It's Taft In Ohio With An If

By BRUCE ROSSAT, NEA Washington Correspondent. CINCINNATI, Ohio (NEA) — Rep. Robert Taft Jr. looks to be in a strong position to pick up a U. S. Senate seat for the Republicans in Ohio unless a Democratic tide develops in the governorship race and engulfs him.

His opponent, wealthy businessman Howard Metzenbaum, who knocked off ex-astronaut John Glenn in the Democratic primary last May, is a stiff challenger but has been running three points behind Taft in most poll tests.

Metzenbaum's chief tactic is to try to link Taft with slackened economic conditions, which he in turn lays at President Nixon's door. But Ohio's unemployment rate has been below the national average, and though it surely will rise with a long General Motors strike (the company has 40,000 workers in the state), there is as yet no convincing evidence this will damage Taft.

Taft's answer to Metzenbaum on the economy is that unemployment generally is around the level it was during most of the Kennedy-Johnson years—until the "wartime boom" touched off by LBJ's large export drive for the war effort.

Why Not Memorial To Nasser?

By RAY CROWLEY, NEA Washington Correspondent. WASHINGTON: — (NEA) — The Nixon administration must not let the death of Gamal Abdel Nasser go by without some symbolic act.

However even-handed U. S. policy may have been in the Middle East, millions of Arabs firmly believe the United States is walled to Israel.

Now the United States has an opportunity to make a gesture—one that would mean a great deal to the Arabs without destroying this country's neutrality.

The gesture this reporter proposes would be a meaningful gift dedicated to the memory of Nasser. It could be cultural, educational or economic. But the most meaningful gift would be some dramatic humanitarian economic project.

It could, for example, be the great desalination and power plant at Alexandria, Egypt, first proposed in President Eisenhower's administration and reportedly personally endorsed by him. This would give Egyptians a new source of water and electricity for agricultural, drinking and industrial use.

