NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—What has become of the unbeaten and uncrossed goal football teams that used to be so common in the old days of mass play and heavy casualties.

With the season half finished back in the trail-blazing days of 1900 and thereabouts, when the football world was divided into two very clearly defined strata, the season found a host of unbeaten and uncrossed eleven.

No Child Beggars Will Be Permitted On Moscow Streets

Not a single homeless child roaming the streets, stealing or begging for a living, is the ambitious plan of the Moscow city Soviet as its contribution of achievements in honor of the tenth anniversary celebration of the revolution November 7.

Six hundred children have already been caught. An estimated 1,500 more are running wild. Three new orphan homes are being rushed to completion.

A grand police roundup of the kids is scheduled when places have been found to keep and educate them. But hundreds are certain to remain in hiding until the drive is over.

Under such conditions, the program of Moscow officials is almost certain to fail at least in part. And even if the kids are rounded up, they will most likely break out of the homes before long.

Business efficiency and conservation, has increased bank deposits, the delegates agreed, and the general banking situation is quite satisfactory and healthy.

"People are buying more conservatively," said Frank R. Rambores, assistant superintendent of banks. Although some lines of business are complaining, their troubles are largely seasonal and general complaint is unwarranted.

Vatican And Italy May soon Agree On 50 year-Old Dispute

ROME, Oct. 20.—(INS)—Settlement of the 50-year-old difference between the Italian and the Vatican states, which arose from the pope's loss of temporal power, took on definite possibility today as the result of a settlement from the papal legate offering the basis for agreement.

According to this statement the Vatican has four chief demands, as follows:

- 1.—Recognition of papal jurisdiction in places now occupied by Italian officials or officials.
- 2.—Recognition of papal sovereignty over political territories such as shall be outlined in later negotiations between the Vatican and the Italian government.
- 3.—Construction of a seaport which shall be recognized as papal territory.

4.—The Vatican shall be given sovereignty over a tract of land where the pontificate is now situated additional territory to be purchased from a loan of \$3,000,000 which the church hopes to negotiate with J.P. Morgan & Company.

Primo Masolini is preparing to answer informal overtures that have already been made on behalf of the Vatican.

Travel Bureau Will Begin Functioning On Next Saturday

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 20.—(INS)—Machinery of the state of Florida travel bureau is expected to be set in motion throughout the country following the final meeting of the bureau executive committee to be held in Orlando, Saturday.

All details of the tourist season extension movement have been completed by bureau officials and will be presented at the session for approval. Lodging certificate books which guarantee reduced rates in Florida's best hotels between October 15 to December 15 1927 and March 15 to May 1 1928 have been placed in the hands of nationally known tourist agencies for distribution.

Arrangements are being completed with more than 700 motor clubs located in the north and affiliated with the American automobile association to offer "big" lodging certificates to club members. Several bureau headquarters have been established in principal cities of the north for the purpose of offering the reduced rate accommodation books for sale.

In addition to the lodging certificates, travel coupon books guaranteeing the tourist 2,000 miles of travel within Florida for \$37.50 are being offered as well as a free entertaining book valued at \$75.00.

Rev. Willis T. Jordan To Get Hearing Soon

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Oct. 20.—(INS)—Rev. Willis T. Jordan, the "quarrying parson" of Columbus, Ga., probably will learn soon whether he will regain his freedom or serve an 18 months sentence for bigamy, it appeared here today.

Rev. Jordan is scheduled to be given a hearing for pardon before Commissioner Edwin B. Bridges here Friday or Saturday, his counsel said today. The pardon commissioner will then make a recommendation to Governor McLean.

PARIS, Oct. 20.—(INS)—A Russian fiend was being sought by French police today in connection with the murder at Nice of Mrs. Horace Lord of Fall River, Mass. Jealousy was believed by police to have been the motive.

