

# Liquor Rations For Entire U. S. Held Inevitable

## Report To Legislator Sees Distiller Plan In Effect This Year

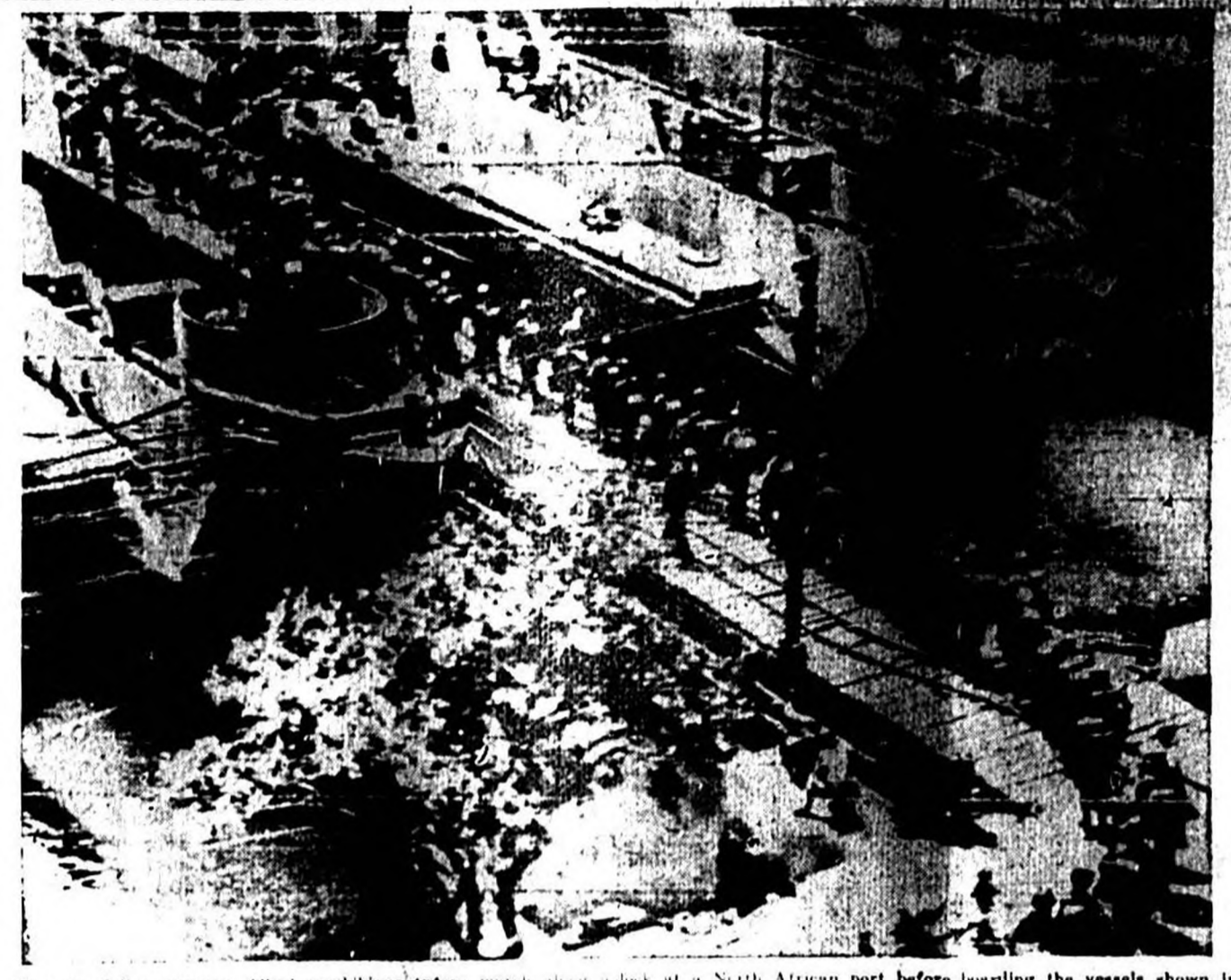
NEW YORK CITY, July 14. (AP)—Nation-wide rationing of liquor is "inevitable within the next few months," the New York Joint Legislative Committee on Interstate Cooperation was advised recently at the final session of its three-day annual executive conference at the Hotel Roosevelt.

