Uric Acid Level Can Be Controlled by Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D. Dr. Lamb. Uric acid is also called allopurinol. It suppresses the body cell's capacity to form excess uric acid. The combination of medicines now available make it possible to literally control gout and prevent most of its complications. But of course one must continue medical supervision to gain these benefits.

Uric Acid Level Can Be Controlled (continued). The excess production of uric acid appears to be on a genetic or inherited basis. It is perfectly true that anyone who has gout should accept lifetime medical supervision. This isn't all bad. As long as the person's uric acid level in the blood is controlled, things are progressing well.

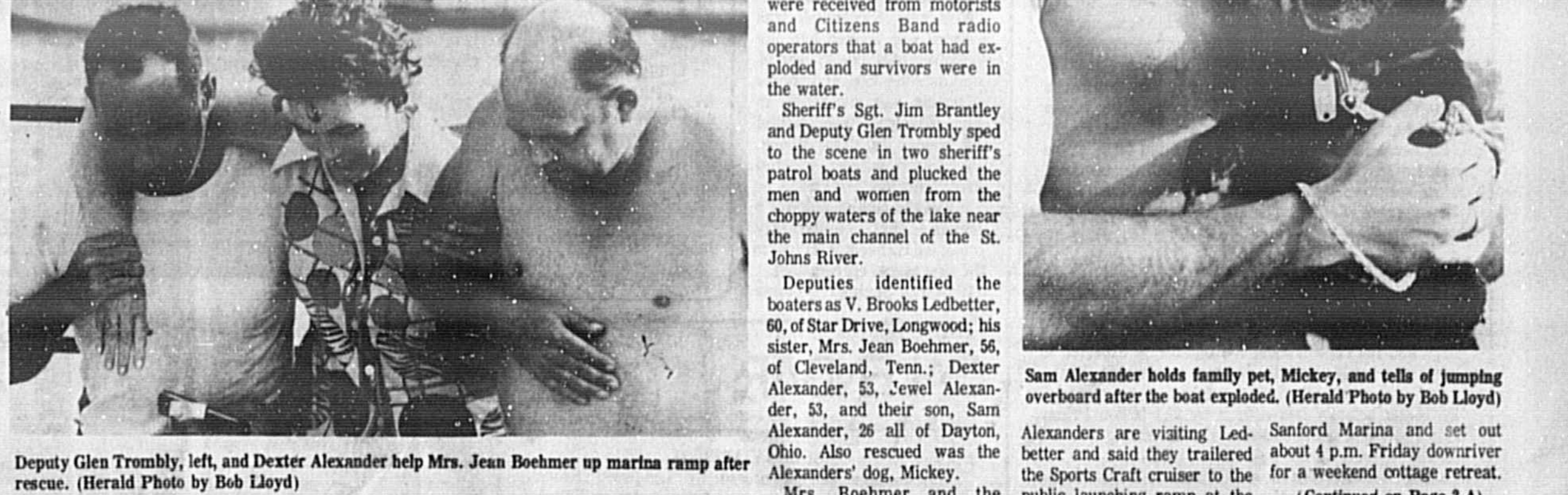
