WINTER PARK, Feb. 17. (Special) — The famed Rollins College Animated Magazine Sunday at 2:30 P. Says Clinic Speaker

"America would vote dry right now if given a clean-cut chance to vote 'yes' or 'no' on Prohibition," said Raymond J. Jeffreys, national speaker for the Prohibition National Committee, at a Temperance Clinic held at the Fellowship Front at Sanford on Friday night.

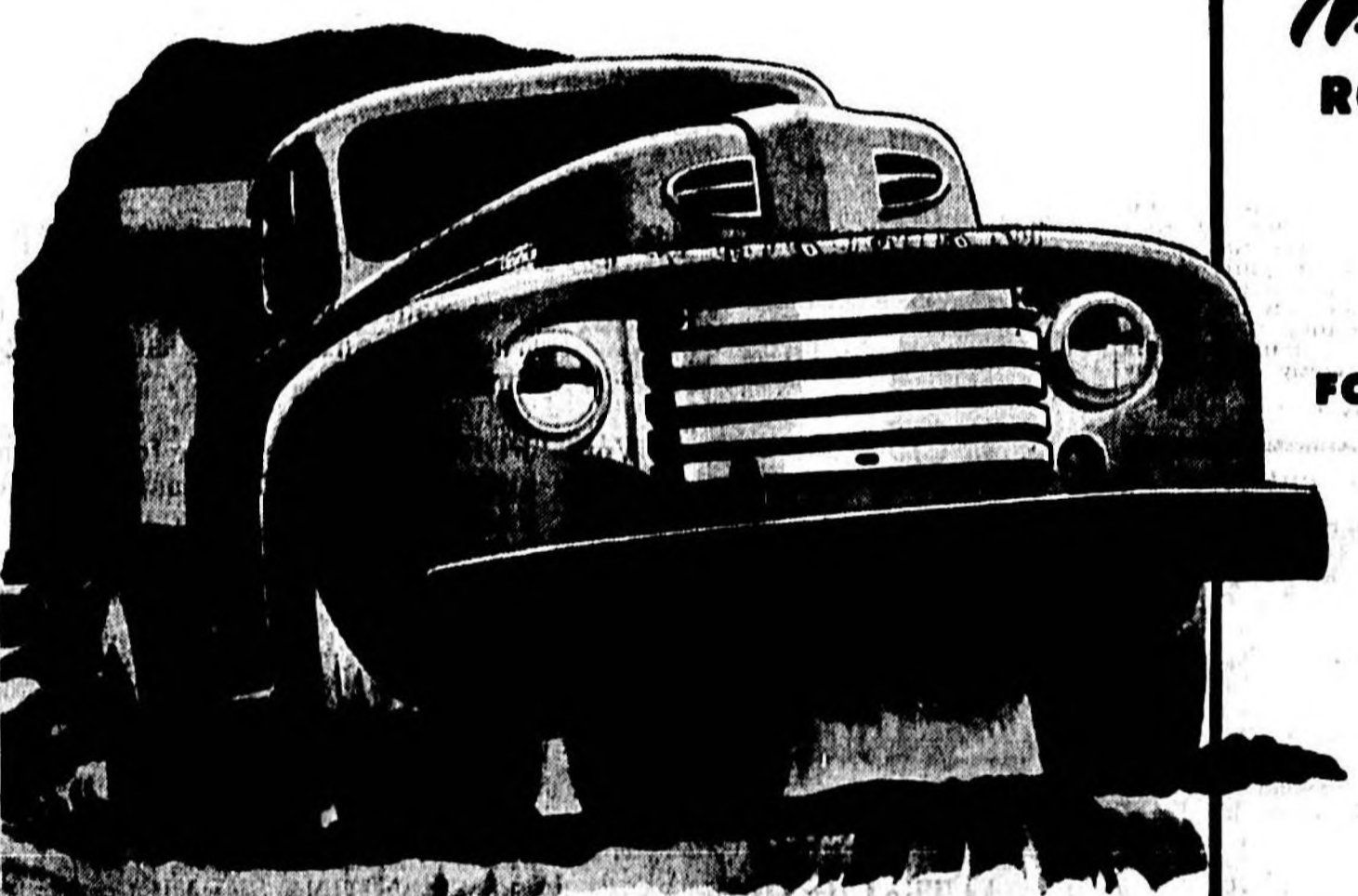

FEPC Bill Is By-Passed By 3 Other Bills

Cotton Acreage Measure Given Priority By Democrats; Housing Bill Aided

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—(AP)—The Democratic majority in the Senate today gave three other bills priority over the hotly disputed FEPC anti-discrimination measure. This means that the FEPC bill, No. 1 on President Truman's "Civil Rights" program, won't be taken up in the Senate before sometime in March. The decision was reached at a conference of Democratic senators today.

Ahead of it go (1) A cotton acreage increase bill, (2) A natural gas regulation measure and (3) Legislation to increase the number of displaced persons who would be allowed to enter the United States. The FEPC bill would establish a Fair Employment Practices Commission to prevent racial or religious discrimination in the hiring and firing of workers. A companion measure has encountered rough going in the House Rules Committee, where it has been tied up for months.

Senate Democrats decided to press a thorough investigation of charges by Senator McCarthy (R-Wis) that a spy ring is operating in the State Department.

Senate Leader Lucas (Ill) said after a party conference that McCarthy's charges will be investigated either by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee or the special Senate investigating committee.

Northeast Is Hit By Coldest Spell In Many Years

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Icy cold and cutting winds, unleashed by a tricky winter, gripped the northeastern states today, plunging to the lowest levels in two years.

"I guess we had it coming," said a weather bureau employe. "For months much of the northeastern region has basked in unusually mild weather, while the Midwest and other sections have been lashed by bitter cold and storm."

But now — just a month before spring — the friskiest northeastern winter finally uncoiled its frigid fury. The cold winds accompanied by piercing winds that shattered windows and toppled signs.

The cold front stretched from Canada to the southern United States along the eastern side of the country.

Much of New England shivered in sub-zero temperatures that dropped toward 20 and 25 below in northern Maine.

The cold blast came as New York State and Massachusetts began rationing coal. Other states, with short coal supplies, also face increased home-heating problems.

No coal was coming from the struck soft coal mines, and a hard coal industry spokesman said here the three-day work week in the hard coal mines wouldn't supply the demand "in this weather."

For the first time in two years, New Haven, Conn., reported sub-zero temperatures. New York City, Boston and Philadelphia also had their coldest weather in two years.

In New York City, the warmest spot in New York State, the temperature tumbled to 3.3 degrees shortly before last midnight — a record low for the city. Previous low mark was 3.8 degrees on Feb. 20, 1948.

Power steam engines delayed trains on the Long Island railroad. Frosts broke up sidewalks, causing a series of accidents on the metropolitan area's subway lines.

At Fort Chester, N. Y., in celebration of Washington's birthday, a 75-pound view was found frozen to death in an alley.
