a healthy garden for an entire season. Here's a simple recipe: Spread 1 to 2 inches of peat moss and 1 to 2 inches of compost over your garden, then dig them into the top 6 to 8 inches of soil.

How does it work? When peat is blended with compost it does two things: First, because peat stays in soil for years, it helps balance the faster-decomposing compost, which breaks down in a few months. The longer organic matter stays in the soil, the more good it does. Second, peat reduces compost's tendency to compact, loosen-

ing the soil and allowing water and oxygen to flow to a plant's roots. The peat/compost duo also saves time and money by reducing the amount of water and fertilizer a garden needs. And peat's higher acidity helps balance compost's low acidity, resulting in a pH level that's beneficial for most plants.

This organic blend provides balanced nutrition for the soil — a recipe to help your garden thrive throughout the entire growing season. Award-winning gardens enhance museum visit

The Seminole County Extension Demonstration Garden is a joint project in cooperation with the Student Museum and Social Studies Center of Seminole County Public Schools and is located on the grounds of the Student Museum. The project started in April 1998 with the vision of a few master gardeners to create a community service project and to gradually transform an empty space with sparse landscaping into a series of demonstration gardens.

Nearly four years later, the project includes 15 gardens covering approximately 10,000 square feet that illustrate themes, including herbs, pioneer vegetables, pioneer field

crops, historic roses, Florida and Southeast natives, shade, tropical, butterfly, muscadine grapes, mints, water barrel garden, perennial/annual flower meadow, ornamental grasses, citrus grove, and Oriental raised bed. Two "welcome arbors" define the main entrances. They contain several structures, including a Victorian-style gazebo, split rail fencing, brick paths, pergola, an old John Deere tractor and wagon wheels. The gazebo and pergola are used for public presentations.

Maintaining and developing the gardens is the responsibility of the project team, MG "caretakers," who work their garden areas several times a month throughout the year. In addition, there is an

open work day each month, except in December, for any MGs who want to earn volunteer hours and for middle school students who are in a special pre-baccalaureate program.

During the school year, about 6,000 public, private and home-school students visit the gardens and receive instruction from the Student Museum staff. Many other adult groups who use the facility also visit the gardens.

In 1999, the University of Florida recognized the demonstration gardens by bestowing it with the annual Florida Master Gardener Award of Excellence for best project. In May 2000, the garden was given a Beautification Award from the city of Sanford.

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Create beauty all year long through gardens

One of the easiest ways to transform a landscape or bring beauty to a dull gray area is through gardening. Whether expansive flowering blooms, well-placed shrubbery or a purposeful vegetable patch, greenery can enhance most any area.

In many cities across the country, urban renewal projects are in full swing, and often include setting aside plots for parks or even city gardens. Also, with the advent of "adopt-a-highway" programs, many of the individuals involved have chosen not only to just keep their chosen property litter-free, but to enhance the view with shrubs, flowers and other landscaping accessories.

Just in time for Keep America Beautiful and Earth Day celebrations, here are a list of flowers and the seasons in which they bloom so that you can keep your neighborhood and community beautiful throughout the entire year.

Winter

• Weeping Forsythia (*Forsythia suspensa*) — This

graceful, deciduous shrub has slender shoots and narrow, trumpet-shaped, yellow flowers. Prefers full sun and well-drained soil.

• Christmas Rose (*Helleborus niger*) — A small evergreen perennial noted for its lovely cup-shaped white flowers and golden stamens. Prefers partial shade and well-drained soil.

Spring

• Bleeding Heart (*Dicentra spectabilis*) — Heart-shaped, pinkish-red and white flowers and fern-like foliage grace this herbaceous perennial. Prefers partial shade and well-drained soil.

• Oxslip (*Primula elatior*) — Delicate, fragrant, tubular yellow flowers appear on this rare, British-native, clump-forming perennial. Prefers partial shade and moist soil.

Summer

• Peony (*Paeonia*) — These exotic, luxuriant flowers can be single, double or anemone-form and bloom in white, yellows, pinks and reds. Prefers full sun and well-drained soil.

• Snapdragon

(*Antirrhinum*) — A perennial favorite with children with flowers in white, pink, red, purple, yellow and orange. Prefers full sun and well-drained soil.

• Sneezewort (*Achillea ptarmica*) — A quickly spreading, upright perennial that is wreathed in large heads of small, pompon-like, white flowers. Prefers full sun and well-drained soil.

Autumn

• Ice Plant (*Sedum spectabile*) — Flat heads of dense, rose-pink flowers have great appeal for butterflies above fleshy, gray-green leaves. Prefers full sun and well-drained soil.

• Chrysanthemum (*Chrysanthemum*) — There are many different flower forms that come in a range of colors. Prefers full sun and well-drained soil.

• Coneflower (*Rudbeckia fulgida*) — Prominent, conical, black centers differentiate this flat flower from others with daisy-like flowers.

Prefers full sun and moist soil.

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Student Museum — Seminole's best secret

One of the best kept secrets in Seminole County is the Student Museum. Located at 301 W. 7th Street, in 1902 facility is the oldest school in continuous use in Florida.

In 1984, the building was placed on the National Register of Historic Places by the U.S. Department of Interior. Officially known as the Seminole County Public Schools Student Museum and Center for the Social Studies, this "school away from school" now is a hands-on museum offering instructional programs to Seminole County students.

