## 'Joachimsthaler' Now On Display

The "granddaddy" of the silver dollar, the 16th century Joachimsthaler, along with over a score of other dollar-size coins, is currently on exhibit at United States Bank President John Y. Mercer has announced.

On display until March 6, this historical parade of silver coins is on loan from the 75,000-item collection of coins, currency, and checks of the Chase Manhattan Bank Money Museum, New York.

The oldest coin in the show and the prototype of all dollar-size coins is the Joachimsthaler, minted in Bohemia between 1520 and 1525. The coin's obverse side and excellence of design set the pattern for many European coins.

Another dollar first struck in Austria in 1780 is still being used in Asia and Africa. The Empress Maria Theresa Thaler was minted in 1780 specifically for trade with the Levant. Because of its insuperable popularity with the Levant, thalers bearing the same likeness of the Empress and the date

1780 continued to be struck by Austria for over 150 years. Today the same coin is being produced in several European countries.

The Spaniards also began minting dollar-size silver coins in the 18th century. Spanish milled dollars — "the Pieces of Eight" of pirate lore — were minted in the various Spanish colonies and were widely circulated in North America both before and after the Revolutionary War.

Mercer stated that the coin anniversary celebration exhibit was a part of the fifth going on.



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# Gun Theft Ring Broken

A Sanford motel operator and two companions were arrested and a quantity of stolen guns recovered this morning after a combined state-county raid on the Coachman Motel, Highway 17-92.

James Billy Cain, 40, of 220 Scott Avenue, Sanford; Angelo R. Trepina, 40, Miami; and Darrell Frank Ryan, 38, Pittsburgh, Pa. were arrested by agents of the Florida Bureau of Investigation and Seminole County sheriff's department after a two-month long investigation of stolen gun traffic in Florida.

Chief Deputy Duane Harrell said the three men were charged with receiving, concealing and attempting to sell stolen

property. They were lodged in county jail awaiting the setting of a bond.

Harrell said 60 guns, mostly revolvers, were recovered in new condition in a cache at the motel, which is owned by Cain.

The deputy said all three were taken without resistance in a lightning attack this morning on the motel.

Cain at one time was also a part owner of the Crown Pawn Shop, Harrell informed.

The deputy advised that this is not the end of the investigation and indicated the Sanford operation was only a small part of a large scale state operation. "The investigation is continuing," Harrell said.

# Longwood Mechanic Arrested in Murder

A 33-year old Longwood automobile mechanic was arrested late Thursday by Seminole County authorities on second degree murder charges in the death of his 2 1/2-year-old stepdaughter.

Ronald Frank Powers, 207 Lake Gene Drive, was placed in Seminole County jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond on a warrant signed by Wallace Hall, county judge, after an intensive investigation by George Agy and Tony Calangelo, county detectives.

Powers is charged in the death of Lana Bennett, youngest of four children, two boys and two girls, born to George W. and Charlene Bennett, of Longwood.

The arrest of Powers followed receipt of an autopsy report from Dr. Thomas Hager, Orange County pathologist, who was asked to determine the cause of death of the little blonde girl after she was taken to Orange Memorial Hospital in Orlando on Feb. 4 by her mother for treatment of internal injuries, said at the time, to have occurred from a fall.

The child died two days later at Orange Memorial Hospital. Powers is charged with two counts of murder. He is also charged with tampering with evidence.

Holland is state agent for Providence Washington Insurance group. He is a native of North Carolina, moving to Florida seven years ago. Charles Littleton, of Oviedo, was reappointed to the Seminole County Jury Commission, and James Robinson, of Altamonte Springs, was named to the board of trustees of Seminole Memorial Hospital as an "opportunity to serve rather than be served."

Miller, Littleton and Robinson were unavailable for a resume or comment.

# Monroe Flooding Controls Asked

Bids for a contract which will control seasonal flooding of Lake Monroe are being sought by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers for the Central and South Florida Flood Control District.

Bids are being asked by the Corps of Engineers for construction of a levee, canal and water control structure in the Upper St. Johns River Valley west of the river and proceeding 10 miles south from SR 500 (connecting highway between Melbourne and Kissimmee).

Estimated cost of the project will be \$4.7 million. CSFCD engineers explained to The Herald by telephone from their West Palm Beach headquarters this morning that the project will be along Jane Green creek and will form the Jane Green Reservoir, designed to contain water at the peak flow during the flooding seasons and to release water during drought. They added it will control the flow through Lake Monroe.