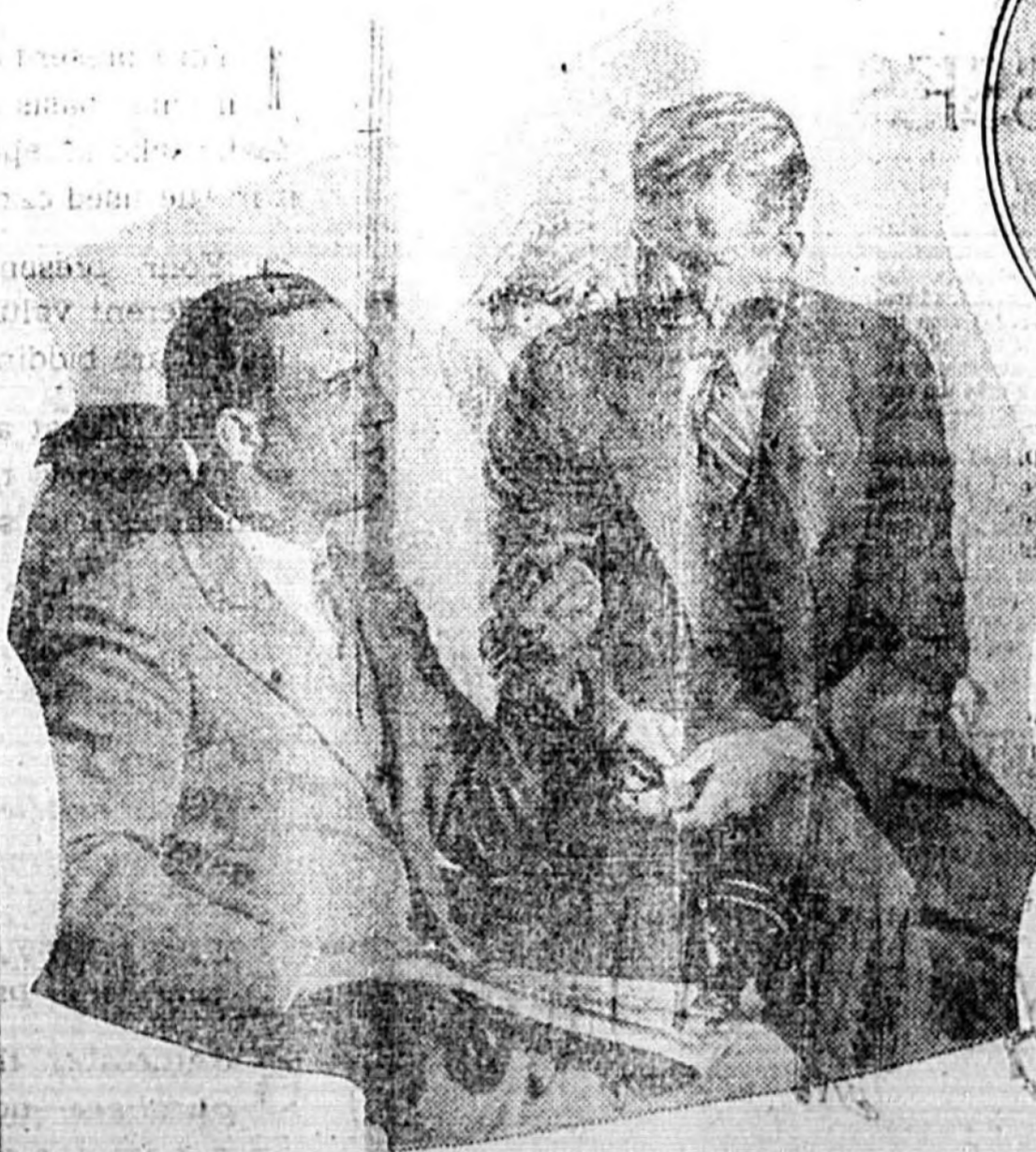
Mrs. Lord, who was formerly Marcelle Vernet, daughter of Count Gustave Vernet, was found stabbed through the heart.

Mr. Borah's Peace Plan

Senator William E. Borah as an ardent disciple of world peace is convincingly revealed in a recent article in Century. Those of us who remember the Idaho senator in his memorable fight against the League of Nations and Woodrow Wilson's efforts to have the scheme approved by the senate, will detect in Borah's latest declarations an apparent change in opinion.

The Georgia paper describes Borah's opposition to the League because of his contention that the scheme was based upon force, an element which the senator declared has failed to bring about world peace over a period of two thousand years.

