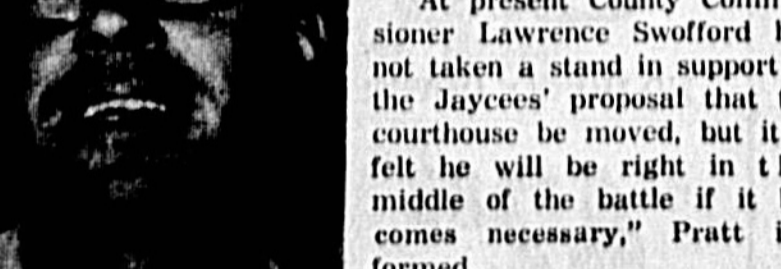

Clyde Franklin Lee Free On Bond After New Arrest

Clyde Franklin Lee, 44, twice convicted on lottery violation charges and arrested Wednesday on similar charges, was still at liberty today under bond. Lee and his girl friend, Jinxie Belch, 26, were arrested Wednesday by a team of law enforcement officers in a house off I-4 south of Longwood, said to be Miss Belch's home.

Participating in the Wednesday raid were Internal Revenue Service agents, Orlando police and Brevard County Sheriff's deputies.

Seminole Sheriff J. L. Hobbs said this morning his office was "aware of the raid. We knew it was going to happen some time soon but didn't know the exact day or time." The federal agent said Lee was taken to jail on \$50,000 bond pending appeal to U. S. District Court of Appeals at New Orleans.

Charles Limpus, clerk of Orange County criminal court, reported this morning he had received a mandate from the State Circuit Court of Appeals, Vero Beach, Wednesday concerning lottery conviction of Lee.

Limpus issued a commitment to the Orange County sheriff to pick up Lee to serve the state sentence in state prison at Raftord.

However, he said today, Lee's attorney informed him this morning he will file in Florida Supreme Court today a petition for a writ of certiorari (seeking review of the lower court's decision) and that Lee would not be in prison for two years ago.

Limpus said the Appellate Court was premature in issuing the mandate, that Lee has the right to a 15-day stay of execution pending petition to a higher court.

He added that should the Supreme Court clerk notify him of a writ of certiorari, he will file the petition for a writ of certiorari within the next couple of days, that a petition for a writ of certiorari will be filed in absence of the Supreme Court's decision.

Lee continues free on another \$50,000 bond in this latter case.

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WASHINGTON (AP) — In sharp contrast to the years leading up to John F. Kennedy's election as president, the Democratic party has split and weakened in the 10 big states which traditionally have been the cornerstones of Democratic presidential victories.

In most of the states, last week's election results left the Democrats without a strong, recognized leader and, in some, without fresh, younger leadership ready to plug the gap.

An Associated Press survey of the 10 states showed that Democrats face a major task in overhauling decaying state party organizations by 1968. It was in these states that Democrats, in the years leading up to 1960, laid the organizational basis for Kennedy's 1960 victory.

Furthermore, the problem extends to such national groups as the Democratic National Committee. The party's political leadership has become centralized in the White House.

The problem for the Democrats is complicated by an accompanying decline in the big cities, most of which have been heavily Democratic for more than 20 years.

Republicans made strong inroads in many cities last week. In addition, New York has Republican mayor in John V. Lindsay. Philadelphia's Democratic Mayor James J. Tate faces a difficult re-election fight next year. Chicago's Richard J. Daley — whose term also expires next year — is in increasing political difficulty and Los Angeles is led by Samuel F. Yorty, a maverick Democrat at odds with the party leadership.

Of the nation's five largest cities, only Detroit, with Mayor Jerome Cavanagh, is led by a vigorous young mayor — and this office actually is filled by nonpartisan election. Cavanagh has his own in-trapart political problems, too, resulting from an unsuccessful primary election Senate bid this year.

Overall, the 10 states have 13 Democrats and 17 Republicans at governors and senators, compared with 21 Democrats and 9 Republicans after 1958 and 18 Democrats and 12 Republicans after 1962.

The 10 states, and their electoral vote totals, are: California (40), Oregon (33), Pennsylvania (27), Michigan (21), Minnesota (11), New Jersey (17), New York (45), Ohio (25), Pennsylvania (27), and Texas (25). They have 252 electoral votes — just 18 short of the 270 needed to elect a president.

Republicans will have governors in states with more than enough electoral votes to elect a president. This situation is the situation in the big states.

