\$20,000 Okayed For St. Johns Canal

Congress has appropriated \$20,000 to determine if the St. Johns River channel should be modified between Lakes Monroe and Harney, it was reported by telephone today by U. S. Rep. William Cramer from Washington. The item is part of an appropriations bill awaiting President Nixon's signature.

Cramer, senior Republican on the House public works committee, said a channel five feet deep and 100 feet wide within the reach of Lakes Monroe and Harney was authorized at the request of the St. Johns-Indian River Canal District but, he added, local interests sought a cut-off channel be constructed in lieu of the authorized channel.

The Senate public works committee called for a review to determine if the existing project should be modified with reference to a realignment in the reach of the two lakes, Cramer stated, adding that no funds for the study were made available.

"Now with this appropriation," Cramer concluded, "we can move ahead on this badly needed survey."

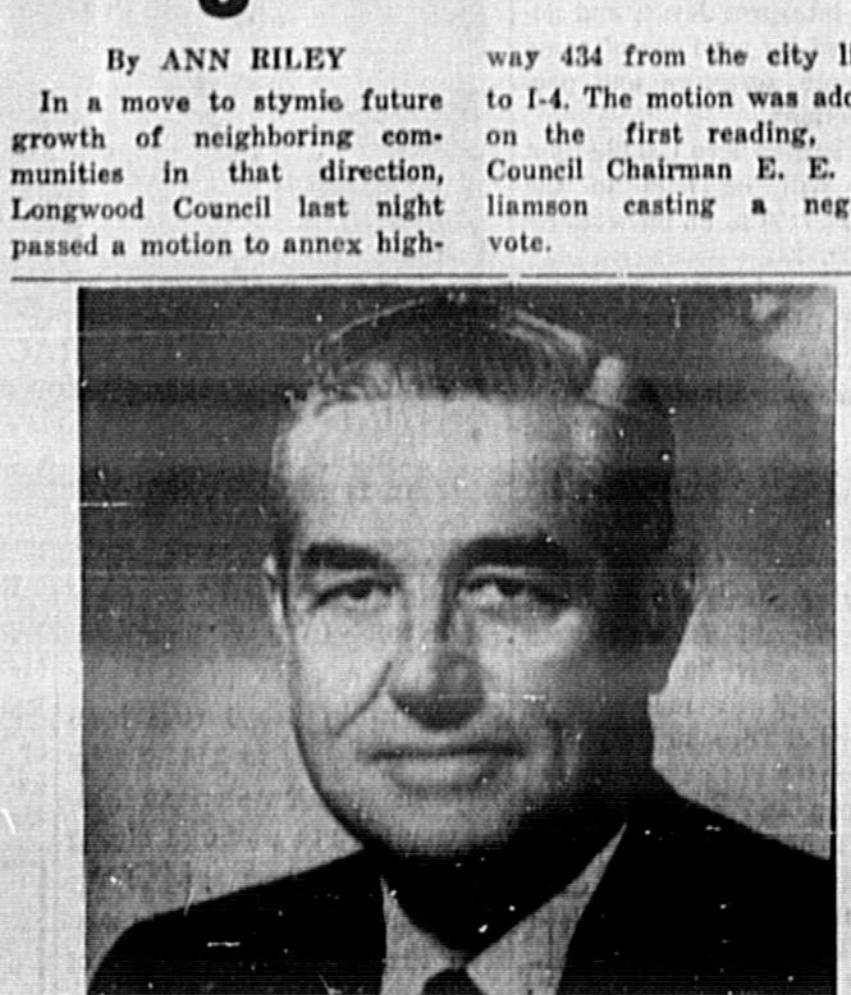

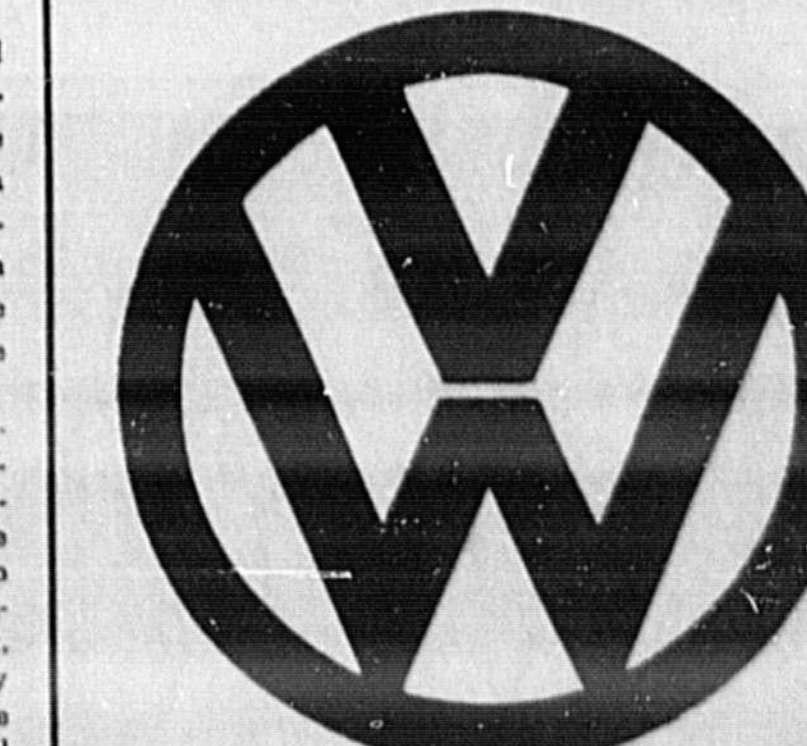

Dr. Harold Harris To Give Farewell

Dr. Harold A. Harris will give his farewell sermon at First Congregational Christian Church of Sanford at 11 a. m. Sunday and will leave on Monday, for Norfolk, Va., where he assumes the senior pastorate of Rosemont Christian (Congregational) Church, largest congregation in the state.

Dr. Harris, who was called to the Sanford Church in May, 1967, received a unanimous call from the Norfolk Church at a congregational meeting this past August.

He came to Sanford from the senior pastorate of Pilgrim Church, Oklahoma City, largest church of the brotherhood in the southwest, as he wished to serve a small church for a few years.

During his ministry the Sanford Church has had a steady growth in membership, attendance and increased giving. The educational building and fellowship hall, a dream of many years, was dedicated this past October.

He has served also as superintendent of the Southern Branch of Congregational Churches, and has been in youth work he has served in youth camps and conferences across the nation.

Dr. Harris will retain his local membership in the Sanford Church, and indicates that when he reaches retirement, he may reside in Sanford. If he decides not to return to Britain, Friends are invited by First Church members to hear his final sermons Sunday.

Dr. Max Strang, Demorest, Ga., and former assistant to the president of Piedmont Congregational Christian College in Demorest, will assume an interim ministry for three months on Dec. 28, while the local church makes a decision on calling a new minister. The public committee with Mr. Leroy Taylor, at chairman, is in contact with a number of ministers and are hopeful of filling the pulpit shortly. Dr. and Mrs. Strang will reside at the manse on Palmato Avenue.

Dr. Harris, following his graduation from college and seminary, and graduate work, came to Baltimore in 1952 as minister of the Congregational Church, and later served historic First Church in New York City, which was gathered in 1747, prior to going to Oklahoma City. He has been active in the work of the general church, having served as a member of the Commission on the Ministry, World Christian Fellowship Committee, and the General Executive Committee of the National Association.

Beyond this business of preserving and protecting, there is another task which is part of both ministering and being stewards. That is, we are really charged with changing the world. One of the American Prayer Book collects speaks of "turning the hearts of the disobedient to the wisdom of the just." This is what we are supposed to be doing as we exercise our ministry and stewardship.

We are only too aware of the fact that there are an awful lot of disobedient children of God in the world today. We have to be aware of this demand to change. We are expected to cast off the sinful old man and don the new man of righteousness. We are expected to show our change for the better in the world and not only show by example how Christ has touched our lives, but also help other people make this change in their lives.