The committee's subcommittee on liquor control, in a report read by its chairman, State Senator James J. Crawford, Kings County Democrat, pointed out that there has been a steady drain on the country's fixed stocks of liquor which cannot be replenished because distillers are turning out only industrial alcohol for war purposes.

To secure fair distribution of dwindling stocks, the report indicated, rationing will be necessary. The subcommittee referred to a prediction by John H. Law, executive secretary of the National Alcohol Beverage Control Assn.

# Draft Dodger Suspect Held; Had 9 Pistols

## Rifles, Knives, Bayonets Also Are Found In Youth's Room

NEW YORK CITY, July 14. (AP)—Gerard Paul Franklin, 24 years old of 319 West Seventy-fourth Street, who was arrested by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents on Friday on charges of being a willful draft dodger and the illegal owner of a small arsenal of various types of weapons, was held without bail yesterday by United States Commissioner Garret W. Colter.

An expert in the manufacture and handling of firearms, Franklin had no desire to put his talents to use by the Army. In his efforts to avoid service, he even cut all ties with his mother and his sister.

Called Parole Violator

E. E. Conroy, special agent in charge of the local office of the F.B.I., said Franklin was called by his local board for a preliminary examination late last year. He failed to report because, according to Mr. Conroy, he feared arrest as a parole violator.

Franklin was on probation as the result of his arrest early in 1941 for possession of counterfeit mounds which, according to Mr. Conroy, he used to make bogus half-dollars. By failing to keep in contact with parole officers, he violated his probation.

When the F.B.I. men caught up with Franklin in the furnished room where he lived with his wife and three-month-old daughter, they found in his room a preliminary collection of knives, pistols, bayonets and ammunitions which Mr. Conroy described as equal to some of the most efficient weapons now used by the Army.

All told the agents found nine pistols, one of which was made by Franklin himself; four rifles, including a German Luger mounted on a stick with a canister of three rounds of ammunition; an assortment of knives, bayonets and another 2,000 rounds of ammunition.

The home-made weapon was a small-caliber pistol complete with a silencer. Mr. Conroy said Franklin was especially proud of it and described in full how he turned it out. When he was picked up the F.B.I. agents found a pistol less than three inches in length loaded with a single bullet pinned to Franklin's trousers in back of a large pocket watch. A quantity of black powder and smokeless powder also was found in the room.

His only explanation for the arsenal was "I have them just because I like them," Mr. Conroy said.

# Lamont Writes An Open Letter To Benet Defending Capitalism

NEW YORK CITY July 15. (AP)—The musings of a poet of the sins of capitalism in war, Mr. Lamont, chairman of the board of Morgan & Co., Inc., in a two-page defense of free enterprise which was published last Saturday in "The Saturday Review of Literature" as an open letter to William Ross Benet 1941 Pulitzer Prize winner of the poetry Pulitzer Prize.

Mr. Lamont, who backed the suggestion financially for years but no longer has a financial interest in it, was urged to composition on reading Mr. Benet's column, "The Phoenix Nest," in the May 23 issue. In it Mr. Benet departed from his usual literary concerns to voice several hundred words of suspicion that the Big Boys, as he called them, might be trying to get in on the war.

Mr. Lamont's letter begins with the salutation "Dear Bill" and with gentle recollection of a long friendship with Mr. Benet, whose literary simplicity, he says, he has long admired from a "humble stance in mundane affairs."

He cites composite financial records of forty large concerns engaged in war production showing that while sales rose 81 percent between 1940 and 1942, wages increased 96 percent, taxes 174 percent and net profits declined 17 percent. Dividends paid to stockholders, according to Mr. Lamont, declined 20 percent.

