

Editor Sees Possibility Of Swedish Blitzkrieg On Nazis

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 1. — A Swedish Blitzkrieg against Germany in Norway! That's Plan No. 1 of the high command. No. 2 is a plan, you understand, to attack Germany from the north. It will be a forgotten plan, and nothing more.

There are other plans, other alternatives. But under-cover agents trickling into Washington from Scandinavia ever since the Nazis invaded Norway indicate that Plan No. 1 is receiving the most serious consideration in Stockholm. Just now, it looks as if approval by the Swedish government of Plan No. 1 depends on concrete evidence that Germany will launch a blitzkrieg into Sweden herself.

And there's no such evidence yet.

Reasons Why
The reasons why the plan is being seriously considered are five of them:

1. The Swedes have plenty of evidence that the German high command is not deeply concerned about Sweden's neutrality.

Sweden has several important raw materials the Germans need enough to take them up. Iron ore, pulp for paper, nickel for munitions, and a gold mine that produces over a million dollars a year.

British secret service and domestic attaches in Sweden have been warning Swedish friends in high places that Germany plans to take what she can in Scandinavia. The Norwegian campaign is proof that the Germans are not idle.

The Swedes not only have plenty of aid from the Allies, but they have proof of Allied aid in the person of British and French troops in the field in Norway.

For the first time since the war began, German military units are in a position where they can drop on them. They are in and near Oslo, perfect base for the Luftwaffe's bombers. It would be 400,000 miles, plus the Norwegian army and the British Expeditionary Force, against 75,000 Germans.

The Swedes have the best aircraft protection in Europe, thanks to industrialists who have been manufacturing anti-aircraft guns for both belligerents.

In a Pinch
The Swedes for months have been hoping to use Narvik as their No. 1 port to keep from starving to death under the pinch of the warfare in the North Sea. They were moving material up to Boden to double track the state-owned electric railroad to Narvik. But now that Allies and Germans are fighting for Narvik, that's out — for the time being.

And Sweden has no more than a year's supply of balanced rations for her people and a large crop of wheat in prospect. The stock market hit a new low in early April. Manufacturing plants in southern Sweden are closing down, and the wharves in Stockholm are piled high with exports that can't move out because of the British blockade, and the German counter-blockade.

That means the Swedish government must move soon to coax supplies into her country through somebody's blockade lines. She can't hope the Allies will let her through at Narvik. Already Swedish manufacturers are moving their raw materials and machinery out of southern Sweden up to Norrking near Stockholm. This is especially true of rubber, an extremely important material.

Here's The Tip-off
But the best tip-off on the trend of events in Sweden are dispatches from Stockholm that have been reaching in your papers every day recently, quoting Swedish newspapers. These dispatches doubtless report facts, but primarily they are reporting facts favorable to the Allies. Despite the fact that the Swedish government must have known Germany would protest.

Now that has happened. And at the same time, Sweden has protested against German air plane flights over Swedish territory, and some press reports indicate the Swedes feel they're made to recognize Swedish defenses.

There you have a background for war. The people are threatened with financial panic. The depression has already begun. In the far distance is also the specter of starvation.

But there is more evidence. Confidential dispatches from Scandinavia also tell the story of a wedding suit of nails from the Swedish army and navy. They indicate the Swedes have been counting Germany naval losses in the most recent clashes with England, and figure they have as good a Baltic fleet as the Germans.

The Swedes have many heavy guns compared with the artillery either the Germans or the Allies have been able to transport into Norway aboard ships or planes. That, too, is an advantage in warfare. The Swedes have been bolstering their submarine fleet in the Baltic, and in addition apparently have been buying underwater boats from — all people — Mussolini.

Have Supplies Now
Furthermore, while the Swedes face ultimate starvation due to war pressure on their shipping, for the time being they have supplies for a quick thrust to the aid of Norway. Stocks of gasoline and food sent to Sweden for trans-shipment to Finland a month or two ago, are still held in Swedish warehouses, and can be requisitioned for war.

Furthermore, the Swedes have evidence that Russia is getting friendlier with the Allies, these days, and is dicker over a landing arrangement with Great Britain. That leads to the fact of a Russian attack on her back door. Besides, there's still little Finland between Sweden and Russia.