This business of being ministers and stewards is not something which is reserved for the pastor. It is the task of every single Christian. As a matter of fact, lay people probably do a lot better job of touching the lives of the disobedient than do the clergy. The reason for this is that they are sort of set apart by their titles, jobs, and often their attire. They are expected to be good, and often expected to be rather innocent of the temptations and trials which arise living in the world. Laymen, on the other hand, live in the world, and contact non-Christians as a matter of business, friendship, and all the rest of living. The layman is, perhaps, not expected to be quite as "good" as the clergyman. Thus his witness speaks more loudly than does that of the professional.

We might add that clergymen are subject to all the temptations of the world, the flesh, and the devil than anyone else is. There are good clergymen and bad ones, just as there are good laymen and bad ones. It is one of the sad developments of the present age that people are inclined to run off to their clergy the task of praying for the troubled and the job of witnessing before all men the wonders of God in Christ. I can't think of a single reason why God should bestow a priest's prayer any louder or more clearly than He hears that of any troubled soul.

As we prepare for the coming of the Christ Child on Christmas, and the second coming of Christ to judge the world, we ought to consider and take up our calling from God to turn the hearts of the wicked to the wisdom of the just and to show forth in our lives the light of Christ which shows all men to fulfillment, hope, and love.

Sebring Desires Jetport

SEBRING, Fla. (AP) — The dream of racing cars brings thousands of tourists to Highlands County. Now, the county wants the roar of jumbo jets to bring millions of tourists every year.

The Highlands County Jetport Authority met today, inspired by reports from Washington that the federal government would refuse the Dade County Port Authority permission to build a giant jetport in the Everglades sports car races held at Sebring.

Highlands County hopes to land the jetport, and the county jetport authority thinks what they have to offer will put them far ahead of other contenders. The county is famous for international sports car races held at Sebring.

Pat Cooper, chairman of the authority, said the jetport location is pointing to its central location and availability of land as big drawing factors.

Sebring and Aven Park, both of which have small airports, are within 150 air miles of two-thirds of Florida's population, compared to the Everglades location which is within the same distance of only one-third of the population, he said.

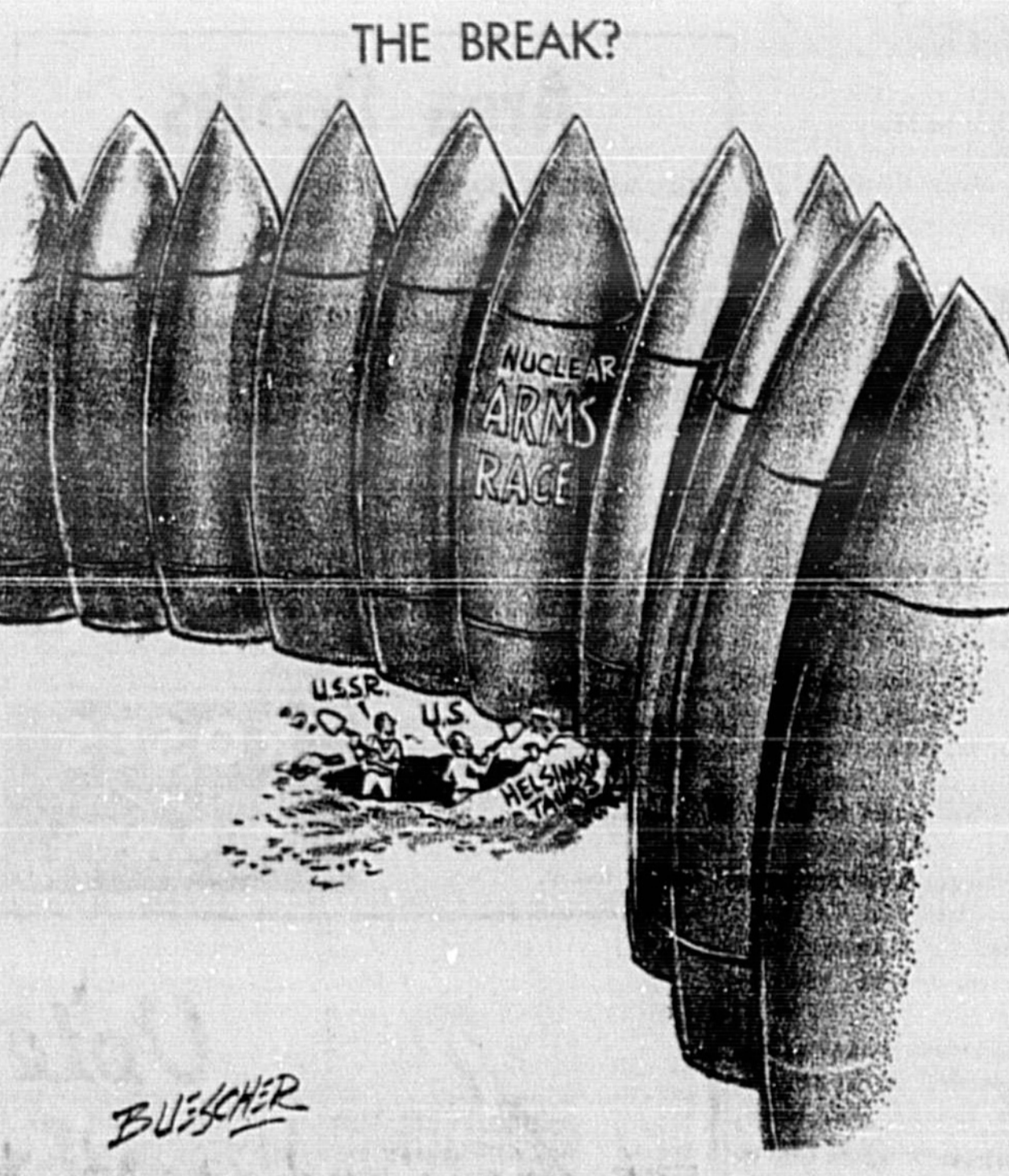

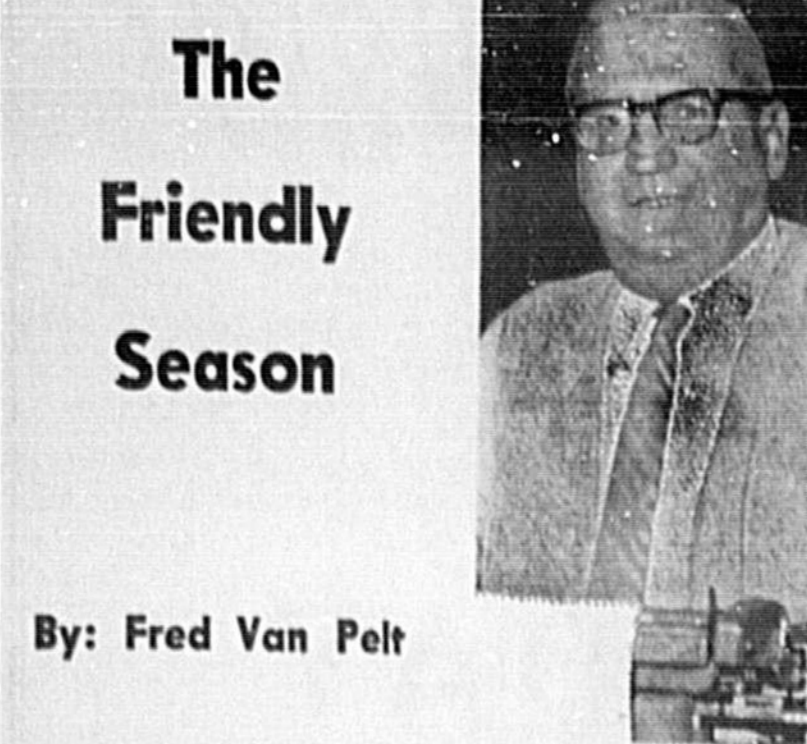

My elderly parents now live in one of the existing projects far removed from the conveniences of downtown facilities, with the accompanying annoyances of high turnover in tenants of families with many children. When one drives through any of the existing facilities, you can readily spot the unwilling of the aged who tenants by their well kept appearance, and the addition of faded flower gardens, etc. It is my understanding that these families now over 62 in present government housing will have first choice in moving to the new location when it is developed. The day will soon come when they can no longer drive, and I am sure there are many more in this category. Some are not so fortunate to have their sons and daughters living here to tend to their needs. To be within walking distance of shopping, medical care, and recreational activities and the pure pleasure of being self sufficient in reason enough to maintain the present proposed site.

