CENSORSHIP OF LITERATURE IS HIT BY SOLONS

Senator Cutting Seeks To Have Authority Taken Out Of Hands Of Customs Service

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—(INS)—The power of the federal government to censor literature, to bar the ancient classics and to excise works of art—all because some minor official deems them obscene—will be tested in the Senate today by a vote on the Cutting proposal to strip the customs service of all censoring authority.

Senator Cutting (R) of New Mexico, a Harvard graduate, a philologist and scholar, introduced the bill today by proposing a ban on all censoring through an amendment to the pending tariff bill. All duties on rates and tariff duties were introduced with the Senate in a legal, interesting discussion of the classic obscenity literature and the government's method of censoring.

Administration leaders were annoyed by the trend of it, since it further delayed action on the tariff bill. They were hopeful of completing final action on all administrative features during the only session of the tariff bill which will be considered by the Senate.

Woman's Missionary Society

Sanford Auxiliary

In 1872 a Charter was granted to the Town of Sanford, situated on the south shore of beautiful Lake Monroe, which is the terminal of navigation of the St. Johns River.

Perhaps no City in Central Florida has had more interesting events connected with history than Sanford.

But as we are to deal directly with events relative to the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, we will center this account closely with events concerning the church and this organization.

Our first scene of the Methodist church gathered from records of memory is a little frame building known as Earnest Chapel, which had taken the place of a log church built some time after the Seminole Indian War on Melville Avenue two miles south of Sanford.

The Methodist people of this section had membership there.

In 1860 there came a distinguished personage, Judge J. Tucker, having been lured to this town by reports of the wonderful possibilities which it afforded for development. He purchased a tract of land and built the first home in Sanford, and immediately began to give of himself in establishing community life.

In 1871 General Henry S. Sanford former minister to Belgium and a financier of prominence was sent here by an American Company, who was interested in Melvilleville, which is now a beautiful suburb of Sanford.

Meeting Judge Tucker they worked together in building the town. It was under the supervision of General Sanford the town was laid out.

In 1877 a name for the little town of village as it was at that time, had to be decided upon. The matter was left with the Judge's daughter, who should be Sanford, Miss Louise Tucker is well known throughout the Woman's Missionary Society of the Florida Conference as Mrs. Lula Tucker Phillips.

At a date not definitely known prior to 1882, Dr. A. E. history and the W. M. S. A man whose noble Christian character stood out in his every movement of community life. He often conducted the Sunday Morning Services. The majority of his converts, laymen, lay-wives, members of the church today.

At a date not definitely known he was elected a delegate to represent the Southern Methodist Church at Ecumenical Conference in London. Upon his return he gave interesting lectures of his trip to the home folks, showing a collection of curios from England. The first school in Sanford was taught by his widowed daughter-in-law. Hallowed are the memories that surround this home of those pioneer days, a man that build well for eternity. "He being dead yet speaketh."

In the winter of 1877 and 1878 Judge Tucker received a letter from his friend Bishop W. D. Wightman, telling him of the new movement of the women's society in which his wife was especially interested and active, asking about the possibilities of such an organization in Sanford. This letter brought about a correspondence with Mrs. H. C. McGovern.

Here we approach hallowed ground on which began the work of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Florida Conference. A few days prior to March 11th, 1878 was an interesting and busy time with Mrs. Tucker, and six other women in Sanford, whose names we are unable to recall. They were to accompany her to Jacksonville on the St. Johns River boat to meet Mrs. McGovern and lay the women of St. Paul Church in South Jacksonville, for the purpose of being organized into a Foreign Missionary Society. Little did Mrs. Tucker or her sister associate know the place this event was to have in the history of the woman's work of Florida Methodism. St. Paul's Church furnished the other seven of the fourteen women that composed the membership of the First Society of the Florida Conference. Very soon this society was divided and Mrs. J. W. Perry Tucker became the president of the Sanford society. This society of Methodism in Sanford not only had an important place in the building at home, but was a part of the body of women in the church who were the first to answer in obedience to the command "Go ye into the world and preach the Gospel, beginning at Jerusalem."

Because Bishop Wightman has a place in our history it will be interesting to recall here his visit to Sanford in 1881 in his proceedings with the present relative to our organization.

The Bishop arrived in Sanford on Saturday and was entertained at the Tucker home. Rev. C. A. Saunders, preacher in charge in this and early meetings, Young Men's Social Organization and Woman's Aid Society and Missionary Society constituted the church activity of the early period. A platform, a table, table and a small organ cost Mrs. C. H. Leffer several hundred dollars. Mr. J. W. Woodcock, Mr. C. M. Martin, Mr. C. E. Perry, Mr. S. A. Summers, Mrs. A. S. Going back to 1882 we see Sanford a prosperous thriving town growing westward. First Street developing into business section, Palmetto, Magnolia, Park and Oak Avenue were prominent residential streets. Other churches were built on Park Avenue. To keep pace with progress a better Methodist Church was needed hence the purchase of the corner of Fifth Street and Park Avenue, and under the careful supervision of Dr. T. W. Moore, the church building was moved from the corner of Sanford Avenue and Sixth Street to the corner of Park Avenue and Fifth Street. In this period a paragon was named and built, the church much remodeled and additions made. The Aid Society found so much to occupy their attention at home. The pledge to the foreign work in the Missionary Society grew slowly, but was never neglected and interest grew as time went on.