"No, Bill," his letter says, "I do not believe you need be troubled by the musings of a poet of the sins of capitalism in war. From personal knowledge, what I have to be concerned about is this: namely, many of our industrial concerns under present tax legislation, far from cashing in on war, are more likely to be dangerously depleting the cash reserves, they will surely need to meet the task of reconstruction of their plants from war uses and machines to peace-time production when the war ends. Of course, we may squeeze the corporations until the pigs squeak, but let us leave them enough to prepare for this vital task of reconstruction."

Mr. Lamont takes issue also with Mr. Benet over a reference by the poet to the "self-righteousness" of capital in its attitude toward John L. Lewis. In the reference the poet parenthetically coupled the press with capitalism in the matter of self-righteousness and said it could have counted on to side with big money.

"Having started originally in newspaper work and for years followed the course of the public press," writes Mr. Lamont, who worked for The New York Tribune after his graduation from Harvard University, "I have always felt that its independence, just as in England, has been recognized and accepted as one of the glories attained up to the present time only by Anglo-Saxon people.

"I have been wrong about this all this time! And are you able, Mr. Benet, as you do more slowly in hope to do, to assure me that you journalistic circles than I am are right as to this lack of independence in the press?"

Mr. Benet quoted from "The Coming Showdown" by Carl Dreher in his column. Mr. Lamont in his letter expressed astonishment that the poet should have taken to his room a fantasy as he called it, "whose remedy for all the ills of the world is democratic collectivism."

# American-Soviet Relations Are Now At Their Best

NEW YORK. As plain as the golden face on the old Kremlin clock is the fact that Soviet-American relations are, at the moment, at their rosiest best.

Every time you see in your Soviet news—and I traveled across it from east to west—you find an earnestness, a good fellowship, a comradeship in arms toward anyone with a United States passport.

Traveling through Siberia, Russian generals, heads of large and small provinces, members of the Communist party, plain, Red Army soldiers, workers and peasants made daily toasts and speeches toward friendliness between Russia and the United States—and the hope that it would last forever.

Wendell Willkie's visit actually says to him a typically American started thing off. The Russians big business man, of one who may have once represented big business. They didn't know exactly how he was going to act. Then Willkie took charge.

He disarmed them with his informality and his friendliness. They took him to their beloved banks and he not only liked it and said so but went on the stage and kissed a ballerina. That dispelled any doubts about Willkie. Gen. Patrick Hurley helped out along these lines. (When he met the Red Army unit that fought its way 17 miles in a single day to close the gap behind the trapped German garrison at Stalingrad he saluted them and asked:

"May I be allowed to salute the men in my own peculiar style?"

"Yes," said the corresponding general.

The former Secretary of War under Herbert Hoover then took two steps forward, threw out his chest and talked with a real Oklahoma war whoop.

Then there was Joseph E. Davies, special representative of the President. Mr. Davies ever received the attention that he did publicly. The Russians know he is a friend of the Soviet Union and they showed him the appreciation.

And, all through these visits there has been Ambassador William H. Standley, a tough old Navy admiral, who has been friendly, natural and helpful throughout his stay.

As I left Moscow a few weeks ago there was an increasing understanding between the Red Army, Red Navy, Red Air force and American authorities.

# Now Is The Time To Plant Fall Gardens

GAINESVILLE, July 15. (Special)—It's time to begin the earliest plantings in the fall garden, says C.E. Abbott professor of horticulture at the University of Florida.

He said that seed of fall tomatoes and fall corn should be planted close to July 15 in central Florida, in the vicinity of Gainesville. Then the first week in August is the time to plant seed of early cabbage. Broccoli can be planted in August also. It is possible to plant collards every month of the year.

Cabbage seed are quite scarce this year, Prof. Abbott says. He recommends for harvest before Christmas—Copenhagen, Market, Charleston and Early Jersey Wakefield varieties.