Democrats had scored breakthroughs in several key races in 1968, including the replacement of Republican senators by such as Philip A. Hart of Michigan and Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota. Clair Engle of California, Harrison A. Williams Jr. of New Jersey and Stephen M. Young of Ohio.

At that time, they had as governors such figures as David L. Lawrence in Pennsylvania, G. Mennen Williams of Michigan, Edmund G. Brown in California, and Lawrence in Pennsylvania.

Not only did the GOP win key governorships last week, but Republicans captured a number of other state positions, especially in California, Michigan, Minnesota and Pennsylvania.

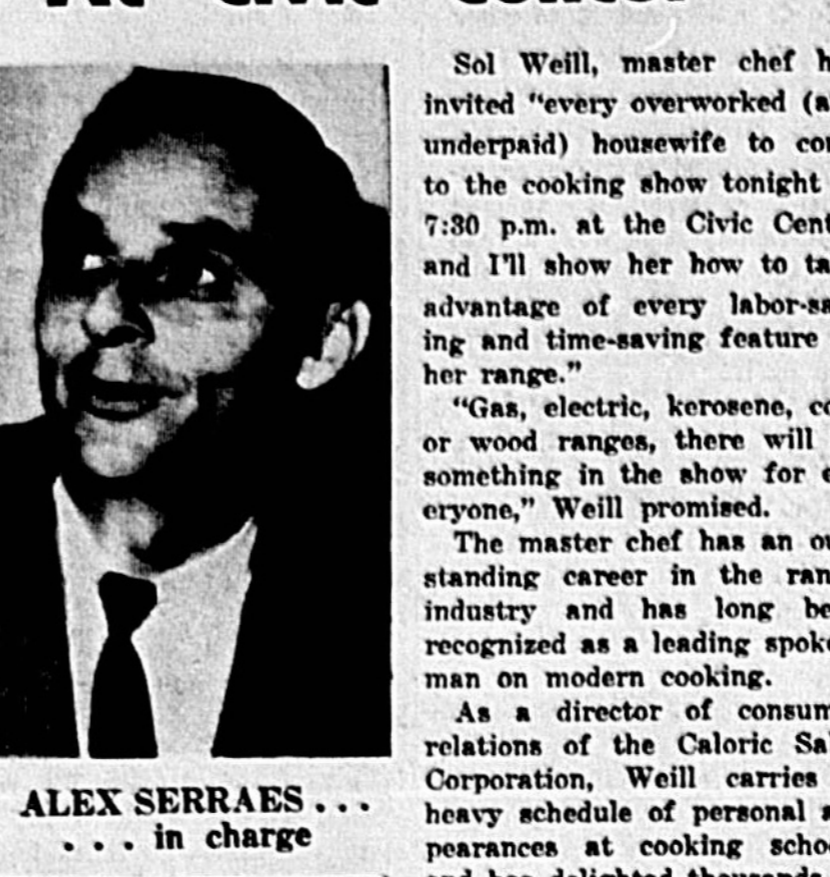

S. Americans Ignoring Signs

In Latin America perhaps it is some of both.

The sale of the warplanes to a country in deep economic trouble and with little reason to fight anybody has aroused sharp criticism even in the United States.

In any event, the sale aroused the Valley is rated among the most important in the world.

When any nation builds up its armed strength beyond the needs of normal internal security, it does so because it feels it may have a use for them against a preselected potential enemy or for reasons of prestige among its neighbors.

Would like to thank Violet Thomas for telling me of the many recipes she has tried from the column. She also said she enjoyed reading about my experience working in the famous restaurant in Washington, D. C. She has requested a barbecue sauce recipe. Here are several for her to try. The first one is a quickie.

ALL ROUND TOMATO BARBECUE SAUCE
1 can (10 1/2 oz.) condensed tomato soup
2 to 4 tbsp. sweet pickle relish
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
3/4 cup chopped onion
1 tsp. brown sugar
1/2 tsp. vinegar
Combine all ingredients. Cover, simmer until onion is cooked and flavors are blended. Use the sauce for basting frankfurters, hamburgers or chicken. Makes 1 1/2 cups sauce.

CHILI BARBECUE SAUCE
2 small onion, finely chopped
1/2 tsp. vinegar
2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 tsp. chili powder
3/4 cup water
3/4 cup catsup
1/2 tsp. salt
Mix all ingredients in a skill pot. Cover and simmer about 15 minutes. Keep in covered container in refrigerator to be used as needed. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

SWEET BARBECUE SAUCE
2 tsp. dry mustard
1/2 cup chili sauce
1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup pineapple juice
1 tsp. lemon juice
Combine ingredients. Brush over meat as desired.