The Century article, declares the Telegraph, "shows Senator Borah in truer perspective than anything he has said or written heretofore. It pictures him as the hater of war; as the yearner for peace. He was not merely a Henry Cabot Lodge, preaching against entangling alliances, or a Jim Reed, twisting the lion's tail. He was seeking peace by another route."

"We shall either change our faith or civilization will experience the crash which has twice before overtaken it. After 2,000 years of this worship of force, after 2,000 years of this teaching and of the practice which flows from such teaching, what are the results, what are the fruits?"

"First, a debt of \$350,000,000,000, resting like an eternal mortgage—for it will never be paid—upon the brains and energies of the human family, driving men and women on to days and nights of ceaseless and fruitless toil. Nations rich, marvelously rich, in natural resources, now on the very verge of bankruptcy and still laying on like a burning lash upon the backs of their peoples, heavier and still heavier burdens. Hospitals from Leningrad and Berlin to San Francisco and Peking, crowded with the diseased, the maimed and the insane. Families broken and scattered, states dismembered, peoples oppressed babes born prematurely old and cursed with inherited disease, communities visited with strange epidemics and incurable afflictions, and finally every government in the face of all this now searching for more deadly and destructive means of indiscriminate murder; these are the fruits of this worship of force, this urge for blood.

"I maintain that the human family cannot carry the creed. It is undermining and destroying the race. We have no alternative. We are compelled as a matter of self-preservation to reject this fetish. We must work definitely to outlaw war forever and to make it illegal."

Earl Carroll's Release

Earl Carroll, New York theatrical producer, has been released from the federal penitentiary at Atlanta on parole. The famous creator of the Vanities is a free man after serving about four months of a year's sentence on a charge of perjury growing out of his testimony in connection with the staging of the now celebrated "bath-tub" party.

After failing in his efforts to escape serving his sentence Carroll surrendered to federal authorities in May of this year. Enroute to Atlanta, the producer was taken ill and he was removed to a hospital at Greenville, S. C., where for seven weeks he remained under care of physicians. Finally the Department of Justice ordered his removal to the penitentiary which he entered June 8, apparently a broken wreck.

Carroll's response to the medical treatment within the prison is said to have been nothing short of remarkable. He has gained in weight, health and color. There is little likelihood of the recurrence of the nervous reaction to which he was subjected while on his way to the prison. To all appearances the New Yorker is a better man all the way round than when he began his sentence.

Doubtless Earl Carroll has learned his lesson. Four months' imprisonment has changed his demeanor and probably has instilled in him a higher respect for the laws which he tried to laugh off last year. He has in a measure paid for his folly but we seriously question the wisdom of his early release. Despite the fact that he may be a changed man, we are of the opinion that society's demands have not been met. Carroll was sent to prison for perjury, telling lies in his testimony to the court. He delayed serving his sentence by resorting to every conceivable legal means.

After entering prison, Carroll and his friends continued their fight for special favors. Thousands of dollars were expended in an effort to secure the man's freedom. Then the pardon board recommended Carroll's parole after he had served only four months. Had it not been for all of his money, the promoter would doubtless be in prison for a longer period, perhaps for the entire term. And while Carroll may have learned his lesson, society has not been protected because it appears that society has no defense against wealth.

REAL ISSUES IN COMING CAMPAIGN

The Miami Herald complains that there is no big issue raised in the gubernatorial race, and says that everything is running along so smoothly that no issue is in sight upon which the candidates can base their appeals for votes. That is indeed, a sad condition, if correct. But on close inspection it appears to us that perhaps the candidates are dodging the real issues.

