A 33-year old Longwood automobile mechanic was arrested late Thursday by Seminole County authorities on second degree murder charges in the death of his 21/2 - year - old step-

Ronald Frank Powers, 207 Lake Gene Drive, was placed in Seminole County jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond on a warrant signed by Wallace Hall, county judge, after an intensive investigation by George Abgy and Tony Calangelo county detectives.

Powers is charged in the death of Lana Bennett, youngest of four children, two boys and two girls, born to George W. and Charlene Bennett, of Longwood.

The arrest of Powers followed receipt of an autopsy report from Dr. Thomas Hegert, Orange County patholo gist, who was asked to determine the cause of death of the little blonde girl after she was taken to Orange Memorial Hospital in Orlando on Feb. 4 by her mother for treatment of internal injuries, said at the time, to have occurred from a fall. Cypress Knees!

The cypress knee is an unusual growth that grows up from the root of a cypress tree. They were here long before Columbus discovered discovered by Tom Gaskins, owner of Cypress Kneeland, at Palmdale, Florida, as he started the cypress knee industry in 1934.

Having worked with cypress knees for 30 years, Mr. Gaskins is a recognized authority on the subject and provided the following infor-

"No other tree has knees, and no one knows for sure why cypress trees have knees. There are a number of theories as to why knees grow the most popular being that the knee helps to aerate the root system of the tree during high "The only problem with this theory is that

all cypress trees do not have knees. Some claim that knees are left over from prehistroic days and were toothpicks for dinosaurs! "Cypress knees do not grow into trees as some mistakenly believe. If you cut the knee it does not hurt the tree, but if you cut the tree it

"The knee starts out as a little bump on a root and if left alone would grow straight or coneshaped, as does a stalagmite in a cave. About 99 per cent of all knees do grow straight without any significant shape.

"The remaining one per cent are shaped haphazardly. Falling limbs in a hurricane, logsfloating down stream, fishermen stubbing their toes, or anything which might injure or break the bark on the knee will help to bring about un-

"When knees are injured, new wood heals over the injured place causing a bump. Repetition of this for tens, hundreds, or even thousands of years, result in the many unusual shapes often seen in knees."
