

However, it is difficult to understand why there should be any very valid reason for the CIO unions resorting to wall-outs now in view of the tremendous strides made by these unions towards the goal of higher wages and shorter hours during the past few years.

Not only has the CIO advanced to a position of considerable power through its own efforts, but it has been rendered yeoman assistance by the government through the passage of laws giving the unions every conceivable "break" in attaining their objective. By statutory enactment the unions have been guaranteed a bargaining position with industry, a guarantee, however, that can exist only so long as the union power is not abused.

For it is a part of the system of our government that the laws, which are passed by the people, can be repealed by the people, and any public revulsion against what appears to be the abusive use of power by the unions might easily result in a reactionary movement hurtful to unionized labor.

In their own interest the CIO unions should be careful to avoid unjustified strikes, and should zealously guard against incurring adverse public opinion. They should realize that now is the time to gain goodwill and sympathy, when the government is crying out for greater and faster production and when the people are anxiously walting for the results.

Intermediary in his farm deal is the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, which helps to bridge the 3,000 mile gap between the two areas.

In the Pacific Northwest, the AAA encourages farmers to grow more legume seed (the new crop cuts down the wheat surplus) and guarantees them a reasonable price.

In the South, AAA gives finan-cial aid to farmers so they can buy the seed.