Next week is Thanksgiving. For those who are preparing a turkey for the first time here are some tips. When buying a turkey, judge the size of the bird by the number of servings you want. If you are using a ready-to-cook turkey allow 1/2 lb. per serving. An 8 to 10 lb. bird takes 4 1/2 to 5 hours to cook. A 14 to 16 lb. bird takes 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 hours to cook. A 20 to 22 lb. bird takes 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 hours to cook. Unstuffed turkeys require about 5 minutes per pound less cooking time. If you have any turkey left over after the big day try this Turkey Casserole.

TURKEY CASSEROLE
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
3 tsp. fat
1/2 cup flour
1 1/2 cups milk
1 can cream of chicken soup
1/2 cup chopped turkey
1/2 cup cream of mushroom soup
1/2 cup bread crumbs
1/2 pkg. canned biscuits or 1 recipe
1/2 cup grated cheese
Brown onion and green pepper in melted fat. Add salt and flour. Blend until moistened; add milk and soup. Cook until bubbly hot and thick, stirring constantly. Add cream of chicken soup, turkey, cream of mushroom soup and bread crumbs. Spoon into greased baking dish. Roll biscuits to form a rectangle 3/4 inch thick. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake in preheated 450 degree oven for 15 minutes. Remove to 425 degrees. Bake until twigs are browned. Serves 6.

DUCK A L'ORANGE
1 5 to 6 lb. duck
2 tsp. butter
Dash of Kitchen Bouquet
1/2 cup orange marmalade
Salt and pepper to taste
1 onion peeled
2 oranges, peeled
Remove giblets and neck from cavity of duck. Place in pan; cover with salted water. Simmer for 45 minutes. Drain neck. Chop giblets. Reduce stock to 1 cup, if necessary. Melt butter, blend in 2 tbsp. flour until smooth. Add stock; cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add chopped giblets and enough Kitchen Bouquet to make gravy dark color. Add marmalade, mix well. Set aside. Season duck outside with salt and pepper. Place onion and 1 orange inside duck; close cavity. Place duck on rack in roasting pan. Bake at 450 degrees for 30 minutes. Reduce heat to 300 degrees. Pour gravy over duck; cook for 1 hour longer, basting occasionally. Remove duck from pan; keep warm. Drain excess fat from pan. Stir flour into remaining pan drippings. Cook until thickened. Section remaining oranges; place around duck.

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — Samuel H. Sheppard, cleared after 12 years in the bloodstained number of his first wife, savored his complete freedom today and quietly vowed to build a new life with his second wife.

The balding, graying man of 42, who served nine years in prison for the crime of which he was acquitted by a jury Wednesday night, said: "How can I have anything in my heart left of bitterness. I have no bitterness. I have love in my heart."

His lawyers said they expect so his osteopathic license, suspended while he was in prison, to be restored. But when asked if he will return to his career as a neurosurgeon, Sheppard replied: "I don't know if I will. If people need help, I will. If people are sick and need a neurosurgeon's help, I will."

As for immediate plans, Sheppard told a news conference Monday after the 10:18 p.m. acquittal verdict: "I plan nothing. I would like to go see our parents in Germany."

Petticoat Politics To Rule Alabama

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — The petticoat's place in Alabama politics seems assured with women holding six of the state's top elective offices.

During the Nov. 8 elections, most of the national attention was focused on Lurleen Wallace's smashing victory over two male opponents.

But, when the 40-year-old blonde succeeds her husband, Gov. George C. Wallace, to become Alabama's first, and the nation's third, woman governor, she will be joining five other members of her sex who have been chosen by Alabama's voters.

Moreover, a woman never has been defeated by a man in a contest for statewide office in Alabama.

This year, Sibyl Pool, who started the feminist movement at the state Capitol, drubbed a male foe for re-election to the Public Service Commission. The only other woman challenged by a man, Secretary of State Agnes Baggett, handily moved over to the treasurer's office.

Two other women were elected without male opposition. Melba Till Allen defeated Republican Alice Hudson for state auditor while Mabel Amos was unopposed for secretary of state.

In addition to the women elected this year, the presiding judge of the Alabama Court of Appeals is a woman, Annie Lohmeyer. Her six-year term did not expire this year.

U. S. Ups Gls In War To 358,000

By ROBERT TUCKMAN SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — The Viet Cong unleashed mortar attacks on a provincial capital and five government outposts during the night and today in the Mekong Delta.

The barges struck the town of Ben Tre, 45 miles southwest of Saigon, and a string of militia posts 48 to 78 miles southwest of the capital.

