British Blast German Steel Center At Saar

Lose Nine Planes; Foe Counters With Raids Over Isles; Greater London Hit

British warplanes attacked Germany last night for the seventh day in 10 nights, heavily pounding the big steel manufacturing center of Saarbrücken in the Saar valley coal fields. Nine RAF planes were missing.

German night raiders countered with widely separated attacks on the British Isles, dropping a few bombs on greater London for the first time since June 3, and striking at Birmingham and East Angles. Seven German raiders were shot down.

RAF fighters were active in the night sky over the Channel, and a few were seen over the coast of France. The RAF reported that it had shot down a German bomber over the Channel.

Between July 11 and 28, it was revealed, 23 separate fighter attacks were carried out, in which 16 locomotives, 3 destroyed, 11 freight trains damaged and halted, 20 river barges damaged and numerous freight yards, stations, bridges and canal docks riddled with gunfire. In one raid 11 Spitfires located nine stationary locomotives and knocked over one of them out of action. Heavy damage was caused by the fighter raids, sometimes by traffic on main lines for 24 hours, and bullet holes in locomotive boilers usually cause explosions that rupture the engines. One RAF squadron alone has damaged or destroyed 50 locomotives in six weeks.

Death Of Convict Is Reported In Investigation

TALLAHASSEE, July 30. (AP) State investigation of the self-maiming of 13 white convicts revealed yesterday for the first time publicly that another prisoner died two years ago after being beaten by a guard in the same camp.

State Atty. Gen. Burton reported the prisoner who died was John McLaughlin, but did not disclose the name of the guard.

McLaughlin died at the State prison hospital March 25, 1940, after being transferred there from State Road Department camp No. 33, then located in Highlands County, and suffering from pneumonia, the physician's report said, and an autopsy disclosed that he had two broken ribs, a fractured vertebra and internal injuries.

State Atty. Gen. Burton informed Gov. Spessard L. Holland yesterday that he would present the McLaughlin death case to a special Highlands County grand jury called for Aug. 8.

Burton turned up the death of McLaughlin in investigating why 13 convicts cut their heel-strings at camp 33 during the past two months in protest of what they charged was brutal treatment by camp officials.

He said he would prosecute J. R. Nabbs, camp foreman named in affidavits by the prisoners, for beating a convict named Lawrence Weaver during last March. Weaver was one of the convicts who mutilated themselves and tried to be transferred to the State prison hospital for treatment. They were not permanently injured.

U. S. Troops In Australia Get American Foods

SOMEWHERE IN AUSTRALIA, July 20. —(WW)—The eating habits of Uncle Sam's soldiers in Australia have undergone only slight revisions despite the long distance from home, and they still rank among the best fed troops in the world.

They still get their roast beef and pork, and in quantities greater than the Australians would care to eat them. There is plenty of sugar and butter.

The variety of sweets has been reduced and they find mutton on the table oftener than at home. It is necessary to import such items as coffee, tea, cocoa and canned fish, but they get them.

Due to problems of transportation and the limited facilities of the country, it has been necessary to modify the soldier's ration issue from his American scale to fit in, as far as possible with local conditions.

Here is a comparison of typical menus for an American soldier at home and in Australia:

Breakfast: In Australia: French toast, butter, syrup, coffee and fresh milk. At home: fresh apples, oatmeal, scrambled eggs with minced bacon, toast, fresh milk and coffee with canned milk and sugar.

Repercussions Over "Little Steel" WLB Decision Are Seen By Grover

By JOHN GROVER
WASHINGTON, July 26, (W) — Official Washington is in a state of speculation over the repercussions from the "Little Steel" decision of the War Labor Board, granting 150,000 steelworkers a 44-cent daily wage boost.

In effect, the decision lays down a formula that steel workers deserve a 15 percent pay hike because the cost of living increased 15 percent since January, 1941.

Most important question left unanswered by the decision is: will the 15 percent increase be applied generally in all future wage disputes, certified to the War Labor Board?

The board has indicated that all cases will be considered individually, and that no blanket formula will be applied. However, from a practical standpoint, it will be difficult to discount that decision in adjusting future

wage disputes, as the 15 percent living cost increase is general over the whole country in industrial areas.

Labor was quick to seize on this entering wedge for general wage increases. Philip Murray, CIO president, announced that renegotiation of "Big Steel" wages, affecting 400,000 more steelworkers, on the basis of the 15 percent boost, was immediately contemplated.

