British Blast German Steel Center At Saar

Lose Nine Planes; Goebbels Warns Allies Against Second Front Try

British warplanes attacked Germany last night for the seventh time in 10 nights, heavily pounding the big steel manufacturing center of Saarbrücken in the Saar valley coal fields. Nine RAF planes were missing.

German night raiders countered with widely separated attacks on the British Isles, dropping a few bombs on greater London for the first time since June 3, and striking at Birmingham and East Angles. Seven German raiders were shot down.

Death Of Convict Is Reported In Investigation

TALLAHASSEE, July 30. (AP)—State investigation of the self-murdering of 13 white convicts reported yesterday for the first time publicly, that another prisoner died two years ago after being beaten by a guard in the same camp.

State Atty. Gen. Burton reported the prisoner who died was John McAuliffe, but did not disclose the name of the guard. McAuliffe died at the State prison hospital March 25, 1940, after being transferred there from State Road Department camp No. 33, then located in Highlands County, suffering from pneumonia, the physician's report said, and an autopsy disclosed that he had two broken ribs, a fractured vertebra and internal injuries.

Dodgers Wade Into Cooper To Down Cardinals

Triumph 4 to 3 In Seven Inning Game; Wyatt Is Winner

BROOKLYN, July 26, (AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers waded into East Cooper with six timely hits last night to beat the St. Louis Cardinals 4 to 3 before the game was halted in the last of the seventh inning by wartime direct regulations.

It was the first game in the major leagues to run afoul of the direct regulations which forbid floodlights being on more than one hour after sundown in this area.

Whether the shortening of the contest affected the final score was, of course, a matter of conjecture.

The Cardinals threatened repeatedly to break out of Whitlow Wyatt's control. They scored two runs in the seventh and had the bases loaded when the rally died. But Wyatt, by winning his 18th game against three defeats, proved equal to every occasion including his first turn at bat in the third inning when he singled Brooklyn's first run across.

Tom Blalock, who had a perfect night at the plate, hit his sixth home run in the first inning to give St. Louis a temporary lead.

When in the third Mickey Oswald set with the first hit of Cooper, a single, and was sacrificed to second ahead of Wyatt's blow.

In the fourth Joe Medwick scored an earlier two were out by Harold Kuroski and Owen Walker to lead the bases. Pee Wee Reese hit the first pitch for a two-run single to left.

What proved to be the deciding run came in the fifth when Dixie Walker doubled and raced home as Medwick beat out an infield hit and first baseman Ray Sanders let Willey Kurzwahl's throw get through him.

BOSTON, July 26, (AP)—The Pittsburgh Pirates and the Boston Braves split a double-header yesterday, the Pirates taking the opener, 2-0, behind the five-hit pitching of Truett Swartzell, after which Jim Tobin hurled the Braves to a 5-3 triumph in the nightcap.

In the first game the Pirates defeated the Braves 2-0 in the eighth inning. Truett Swartzell pitched for the opener, when they put over their initial run on singles by Frankie Gustine and Ed Stawick and Pete Concatori's sacrifice.

Concatori doubled against Wilford Donovan with two Pirates aboard in the ninth for two runs. The Braves came from behind in the sixth, threw wild and Stutz raced in from second base with the deciding run.

Between games Paul Waner, who spent 15 of his 17 major league seasons with the Pirates, was presented a plaque by the National League to commemorate his 20,000th hit, which he gained on June 20.

CHICAGO, July 26, (AP)—The Chicago White Sox defeated the New York Yankees twice last evening, during a twilight game by 2 to 1 in 11 innings and then again by night, 7 to 5.

Sam West won the first game for the Sox almost singlehandedly when he drove in four of the six Chicago runs. He doubled in the ninth with two on to tie the score and then singled in the 11th with Wally Moses on second to give the Sox the winning run.

Both teams made 10 hits in the twilight game and they each made 10 more in the night contest.

The Sox knocked Atley Donald out in the ninth inning of the opener and scored the winning run off Johnny Murphy. Joe Haynes was the winning pitcher for the Sox in the twilight game.

NEW YORK, July 26, (AP)—The Chicago Cubs gave Van Lige Mungo a rather rude welcome back into the National League yesterday, but the New York Giants retaliated for their 4-3 setback in the opening game of a double-header by winning the nightcap 3-1.

The Giants made ten off Mungo, but trailed from the first inning when the Brooklyn pitcher threw a long ball to Lonnie Stripling and Lou Newhart's single.