The 1902 Romanesque revival-style brick building was designed by architect W.G. Talley of Jacksonville. Two symmetrical one-story wings were added in 1916. These were

designed by Sanford architect Elton Moughton. The building is one of the few surviving examples of Florida's turn-of-the-century school architecture.

Located in the heart of the historical residential district, the school overlooks Touhy Park — Sanford's Grove for Famous and Historic trees. Originally, the park land was donated to the city by the area's pioneer developer, General Henry Shelton Sanford.

The school opened in 1902 as Sanford High School. With the construction of a new high school in 1911, the building was renamed Sanford Grammar. Sanford Grammar served public school students through 1984.

It was at this time that the mission and name

changed — the facility became the Student Museum and Center for the Social Studies. Former classrooms were transformed into six interpretive areas: the Native American Room, the Pioneer Room, the Photographic Essay Lobby, the Turn-of-the-Century Classroom, Grandma's Attic and the Geography Lab.

In 1998, the Student Museum programs expanded with the creation of Demonstration Gardens. Garden activities are an integral part of each instructional program.

The Demonstration Gardens represent collaboration among the Seminole County Public Schools, the University of Florida Cooperative Extension and the Seminole County Master Gardeners.

Rules for Teachers — 1872

1. Teachers each day will fill lamps, clean chimneys.
2. Each teacher will bring a bucket of water and a scuttle of coal for the day's session.
3. Make your pens carefully. You may whittle ribs to the individual taste of the pupils.
4. Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly.
5. After 10 hours in school, the teachers may spend the remaining time reading the Bible of other good books.
6. Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
7. Each teacher should lay aside from each day's pay a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his declining years so that he will not become a burden on society.
8. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool or public halls, or gets shaved in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect his worth, intention, integrity and honesty.
9. The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault

for five years will be given an increase of 25 cents per week in his pay, providing the Board of Education approves.

Rules for Scholars — 1872

1. Respect your schoolmaster. Obey him and accept his punishments.
2. Do not call your classmates names or fight with them. Love and help each other.
3. Never make noises or disturb your neighbors as they work.
4. Be silent during classes. Do not talk unless it is absolutely necessary.
5. Do not leave your seat without permission.
6. No more than one student at a time may go to the washroom.
7. At the end of class, wash your hands and face. Wash your feet if they are bare.
8. Bring firewood into the classroom for the stove whenever the teacher tells you to.
9. Go quietly in and out of the classroom.
10. If the master calls your name after class, straighten the benches and tables. Sweep the room, dust and leave everything tidy.

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
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Today's lawnmowers: Low on emissions, high on helping environment

Nowadays, the country is more concerned than ever about environmental issues. Like automobiles, lawnmowers must meet strict emissions regulations, but that's where the comparison ends. Past attempts to compare automobile emissions to lawnmower emissions have resulted in published information that has been misstated, outdated, or simply not true.

Lawnmower Emissions

Previously distributed information stated that "one hour of grass cutting equals 100 miles worth of auto pollution."

"This is an unrealistic, inaccurate comparison between lawnmowers and automobile emissions," stated Bill Harley, President and CEO of the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI). "Outdated and incorrect information continues to blur

the emissions issue. We want the public to be informed that comparing lawnmower and automobile emissions is just not a reasonable comparison.

Consumers also need to be aware of the advances in technology over the last ten years."

According to the OPEI, the industry's trade association, these types of comparisons are misleading for these reasons: an average automobile is driven approximately 14,000 miles in one year, and uses hundreds of gallons of gasoline; while a typical walk behind lawnmower is run on the average of 25 hours per year and uses only a few gallons of gasoline. It is also important to note that the estimated number of lawnmowers in the United States today is approximately 38 million, compared to the 159 million automobiles on the road.

Another inaccurate claim is that after two years the average lawnmower will produce 34 times as many smog-forming emissions as an average passenger car. The fact is that on an annual basis, new automobiles generate 10 times more emissions than a new lawnmower.

That is, a new automobile would generate 20 pounds of smog-forming emissions in two years, compared to a new walk behind lawnmower that would generate 2.1 pounds of emissions in two years.

One fact that is often overlooked is that lawn & garden equipment is only a very small part of the EPA's non-road engine category, which includes marine engines, construction and agricultural equipment, industrial engines, airport service equipment and other commercial sources. Actually, the

total contribution of smog-forming emissions from all of today's lawn and garden equipment is significantly lower — under two percent. And with walk behind mowers, it's even smaller — less than one percent.

A Cleaner Environment

Environmentally conscious manufacturers of both small hand-held and non-hand-held gas engines have invested millions of dollars developing clean, innovative technologies that comply with and frequently exceed federal emission standards. Today's outdoor power equipment runs 70 percent cleaner than those built in 1990.

Design improvements have produced an entire new generation of outdoor power equipment with engines that are more fuel efficient, more durable and cleaner running. In addition, using outdoor

power equipment is a time-saving way to be environmentally helpful — like using a lawnmower for mulching grass clippings to lessen the burden on landfills, or recycling yard waste into compost with the help of a chipper-shredder. The industry has also developed new, specially designed fuel cans that help reduce emissions caused by spilled fuel. Consumers should use these new cans and take care when refilling fuel. "Don't spill when you fill" is the phrase to remember when gassing up outdoor power equipment.