Consensus of the ablest analysts is that organized labor generally will seek to ride the cost-of-living escalator under the formula laid down in the "Little Steel" case.

GAINESVILLE, July 26, (Special)—Increased use of fuel wood from farm woodlands will help to release ships and railroad cars for transporting war materials, according to L. T. Nield, farm forester with the State Agricultural Extension Service.

Farm woodland owners can assist in saving this transportation space by using fuel wood on the farm wherever feasible in place of coal and oil, and by supplying wood for similar use in towns and cities nearby.

Foresters advocate fuel-wood cutting according to plan to correct poor forest conditions resulting from mistakes of the past. Fuel wood can be obtained from misshapen trees, dead and insect-ridden trees, and other cut trees from tops of trees cut for saw logs; and from suppressed or unthrifty trees cut in thinning or woodland improvement operations.

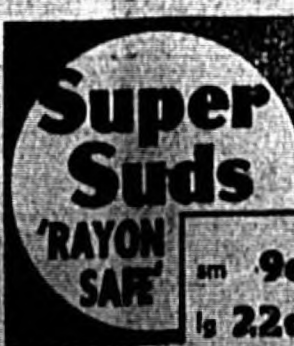

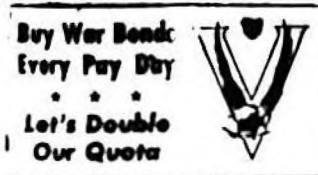

9 Jap Planes Are Smashed In Fight Over Port Darwin

U.S. Airmen In China Hit 7, 400,000 Said In Chukuo

In Australia, MacArthur's headquarters reported the biggest outburst of aerial warfare since the Coral Sea battle with American airmen destroying nine of the 49 Japanese raiders over Port Darwin, setting another enemy transport aflame off New Guinea and shooting up the transport's destroyer escort.

In China, Stilwell's headquarters reported the Japanese lost four bombers and three new fighters in the run down of 30 Japanese fighters when they attempted a raid on Kunming yesterday.

British military declared today Japan has massed nearly 500,000 troops in Manchukuo opposite the 1,000-mile Soviet frontier and said "There is little doubt they are planning to attack."

They predicted the Japanese would make at least three drives in an attempt to isolate the Siberian part of Vladivostok, only 700 miles across the sea of Japan from Tokyo.

At Kowloon, Chinese official declared some weeks have passed since the Japanese were finally suffering large reinforcements, some of them from Burma, the Philippines, Formosa, and other Chinese provinces.

They disclosed that the Japanese had massed some 500,000 troops in Manchukuo and that they were planning to attack.

A spokesman gave the number of divisions in China proper as 11, and said that roughly 50 divisions were in the Philippines, Netherlands East Indies, Malaya, Burma, Thailand and French Indo-China.

He said 12-15 divisions not located specifically in the Pacific were presumed to be stationed in Japan proper and Formosa.

Nazi Submarine Sinks Ship And Seizes Captain

The capture of an American ship by a German submarine was reported today by the United States Navy. The ship, the USS *Albatross*, was sunk off the coast of the Azores, and its captain, Lt. John W. Smith, was taken aboard the submarine.

The capture of the *Albatross* was the first time since the outbreak of the war that a United States ship has been captured by a German submarine.

The *Albatross* was a minesweeper and was on a mission to sweep the mines off the coast of the Azores.

Court Rules Against Plea Of Saboteurs

Trial Of Alleged Nazis By Military Commission Legal, Stone Announces

WASHINGTON, July 31. (AP)—Seven alleged Nazi saboteurs lost today in their effort to escape the jurisdiction of President Roosevelt's military commission by appeal to the Supreme Court. Chief Justice Stone announced the court denied the prisoners' motions to file habeas corpus writs.

The court held the military commission is lawfully constituted and that the charges against the prisoners are valid. The President was authorized to order trial before a military commission, and that the prisoners are held in lawful custody.

The Supreme Court's decision may have an important bearing on the President's war-time powers, not only as they affect the case at hand, but the degree in which he may control wages, prices and other important phases of national life.

Atty. Gen. Francis Biddle also said yesterday in arguing against the prisoners' petition. He said the government is interested in the Supreme Court sustaining the built-in power of the President in war.