There are several people in high places in Washington who suspect that the escape of King Haakon from the German forces at the outset of the Norwegian war was not a Norwegian feat but Swedish.

Of course, the exhibits on manufacturing, the arts and the sciences still will be grand. But last year's emphasis on culture didn't pay off. Only 25,000,000 of the expected 50,000,000 visitors arrived.

Now there's an about-face. This year's show is designed to be the county fair of county fairs.

Prices have been cut. Adults will get in for a half dollar; children for two-bits. Tickets for big shows will cost two bits less a dollar.

There will be dozens of fun-and-frolic spots. The fair is putting on a historical pageant, "American Jubilee," on a stage 312 feet wide with a cast of 250.

San Francisco Fair To Cater To Fun Lovers

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1. — The San Francisco fair on Treasure Island opens its gates May 21. It is more of a carnival and less of a museum this year.

The California enterprises learned some hard lessons in 1939. Two results are a shorter run (123 days), and an emphasis upon show amusement in 1940.

The swing toward amusement was made about midway in last year's run when Dr. Charles H. Rumb, manager of Santa Anita race track, was called in.

This year the Gayway is being elaborately improved. Two of the industrial exhibit palaces are being taken over by shows — one being the version of Billy Rose's Aqueduct which appeared in New York last season, and the other a moving picture studio in public operation.

The Felix Bergers, a big money maker, last year, will reopen. There will be two big outdoor theaters — "Calvalcade" of the Nolite and "Golden-Day" — Clyde Beatty's animal show and Belle's puppets are two additional features. Big-name bands, which proved their box-office success last year, and symphony concerts are in the program.

Sex appeal — notably Sally Rand's "nude ranch" — played last year a big role on the Gayway last season. Fair officials are considering a special midway for this type of show alone. There is going to be some loss of the more identified exhibits, anyway, with certain foreign national and big corporations dropping out.

Some exhibits, however, have increased their space. Exposition officials promise there will be no vacant buildings. Like San Francisco's Panama-Pacific exhibition of 1915, the 1940 event has run into a war. Officials say this means about 500,000 Americans won't go to Europe this summer. It also means they say that people will seek relief from war's tension in sheer amazement. Symbolical of the attitude is the dropping of the old eff-

King George signed a proclamation today making 2,500,000 more Britons subject to military service—boosting the total to 4,500,000—as Chamberlain stuck doggedly to his guns under blasting fire of criticism, and hinted he had no intention of resigning.

"May God give long life to Neville Chamberlain as Britain's prime minister," came the fervid ironic comment from official German circles in Berlin. But the usually docile British press took a sober view.

"It remains to be seen whether Chamberlain will cling tenaciously to his office or with a higher patriotism make way for a man who is fitted to win the London Star."

The Star's choice was not mentioned, but the popular selection might well be Churchill.

With a "confidence vote" majority of only 51, Chamberlain hurriedly left his seat in Commons with several members of his cabinet for a series of war cabinet meetings.

London political circles the prime minister's resignation in the more than three years of his tenure, but Chamberlain's demand for a "confidence vote" was reported as a 7,000-ton transport had been sunk by a German submarine.

Stockholm news reports German planes had landed in the Aland Islands at Narvik. What German troops were reported to have landed there was not known.

Dutch Have Sent Millions To This Nation For Safety

Foreign Governments Have Stored 11 Billion In U. S.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—(AP)—The United States' role as the world's safety deposit box was emphasized anew yesterday when it was estimated the Netherlands have at least \$200,000,000 of wealth in this country—perhaps a much larger sum.

All told, foreign governments and citizens have stored more than \$11,000,000,000 in the United States for protection from war and other dangers abroad.

The Dutch government recognized the American role of "stronghold" keeper by appointing its minister to Washington, Dr. A. Louren, paymaster for all the far-flung foreign services of the Netherlands government "in case of emergency."

Holland's role assured that if Germany invades her, Dr. Louren will be aided by the United States in using Dutch money in deposit here as the Dutch government would work it used and not as a cooperating army might dictate.

If an invasion occurs and President Roosevelt follows his action in the case of Denmark and Norway, he will issue an executive order prohibiting the withdrawal of Dutch money from the United States or shipment of it to Holland except upon Treasury license.

