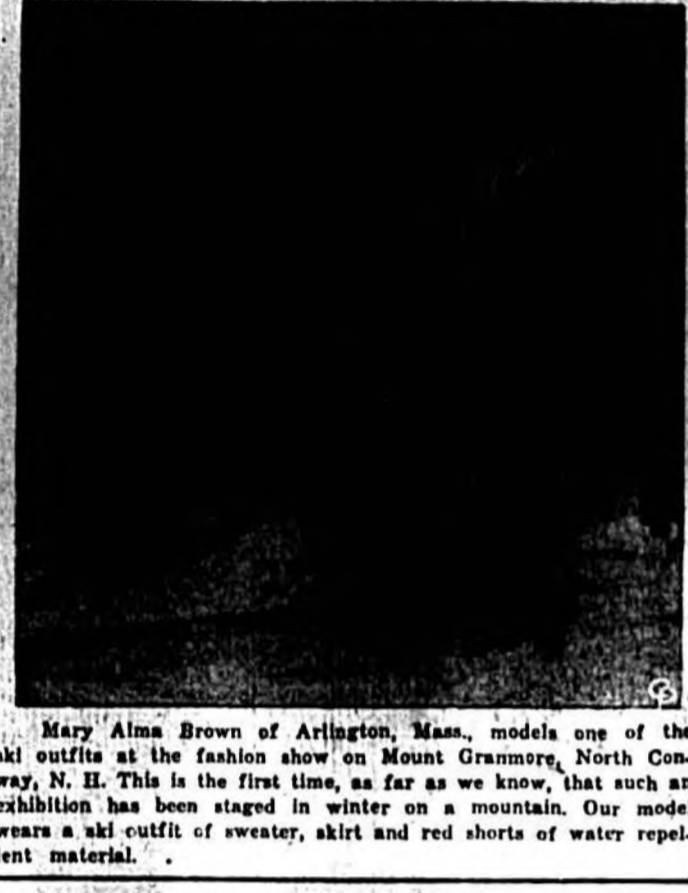

Dead were three members of the crew: Captain James Perry, Co-pilot L. E. Thomas, and Steward Clarence Moore, all of New York; Rep. William D. Byron (D-Md.); R. C. M. Vanderhoop, Secaucus, N. Y.; Juan Maria, San Salvador, Central America, and A. Leibowitz, Atlanta.

Perry, a native of Lawrenceville, Ga., attended Riverside Military Academy at Gainesville, Ga., and later Merion (Ala.) Institute.

Rickenbacker suffered a broken left leg and back injuries. He was en route to Birmingham for the inauguration of Eastern Airlines' new service.

ROME, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Stefani, official Italian news agency, disclosed today that Italy, claiming she had spent 7,500,000,000 lire (about \$375,000,000) aiding the insurgents in the Spanish civil war, had presented a bill to Spain for 5,500,000,000 lire to be paid in 21 annual payments.

Balkan Diplomats Hear Reports Of Russian Dislike Of German Actions

Balkan diplomats heard today that Soviet Russia has raised objections to the passage of German troops through Bulgaria as dispatches from Belgrade said the Yugoslav general staff had ordered a speed-up in defense preparations.

Yugoslavia Was Said To Fear That Nazi Armies Massed In Rumania Might Attempt To Invade Country Through Yugoslavia Instead Of Bulgaria

In Sofia, Bulgaria, British quarters said the mysterious disappearance of a member of the staff of the Sofia legation may lead to a break in diplomatic relations between Britain and Bulgaria.

The man is Wladimir Grenovitch, British passport officer whose assurances asserted they had a "good reason to believe" he was taken from a train en route from So- fia to Istanbul, Turkey by Bul- garian police at the behest of the Germans.

The chief of staff of the Bul- garian army, General Petkoff, conferred yesterday with Premier Petroff and Foreign Minister Pop- off, and last night the cabinet met in emergency session.

As the cabinet members ac- sembled, the government issued a statement in the series of de- clarations that Germany troops joined at the Rumanian frontier had entered Bulgaria.

German Minister Richtofen was understood to have talked during the late afternoon with Popoff, and that German troops who had impressive reason to remain were advised by their government to leave Bulgaria last night. Black- out restrictions and threatening anti-aircraft batteries cast about the city a aura of sharp and ominous event.

Although rumors circulated rapidly that German troops already had crossed the Danube at several places, foreign military observers said these reports were not borne out by information from German bases in Rumania.

Fourteen German divisions— about 200,000 men—were reported by these observers to be in positions on the banks of the ri- ver and ready to start the cross- ing into Bulgaria whenever they got the word, however.

Bulgarians watched proceedings in Turkey, where British Foreign Secretary Eden was arriving for conference, almost as closely as they did the Danube.

theology. Of the others, one finished only the seventh grade. In age, the boys run from 15 to 35. Some were transferred from other CCC camps, some are farm boys from the valley.