Several years ago the district engineers said that, prior to the construction of Sebastian Canal from the St. Johns River to Sebastian Inlet, the canal might be opened to pleasure craft, thus opening the entire river for traffic either way to the Atlantic Ocean. This morning the engineers said the canal has been completed as far as flood control is concerned but no locks have been installed for boat traffic, as yet.

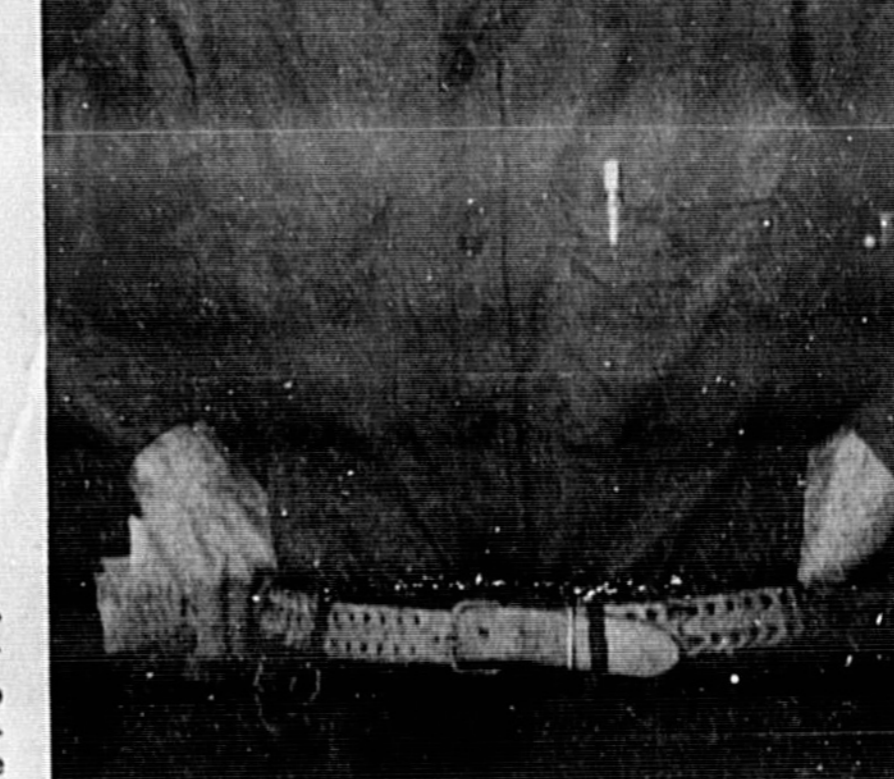

# He Waits For Second Eclipse

A total solar eclipse usually occurs only once in the lifetime of most persons but "I remember the total eclipse of the sun on May 28, 1906," says J. W. Harkey, of 2140 Southwest Road.

He was residing on a farm in Macklenburg County, N. C., when the eclipse occurred and frightened the farm animals.

### Educator Becomes Banker

It was an interesting route to the plush president's office at the United State Bank for John Mercer, the genial head of the fast-growing Seminole Bank.

Mercer came to Florida in 1940 as principal of Hartwe Junior High School. He later became principal of Hartwe Elementary which at that time was the largest elementary school in Polk County.

In 1958 he moved to the Fort Meade area as the supervising principal where he served for four years.

"In '62 I made the move to banking," said Mercer, relaxing behind an enormous wooden desk in his bright office, which reflects the red ring carpeting, in contrast to the royal blue floor covering of the bank lobby.

He became the installation manager of First State Bank of Fort Meade. Later he went to the State Bank of Haines City as assistant vice president. And to give another turn to his growth spirit in the banking world, Mercer came to Sanford in 1964 as the vice president of the new United State Bank. In 1968 he took as president of the bank.

Mercer, a non-smoker, played with the well-polished "coffin" on his desk. This gag gift from "Frank Mercer" as it already presented a cigarette. Mercer's good humor as he jokingly offered a cigarette, is obviously a factor in the impressive growth in the bank.

His education, and interests in his community are other personal assets well placed in the banking world. Mercer, a Kentuckian, earned his bachelor's degree from Centre College in his home state. He obtained a master's degree from Western Kentucky University, and has also earned post-graduate credits at the School of Banking of the South at Louisiana State University.