1st Lynchless Year Passed By Modern South

Effective Education Plus Swift Police Patrols Credited With New Record

ATLANTA, May 9.—(AP)—A Modern South ended its first year without lynching at midnight, and today a foe of mob rule credited the new record to effective education, plus swift work of police and radio patrol.

Mrs. Leola Bondel Ames, executive secretary of the Association of Southern Women for the Prevention of Lynching, said that midnight marked the close of the first year without lynching since the tabulations were started in 1882. The peak mark was 221 mob killings in 1892.

She said the association, representing 11,000 southern women, is now revealing a steady public opinion that lynchers acted only in defense of women. None of last year's three lynchings involved a crime against women.

Another Step Is Taken In City's Refunding Suit

Circuit Court Of Appeals Holds Hearing Of Legality Of Act

The City of Sanford progressed another step in its effort to compel the minority to accept its refunding bonds for bonds bearing a lower rate of interest when City Attorney Fred E. Wilson appeared before the United States Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans on Monday to argue the constitutionality of the amendment to the Federal municipal bankruptcy law which the City is attempting to revoke.

Mr. Wilson, who with his wife, Mrs. Wilson, of New Orleans, last Friday filed suit to have the amendment to the law which was passed in 1938 which would be retroactive, covering the City's refunding program which was instituted before the amendment was passed.

A minority of bondholders who own \$178,000 in municipal bonds drawing from 5 to 8 percent interest instead of the 1 to 2 percent interest which the refunding bonds bear, are fighting the City's invoking of the law which would force them to exchange their bonds.

The four hours of argument was heard by Federal Judges Hutcheson, McCord, and Holmes. Mr. Wilson said that because of the similarity of the Sanford and Homestead suits, they were consolidated in the hearing before the high tribunal.

The bondholders were represented by Stewart W. Brown of St. Petersburg, F. A. Barr of Nashville, Tenn.; J. Elmer Monroe of New Orleans, La.; and Charles A. Carroll of Miami.

Representing the city's side of the fight were J. C. Hays, chief of Miami, Melvin H. Beal, special assistant to the United States Attorney General, and Fred E. Wilson of Sanford. Hays and J. C. Hays of Orlando were present as an amicus curiae or friend of the court.

Seminole Sets New Record For Voting Tuesday

Results Of County's Vote In State Races Are Given

Nearly 5,000 voters visited the polls in Seminole County in the first Democratic Primary election on Tuesday, the largest number ever to vote in the history of the county. The vote was 4,955 as compared with 3,551 for 1936. The total registration is 6,570.

The complete returns on Seminole County's vote for the various candidates for State offices were: Tom Watson the lead in the race for attorney general with 1,322 while Edward R. Bentley was second with 914 votes. Millard Conklin received 874 votes while E. P. Martin received 469 and E. H. Donnell got 259.

In the race for state comptroller, J. M. Lee received a majority of votes for re-election to the office in this county. The final count in Seminole gave Mr. Lee 2,500, E. C. Fraser 855 and Frank Brown 518.

J. Edwin Larson polled the highest Seminole County vote in the race for state treasurer with 1,113 votes while W. M. Wainwright followed a close second with 1,081. R. L. Richard got 826.

Mr. Douglas received 2166 votes in the county while S. C. Peacock got 1,322.

In the race for State Democratic Committeeman, George S. Wilmer was high with a total of 1,940 votes while E. A. B. Williams received 1,383. These totals in this race do not include the returns from the Fern Park precinct.

Probably the closest race in the county was that for Justice of Peace in District Six. Eugene from four of the five precincts in that district gave Thomas P. Lewis 217 votes against 216 for the incumbent Ben Burdick. It was understood that Burdick would be re-elected, but he received a seven-vote majority in the missing Fern Park precinct but the final count must await the meeting of the governing board in the Court House on Friday. Lewis led in the Longwood precinct with a vote of 141 to 66 while Burdick led in the other precincts.

Other gubernatorial candidates and their votes were as follows: Barbee 31,382, Clancy 2,330, Fraser 33,801, Maples 2,731, Schoepf 7,445, Van Roy 2,921, Walker 16,117, and Warren 68,501.

In the Senate race, Andrews had 150,859; Carter 66,595, Coe 40,065, Cone 50,149, Hazan 4,093, and MacFadden 65,484.