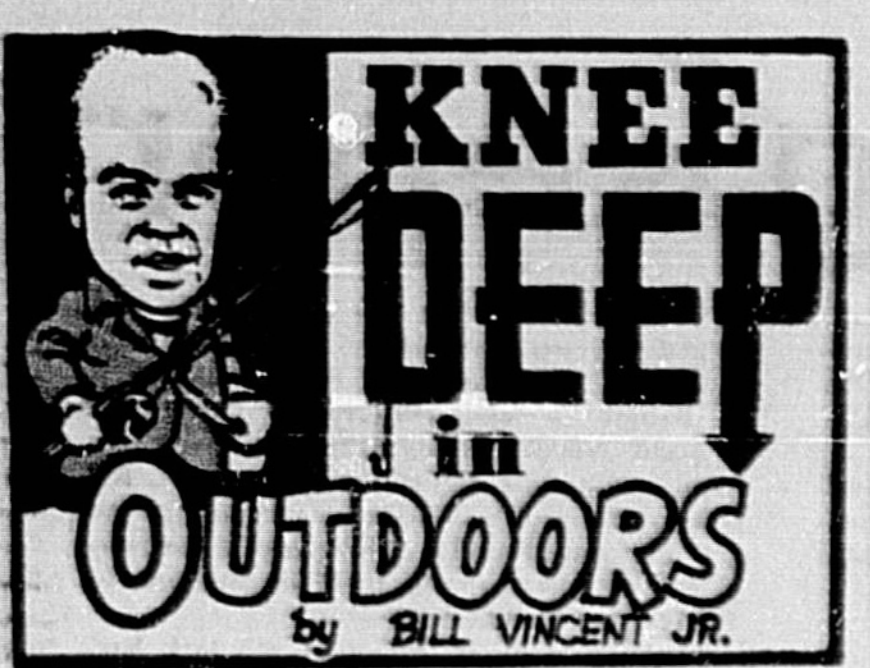

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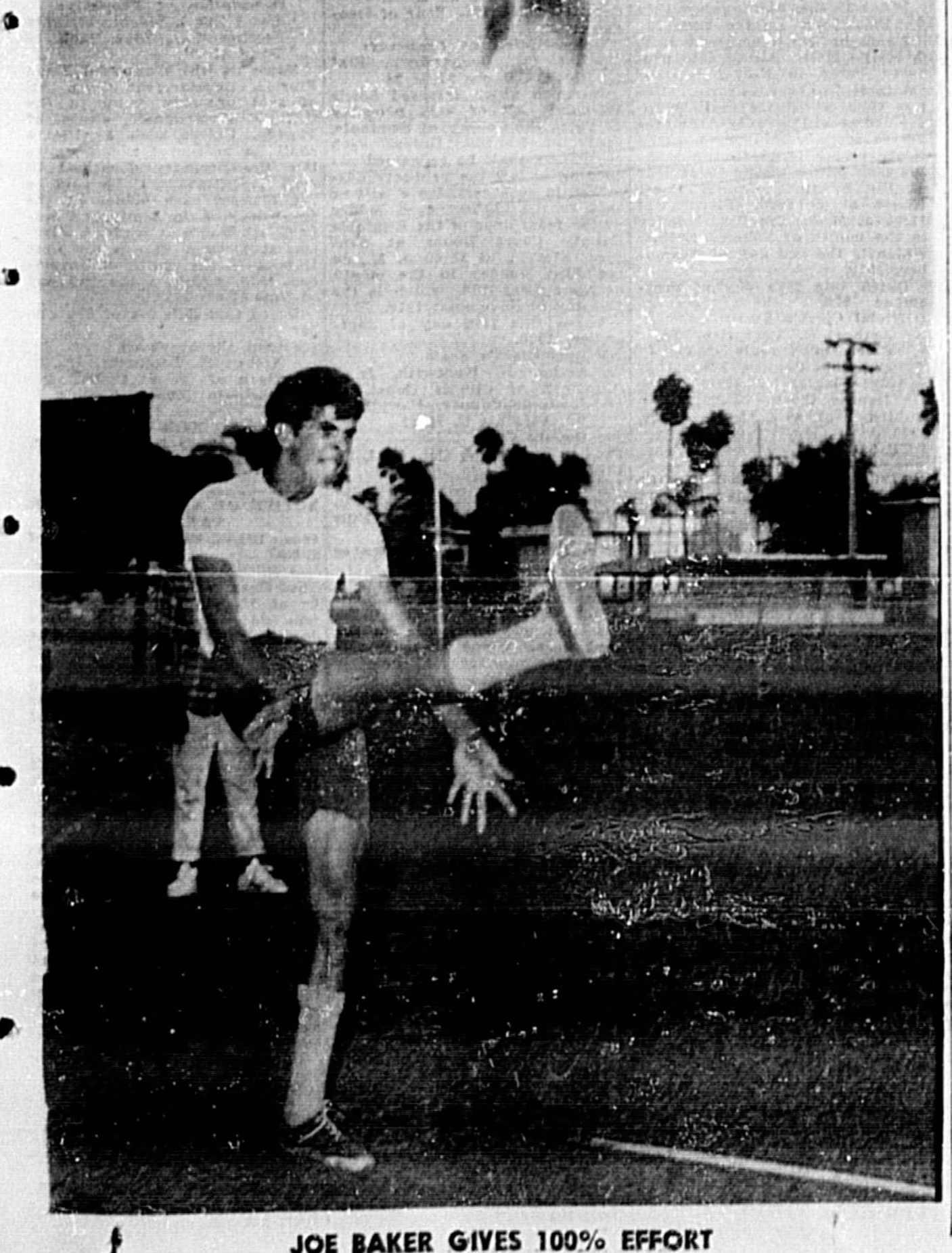

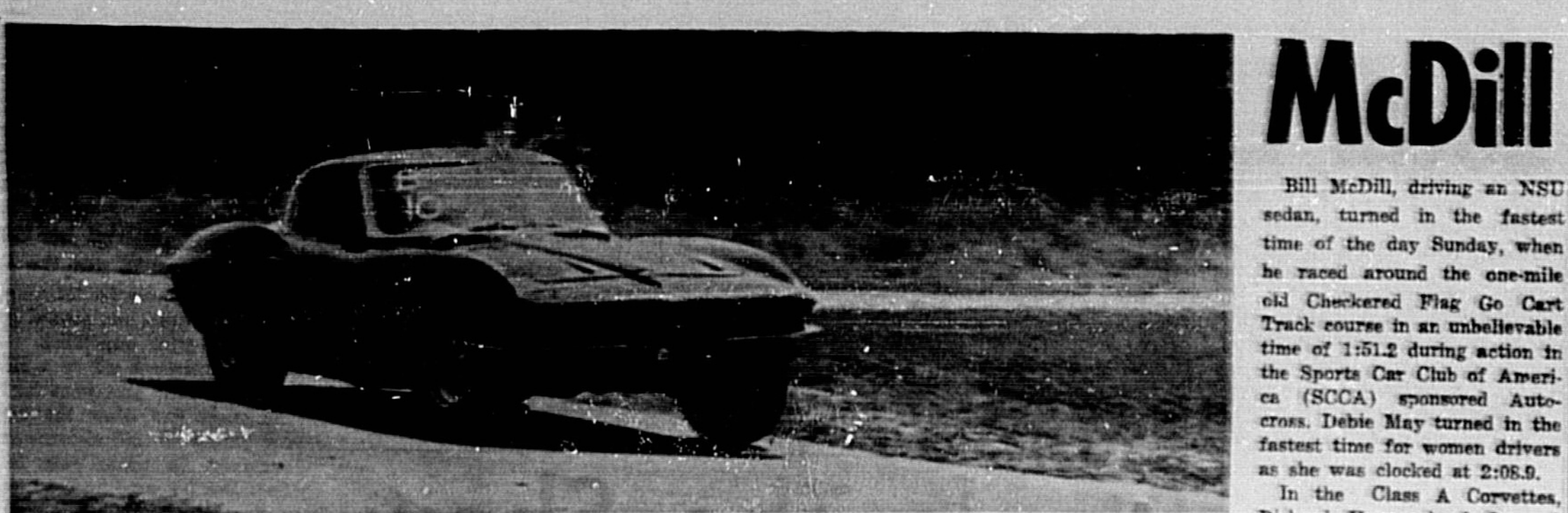

One item I'd like to mention in last week's column was the fact that the new trespassing law was going to be enforced to the fullest for dove season. This was the word that passed on to me from the Sheriff's office. It is very unfortunate that this law has to be again enforced as very few "sportsmen" who abused their privilege. The law is very clear and the fines are very large. The landowner has the right to keep off whomever he wishes and does not have to post signs. This law covers not only doves but also quail, pheasant and other property.

