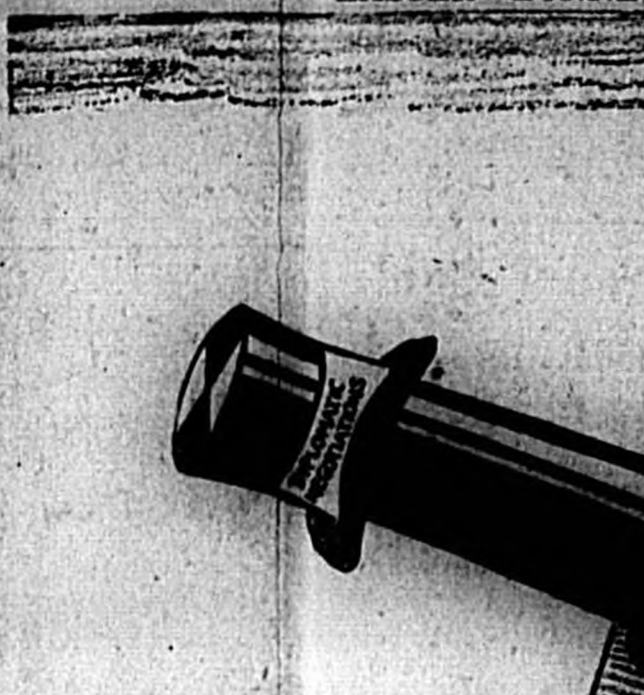

U. S. Navy Is Centering Work On Defense Plans

Main Problem Is How To Protect Vessels From Aerial Bombs

A United States fleet alert to developments in the European war springing ground in preparation to tackle defense problems with which the harassed British navy has had only spotty success.

How to protect costly battle-ships at anchor and safeguard warships and merchantmen from aerial bombs are among outstanding problems certain to figure prominently in the fleet's April-May maneuvers in the Pacific.

An official announcement said that the war which many strategists profess to consider probable in the American fleet would operate from an anchorage in the outposts of Hawaii far more exposed to stealthy submarine attack than Scapa Flow.

The sinking of Britain's Royal Oak has been followed by abandonment of landlocked Scapa Flow as the British fleet's principal North Sea base.

In this country, President Roosevelt asked Congress for more than \$25,000,000 for anti-submarine nets and equipment to protect anchored ships and harbors. An economy-minded House turned down the request on the ground that it was not actually an emergency measure.

It was an acute disappointment to navy men, in the future months, which many strategists profess to consider probable in the American fleet would operate from an anchorage in the outposts of Hawaii far more exposed to stealthy submarine attack than Scapa Flow.

This is Lahina roads, an area only partially protected by the islands of Molokai, Maui and Lanai. When the fleet is in Hawaii in force, as it will be next month, the battleships must anchor there.

Reports of success for German air raiders against North Sea shipping testify to the reality of the new bombing menace to anti-aircraft vessels and the work of American admirals. The United States and Great Britain have parallel problems in this respect also.

The newest American cruisers, which in wartime would convey most of the shipping traffic with anti-aircraft guns of top five-inch caliber and can carry from two to eight defensive planes each. Two new cruisers and a dozen or more new destroyers will operate with the fleet this year for the first time.

Other special naval situations which may well be reflected in the fleet exercises include the peculiar running battle of Germany's "pocket battleship" Admiral Graf Spee with three lighter British cruisers. The American navy had previously been convinced, however, that the possibilities of the Nazi 10,000-ton hybrid were limited.

Differing in several significant particulars from past annual exercises to keep the fleet in fighting trim, the forthcoming maneuvers will be carried out behind heavy secrecy against the background of war in near-by Asia as well as Europe.

Mannerheim Is Mentioned As Finland's Head

HELSINKI, Mar. 15.—(AP)—The important newspaper Uusi Suomi suggested yesterday that Field Marshal Baron Mannerheim assume "direction of the national file in general," as well as continuing as chief of the nation's defense forces.

This was the first public proposal that the field marshal take an active part in governing the republic, but there has been much private talk of this as an emergency measure during the reconstruction period, now that the Finnish-Russian war is ended.

"Nothing in our misfortune could be more desired than that the commanding position of the field marshal would continue, not only in respect to national defense forces but also in direction of the national file in general," the paper said.

"We do not need a dictator but we do need a commander-in-chief who, by the power of his personal qualities, is capable of thrusting aside all political differences and preserving the nation's readiness to sacrifice and its fighting spirit, which in our heavy struggle has come forth and which alone can guarantee realization and success of the gigantic program which lies before us."