Douglas appeared the likely winner for the post of railroad commissioner with 87,754 votes to his credit as compared with 71,158 for Sam Peacock of Umatilla.

Jim Lee was also re-elected as state comptroller. His vote stood at 142,028 with 25,410 for Fraser and 20,836 for Brown.

In the attorney general's race a runoff election between Bentley and Watson loomed with Bentley in the lead. His 84,533 votes to 84,510 for Watson. Conklin had 25,188, Donnell 29,484, and Martin 30,927.

For state treasurer, Larson had a strong lead though a runoff off between him and Wainwright appeared inevitable. Larson had 105,124 votes to Wainwright's 88,831. Third man in the race, Richard, had 25,116.

In the second congressional district the incumbent was leading with 37,942, but probably will not have to go into a runoff with Cary who was second high with 16,591. Johns received 11,219 votes.

In the third congressional district, Sikes had 13,890 votes to Mays 12,236, Wood 8,710, and Gillis 7,047.

Children Told To Cook Simple Foods For Mother

Fancy Preparations Are To Be Avoided, Frills Left Out

NEW YORK, May 19.—(AP)—Mrs. Alexander Gordon, who is planning to make it an especially festive occasion to give her mother all her favorite flowers and little gifts. Dinner for the day, prepared in whole or in part by Young Daughters and boys, invited to the table will delight the honored guest. Young cooks, like other novices, should stick to simple foods, making sure that they are well cooked, neatly garnished and attractively served.

This recipe serves for a meal can be made up the day before. That's a real help for the faithful meal planner. Boil a package of orange-flavored gelatin in a cup of boiling water. Mix in 1-2 cup orange juice and 2 tablespoons each of pineapple and lemon juices. Fill individual molds or extract cups, which have been rinsed in cold water. When it's time to serve the appetizers, arrange the gelatin cases on crisp, shredded lettuce or grass, put on cold salad dressings. Pass salad dressing or mayonnaise into which you mix white cream cheese or cottage cheese (1-4 cup of cheese to each 2-3 cup of dressing). Stick tiny Spring flowers on top of each salad. These gay foods can be on the table when dinner is announced.

Breaded veal chops are easy to do this way. Select rib chops, about one-inch thick, and sprinkle each chop with a little flour, 1-2 teaspoon of salt and a speck of pepper. Heat 5 tablespoons of fat in a frying pan (any kind, but better, as it would burn easily). Put in the chops and brown them quickly on both sides. Now pour in 1-2 cup chili sauce and 1-2 cup boiling water. Cover lightly, bring the heat to moderate and cook about 20 minutes. Turn the chops often to prevent scorching. Creamed new potatoes, tattered asparagus, heated bakery rolls, raspberry jam and possibly the best fruit (make a mold on the hot compound) go very well with the chops. They are also very good served with roast ham, fried chicken, broiled lamb chops or veal loaf.

For special occasions like this a fancy dessert is desired. Try this one. Buy an angel food cake (or make your own, if you are expert), set it on a large platter. Then slice to serve fill the center with an cream and top both the cake and the cream with fresh or frozen strawberries, preserved peaches or sliced apricots mixed with crushed pineapple. Garnish with small yellow cherries and you will have a really beautiful dessert.

GELATIN MARSHMALLOWS
 1 package 2-1/2-cup gelatin
 1 cup hot water

Put gelatin in hot water and let it stand 5 minutes. Add 1 cup sugar and 1/2 cup corn syrup. Heat to boiling and stir until thick. Pour into a 9 x 9 x 1 1/2 inch pan. Let it stand in the refrigerator until firm. Cut into squares and serve with strawberries or peaches.

Playwright Hopes To Warn U. S. Of Danger From Nazis

Ever since the beginning of the rise of Hitler—ever since I first read "Mein Kampf"—I have believed that the American writers' greatest obligation was to warn our people of the terrible threat of Nazism.

That is a threat to everything we believe in—all the fundamental principles of religion, justice and civil liberty which constitute democracy.

In 1935 I wrote "Idiot's Delight"—an attempt to warn Americans of the new world war that was coming. People seemed to be entertained by this play, but they evidently weren't impressed by its argument.

"Lincoln's Missed Target" in 1937 I wrote "Abe Lincoln in Illinois"—which described how the greatest American tried to evade his great responsibility that as we are trying today to hide under the bed until the storm blows over. When Lincoln finally saw his duty, and accepted it, he gave his life to preserve our form of government which is again in violent danger.