The elderly of both races deserve this opportunity. The problems now existing in present government housing were there before the gradual mingling of the races — mainly the overcrowding of children and instability of many transient families — which will be eliminated in senior citizen housing. My parents' total income is far less than \$8800 annually and they, along with many others will not be able to afford to live in the type of housing. Keep in mind that a good percentage of the over sixty age bracket at the present time raised their children at the height of the depression years, and through no fault of their own were never able to buy homes of their own.

I urge the City Commissioners to keep all these facts in mind at the future hearing on this subject. The desires of a handful of homeowners should not have control of progress which could benefit hundreds more.

Diphtheria Moves North

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS
Diphtheria, already blamed for three deaths in Miami, has moved north to Sanford, Fla., where it is now spreading in two widely separated cities hundreds of miles apart.

Health officials said they doubt a major epidemic is in the offing. Emergency supplies of vaccine were rushed to Monticello for the start of a mass inoculation program similar to one already under way for some 74,000 Miami children. Jacksonville was considered for another crash effort.

Two half-brothers who fell ill in Monticello Thursday set off a medical alarm 445 miles north-northwest of Miami and just one mile from the Florida-Georgia border.

David Seabrook, 6, was listed in critical condition in a Thomasville, Ga., hospital. One-year-old Darrell Galton was in satisfactory condition. Neither had received nine miles from the Florida-Georgia border.

"We plan to immunize every child in Jefferson County within the next five days," said Mark Austin, a spokesman for the State Division of Health.

Then in Jacksonville, Dr. Malcolm Ford announced three diphtheria cases had been diagnosed there. He said only one was the sometimes fatal throat infection, however. The other two cases were an offshoot of the germ that affects the skin. The victims were not identified. Jacksonville is 247 miles north of Miami and 132 miles east of Monticello.

Dr. James Bax, state health secretary, geared up his agency to help. "It's only predictable to the extent that it is (geographically) sporadic, but at this time we do not expect an epidemic of major proportions," Bax said.

"We've got standby airplanes, we've got an adequate amount of drugs, the guns, the people we've well equipped, well staffed and well prepared to meet any emergency."

Patience inoculation guns that use jets of air to squirt vaccines through pores without breaking the skin were rushed to Miami and Monticello for school clinics.

There was no obvious link between the Jacksonville illness and the Miami outbreak. But doctors said circumstantial evidence at Monticello pointed the finger at three Miami families who went to Jefferson County for a funeral and visited the home of the stricken youngsters.

White House Orders Study Of Draft 'Holes'

WASHINGTON (AP)—The White House has ordered a study of loopholes that could turn the new draft lottery system into a giant chess game with unmanageable pieces.

A White House source said staff members of the National Security Council, Defense Department and Selective Service have been asked to consider whether the acknowledged loopholes in the system "will be a real problem and, if so, what to do about it."

The most obvious loophole allows a deferred man, in some cases, to choose the year he is assigned to the draft—presumably a year when his lottery number is unlikely to come up.

And even if it holds up, he conceded, it would not prevent a man from dropping his deferment by actually dropping out of school or quitting an essential job.

"They are kicking around a number of things," the White House source said, of the loophole study, "of which that is one."

Still another flaw is the reverse case of a man classified 1-A, who seeks a deferment when it looks as if his number is getting hot. If he gets the deferment—and the local board may have no choice if he qualifies—he leaves the draft pool.

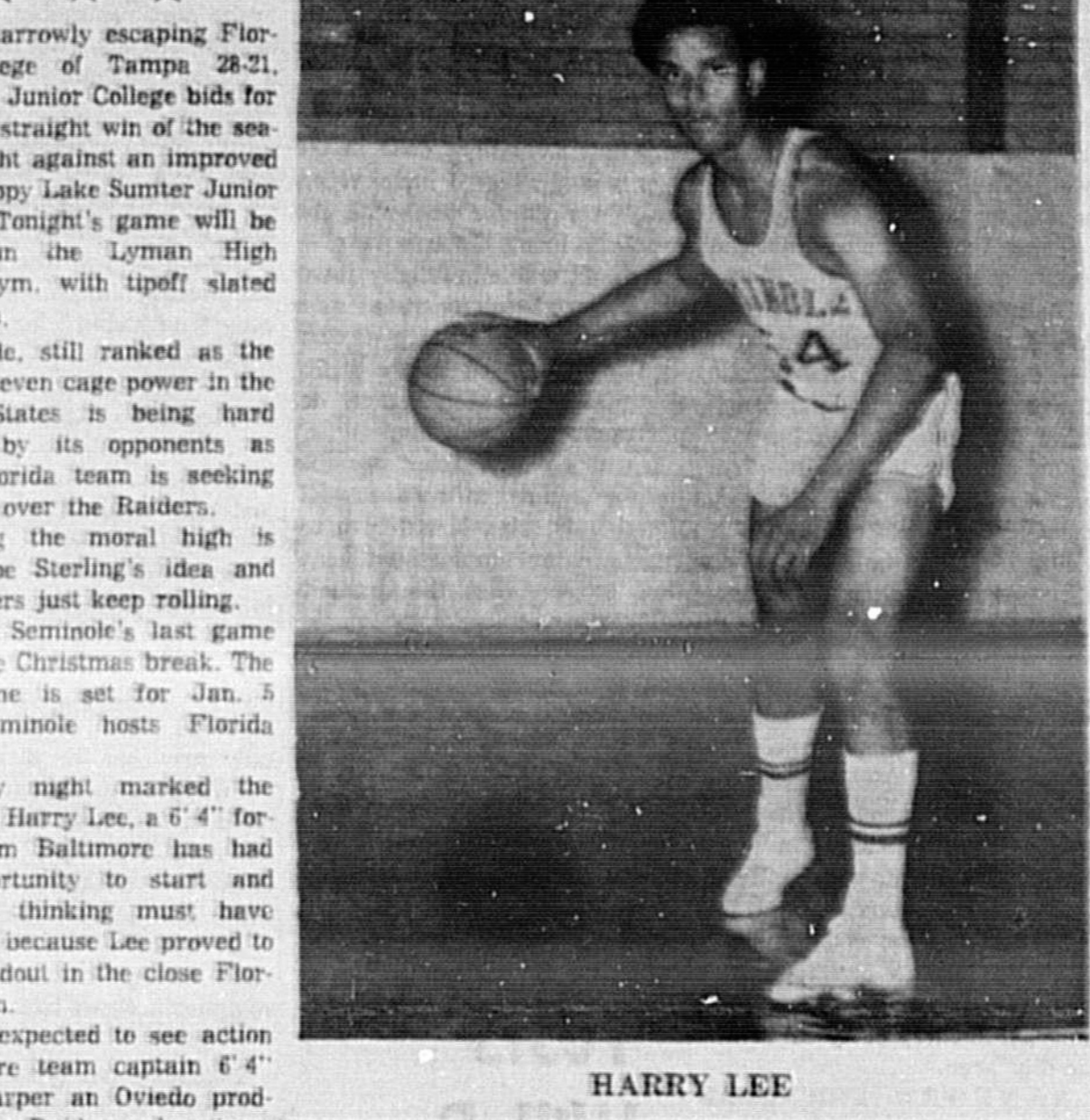

Clay-Frazier In Orlando?