U. S. Troops In Australia Get American Foods

SOMEWHERE IN AUSTRALIA, July 20. —(WV)—The eating habits of Uncle Sam's soldiers in Australia have undergone only slight revisions despite the long distance from home, and they still rank among the best fed troops in the world.

They still get their roast beef and pork and in quantities greater than the Australians would care to eat them. There is plenty of sugar and butter.

The variety of sweets has been reduced and they find mutton on the table oftener than at home. It is necessary to import such items as coffee, tea, cocoa and canned fish, but they get them.

Due to problems of transportation and the limited facilities of the country, it has been necessary to modify the soldier's ration issue from his American scale to fit in, as far as possible with local conditions.

Here is a comparison of typical menus for an American soldier at home and in Australia:

Breakfast: In Australia French toast, butter, coffee, coffee and fresh milk. At home—fresh apples, oatmeal, scrambled eggs with minced onion, toast, fresh milk and coffee with canned milk and sugar.







Court Rules Against Plea Of Saboteurs

Trial Of Alleged Nazis By Military Commission Legal, Stone Announces

WASHINGTON, July 31. (AP)—Seven alleged Nazi saboteurs lost today in their effort to escape the jurisdiction of President Roosevelt's military commission by appeal to the Supreme Court. Chief Justice Stone announced the court denied the prisoners' motion to file habeas corpus writs. The court held the military commission is lawfully constituted and that the charges allege an offense on which the President was authorized to order trial before a military commission and that the prisoners are held in lawful custody. The commission resumed the trial, after a recess, several hours before the court decided.

The Supreme Court's decision may have an important bearing on the President's war-time powers not only as they affect the case at hand, but the degree in which he may control wages, prices and other important phases of national life. Atty. Gen. Francis Biddle also filed this yesterday in arguing against the prisoners' petition. He said the government is interested in the Supreme Court sustaining the full power of the President in war. Biddle held that the President has "absolute authority" over the trials and ordered all defense attorneys to be removed from the case. After rebuttal by defense counsel the court concluded the hearing of the nine justices formally went into conference. Justice Brandeis has dissented, but because of his connection with the army, he is not a member of the majority.

Several New Schemes Racketeers Use To Fleec Public Are Listed

Warning against the many fraudulent schemes being operated by racketeers, a B. Petersen, defense Council co-ordinator, today revealed a list of tricky rackets being used to defraud the public. The schemes are described in a bulletin issued by the defense Council. Explaining that swindlers and "grift artists" usually formulate their schemes on things in which the public is particularly interested, it was reported the nation now is overrun with swindlers. Hitler Declares Invaders Have Thrust Below Don River

(By Associated Press) Six Axis bombers raided Alexandria last night killing four persons and injuring 12, and causing slight damage to property.

LONDON, July 31. (AP)—The quickest success of the British and American offensive in this theater of war and the constant conference of Allied war leaders were viewed here today as indications that the Russians have made it plain they think the time is ripe for a diversionary action against the Germans in western Europe.

Armored trains of the Red army rolled into the shell-ton steppe of the Don bend today, hurrying fresh reinforcements into the flaming battle for the defenders who already are reported to be checking the German onslaught east of Stalingrad. The situation here, however, remains critical.

Rallying Soviet armies, fighting under the slogan "Die, but don't retreat," threw back the Germans in some sectors of the Don bend 80 miles northwest of Stalingrad today, but in the Caucasus situation, the Red's plight grew ever more critical.

Hitler's headquarters declared German, Rumanian and Slovak troops driving toward the Caucasus oil fields, already have thrust 112 miles below the Don, and the Russians acknowledged German advances in this theater.

Strong Soviet attacks were acknowledged to the north around Rubezh, 130 miles northwest of Moscow, on the Volkhov front and outside of Leningrad. In the battle of the Don River bend, the Russians said they turned a novel "flying wedge" attack by massed German infantry walled by tanks into a death trap for the Nazis.

At Voronezh on the German main flank, too, the Germans pushed up new positions in the course of bitter fighting, but south of Rubezh, a Soviet counter-offensive had beaten back a German attack that had driven a wedge of tanks and infantry into a large number of German armaments, including the slaughter of 1,500 men and destruction of 40 tanks and 15 airplanes.

From the Caucasus, reports of German and Slovak advances in the Talmynskaya area, where the Germans first Spring offensive crossed the Don, however, the Russians said they were counter-attacking and had driven a wedge of tanks and infantry into a large number of German armaments, including the slaughter of 1,500 men and destruction of 40 tanks and 15 airplanes.

Front line dispatches broadcast on the Moscow radio gave a more graphic description of a breeding two-day battle.