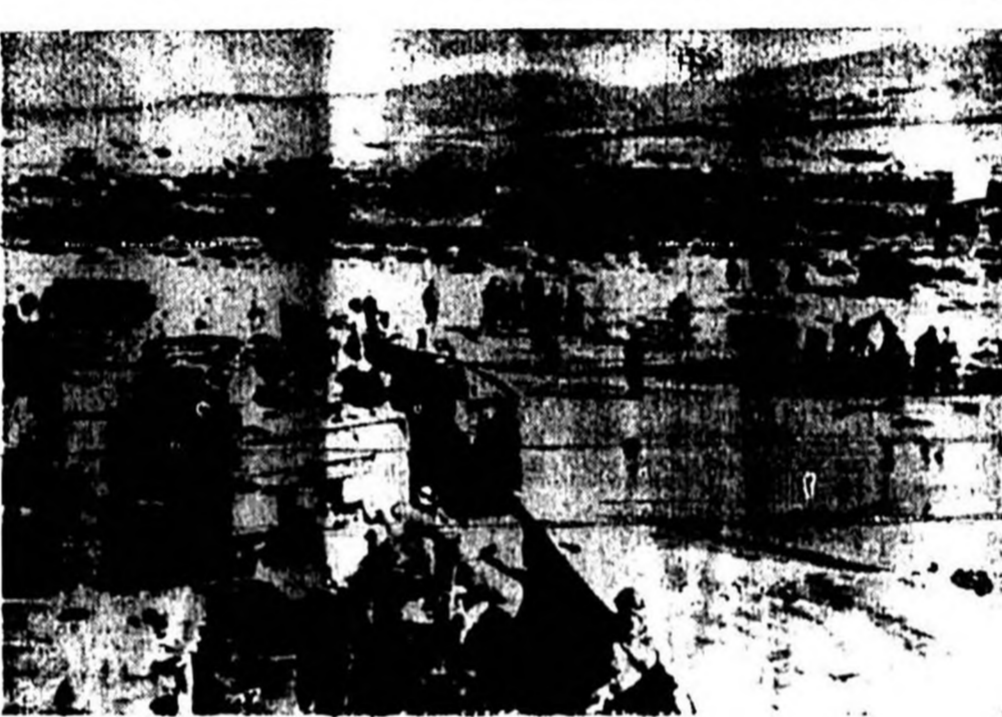

"Every Man A King"

Bank deposits in Sanford have increased enormously during the past year. June 30 statements reveal that the Sanford Atlantic National Bank had on deposit as of that date \$5,984,365.28 as compared with \$2,645,370.33 one year ago. While the Florida State Bank now has \$2,679,265.77 on deposit as compared with \$609,262.50 a year ago. This means that deposits in Sanford have increased from \$3,254,632.83 to \$8,663,631.05...

Bank statements from other Florida cities also reveal a phenomenal increase in deposits during the past year. Deposits of the Jacksonville Atlantic National Bank increased from \$77,377,149.82 to \$102,691,538.68 and of the West Palm Beach Atlantic National Bank jumped from \$10,198,317.72 to \$15,981,625.60...

The story throughout the rest of the country is pretty much the same, though the percentage of increase may be somewhat smaller. The Chase National of New York City, which we believe is the largest in the world, shows a deposit increase from \$3,595,000,000 to \$4,193,000,000. That is an increase of nearly 600 million dollars in just one bank. The National City Bank reports \$3,512,000,000 now as compared with \$2,917,000,000 a year ago, or another increase of practically 600 million.

What these figures plainly mean is that inflation is already well under way. The volume of money in circulation is being increased enormously by government spending. The war is costing the country \$90,000,000 a day and about 60 percent of that is being borrowed. Federal Reserve credit is now at \$8,117,000,000 as compared with \$3,069,000,000 a year ago. Actual currency in circulation is \$17,607,000,000 as compared with \$12,489,000,000 a year ago and about \$6,000,000,000 in 1929.

