Infantile Paralysis

Although so far there has not been a single case of infantile paralysis reported in Seminole County, and there is hope in the surrounding counties so far as we know except possibly in Broward where two or three cases have been reported, there is enough of it in certain other parts of the state to approach epidemic proportions and to warrant the utmost precautions everywhere against its introduction.

The proper time to prevent an epidemic is before it gets started, and with that in mind, The Herald urges all public officials, civic organizations, businessmen and housekeepers to do their utmost toward eliminating those conditions which are thought to be most favorable for the spread of the disease. No one knows exactly how infantile paralysis is carried, but there is strong reason to believe that dirt and filth have a great deal to do with it.

What is needed is a good thorough clean-up campaign so that the disease cannot get started here. Rats and mice, roaches, flies, gnats and mosquitoes, should be absolutely eradicated, not only in the downtown districts but everywhere in the county. Chicken yards should be sprayed with insecticides and bar yards, manure piles and trash piles either sprayed with DDT or burned up. Garbage piles should be sprayed and all screens repaired.

Restaurants and food establishments of all kinds should be particularly careful. Fruits and vegetables should be kept carefully screened and flies that get into them should be immediately eliminated. Sanitary inspectors should exercise the utmost vigilance and be hard-boiled about it. The practice of leaving food exposed to roaches, washing dishes in cold or dirty water, picking up food that has fallen on the floor and serving it to customers should be stopped.

Housekeepers themselves can go a long way toward keeping infantile paralysis away from their own families by the immediate elimination of sanitary inspectors. They should exercise the utmost vigilance and be hard-boiled about it. The practice of leaving food exposed to roaches, washing dishes in cold or dirty water, picking up food that has fallen on the floor and serving it to customers should be stopped.

These things everyone of us can do. And doing them will help to keep the disease away from our families and the public at large. We can keep infantile paralysis out of Seminole County by using our heads. And it is a lot better to be safe than sorry.

Half of Race Track Monies Given Schools

Action By Seminole Commissioners To Give Every County Teacher \$200 Raise

The Board of County Commissioners this morning added \$200 a year to the salary of each teacher in Seminole County, white and colored, by allocating the portion of race track funds totaling \$32,000 or more to school use.

This action was in the form of a motion by Commissioner H. B. Pope that the school board be given half of the race track fund, after \$32,000 already budgeted for other use, has been deducted. An amendment by J. McClelland, that following this, 50 percent of the race track monies to schools every year was approved.

The action of the Board was roundly applauded by a 15 member delegation of women, parents and mothers representing the Seminole County Council of Parent Teachers, pointing out that the raising of county funds for the school system is one of the most important of the county's duties.

S. Supt. T. W. Lawton, in appealing for the increase, pointed out that at least 16 other counties in the state were sharing race track funds with the schools. He also declared that this allocation of funds would release other school money for repair of school buildings and school buses, and would eliminate the need of raising the school millage rate.