Instead of a military commander, the camp has a council made up of enrollees. Before the fireplace at night the boys settle their governmental problems and talk over the many questions that rise in legislative minds.

The work of the camp will be planned with the council of the fine townships in the valley. One project being considered is a big community pasture for sheep.

Harvard boys, the first to arrive, are first to speak in church choir and speak at club meetings. Sometimes the college boys go in to Hanover, N.H., to one of the Dartmouth eating clubs. They take meals at the town's cafe boys with them.

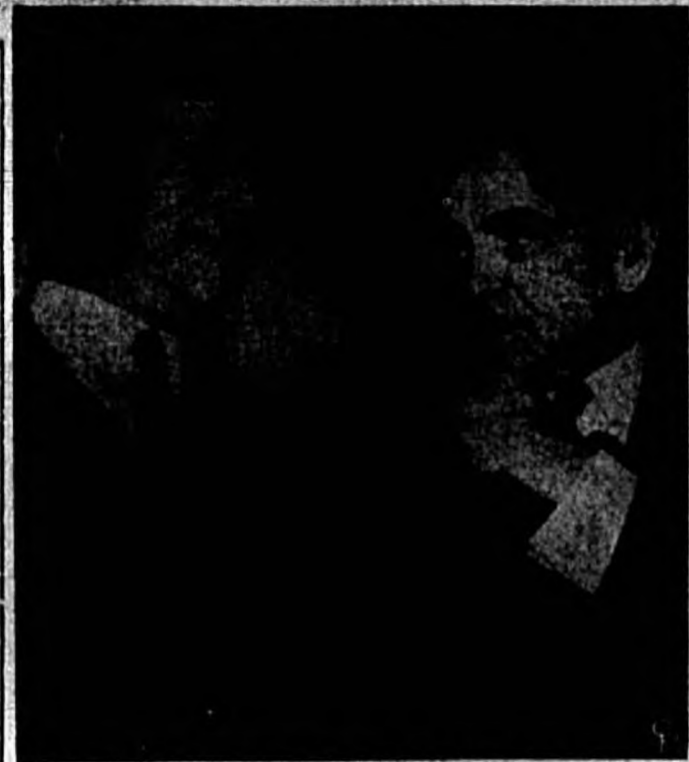

Books and Authors
By Mrs. Irving Feiberg

Two well-deserved honors have come to Louis Adamic within the past few weeks. He has been presented with the sixth annual John Ashfield Award of \$1,000 for his book "From Many Lands" (Harper & Brothers), as the outstanding book of the year on racial relations, and he has received the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters from Temple University in Philadelphia for his distinguished contribution to the field of literature. The Ashfield Award was established in 1934 by Mrs. Edith Ashfield Wolf of Cleveland, Ohio.

In memory of her father, John Ashfield, for the purpose of encouraging and rewarding good books in the field of racial relations either here or abroad.

Louis Adamic was born of parent parents in Slovenia, or Carinthia, now a part of Yugoslavia, in 1899. His formal education in his native country was equivalent to two years in high school. He came to this country in 1913, knowing no English, and he has never been in school here. In 1918 he became a citizen while serving as a soldier in the American army. At various times Mr. Adamic has been a sailor, a migratory worker, a pilot's clerk in Los Angeles harbor and a Slovenian language editor in New

York. He began his career as a writer in 1926, when H. L. Mencken began to publish his stories in The American Mercury. In 1928 he began his studies of the development of American life resulting from the influx of this country in the last hundred years of 25,000,000 immigrants representing more than fifty different national backgrounds. One result of that study is his latest book, "From Many Lands." Another is his editing of the magazine Common Ground, published by the Common Council for American Unity, of which he is one of the founders and directors. Still another is that he is attached to the Consumers Division of the Defense Commission as consultant to Commissioner Harriet Elliot on the expert on the problems of the new-immigrant groups. Mr. Adamic is the author also of "Laughing in the Jungle," "The Native's Return," "House in Antigua," "My America" and several other books.

Now it turns out that it was not a mere list of names, and the publisher has been blaming the criticism Mr. Bayler's "Aldermen" account. That is why he is so busy in the House of Representatives.

Doubleday's first edition of Daphne du Maurier's "Come Wind, Come Weather," published on February 21st was 100,000 copies. It is a collection of true war stories.

Doubleday looks forward to a big campaign of publicity in newspapers, magazines and over the radio. The low price of "Come Wind, Come Weather" will help, the publishers hope, to secure a sale in this country comparable to that in England. News stories and releases, as well as speeches and sermons by clergymen, will stress the "moral re-orientation" aspect of the book, for Miss du Maurier believes that "moral re-orientation" is as important to national defense as the building of armaments and aircraft.

Although seed crops are grown and harvested in the summer vetch and field peas used for cover and soil building in the South are planted in the Fall and plowed under in the Spring.