If the candidates for Governor are really interested in the welfare of the state, and are not desirous of dodging issues that mean a great deal to the voters, they should look into the toll bridge franchises granted by the Legislature along the route of the Gulf Coast Highway. Here is an issue "rammed" down the throats of the taxpayers of Florida by the Legislature for the benefit of a few capitalists and for the benefit of one section to the detriment of all other sections of the state, and it sticks to the high heavens. No candidate for Governor who upholds this legislative "deal" should receive the support of south and

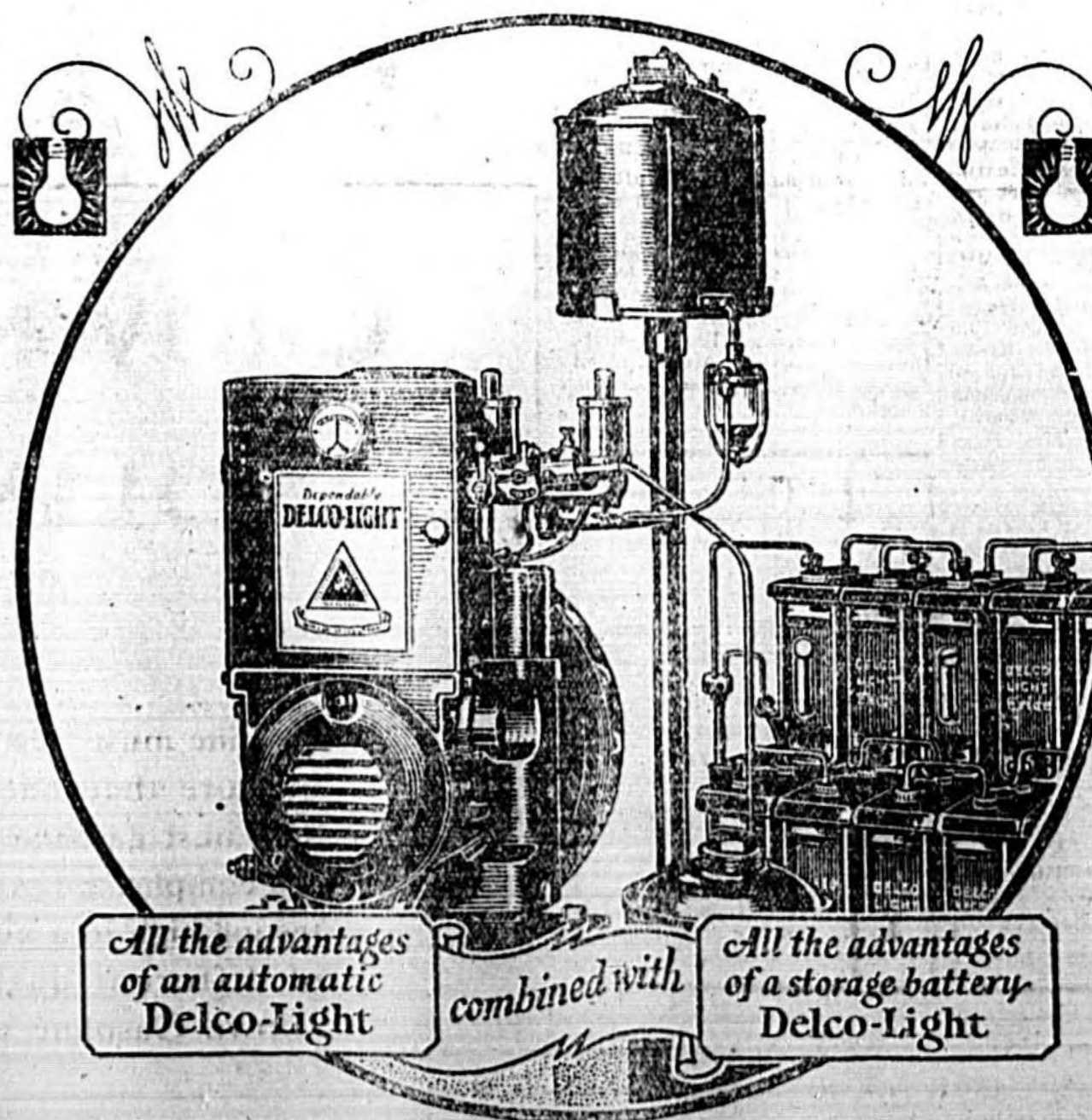

ARMY ELEVEN IS ONE OF ENIGMAS OF THIS SEASON

Coach Jones Has Much Power In Veteran Team But The Results Thus Far Have Been Far From Best In East

WEST POINT, N. Y., Oct. 20.—One of the big enigmas of the present football season is the army eleven. There is no doubt that Bill Jones has been doing a lot of hard work with his veteran material but the returns have been coming in slowly and what little the army has shown in action has been more or less contradictory. But the riddle should be answered after the cadets take the field against Yale in their annual clash in the bowl on Saturday afternoon.