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — That heavyweight title fight between Cassius Clay and Joe Frazier scheduled to occur today at Florida promoters battled public opinion and threats of legal action for the distinction of settling a "national question."

Promoter Ron Gorton, backed by the state, withdrew his plans to hold the fight in Tampa and joined forces with former rodeo star Pete Ashlock to book the Clay-Frazier battle in a domed stadium near Orlando Feb. 17.

Still unsettled is the public objection to Clay's convictions for refusal to serve in the armed services, a factor blamed for the fight's location in the court's area of jurisdiction, which includes Tampa, Orlando and Jacksonville.

An Orlando man, Larry Sunbrook, petitioned a federal court Thursday for a restraining order that would keep Clay from fighting for money anywhere in the court's area of jurisdiction, which includes Tampa, Orlando and Jacksonville.

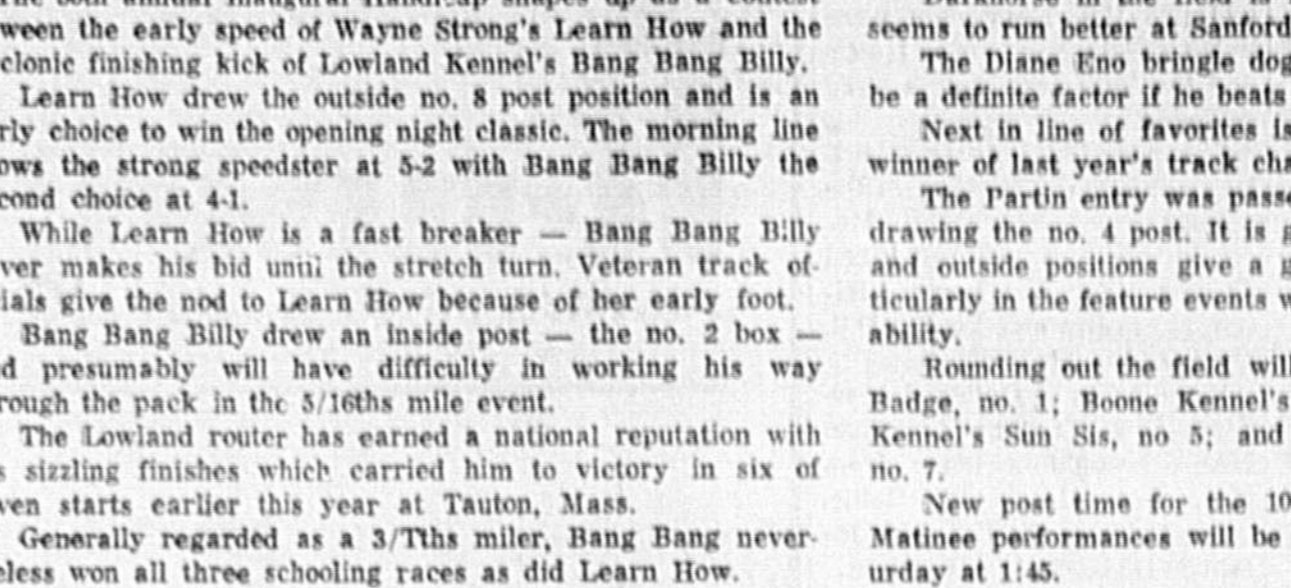
Clay, said Sunbrook, should be kept out of the professional boxing ring because he is a convicted felon and a draft dodger who is under sentence of violation of the U.S. Selective Service Act.

Clay was stripped of his title by the World Boxing Association after he refused to take the oath of induction. He has appealed his conviction.

Frazier is recognized as heavyweight champion in seven states. A third fighter, Jimmy Ellis, holds the WBA title.

The change from Tampa to Orlando would mean a drastic reduction in seats for the fight. Gorton had sought Tampa's 48,000-seat stadium. Ashlock's domed stadium holds only 9,000 persons. Gorton said he and Ashlock would guarantee a gate of \$200,000.

Ashlock said he wasn't worried about public opinion.