Mercer is a active Rotarian. He has served that organization as president and was instrumental in the organization of the Rotary in Fort Meade.

"An active booster of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce," he said with pride. He is also on the board of directors for the Chamber.

He is a member of First Baptist Church, the Sanford Industrial Commission, holds a sustaining membership in the Jay-Cee, and in 1968 was honored as the "Boos of the Year" by that group.

Mercer can also be addressed as "The Colonel". He was honored by the governor of Kentucky Ed Breathitt, and designated as a Kentucky Colonel. The award is given to Kentuckians who have distinguished themselves in any manner.

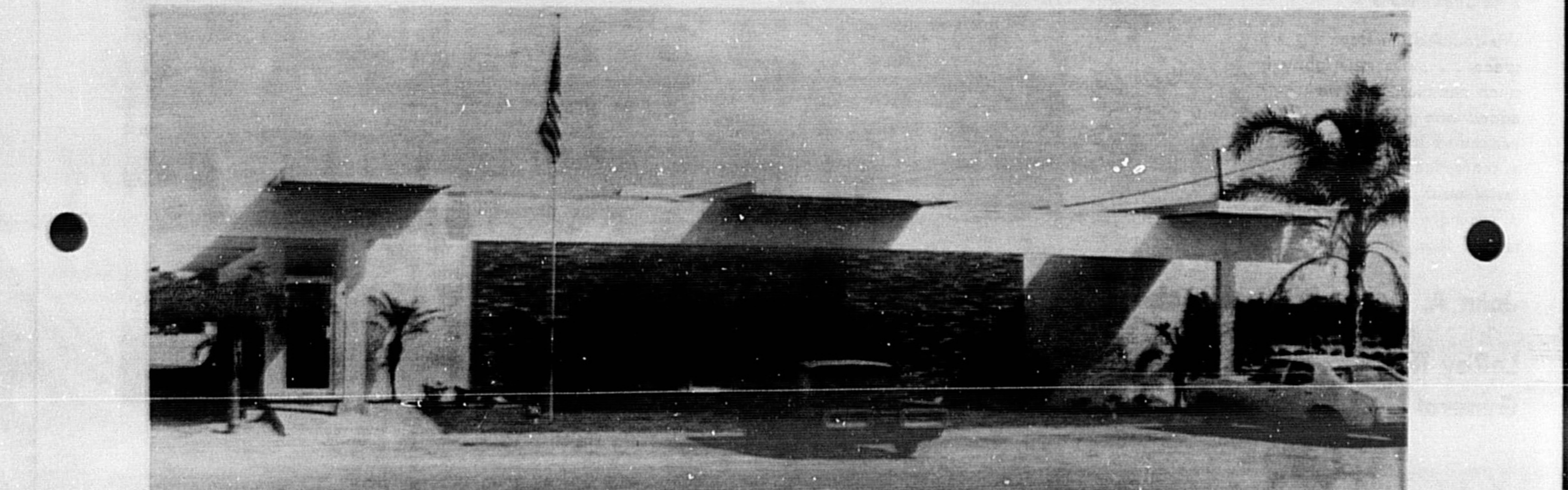

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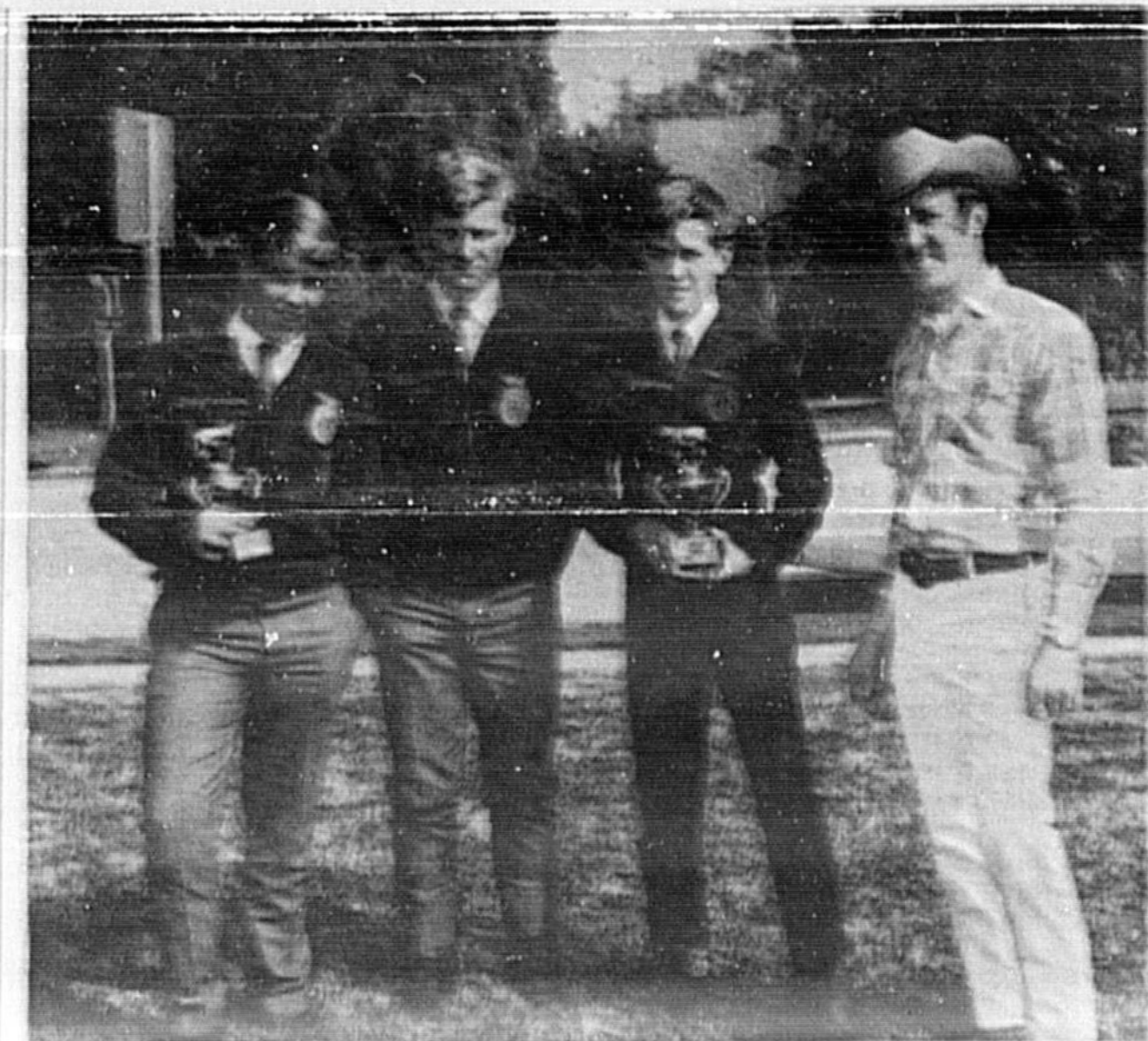

