Crimson Tide Is King Of The Southern Conference With 7 Straight Victories

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS conference football season settled their championship on Saturday but the battlefront there were no less than the King is dead; give the King!

The Crimson Tide of Alabama, University of Alabama, and the other six teams were held to a record of 49 to 0 victories in the Southern Conference. In the King of the King of conference teams for two years past, the Crimson Tide has adjusted his crown to another King.

At the front there still stands a call to arms. Six teams trailed the parade will play on Saturday but the six teams that made the race hottest will play until Thanksgiving day. Instead of being anti-climatic, these games will attract an exceptional interest. Traditional foes are on the boards and with removal of the mental strain that a championship entails the business at hand will be that of trouncing foes who are usually kept apart until the game.

On Saturday, the Crimson Tide defeated its championship foe, the University of Georgia team Saturday outgamed Georgia 34 to 14. Alabama with its seven straight victories is expected to win but the champions will meet an eleven whose offensive strength is strangely similar to its own and whose defensive power is equally as determined.

Defeat will not damage Alabama's eminence but a victory for Georgia will give the Bulldogs a claim to second honors for the season. Tennessee, with Georgia's percentage of four games won and one lost, also will bid for second honors in a game with Kentucky.

Each of the aspirants at Vanderbilt may see its record dwindle, but Tennessee's loss to Georgia was more decisive.

Georgia Tech joy was unquenched at last. An aerial game all season was only a gesture toward the Golden Tornado two weeks in the first half against Georgia Saturday and the Bulldog's chagrin was no more intense than Tech's surprise. The Atlanta eleven outtraced an experienced line throughout the first half and although finally beaten, played heads up ball without their main offensive threat, Carter Barron.

Barron will be ready to play when Alabama Polytechnic takes the field for Tech's last game, on Thanksgiving, and the team that Saturday lost to Marquette, 10 to 3, will have an afternoon of varied entertainment.

In games this week end among less fortunate teams in the conference race traditional foes are expected to kick the dope bucket across the expert's goal line with battles not in keeping with comparative scores.

South Carolina lost Saturday to a strong Furman team, 10 to 7, while North Carolina State was defeating Duke, 28 to 10, but when these two teams meet past performances will have little to do with the accounting. The same can be said of Washington and Lee's Generals, who will meet Maryland. The former has an extra break in games won and Lee, while Maryland forfeited the same percentage by being tied Saturday by Virginia, 0-0.

Florida, a harder and wiser eleven after its brush with Alabama, will go outside the conference to meet Hampden-Sydney in a game that may be more evenly fought than anticipated. Kentucky also will have a non-conference opponent in Centre and its conference record of one game won, two lost and one tied will not be changed by the result.

The nine other conference teams also will hear the referee's whistle for the last time in Thanksgiving day games that will add color to spectacular season.

Tulane and Louisiana State will meet at New Orleans and the winner will have the best conference record for each team has won two games and lost three.

Virginia will play North Carolina University while North Carolina State goes outside of the conference to meet Wake Forest. At Nashville, an intra-state battle between a strong Vanderbilt team and courageous University of the South promises a lively afternoon.

V. M. I. and V. P. I., the ham and eggs of the conference schedule, will take up at Roanoke, Virginia, where they left off last year.

MICHIGAN FACES BIGGEST TEST IN MINNESOTA TILT

Yost's Men Must Defeat the Strong Gophers to Clinch for Tie With Northwestern For Conference Supremacy

CHICAGO, Nov. 15. — (AP)—Michigan, whose early season chances were the brightest to win the 1928 Big Ten title, now faces the hardest test of the two conference teams who have remained undefeated in this season's campaigns.

The Wolverines must defeat the hardy Minnesota eleven at Minneapolis next Saturday to clinch or at least tie with Northwestern for the mythical mid-western honors.

On the other hand, the Purple warriors, expect to have a comparatively light afternoon against Iowa at Iowa City. Iowa has lost all four of its conference starts, while Minnesota has a record of two conference victories. In addition the Galloping Gophers further added to their record as a dangerous combination by running up the top-heavy score of 91 against Butler Saturday.

Michigan came through the semi-finals by its close 17 to 16 victory over Ohio State, one of the big guns of the conference, and while favored over Minnesota in the season's final, may find the Gophers one of the most difficult barriers to their championship aspirations.

Northwestern's win over Chicago, coming on the heels of three previous Big Ten wins, added to the prestige of the Evanston institution as one of the midwestern leaders.

Outside of the conference territory, both Michigan and Northwestern have suffered defeats the Wolverines falling before the Navy, with Northwestern a victim of the powerful Notre Dame eleven, so that team for team honors are about even.

A glance over the performance of the two teams to date reveals that while Michigan has scored more points than Northwestern, the Evanston team has held its opponents to a smaller point count. Michigan has scored 184 points against 108 for Northwestern, while opponents have nicked the Wolverines for 32 counters, against 16 scored against Northwestern.