Like Notre Dame, the Army employed the shift very extensively in its offense in other years and the rule requiring a stop of a full second before the ball has been passed appeared to have worked havoc with the west pointer's attack.

This was never better illustrated than in the battle with Davis-Elkins last week. The southern eleven, to be sure, was nobody's set-up, but the army had real trouble in uncooking a scoring punch until the final period when the sturdy Davis-Elkins line had been putted into a pulp by the superb West Point forwards. Then it was easy for the Army backs to pile up the touchdowns that brought victory for a comparatively big score.

The Army has revamped its attack to such an extent that it has retained few features easily recognizable as basic plays of the 1926 season. Most important apparently is the stress that Jones is placing on the forward pass now. It will be recalled that a year ago the army used the pass little if at all.

But Jones seems to have restored the pass to its old time place of importance because it was trotted out a good many times against Davis-Elkins and used in a way that indicated that Jones was determined to employ it in the big game to come.

With the team that he has at his disposal Jones should take the army far along the championship road. The backfield is without doubt one of the best and certainly is the most experienced in the country with Harry Wilson, one time Penn state star, playing his seventh year of varsity football. Jones has a line well-up to West Point standards. It is heavy and charges with terrific force. Incidentally it is well fortified with reserves. Sprague and Perry stand out as the best tackles the army has had in some time. Hall at center and Hammond and Seaman at the guards give the center of the line the power of a battering ram on attack and are dependable no defense. There are at least two good players in reserve for each regular between the tackles.

New Ford To Be Named The "Linford" For Lincoln And Ford, Says Texas Writer

WACO, TEXAS, October 20.—We have been repeatedly asked for information concerning the new Ford and we are pleased to give you under the first benefit of the information we have gleaned from one source and another. Here it is:

The new Ford product will be known as the Linford, taking its name from Abraham Lincoln, its founder, and Henry Ford, its manufacturer. Some other name may be substituted.

The car will be equipped with a complete gear, engine body, gasoline tank, radiator, and other accessories, all to other automobiles.

The wheels of which there will be four, will be set on axles and will revolve around and around, forward or backward, depending on the shape and ball of the driver.

On the extreme front end, the car will be equipped with a radiator, which will serve as a reservoir for water with which to water the road. The front of the radiator will be posted so as to be an excellent catcher of bugs, insects, other proper chickens and the like.

Spurred passengers on the car will be in a tank which will contain a number of gallons of gasoline, or any liquid oil as gas may be filling stations. A lesser number of gallons can be applied if desired.

Seats Equipped With Cushions.—All seats will be equipped with cushions of more or less softness, the bearing and sedan model rear seat will be placed directly

by climbing over. The sedan and coupe models will be closed cars, and the touring cars and roadsters will be open cars.

The engine of the car will be of usual design and equipped with gears, pistons, cylinders, spark plugs, wires and distributor.

The car will be equipped with pneumatic tires which will be placed on the wheels, tending to give the car a soft, airy feeling.