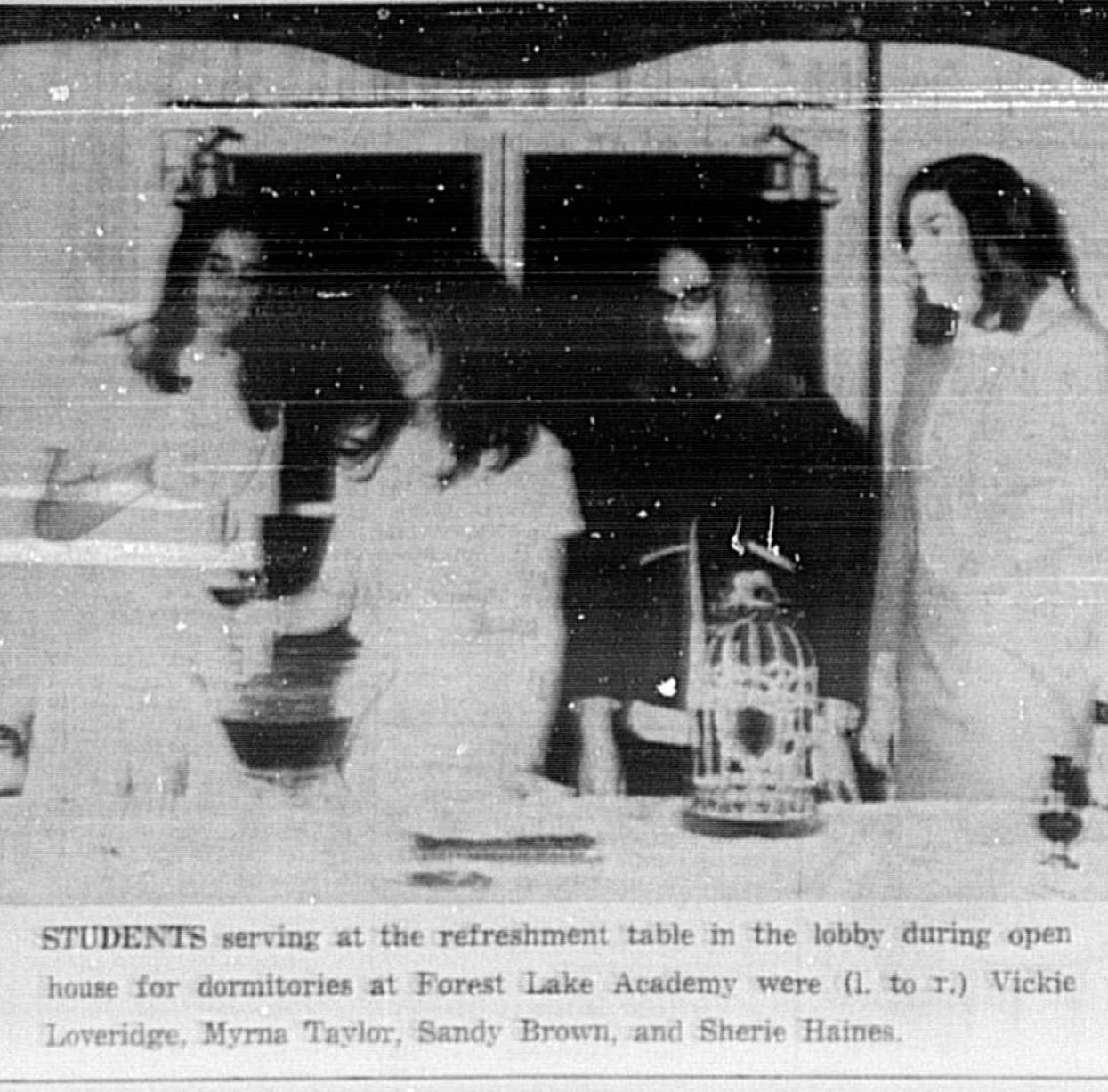

### February Primary Proposed

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Sunny Florida, not rigid New Hampshire, would become the nation's presidential election barometer if a bill sponsored by Rep. Don Studdard, R-Longwood, passed the Legislature.

Studdard drafted a bill Thursday to move the presidential preference primary to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in February. It would be the first primary in the nation, earlier than New Hampshire.

"I think given the opportunity to run in a presidential preference primary candidate would rather come to Florida and stamp around in the snow" he said.

In the presidential primary process by Studdard, the candidates would flock to Florida in search of the early lead in the convention delegate sweepstakes.

The names of the candidates would be on the ballot, but the voters would actually be selecting convention delegates pledged to that candidate.

Studdard would see that 75 voters get what they wanted in binding delegates to the candidates. He said he would like to see the names of the candidates on the ballot, but the voters would actually be selecting convention delegates pledged to that candidate.

Studdard also introduced companion bills which would change the law so that convention delegates and party committees and committeemen would be elected at the presidential preference primary.

Moving the primary elections from May to September has given the state a pretty good reason for moving its presidential primary, Studdard said.

In presidential election years the state picks its national convention delegates at the second primary.

"If we continue to elect convention delegates at the second primary we'll be electing them after the convention is over," Studdard said.

The Legislature moved the primary from May to September to avoid conflict with annual sessions. The conventions are always held in September, a month or two before September.

The raid came yesterday at 1 p.m. after a search warrant was obtained from County Judge Wallace Hall.

Arthur B. Eastman, 18, of 4309 Park Lake Avenue, Orlando, was apprehended by Lieutenant Walton in the same raid after 14 stolen vehicle inspection stickers and a quantity of stolen driver's licenses were recovered.

Polk said Eastman also a SJC student, was booked for unlawful possession of motor inspection stickers and released on \$500 bond.

A 15-year-old juvenile was charged by Tom Deppen, city detective, with possession of marijuana and released to parents Saturday after police found a packet of narcotics on the youth. Deppen said the arrest occurred in the Sanford Plaza parking lot.