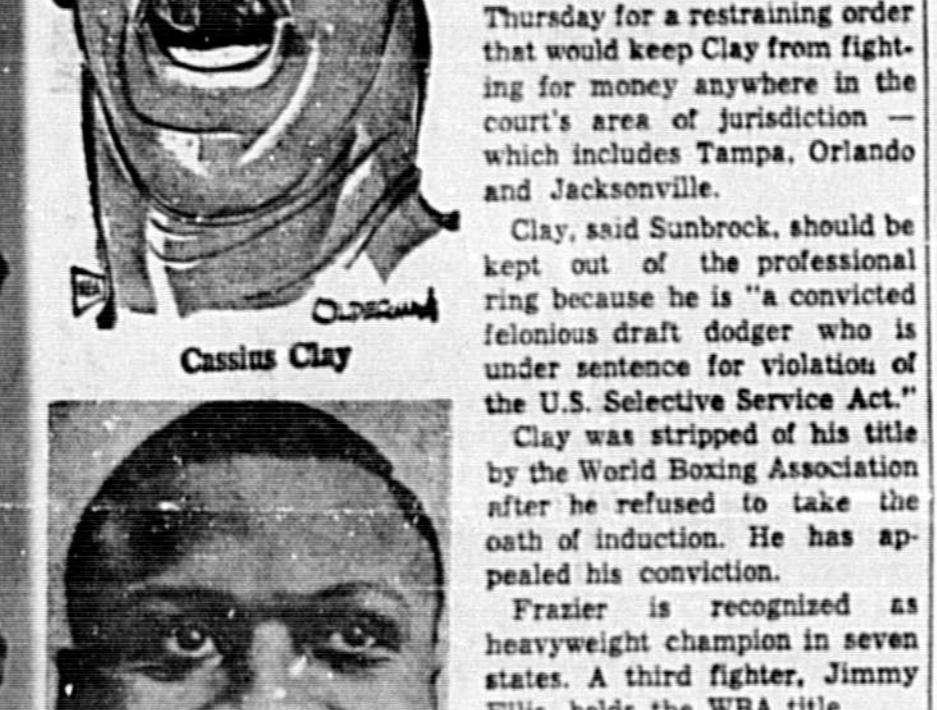

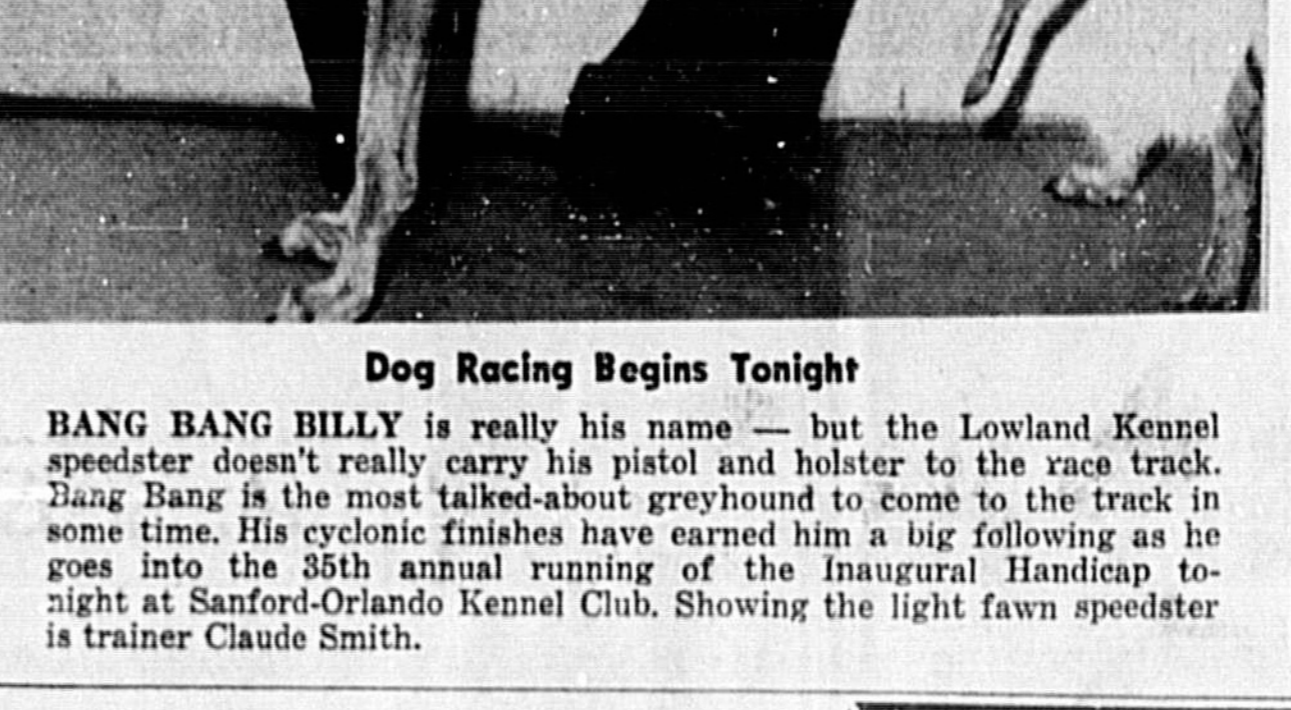
Lyman Seeks Pioneer Win

GI Aircraft, Artillery Clobber Enemy Forces In Attacks

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. aircraft and artillery killed 111 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong soldiers in five attacks; and the Americans didn't have a casualty, the U.S. Command said today. South Vietnamese forces reported 88 North Vietnamese killed.

Aerial observers counted 70 enemy bodies after three attacks by U.S. artillery, bombers and helicopter gunships 34 miles from the Cambodian border and 85 miles northeast of Saigon. Two of the attacks were triggered when North Vietnamese troops opened fire with rifles and machine guns against helicopters screening American air cavalrymen screening infiltration corridors from Cambodia, a spokesman said. None of the helicopters was downed, the spokesman added. About 300 South Vietnamese paratroopers operating with the U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division clashed with North Vietnamese soldiers three miles south of the American encounters. Aided by artillery and U.S. helicopter gunships, the South Vietnamese claimed another 24 enemy in "light sporadic contacts," while nine paratroopers were reported killed and 18 wounded. Sharp fighting also flared in the northern, western and southern Mekong Delta as far south as the U Minh forest. The government soldiers reported 64 enemy soldiers killed in four clashes, one of them a mile from the Cambodian border. The government soldiers

were supported by U.S. Army helicopter gunships and Navy patrol boats. Field reports said nine more South Vietnamese and two U.S. Navy men were killed and 32 government troops and five American sailors were wounded. The other fighting was reported southeast of Da Nang in the coastal plains. There U.S. Marine artillery and aircraft killed 41 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese in two attacks, the U.S. Command said. Reaction to the alleged massacre at My Lai by American troops brought a letter from Maj. Gen. Harris W. Hoiha, commander of the U.S. 23rd Infantry Division, to his troops.

Hi-Speed Trains For Jetport

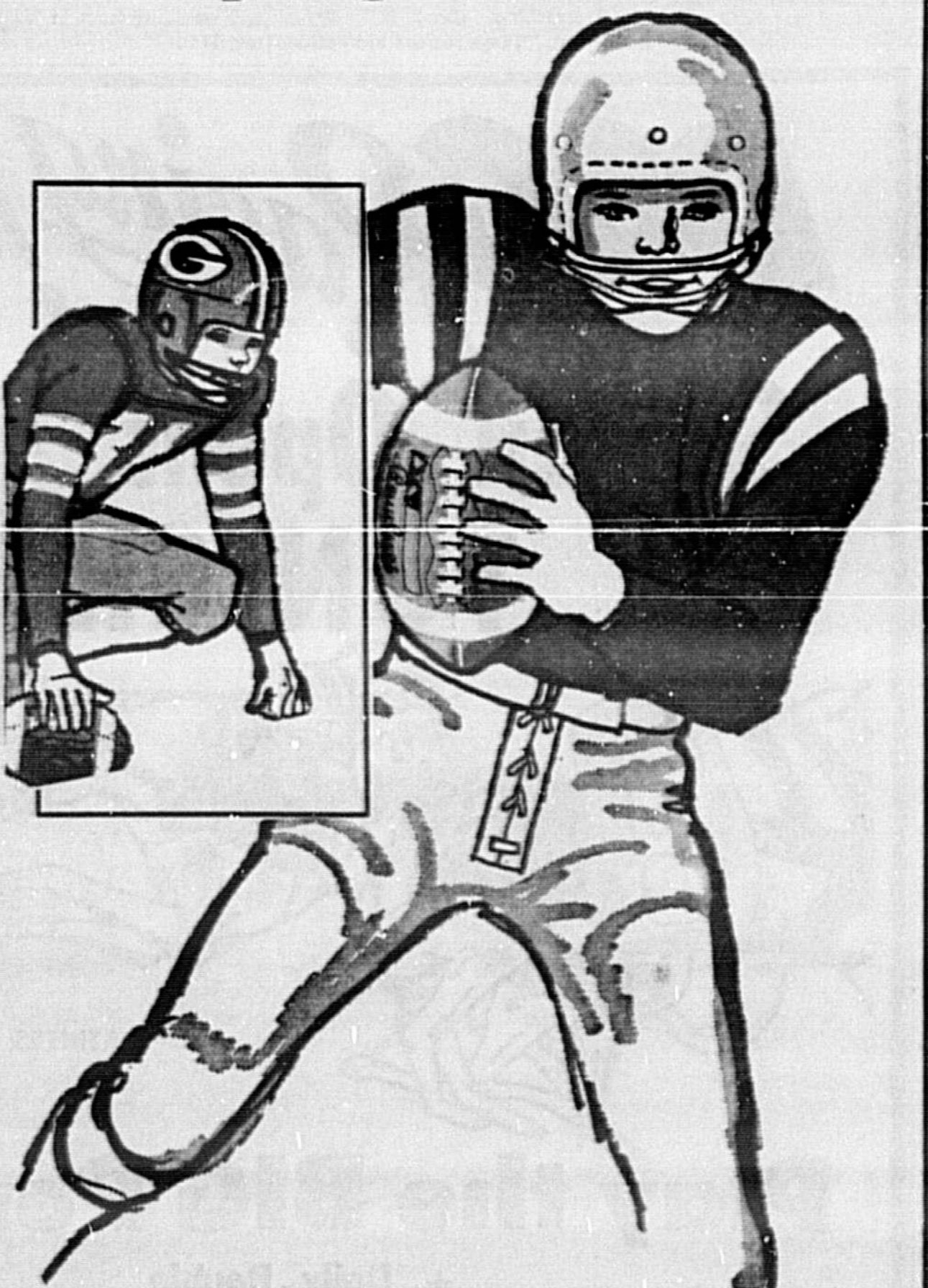
MIAMI (AP)—A secluded jetport in the Everglades, accessible by only 200-mile-an-hour vehicles, was proposed by former Interior Secretary Stewart Udall. Udall, whose firm, Overview Inc., was hired for \$75,000 to study the environmental impact of the proposed jetport, proposed at a Dade County Commission meeting. A rapid relay system of high speed ground transportation to connect the port with a terminal in Miami or some other urban area. A "clean enclave" port, far from urban areas. "A large scale effort" to preserve the quality and quantity of water resources and natural environment of all South Florida. Udall told commissioners, U.S. officials, conservation leaders and aviation representatives that a conventional jetport in the Everglades would have devastating effect on natural resources. Such a port, Udall said, "would be unacceptable with its supporting buildings of houses, industry and ground transportation corridors." Senate OKs Tax Reforms; Bill Is Now In Conference