The only question was whether the field marshal would accept a broader role than that of commander-in-chief. He has had many opportunities in the past to become active in governing the republic but never would accept.

In the present instance, the question has gone no further than the newspaper suggestion and the government, meanwhile, was busy pushing reconstruction measures.

A new decree provided that all grain above individual requirements must be given to the government with compensation.

The government also announced owners would be reimbursed for all vehicles confiscated for war use.

Big business firms continued to donate large sums to the government for reconstructing the nation's defenses. One firm gave \$170,000.

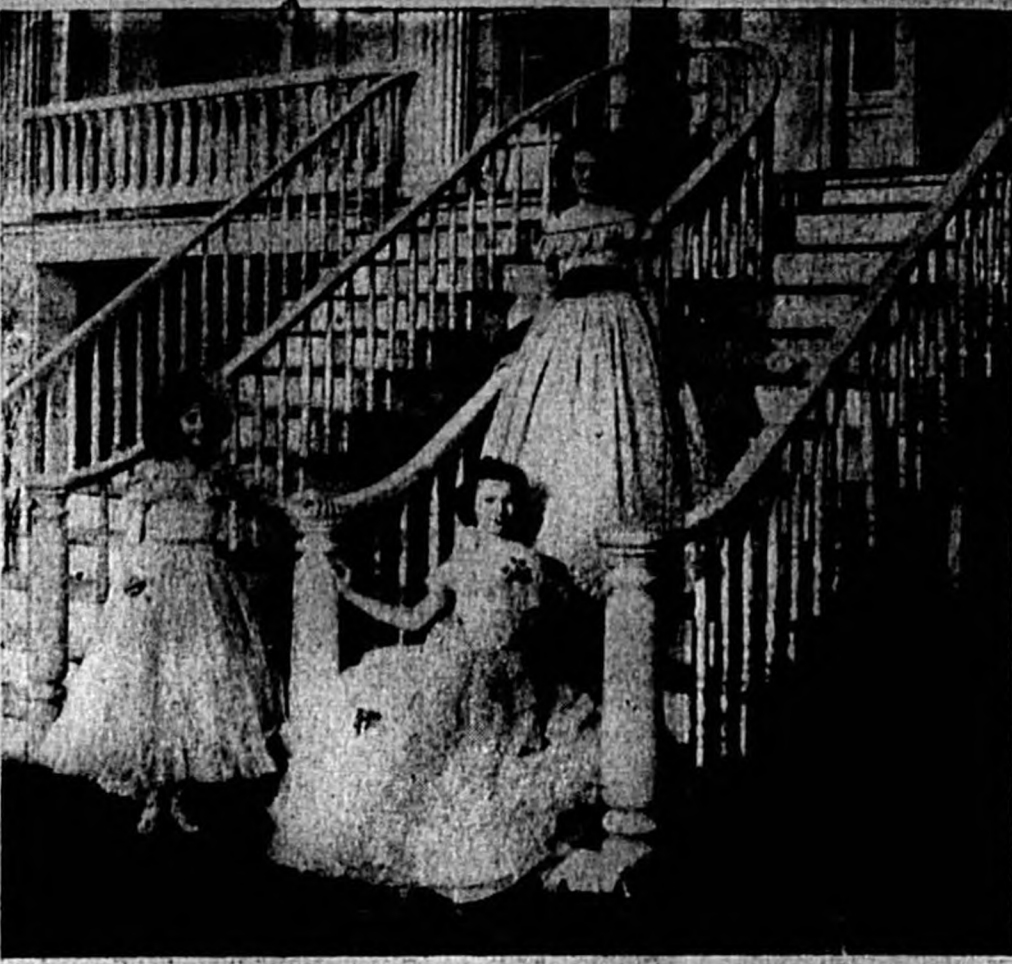

British, Nazis Stage Air Raids On Naval Bases

LONDON, Mar. 15.—British and German air forces exchanged raids on each other's naval units Saturday—the British at Helgoland and the Germans at Scapa Flow—and the Germans, in addition to hitting one warship, as admitted by the British admiral, killed one civilian and wounded seven.

The German raid also inflicted seven casualties among naval personnel of the Orkney islands sea basin.

Britons believed the raids may have been the beginning of the anticipated Springtime upsurge of aerial warfare. The Scapa Flow raids, which saw a rain of bombs on tiny villages around the naval

base, were the occasion of the war's first civilian casualties on British soil and the first time that German bombs were dropped on land objectives in Britain.