## Second Report Of Sex Deviate In Week Girls Frighten Off Molester

The second reported incident of school children being forced into cars by apparent sex deviates within a week occurred late Friday afternoon when two Milwee Junior High female students were forced into a car by an unidentified man who exposed himself to them.

Seminole County Sheriff John Polk said the girls, ages 13 and 14, started to scream and cry and the would-be molester became alarmed and put them out of the car, somewhere near SR 436 and Interstate 4 intersection.

According to the county report, the two girls were walking along SR 436 when a white Chevrolet drove along side and ran until they attracted attention and authorities were called.

They refused but the man reportedly forced the two inside the car and proceeded to expose himself to the frightened girls who began to cry and scream.

The deviate, apparently alarmed over the outcry, stopped the car and dislodged the girls, who ran until they attracted attention and authorities were called.

In the meantime, the molester drove away at high speed to make his escape.

The victims described the man as being approximately six feet in height with brown eyes and dark hair.

They were later released near Lake Mary School after having been fondled and one of them apparently raped.

In this incident, the abductor reportedly drove an old model red car.

Meanwhile, a Sanford woman called police and reported her eight-year-old daughter was accosted by a car filled with hippies and an effort was made by a female to get the little girl to get inside the car.

Police report said the car contained three male and two female hippies and the incident occurred near the eight-year-old's home. According to the report, the eight-year-old became frightened and ran.

## Ex-Constable, Police Chief Freed Kelsey Charges Dismissed

Former constable and Oviedo police chief George Kelsey was freed this morning of conspiracy charges when Circuit Court Judge Tom Waddell Jr., after 90 minutes of deliberation in his chambers accepted a motion to quash Count 1 of the indictment against Kelsey and Eddie McGee.

The indictment alleged a conspiracy between Kelsey and McGee to operate a gambling house and violate state beverage laws.

Defense Attorney Gordon Frederick said in his motion to quash that "a conspiracy can take place only once and ends when the offense itself commences. The information shows that if a conspiracy took place, it was on Sept. 21, 1965, therefore the statute of limitations would bar prosecution." Mack Cleveland, McGee's attorney, adopted the same argument.

McGee, however, is still to be tried on the second count of the indictment in which he is charged with operating and keeping a gambling house in Oviedo in a restaurant known as "The Twin Pines." Frederick and Cleveland will continue McGee's defense. Kelsey is no longer party to the case.

Abbott Herring, state prosecutor, contended that the statute of limitations begins to run two years from the time the conspiracy has ended; therefore, the statute of limitations had not run out.

Three indictments against Kelsey and McGee were dismissed previously on Wednesday for lack of witnesses by the prosecution. Two of these alleged bribery and a conspiracy to operate and conduct a lottery.

Kelsey, who was the constable at the time of the alleged violations of the law, was removed from his office by Gov. Claude Kirk and was reinstated by the Florida State Senate. Recently Kelsey sought election to the office of sheriff but was defeated by John Polk.

The charges were filed on the two almost three years ago in April of 1967.

## Casselberry To Ponder Cable Television Bid

A heavy work session is slated for the city of Casselberry this evening as the council will hear a proposal from a representative of TM Communications regarding possible cable TV for Casselberry.

Another item that will receive attention from the council will be propositions on the new Camelot Subdivision planned for the city. The proposal probably will include stipulations for zoning, roads, curbing, etc., for the new housing development.

The council also will consider taking action on the following items: New stop light for 436 near Oxford Road; City map renovation for new city hall complex; and municipal appointments.

The council will hold another work session tomorrow evening concerning the hiring of a city administrative assistant. The city also will hear a report on insurance for the police auxiliary.

## Tuition Grants Proposed

At next month's session of the State Legislature, a very important piece of legislation insofar as some Seminole County parents are concerned will be that area to provide tuition grants to students in non-public schools.

Method of payment will be to the parents or guardians and the school of those students who are residents of Florida.

The amount of the grant, per pupil, would be two thirds of the State's share of per pupil cost of educating a child in public schools in Florida (determined by dividing State's appropriations by number of children in daily membership — ADM), which amounts to slightly less than \$300 per year.

Because of the current financial crisis, it is proposed to stagger the amount over three years: 1970-71 \$100 per pupil; 1971-72 \$100 per pupil; 1972-73 and subsequent years — the fraction of the State's cost.

There are presently 12,000 non-public school pupils throughout the state, and if everyone qualified, the 1970-71 appropriations would be \$11.2 million.