"Abe Lincoln in Illinois" was accepted as historical and a story of long ago. Its intended application to our present crisis was largely ignored.

Now in "There Shall Be No Night," I am trying to be as direct as I can, as I possibly can. I hope that this time the true meaning won't be missed.

The deepest hope of every one of us is that our institutions "shall not perish from the earth," and that millions of mothers' sons—in this country and in all countries—won't have to die horribly in battle defending those institutions.

But—the American people and their representatives in Congress must wake up—and soon—to the fact that the danger is far closer than they think.

The Nazis and their allies are striving to poison the democratic spirit. Despite the widely advertised width of the Atlantic and the Pacific oceans—that poison is already here, in our own people, and to a much greater extent in the peoples of Mexico and South America.

I have been asked, "Do you consider that war is inevitable?" It's a lot worse than inevitable—it's already here—it is already writing destruction in the heart of every American who is hysterically afraid to face facts.

The Mediterranean designed to aid the Nazis. No Allied scruples over Italian neutrality impede the way as they did Norway, for Italy is not neutral, only non-belligerent. And the stormy scene in London that shook the Chamberlain ministry could be more effective in restraining Italian policy than any outside diplomatic pressure upon Rome. Britain's danger is war. There can be no doubt of that in Mussolini's mind now.

Winston Churchill Becomes New British Prime Minister As Chamberlain Resigns

All Ministers Asked To Remain In Posts While New Administration Is Formed

British Airmen Engage Germans

Nazis Claim To Have Shot Down Hundred Enemy War Planes

LONDON, May 10.—(AP)—Winston Churchill, belligerent First Lord of the Admiralty, today became Britain's new prime minister as Neville Chamberlain, the war minister, resigned.

The new prime minister asked all ministers to remain in their posts while the new administration was being formed.

Chamberlain, the architect of appeasement, who saw his policy fall and when war came expressed the hope for world unity and peace, but now he has resigned.

Churchill, who was war minister, said he had held the same post during the World War I.

Shortly after Churchill took office, the British air force had been in heavy fighting with the Germans over France.

In Berlin the Germans said they had shot down at least 100 enemy planes. The Dutch claimed 70 German planes were downed during the day.

JACKSONVILLE, May 10.—(AP)—County canvassing boards meeting today throughout Florida will make official the returns from Tuesday's first Democratic primary.

Latest unofficial tabulation gave the leaders in the two principal races the following: Senator—1,822 precincts, Andrews 105,000, Carter 76,343, MacFadden 68,150, Governor—1,122 precincts, Holland 112,215, Whitehair 60,000, Warren 74,024, Pate 75,190.

Related returns from Escambia county (Panhandle) last night showed a sudden burst of advance for Fuller Warren, putting him in third place, ahead of Pate, and still far behind Whitehair. Escambia gave Warren 6776 and Pate 1884.

Representative Gross won by a margin for re-election in the 1st congressional district but the "third" where Congressmen Caldwell did not seek re-election, Sikes and Mays went in a close runoff for the nomination.

State Comptroller Lee easily won re-nomination over two opponents and State Railroad Commissioner Douglas seemed safely headed for another term.

Germany Invades Low Countries Using Her Air Superiority

Bomb and Land Plan

Allies Rush Help To Tiny Neutrals

Parachute Troops Are Playing Big Part In Lightning Invasion

The lights of peace exploded violently in Western Europe today as Reichsmarschall Adolf Hitler launched a triple Blitzkrieg attack before dawn on the little neutral "low countries"—Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg.

Nazi parachute invaders rained down in the darkness, striking at vital airports and strategic centers while the German land steamrollers pushed across the frontiers.

General Maurice Gamelin, commander-in-chief of the French and British armies, declared Germany has begun "a fight to the death against us."

A Paris military spokesman said "the most gigantic battle of all time" apparently is imminent.

A few hours after the Germans struck, conflicting statements were issued by the belligerents. The Nazi high command announced that German troops had broken the border resistance on the Belgian-Netherlands-Luxembourg front.

The Belgian foreign minister said, however, that German land forces have been stopped within a few hundred yards of the frontier.