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate has overwhelmingly passed its veto-threatened tax reform bill, sending it to a conference committee where House members wait with their own quite different version. The conference committee has a heavy chore in reconciling the bills, but leading members of both delegations say they expect to come up with a compromise Nixon can sign. The Senate, which ended almost a fortnight of debate by approving the bill 69-22 Thursday afternoon, sparked Nixon's ire by providing a 15 per cent increase in Social Security benefits and a boost in personal income tax exemptions from \$500 to \$800. The House bill makes no provision for either matter, although that chamber is considering a separate Social Security proposal. Opponents railed vainly against the bill Thursday, charging its differences between tax relief and revenue gain amount to more than \$3 billion and is fiscally irresponsible. It was this cost that Nixon cited when he said he veto the bill if it's unchanged. However, it seems certain the 15 per cent Social Security benefit boost, and many other of the tax breaks "will be retained either in the tax bill or in separate legislation. The Senate bill raises the present \$500 personal deduction to \$700 in 1970 and \$800 in 1971. The House version provides a cut in income tax rates beginning in 1971. Nixon contends a tax cut in 1970 would hurt his fight against inflation and would take too much out of the Treasury. The Senate's 15 per cent increase in Social Security benefits and a provision raising the minimum payment from \$35 a month per individual to \$100 most exceed the President's suggested total of 10 per cent increase in benefits. Another major difference, but one on which the administration has not taken a do-or-die stand, is the oil and gas depletion allowance. The House bill reduces the percentage of gross income an oil company may write off before taxes from 27 1/2 to 20 per cent. The Senate bill drops it to 22 per cent.

Crime Rate Levels

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's spiraling crime rate leveled off during the first nine months of 1969, but armed robbery became a much greater menace on city streets, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reported today. Hoover said the overall crime rate rose 11 per cent during the period—eight per cent under the increase during the corresponding months a year ago. But, in releasing the quarterly uniform crime reports, he called attention to the 15 per cent jump in robberies, particularly an 18 per cent hike in armed holdups. Hoover said street robbery made up more than half of all robbery offenses and increased 18 per cent, while residential holdups climbed 22 per cent during the period. Among the various types of robberies, he said, only bank holdups showed a decline—4 per cent less than during the first nine months of 1968. The report came shortly after Hoover released a statement in which he predicted "the soaring crime rate in the 1970s can be contained." The optimistic prediction, he said, was based on giant strides in the professionalization of police, installation of modern communication systems and construction of new facilities and increased cooperation among law enforcement agencies. Hoover attributed a 122 per cent increase in the volume of

WASHINGTON (AP) — Army sources say they expect charges to be filed against most of the 24 soldiers and former soldiers under investigation in the alleged massacre of Vietnamese civilians at My Lai. They estimated the probe will not be completed for about four months because of the wide spread hunt for evidence. Interrogations resulted in more leads that have to be followed up, they explained. But on the basis of what has been developed so far, the sources said there probably will be charges filed against a majority of nine soldiers and 15 former soldiers, all one-time members of Company C, 1st Battalion, 11th Infantry Brigade. First Lt. William L. Calley Jr., a platoon commander in Company C, is awaiting court-martial at Ft. Benning, Ga., on charges of the slaying of 22 of at least 109 Vietnamese men, women and children. A decision is expected on whether to court-martial one of Calley's squad leaders in Vietnam, S. Sgt. David Mitchell, who has been accused of assault with intent to kill 30 Vietnamese.

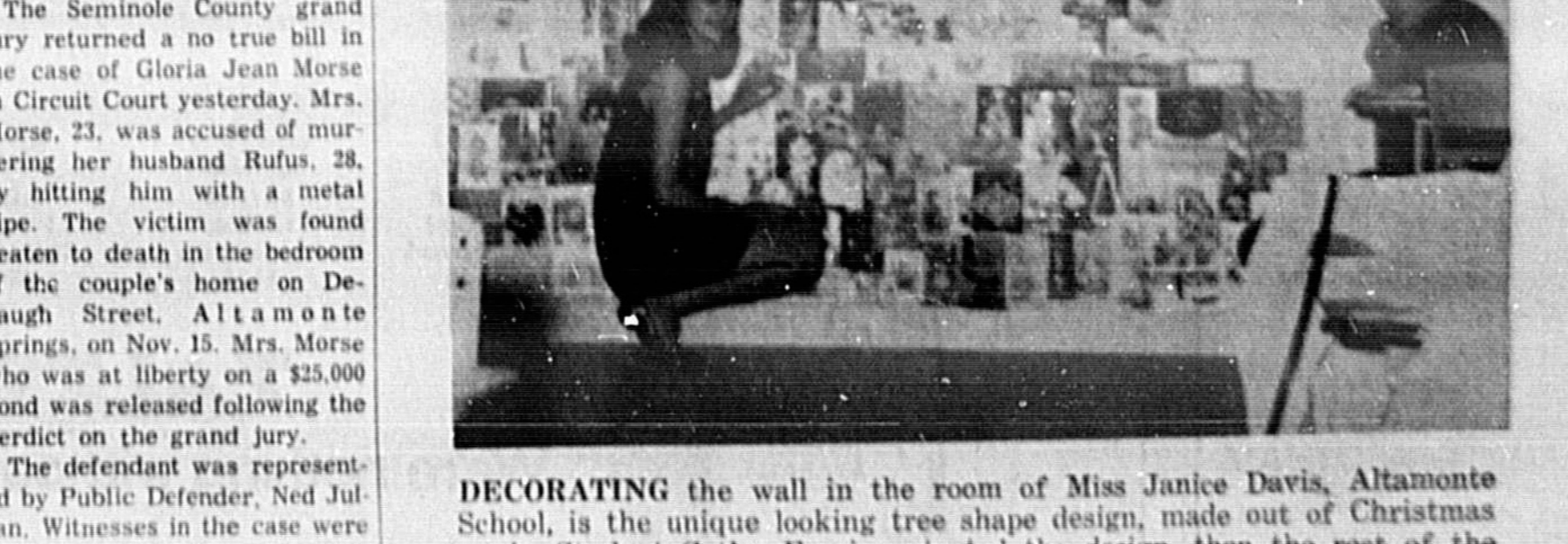

1 1/4-cup. can chicken spread
1/4 can chopped pimiento-stuffed olives
2 tbsp. mayonnaise
30 party rye slices
softened butter
CREAMY PATE SPREAD
1 1/4-cup. can liverwurst spread
3 oz. cream cheese
2 tbsp. chopped scallions
30 party cheese slices
softened butter