According to information released by the Catholic Diocese of Orlando, there are two Catholic schools in Seminole County with a pupil enrollment of 781 students.

Based on figures from the State Department of Education (with a state average of \$623), the per pupil cost to educate in the public system for these 781 students in Seminole County amounts to \$429,572, based on an average cost set at \$552.31. The county pays for 35 per cent or \$150,350.

## Capital Stock Is Increased

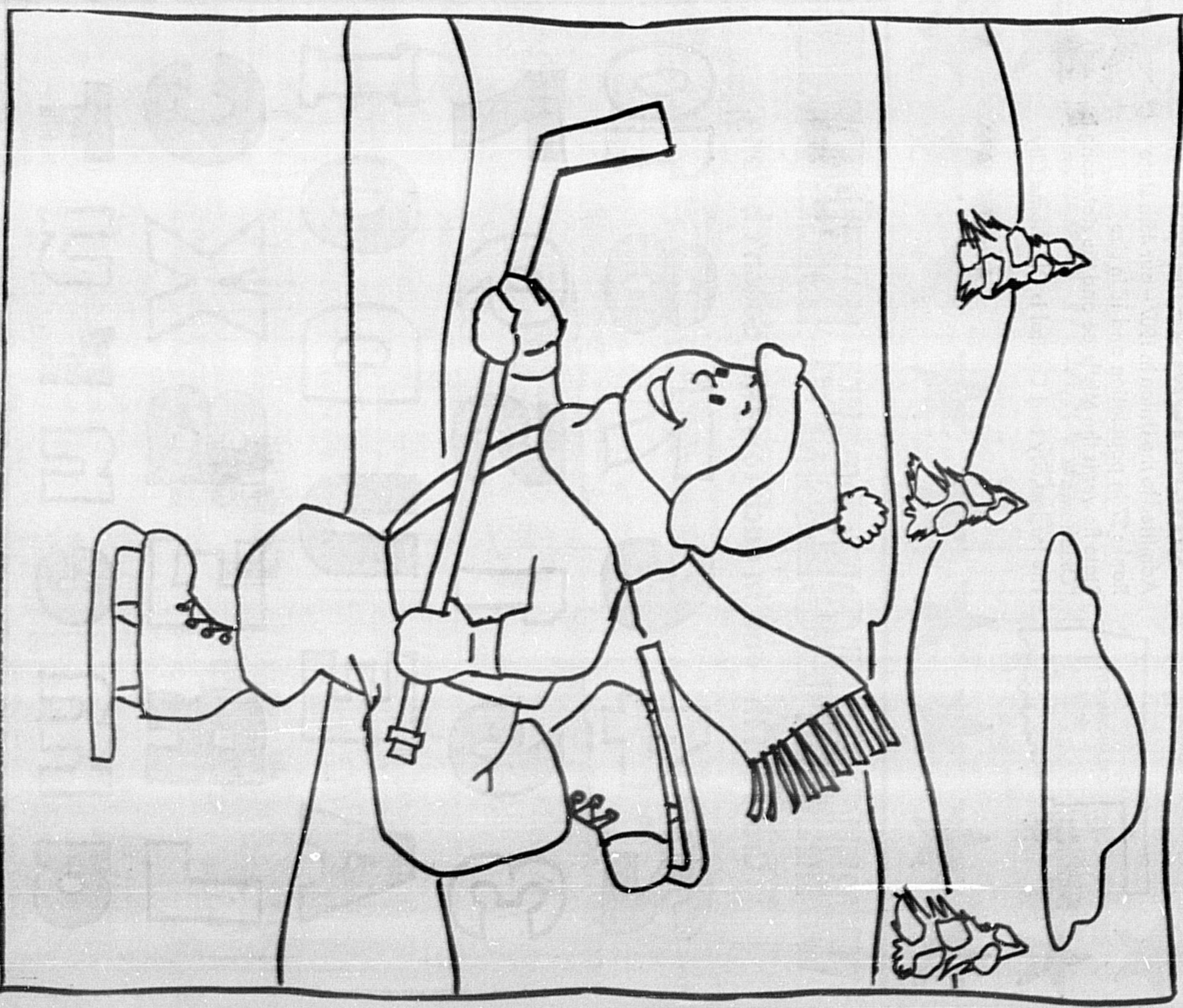