The Dutch claimed they shot down 10 invading planes and destroyed an armored train.

In England, the war cabinet committee announced that British opposition in Parliament would join the British cabinet under a new prime minister.

Shortly afterwards, Prime Minister Chamberlain went to Washington to confer with King George.

Nazi troops streamed from the line and occupied a north of Rotterdam and a battle for the city was on.

General Gamelin, American ambassador at Brussels, informed the State Department at Washington that German forces had overrun the whole of Luxembourg and all of Limburg, a province of Holland.

British and French troops were said to be in the German air force in bombing raids over both countries.

Allies rushed help to the defense of the imperiled small nations which are able to maintain a combined military strength of 1,500,000 men.

Washington agreed to dispatch 100 planes to Belgium and 100 to the Netherlands.

The flight beginning today would be the first of the German invasion for the next 1,000 years. The year day now," he said.

World eyes turned anxiously toward Italy, expecting this might be the moment for Benito Mussolini to take a jump off the neutrality fence. But for the moment, at least, he remained aloof from the fast-moving conflict.

In a lengthy memorandum the Nazi government declared its lightning move was to disrupt a plan of Great Britain and France to use the Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg as a gateway to attack into Germany's vital Ruhr—said to be the heart of the country's industrial base.

Young King Leopold III, who had been in Belgium since the outbreak of the war, was said to have been captured by the Germans. He was said to be in the hands of the invaders.

Italy, Germany Are Told Not To Bother Balkans

Soviet Diplomats Convey Information To Both Governments

SOFIA, Bulgaria, May 10.—(AP)—Soviet diplomats were reported to have conveyed the statement of Soviet position to Britain, France, Germany, and Italy, while Bulgaria and Yugoslavia, possible partners in a military alliance with Russia, were informed of the action.

The action is understood to have been taken after German and Italian troops were concentrated near Yugoslav frontiers and upon the arrival of an Allied fleet at Alexandria.

It was described as designed to prevent a "fatal collision" in the Balkans between axis and Allied forces which would be a detriment to Soviet interests.

Furthermore, it was reported in reliable quarters here that in addition to a Yugoslav military mission which is preparing to go to Moscow, a Soviet mission already en route to Belgrade.

The Yugoslav military mission, headed by General Maximovic, in support of national defense, now is en route to leave for Moscow at the end of next week.

Concrete Soviet proposals meanwhile will be brought here for discussion by the Yugoslav government, which is in the Soviet capital. This delegation is expected to leave Moscow next Monday and arrive in Belgrade some days later.

It was reported that the Soviet Foreign Minister had conveyed to British, German, and Italy the position of the U. S. S. R. to support the Soviet position by any of the Balkan countries.

Roosevelt Picks Up More Support For Third Term

State Leaders Now Are Voluntarily Pledging Loyalty

WASHINGTON, May 10.—(AP)—The campaign of the third term supporters seems to have entered a new phase—state leaders are going to President Roosevelt to tell him to his face that their delegations are ready to vote for a third term.

With the President's victory by impressive majorities in the state primaries, the idea perhaps is to impress him with the strength that he commands among the organizations which reach down into the wards and touch the individual voter.

This is not to say that a concerted and premeditated campaign of this nature has been undertaken, but:

A Georgia delegation led by Gov. E. D. Rivers, called at the White House yesterday to give the President the message, personally, that Georgia's 21 electoral convention votes would be cast loyally for his re-nomination.

A little later a group of North Carolinians was in with an invitation to come fishing in their state and it was reported on rapid authority, assurances that North Carolina's convention delegation (25 votes) were for a third term.

Next in line was a group from Iowa asking the President's approval of a plan to instruct their delegation for Secretary Wallace. If unmentioned, it certainly must have been in the minds of all that Wallace is one of the more enthusiastic third-termers, which it takes to mean that the state's 22 votes are lined up for Roosevelt if he wants them.

And yesterday the series of visitors continued. This time it was Michigan with 25 convention votes. Senator E. J. Burns, the leader of the group, said Roosevelt was told his state's 25 convention votes were his, if he desired them.

Talking with secretary later Oswald Kennedy, state highway commissioner, and a member of the Michigan group said a recent poll had revealed that in support of the third term, 80 per cent of the voters favored Roosevelt. The Michigan delegation will be the first of a state convention on June 15.