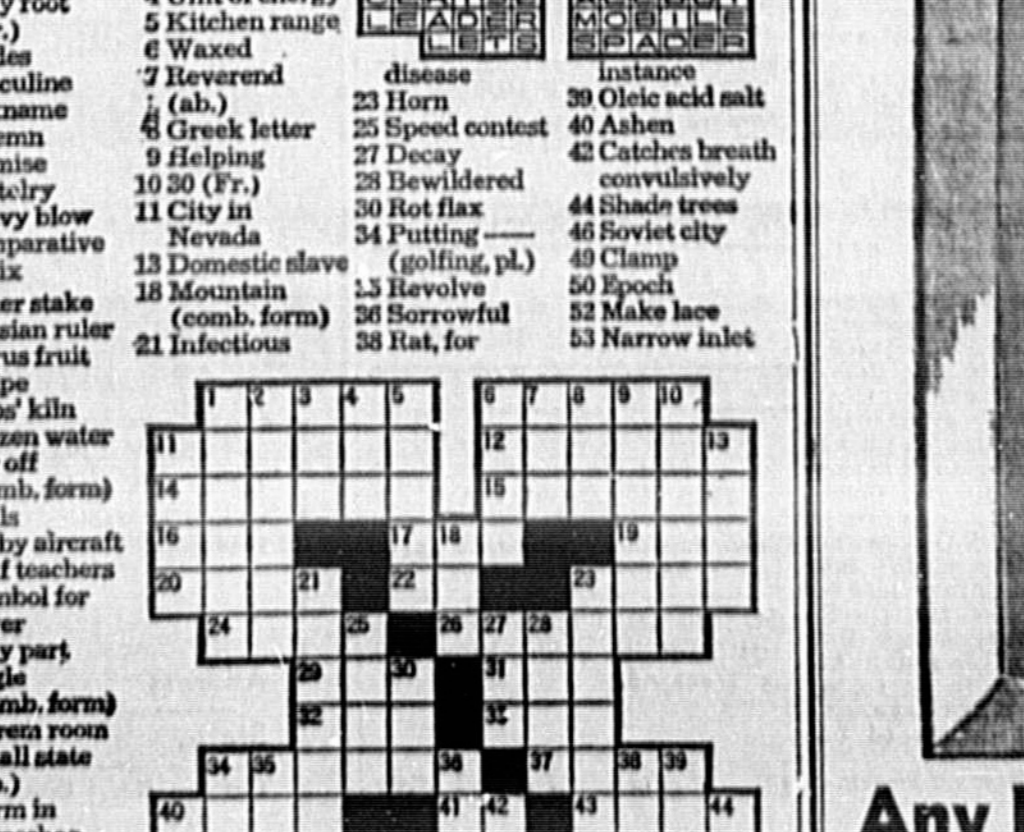

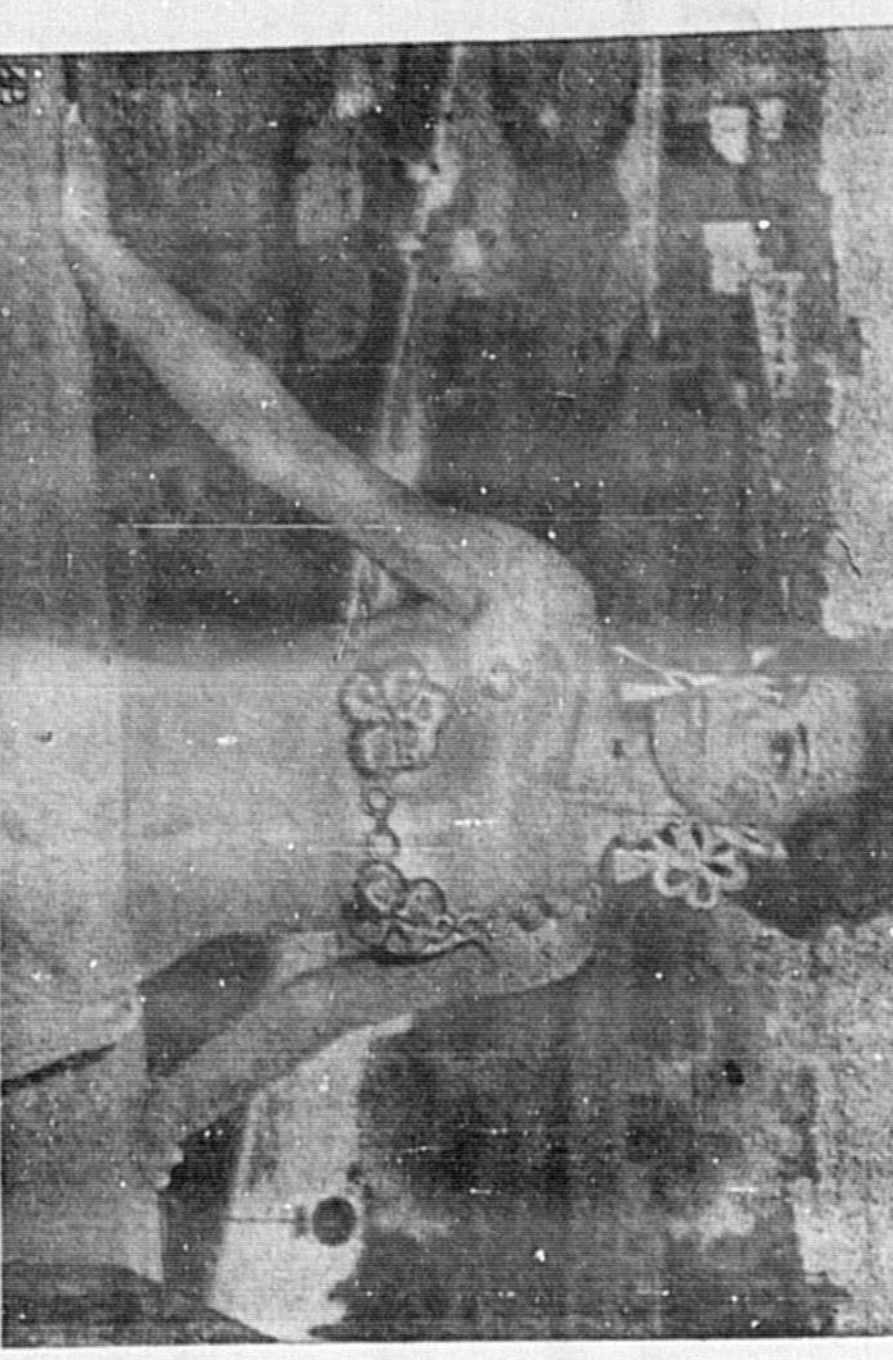

School Sex Measures Will Occupy Solons

Sex in school makes up the greater part of the 10 Seminole County legislative measures to be considered by the Seminole-Orange legislative delegation at 7 p.m. Tuesday at the Orange County Commission chambers in the courthouse at Orlando.

School sex bills to be considered tomorrow evening for presentation to the next session of the Legislature included (1) a bill requiring parental consent of health and sex education courses; (2) a bill prohibiting the use of "Sullivan Reading Series" in Seminole County kindergartens, primary and secondary schools; (3) a bill prohibiting the use of materials recommended by the Sex Education and Information Council.

Other Seminole bills to be considered are: Designating Wekiva Springs Road and Redbug Road as state primary roads; requiring theaters to display ratings of main features and previews; prohibiting discriminatory double school sessions.

Prohibiting standing in moving school buses; providing for the relief from uncollected checks for the Clerk of Circuit Court; and providing for the redistribution of race track funds.

Welfare Is Dragging

The State welfare system needs changing and updating to meet the needs of the poor. Even employees of the state agency agree that present operation was geared to meet the needs of recipients way back before the Democratic New Deal days of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt.

Now with a new anxiety focused away from the old concepts of farms and male domination, comes the need for a complete change in the qualifications for receiving state benefits.

This is demonstrated by the requirement of the state that before a family can become eligible for aid, the father must leave home and the wife must charge him with desertion and agree to prosecute him, if and when he is located.

State forces this to happen by declaring, "If both parents are alive and well in the home, but neither is working, no help can be given to the family."

Thus a father, who may have been working for 20 years, is suddenly discharged, is unable to find work fast enough to feed his family is forced to desert his loved ones to receive their monetary help.

This and other welfare problems were discussed with Margaret Anderson, Virginia Hurt, Mary L. Simpson and Joyce Kelley, four employees of State Department of Public Welfare at Sanford.

There are 35 persons employed at Sanford engaged in welfare work serving Seminole County, one of the five counties served in state's 12th district, with administrative office at Orlando.

In addition to aid to families with dependent children, the state office also offers aid to aged, blind and disabled.

Stressing there is never any money given at the office itself, Mrs. Anderson said the state agency refers prospective applicants to the state office after a full scale investigation is made to determine qualifications.

Immediate help such as a meal or grocery order for the state department. County welfare also approves emergency hospitalization for indigents but gives no money supplement.

State welfare forwards information to enable receipt of welfare checks issued from Jacksonville headquarters.