Biddle held that the President has "absolute authority" in military trials and denied all defense arguments that the prisoners were entitled to civil processes.

After rebuttal by defense counsel, the court concluded the hearing of the nine Justices promptly went into conference. Justice Brandeis has dissented, but because of his connection with the army, he is a lieutenant colonel.

Newman Wins Naval Rating In Examination

Robbie Newman has won his rating as Signalman 3rd Class Petty Officer by finishing among the first 15 of 300 men taking examinations at the United States Navy Signal School at Orlando, Fla.

Petty Officer Newman, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. A. Newman, completed the regular four-month course in three months. He has left for active duty aboard ship with destination unknown.

Young Newman was graduated from Seminole High School and attended the University of Florida. While in school he was active in athletics, participating in football and being a member of his high school basketball team.

He was an ardent hunter and angler. Prior to his enlistment in the Navy in January he was engaged in the hardware business with his father.

Five alleged bootleggers, three white and two colored men, were rounded up by a state and two Federal revenue agents last night along with nineteen 50-gallon barrels of moonshine. Percy Mero, state revenue agent, stated this afternoon.

The raid on the big still took place about a mile and a half from Oviedo in the direction of Gaines, he said. The agents met no resistance while making the arrests. The five men, one of whom has been an inmate of Raiford, were booked at the City Police Station at 11 o'clock last night and were held without bond. They are William A. Livings, a Driggers, and the two negroes, Roy Guice, alias "Thirty-one," and Wiley Robinson. The three white men were charged with making illegal liquor, while the negroes face an investigation on a bootlegging charge.

There are several others that have installed fixtures and will be completed and be using the same method for sterilization.

This is the most modern up-to-date manner of sterilization and great credit should be given to Mr. Rogers for securing these additions to the fountain. The drug stores and other places serving cold drinks are co-operating to the fullest extent in the work and should be congratulated. These fixtures have been installed in several cold drink stands in the county."

Central Florida Has Bootlegging Increase

OCALA, July 31. (AP)—Federal and State officers here today reported an increase in bootlegging, despite the problems rationing of liquor. The increase is being reported in rural sections of Central Florida, where many bootleggers are using honey successfully as a substitute for sugar, the officers reported. Syrup also is being used, they added, but the resulting product generally is considered inferior to liquor made with honey.

The price of honey has risen steadily during the past year and the grade that formerly sold for 35 cents a gallon now brings 45 cents.

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Hitler Declares Invaders Have Thrust Columns 112 Miles Below Don River

(By Associated Press) Six Axis bombers raided Alexandria last night killing four persons and injuring 12, and causing slight damage to property.

LONDON, July 31. (AP)—The quickened pace of the British and American offensive in this theater of war and the constant conferences of Allied war leaders were viewed here today as indications that the Russians have made it plain they think the time is ripe for a diversionary action against the Germans in western Europe.

Armored trains of the Red army rolled into the shell-toned steps of the Don bend today, hurling fresh reinforcements into the flaming battle for the defenders who already are reported to be checking the German onslaught east of Stalingrad. The situation below the Don, however, remained critical.

Rallying Soviet armies, fighting under the slogan "Die, but don't retreat," threw back the Germans in some sectors of the Don River bend 80 miles northwest of Stalingrad today, but in the Caucasian situation, the Red's plight grew ever more critical.

Hitler's headquarters declared German, Rumanian and Slovak troops, driving toward the Caucasus oil fields, already have swept ahead 112 miles below the Don, and the Russians acknowledged German advances in this theater.

Strong Soviet attacks were acknowledged to the north around Rostov, 130 miles northwest of Moscow, on the Volkhov front and outside of Leningrad. In the battle of the Don River bend, the Russians said they turned a novel "flying wedge" attack by massed German infantry, walled by tanks into a death trap for the Nazis.

At Voronezh on the German march down the Don, the Germans gave up new positions in the course of bitter fighting, but south of Rostov, it was admitted that the German arm 220th had been too much and that a further retreat had been forced to southeast of Rostov.

Hitler's orders to his troops, given as the scene of previous fighting in that sector. To the northeast in the Talmynskaya area, where the first Spring offensive was launched, the Russians said they were counter-attacking and had driven a wedge of tanks and infantry into a large area of German armor and infantry, including the slaughter of 1,500 men and destruction of 11 tanks and 15 cars.