Between the years of 1898 and 1906 we are unable to give accurate periods of administration, however the best estimate is Mrs. C. G. Evans, succeeded Mrs. J. E. Early, Mrs. M. Evans, Mrs. J. K. Whitsona and Mrs. D. C. Wagoner were the next in order of succession.

In 1906 the Home Missionary Society was organized under the supervision of Mrs. H. V. Perry, State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. J. K. Mettinger who had been many years of service in the Aid Society and General Activities of the Church was elected President, others who had served in the past were Mrs. W. C. Perry, Mrs. J. E. Early, Mrs. M. Evans, Mrs. J. K. Whitsona and Mrs. D. C. Wagoner.

In 1911 Mrs. H. V. Perry, who was president of the Foreign Missionary Society, Mrs. Perry's coming added much strength to the work that was so well established. Mrs. Lula Tucker Phillips, who served as Secretary of the Conference found time to contribute much to the work of the local Auxiliary in the middle year of its history and as long as she lived in Sanford.

Mrs. Tucker Phillips was elected as president of the Foreign Missionary Society in 1911. She served in this position until her death in 1917. During her term she was a most efficient leader who would lead the work of the church in Sanford.

This brings our history to the date of the consolidation of the two Societies.

In 1911 Mrs. H. V. Perry, president of the Foreign Missionary Society, Mrs. M. E. Mettinger, Secretary of the Florida Conference, December 12th, for the purpose of uniting the organizations. Mrs. Lula Tucker Phillips was made Chairman of the meeting. Mrs. H. V. Perry was elected Secretary and Mrs. S. A. Summers was elected Treasurer. A roll call of officers was elected the meeting closed with singing, "Hail to the Tie That Binds."

The records show that with the United Society has become a period of marked advancement, in the work of both local and foreign work. Mission Study took a definite part in the life of the Society under the leadership of Mrs. H. V. Perry, who was president of the organization for many years. Sanford now was quite a city and the church membership was growing rapidly. The need of a new church became a subject of much discussion. A meeting was held in the home of the Missionary Society, Rev. H. T. Gaines, preacher in charge, presented the subject of a new church, and requested the Missionary Society members to take steps to acquire interest. It was felt that the women could contribute the most to the building of a new church. It took one year for the temperature to rise. The church was built during the year 1914. The last service was held in the old frame church, and moved to the new church, and named in the memory of the old members.

The old church gave place to the present brick building which was built during the four years pastorate of Rev. E. E. Stoney. All the while the Missionary spirit was growing stronger in the woman's work, and heavier were their obligations at home. Many, many were the calls from Conference, there were demands that were brought about by the war. But the women in Sanford Church kept step and march.

It will not be a digression to relate how the first service held in the new church since it was organized. Mrs. J. E. Early, who had been the builder of the church, had ceased for some weeks, the President of the Missionary Society, Mrs. C. G. Evans, asked the contractor, Mr. Shindler, to put some leading nails in the wall, so that a meeting of the Society could be held, to make plans to

the money to furnish the church. The World War was on and conditions trying in financial.

On a hot afternoon in August, thirty-three women united their voices in song and prayer and efforts in a meeting which had a part in the continuation of the work on the church six months later. The Society took the responsibility of the past, the electric light and heating system and had part in purchasing several windows, at the same time caring for the paragon. While busy at home the connection work was never neglected. During this period many new members came into the church and many went away. Mrs. A. A. Shirine, her sister, Miss Jimmie Glass, Mrs. E. W. Peabody, Mrs. J. E. Perry, Mrs. H. V. Perry, Mrs. Alma Shindler, Mrs. M. H. Bowler and Mrs. W. A. Zachary, finished their mission and joined others of our members in that land of pure delight.

We will now here an expression of devotion, a request of \$100.00 left to the Woman's Missionary Society by Mrs. Jimmie Glass, the collection of Memorial Windows in the new Church is one to the memory of Mrs. Glass, placed by the Missionary Society with funds from the local treasury.

Mrs. H. H. Chappell's six years administration fills an important period in our history. She was succeeded by Mrs. P. M. Elder, a daughter of Mrs. C. G. Evans, whose name appears as President in the earlier period of the Society's history. Mrs. J. D. Parker was next in line in President. During Mrs. Parker's administration the paragon was remodeled and the Society re-organized.

Mrs. A. Kelly was elected to bear the standard and responsibility of President in 1922. A note of \$200.00 on the organ was defrayed during her term of office. During her second year the Society entered the Florida Conference. The year 1924 was distinguished by Mrs. G. W. Spence, who was elected as President of the Florida Conference. 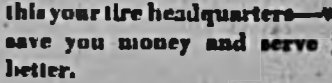