Nor is the end of this monetary expansion anywhere in sight. At least another hundred billion dollars will be spent this year and actual appropriations already made amount to over twice that much. This situation will probably continue until the war is over when we are likely to find bank deposits several times their present figure and the federal debt in astronomical proportions.

Perhaps by then we will all be millionaires, and Huey Long's dream of "Every man a king" will come true.

Forgotten Men

Here's hoping that the House of Representatives doesn't forget to remember the forgotten man as it has promised to do when it levies those new income taxes next year. Eighty-nine economists agreed the other day that new taxes are necessary and compulsory savings, too, if the country is to be relieved from "inflationary pressure" created by the gap between goods and money.

But the House seems to have discovered a ninth economist to remember this Forgotten Man, the man who is making no more and perhaps less than he did before the war, and whose standard of living has already been distressingly lowered by the fact of having to meet high taxes and high prices with this unimproved income, as well as buy war bonds and support drives.

Insofar as the proposed new taxes are for revenue and the carrying on of the war, Forgotten men have no right to protest. Insofar as they are to save the Nation from inflation they do indeed and of right, ought to protest. Unless a distinction is made between those who are wondrously better off and those who are dangerously worse off, the taxes that are meant to prevent inflation will produce inflation's worse effect for those Americans. There will be a gap worse than inflation's own between what they have and what they need.

Why shouldn't there be a differentiation, if the purpose is really anti-inflationary. Why shouldn't the burden be confined to the multi-millions of Americans who are better off than they were, leaving alone in their sufficient misery the millions who are not better off, or worse off?—John Temple Graves.