The regular duck season will be followed by a special season only from January 21 through January 31. The special season will be open in specified areas only. New regulations provide for a point system which will govern the hunters bag limit. In effect, the point system can increase a hunters bag from four ducks a year ago to a possible ten ducks this year.

Ducks have been classified in three separate categories, with some valued at 90 points each, others have been assigned a 30 point value, and a third group are valued at 10 points each.

The key to tabulating the point value will be identification of the birds in the bag rather than birds in flight; however, hunters who are able to identify birds in flight will have the opportunity to harvest more birds by the selective shooting of ducks with low point value.

School Aide Raises Question Are Drugs Used In Seminole Classrooms?

Are Seminole County school children being given personality drugs to induce a desired behavior pattern while they are in classrooms?

This is the question that a member of the Seminole County School Board will pose Thursday night at the board's 7 p.m. scheduled meeting.

Pat Buie, board member, disclosed today he will ask for an investigation of the county schools to determine if students are being prescribed drugs while they are in class.

The educator said he is not saying that drugs are being used but believes an investigation is needed since he had heard from an unnamed source that drugs are used in Orange County.

Buie related that Ritalin, which he said is a mild amphetamine, had been used elsewhere, according to reports that he had read. He said this drug is related to the family of narcotics called "speed," which induces a personality change.

"I have read where some schools are administering this type drug to keep students from becoming too active and moving around too much while in class," the board member stated.

In further reference to drugs, Buie said he wants to propose to the board that a copy in plain language be prepared for students giving information pertaining to the state drug laws.

Buie gave the following reasons for requesting the preparation of the information: He said the information to students from grade 8 and up:

It would make the child aware of the penalties before he experiments with drugs; this will give those students who are wavering good reason not to use drugs and cause them to back off; increasing laws regarding use of drugs; the tragic fact that young people just starting life are being branded as felons if they are caught using drugs.

The state legislature recently passed law implementing drug education for school pupils and, since only 15-12 graders will be given this program this year, Buie feels all children should know the facts.

"I think it's time we, the board, do something about the situation," Buie explained.

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Suit Against County Dismissed By Court

A suit filed by John A. Henley, in the New Year's Eve death of his wife and two children, has been dismissed with prejudice in Circuit Court, announced County Attorney Harold Johnson in his report to the County Commission Tuesday.

The case may be appealed to a higher court, however, Johnson pointed out.

Henley charged the county with negligence. In his complaint against the county he stated that a safety inspection made upon his wife's car had been done in a careless or negligent manner. Her brakes, the husband alleged, were not safe.

Evangelina Farrar Henley and her two children, Johnny Lee and Vickie Lynn, were on their way to New Year's Eve church services when their car plunged off of an Orange County highway into a lake. The three occupants died in the accident.

Before the accident, the Henley vehicle had been inspected by an Orange County inspection station and declared not safe, the suit charged. The car was then taken to the Seminole County station, and passed that inspection, it was claimed.

The case was argued before the court on Aug. 11.

State Eyes The Wekiva For Park

The entire Wekiva River, from the new Wekiva River State Park in Orange County, to the St. Johns River, in Seminole County, has been included in a state study for establishment of park areas in a "wild river" status.

This was reported this morning by Harold Rowland to the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce's project development committee. He said the Wekiva River has been given a priority in the state study.

Rowland said he would attempt to set up a meeting of a new county committee to consider what steps to pursue the proposal. He added that the county already has provided the state with some information.

Priority was granted by the interagency technical advisory panel of the State Bureau of Recreation and Parks.

John Krider, Chamber manager, opined that Seminole County needs some form of seasonal celebration or observance around which a promotion could be fashioned.

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Decimated Council; 2 Show Up

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Running true to form, as has been the case in the last several meetings, a decimated City Council met yesterday with two members in absentia. This necessitated consultation for two weeks of a hearing upon occupational license fees in the municipality.

T. A. Radloff, of Custom Builders, addressed the council concerning the license fees, which he felt to be excessive. He stated that the current fee in Altamonte is \$100 per year, and went on to enumerate other cities as being \$60.00 in Apopka, \$75 in Longwood, \$90 in Oviedo, \$60 in Winter Park, \$20 in Ocoee, and \$15 in Orlando. Radloff said that the City of Sanford had the most up-to-date method in that they used the formula of a contractor versus the number of employees.

Radloff said that the excessive fee charged by Altamonte was "creating a hardship upon business," and that a fairer method should be devised. He continued that "before a law is passed you should consult the business people." Mayor Lawrence Swafford told Radloff that, "The full council is not here... the one who proposed the law is not here... we can't take action with two members absent."

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