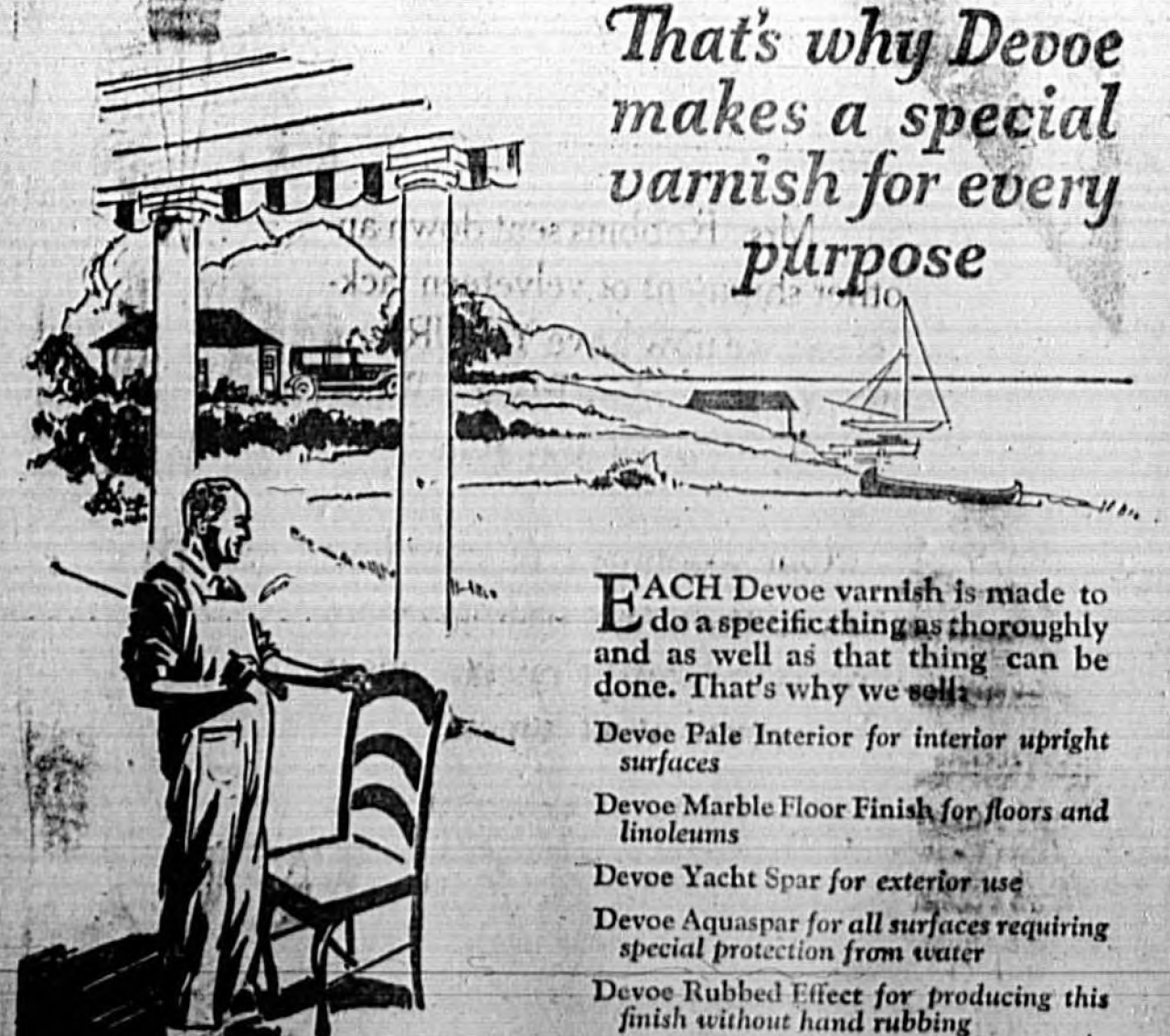

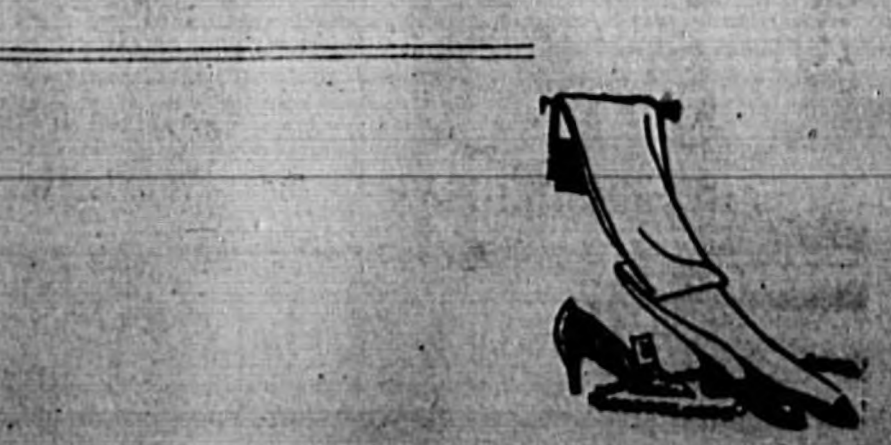