(The German version of the Scapa Flow raid is related by pilot officers, saw hits were scored on the British battle cruisers Hood, Repulse and Renown and an unnamed cruiser, as well as two other warships which were less seriously damaged. The Germans said their incendiary bombs set afire one of three British airfields in the Scapa Flow area. They also claimed to have bombed an anti-aircraft emplacement and to have returned to their base without loss of a single one of their approximately 14 planes, though some were slightly damaged.)

Other raids off the east coast of Scotland followed Sunday. A British collier and three trawlers, the latter assisted by pursuit planes, fought off German air attacks, and in another battle British fighters intercepted and drove off four German bombers.

British sources suggested that the Scapa Flow raid may have been in retaliation for a successful British reconnaissance flight over Helgoland night Saturday morning, in which several naval vessels were bombed despite opposition of German ground defenses.

The raid occasioned some surprise, since two weeks ago Winston Churchill, first lord of the Admiralty, announced to Parliament that since the torpedoing of the battleship Royal Oak and loss of 800 officers and men on Oct. 14, the British navy had abandoned the Scapa Flow base.

The attack was preceded by three days of daylight reconnaissance flights over the Scapa Flow area on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. On Saturday night at 7:50 o'clock the raiders appeared. Since October there have been three German air raids on the Shetland Islands to the northeast.

More than 50 high-explosive bombs fell near houses, on farm buildings and along the country roads and hillsides of the west mainland of Orkney in the Scapa Flow raid. Scores of smaller incendiary missiles were dropped, setting fire to grain stacks, barns and a tool store. One incendiary landed on the Quay farm at Stenness, striking the roof of a barn, but did not penetrate.

In addition to 18 high-explosive bombs which fell on Bridge of Walthe, a small village on the shore of Loch Stenness, another 18 were dumped in one area of Stenness.

Other civilians injured included Mrs. E. J. James, Jamieson, and Miss McLeod, and shortly women who collapsed after crawling from the wreckage of her cottage, which was destroyed.

Dictators Hold Talks On Conflict

(Continued From Page One)

Welles began his survey of the European war capital. Britain and France evidenced only guarded reaction. Both Paris and London heard talk of impending changes in their own governments for a more vigorous prosecution of the war.

Though plans of such changes had not crystallized publicly, both Allies were prepared for parliamentary debates on the entire picture of war which brought a heavy German air attack on Britain's Scapa Flow naval anchorage since the week-end and intensified the Western Front fighting.

Acknowledging severity of the raid, Britain said one battleship was damaged, but Germans claimed three battleships, and one cruiser were damaged severely.

French reports described Western Front fighting as involving the largest number of German troops since the war started, and said all thrusts were repulsed with heavy fire.

It was confirmed that the sensational move by the two dictators, each of whom was accompanied by large staffs, was communicated to Welles in advance, probably when the American conferred with Mussolini last night at Palazzo Venezia.

It was reported last night that Welles received from Mussolini last night more detailed and less adamant German peace terms than he was able to obtain in Berlin. These German terms, it was understood, were brought to Rome by Foreign Minister von Ribbentrop.

Welles promptly postponed his departure from Italy for home, scheduled for Tuesday to Wednesday noon and perhaps later. He was to see Pope Pius XII this morning and as peace has been the pontiff's greatest preoccupation since he ascended the throne, it was a foregone conclusion that they would discuss this topic.

Mussolini was accompanied by Foreign Minister Ciano and Ribbentrop was believed to be accompanying Hitler as Berlin reported he had left Berlin for an unannounced destination.

The meeting of the dictators may supply an answer to Welles' three weeks of soundings on whether any real basis for peace in Europe.

There was considerable speculation that Mussolini may be seeking Hitler to communicate to him Welles' reaction to peace conditions which Ribbentrop is reported to have brought to Rome last week. By delaying his sailing, Welles afforded an opportunity possibly of again seeing Mussolini at Genoa.

It was reported that Doctor Mackensen, German ambassador in Rome, had left the city although his destination and time of departure was not known.

Deanite Washington statements that Welles' task merely is to assemble information for the guidance of President Roosevelt and the state department, Europe is convinced his mission has peace as its object.

Washington, Mar. 19.—(AP)—Stephan Early, presidential secretary, said today that on the basis of authoritative reports received by the American government, "peace headlines" which appear to be very empty.
