PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) - Voters feel the Democratic party is better able to handle the nation's serious problems than the Republican party, according to the latest Gallup Poll.

The poll, released Sunday, showed the Democrats holding a 53 to 47 per cent lead. They actually tallied 34 per cent and the GOP 28, but Gallup divided the remaining 38 per cent undecided equally between the two





U.S. Planes Fly To AidOf Beleaguered Cambodia

SAIGON (AP) - The U.S. Command sent scores of American warplanes into Cambodia Sunday and today to aid beleaguered Cambodian forces facing North Vietnamese tanks for the first

The command announced that U.S. Marine and Air Force jets flying from bien Hoa Air Base, 15 miles northeast of Saigon, destroyed 14 Soviet T54 medium tanks along the Saigon-Phnom Penh Highway 14 miles inside the Cambodian border. It was one of the biggest tank kills claimed in the four-monthold North Vietnamese offensive.

The tanks were knocked out as they tried to encircle the Cambodian town of Kompong Trabek, about 85 miles west of Saigon. The North Vietnamese appeared to be trying to secure the highway, a key route for troops and supplies to South Vietnam's northern Mekong Delta, where a big Communist

buildup is reported under way. In North Vietnam, U.S. Navy jets attacked the Loi Dong transshipment point and storage depot four miles northwest of Haiphong, and pilots reported their bombs set off large orwith thick smoke.

The U.S. Command said Air Force F4 phantoms beamed 2, 000-pound laser bombs into three spans of the Cao Nung bypass bridge 48 miles northeast of Hanoi on the rail line to China. A spokesman said reconstruction of the bridge was near completion when the spans were knocked out. The bypass bridge had been destroyed earlier in the air campaign and the main bridge has been knocked out three times.





Public thanks is due two United States senators who have introduced bills which can do much to assure continuance of the confidentiality right which a free press must have and to shed light on meetings of federal authorities and Congressional committees.

Senator Alan Cranston of California is the one whose bill consists of a single sentence: "A person connected with or employed by the news media or press cannot be required by a court, a legislature, or any administrative body to disclose before the Congress or any federal court or agency any information procured for publication or broadcast."

The vigilance of the California Democrat is noteworthy. For he had detected the basic damage to a free press which could come from a Supreme Court ruling that the press does not inherently possess a confidentiality privilege as part of its First Amendment rights. The bill, introduced on June 30, should be passed and with such a majority that the message could not be

Florida's own junior senator Lawton Chiles is the legislator who has just introduced a "Government In The Sunshine Act" with which he "seeks to assure the openness of our governmental processes and to restore public confidence in those processes."

Senator Chiles had gone to Washington after having experienced the benefits which the Florida government in sunshine law has bestowed on the people of our state.

Once there he became "very disturbed by the great amount of public business being conducted behind closed doors and by the attitude of secrecy I've seen in our federal government agencies."

A legislator of action, the Lakeland Democrat prepared the act which is now before the Senate and bolstered its presentation with a quotation from the famed Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis who wrote, in 1913:

"Publicity is justly commended as a remedy for social and industrial disease. Sunlight is said to be the best disinfectant and electric light the most efficient policeman."



Students Must Prove Need Of Aid

Copley News Service WASHINGTON -College students who want to " study now, pay later" are now subject to intensive examinations of

their family incomes. Uncle Sam is trying to make sure that students applying for an interest-free, U. S. - backed loan to finance their education do indeed come from needy backgrounds.

The means test, incorporated by Congress in the omnibus education bill signed into law by President Nixon on June 23, is likely to result in a substantial reduction in the number of students qualifing for such government subsidies, according

to officials of the U.S. Office of Education. Students from middle-income families attending lowertuition public colleges, universities and two-year institutions will be hardest hit.

In the past, about 96 per cent of students applying for the federally subsidized loans received them, after showing only their adjusted family income was less than \$15,000. This family financial disclosure amounted to a simple formula computation of gross income, minus the 10 per cent standard income-tax deduction and allowable exemptions. Under the new regulations, families will have to complete a detailed financial statement with loan officers at the in-

stitutions their children attend. The statement requires disclosure of all family income, debts and liabilities, and assets such as automobiles, mortgage equity, life insurance, stock income, savings and other investments. Businessmen will have to fill out a separate form detailing their business income.

College loan officers, who will be faced with an unprecedented amount of paper work which could delay the approval of students' loans, will have the power to decide whether a student has demonstrated the financial need required for an interest-free government loan.

The college official will certify the student for a subsidized loan from a bank which then actually makes the government-guaranteed loan.

For a student borrowing \$1,000 a year for four years of college, the "free interest" picked up by the government during a college career and for up to a year afterward could equal nearly \$1,000 at 7 per cent interest.

A two-year study by the Department of Transportation's Highway Safety Administration has given the Corvair a clean bill of health, calling the compact car no more unstable than other automobiles of the same year and

Ralph Nader, who first pointed the finger at the Corvair's alleged readiness to roll over (specifically, the 1960-63 models), has branded the report "a shoddy, internally contradictory whitewash."

Be that as it may, it is interesting to speculate on how different a lot of things might be today had the official study been available five or six years ago. It was the Corvair controversy, it will be remembered

that launched Nader on his career as the nation's leading consumer advocate. Since then, he and the hosts he has nspired have crusaded for better safety and better products in everything from gas pipelines to dams in California to phosphates in detergents. The Highway Safety Administration itself is a creation of this period.

Not only the consumer movement but aroused public concern over ecology, environment, pollution and population and disenchantment with big corporations have come into their own in just the past few years.