Two women were reported killed and nine other civilians wounded in the shelling of Ben Tre during the night. Fifteen millionaires manning one watch tower suffered moderate casualties, a Vietnamese spokesman said. Casualties at the other posts were reported "very light."

U.S. military headquarters reported only small scale probes and patrol skirmishes. In the largest action, U.S. Marines reported the number of Communist killed Wednesday in a fight below the demilitarized zone rose from 14 to 28. The action, 10 miles south of the zone, was the first of any size in Operation Prairie since last September.

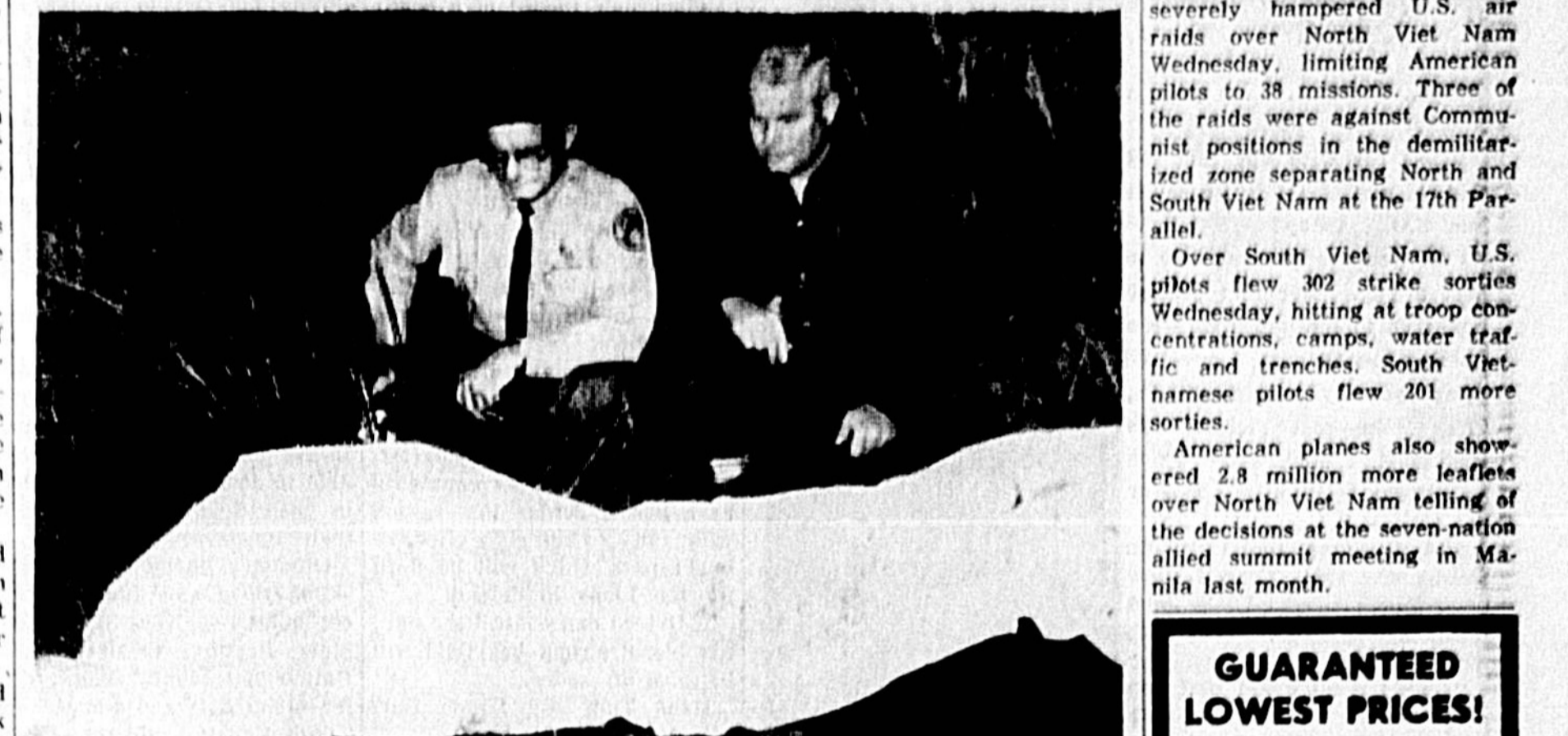
The U.S. command reported that American troop strength in Viet Nam rose to 358,000 last week, an increase of 6,000 over the previous week.

Propose 'Branch' Courthouse