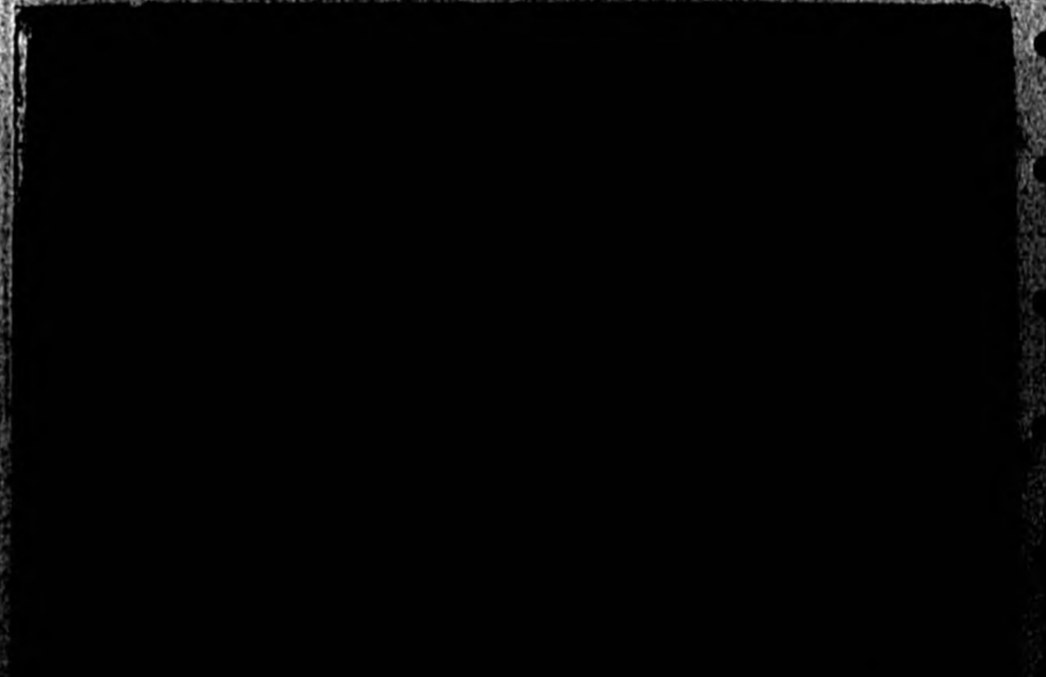

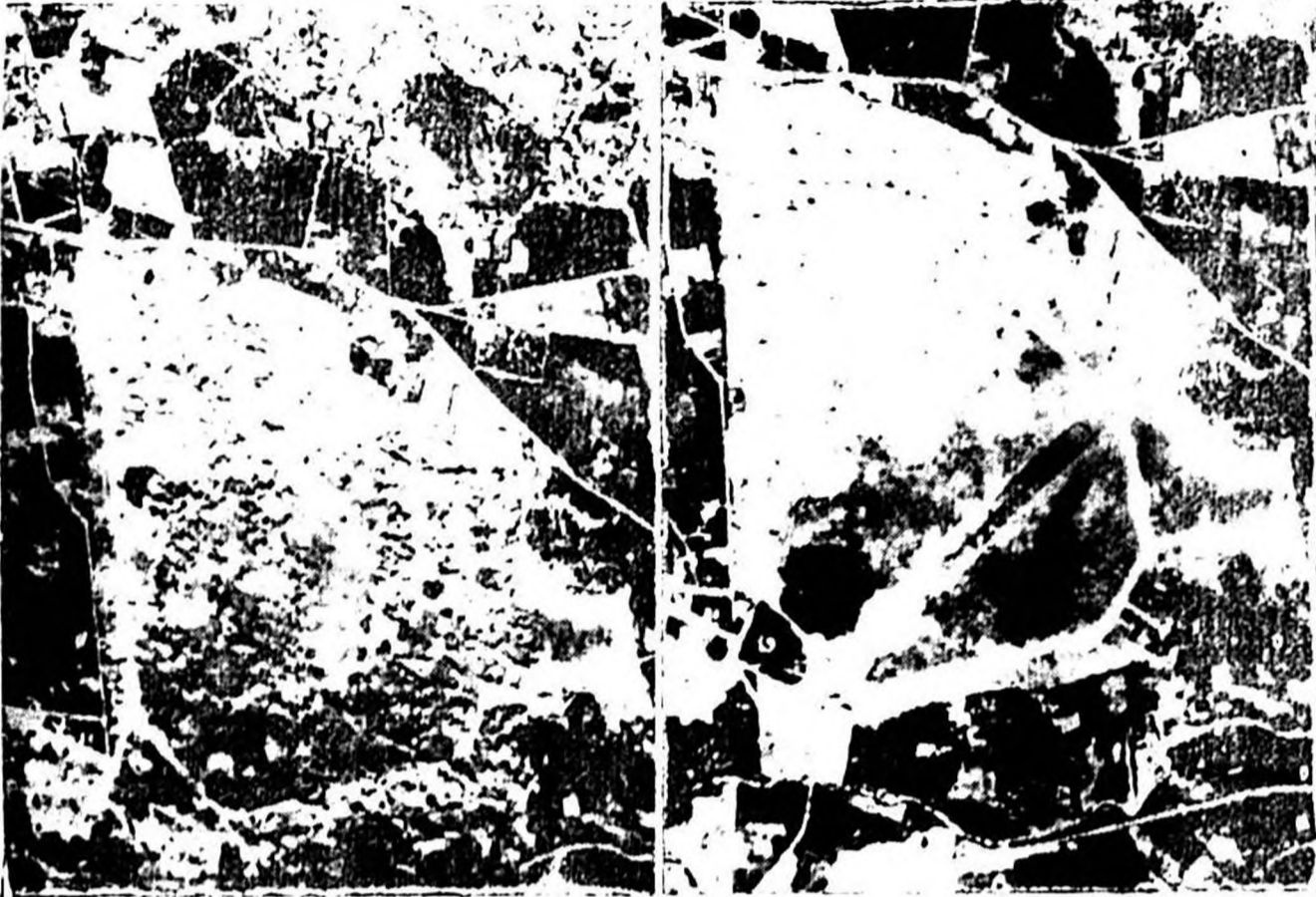