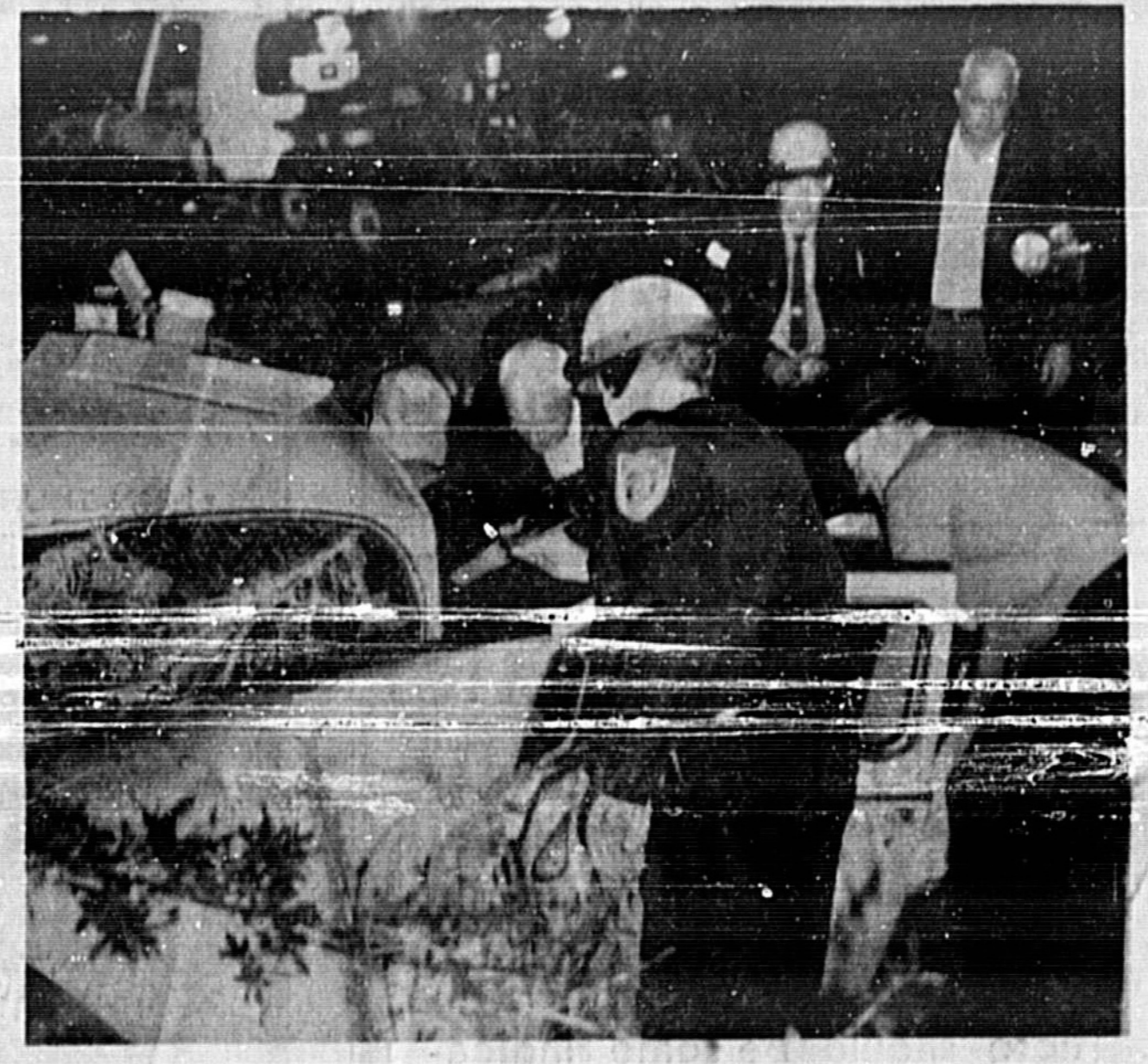
Under the state law, the recently mentioned George Beaton family at Lake Monroe was not eligible for financial aid since the father was well and employed, although his take-home pay was not enough to feed a nine-member family, and provide the many other necessities such as clothing, medical help and utilities.

The four categories in which money grants can be made to state recipients are: Elderly assistance over 65, aid to totally and permanently disabled between 18-65 years, aid to legally blind at any age and families with dependent children lacking support.

The maximum amount payable is \$100 per month to a man and wife in adult category, 65 or over, is \$75 for all needs including rent.

Since April the state agency has required no residency requirement for receiving welfare payments.

County agency requires a year residency before help can be given. If an applicant needs food but does not qualify under state or county agency, he is forwarded to the Salvation Army for aid.

Hospital Attache Cut, Robbed

A Seminole Memorial Hospital switch board operator was cut on the left hand and robbed of \$100 early today by a butch-

er knife-wielding hand wearing a stocking mask.

Chief of Police Ben Butler said Mrs. Lois Avery, 67, Enter-

prise was robbed and cut by a slim handcut who escaped after the 4 a. m. robbery.

Butler said Det. Ralph Russell had been assigned to investigate the incident when Mrs. Avery phoned police after a tall, slim man wearing a stocking crawled under a cashier's cage to slash the woman on the hand with a large knife, which was thrown to the floor after Mrs. Avery gave him approximately \$100 in hospital receipts.

The switch board operator normally takes all money and makes change after the hospital cashier closes the office at 8:30 p. m.

Patrolman Gene Pharis investigated the report and stated belief the robber left by a west side door.

All hospital offices were closed and locked at the time of the robbery and the culprit was forced to crawl under a small opening near the floor to enter the cashier's cage with Mrs. Avery, Pharis reported.

This incident is latest of a series of reported baggings at the hospital, all of them occurring at night but most at the emergency room entrance or the parking lot.

A number of signs allocating parking places to doctors were removed and knocked-down recently. Dr. Thomas Largent, hospital trustee, has requested a guard or security man be hired to police the hospital at night due to several instances of misbehavior by persons at the emergency room.

Amount of monetary assistance received by each family is different since it is based on a formula that takes number of children, rent, utilities and other factors into consideration. If the mother works, but qualifies for aid, then state may pay a day nursery to keep the children for the mother to provide a living.

The state agency employs interviewers by The Herald agree that changes need to be made in the welfare program to enable it to function with the problems faced by a different generation than those of the 1950s, when most of the present laws were established.

No 'Boys' In Marines

(Editor's note: An article was published recently by a group of doctors, psychologists and politicians concerning the so-called "Marine Corps" . . . it stated that the . . . Corps has a bunch of killers, too young to know what they are all about. . . I, Charles Brooks, who has seen war, and Mr. . . . I, Brooks, who has seen war, and a graduate of Seminole High School, write this response.)

I am a Marine in Vietnam. I've been here for 10 months and I've seen what war is like. I've read articles about what the supposedly educated men have to say. They say Marines are killers, too young to know about life. Yet they're the ones who vote and make the decisions for these teenage killers to serve their country.

The Marine Corps is built on leadership. The young killers follow the orders of those old enough to know what's going on. Yet we're also the ones who die for our country. We don't have feelings but I've seen the killers cry when they have to pick up the pieces of one of their buddies.

They talk about how cruel we treat the people of Vietnam. But we don't have feelings so why should it affect us when someone laughs at our dead buddies?

In September of 1969 we worked with elements of the First Air Cavalry Division in taking "Hamburger Hill." During this time we lost eight men from our platoon, two from my squad. One was married, 19 years of age, and had a son. It wasn't too easy to write to his wife and tell her how he died. The other was only 18. I wrote to his Mom. I thought of what my Mom would have felt if she had been the one receiving the letter.

We kill but we have to, to save our lives. They ask why Marines are always the ones who see the action. We go first and come out last. We do the most with the least. There have been many savings as how to put it . . . we've been doing so much for so long with so little that now we can do the impossible with nothing.

Also:

We are the unwilling, led by the unqualified to do the unnecessary for the ungrateful!

Say it like you will, Marines say it. We knock the Corps but deep down there's pride. In Corps and Country. We're here for a reason. I've never been told what it is but I only do as I'm told.

Like I said, you'll hear us talk about the Marine Corps in some bar but you don't talk about it — at least when I'm there or another Marine is there.
