SKINNER KIDNAPED LAST NIGHT BY 5 MEN

(Continued from Page 1)
The abductors pushed it back and tried to pull him out.
Two of the men had pistols and they began raining blows on Skinner's head. A third man, said to be the leader, had an automobile. Once he was outdoors, Skinner dashed in their attacks. Skinner said, and started down a street lane to the highway, where two cars were parked.
Two of the abductors followed Skinner into the back yard, where he laid in the tall grass. The men failed to find her, and a third man shouted in an angry voice: "What the Hell did you let her get away?" It was said.
Three-quarters of the way down the lane, one of the abductors, according to Skinner, said it wouldn't be safe to get in the cars on the highway and to bring the cars in the lane. Skinner said he gave a quick jerk with both hands and was able to wrench himself free. He started running to his house, but stumbled in his bare feet and fell. One of his assailants fell over him, and as Skinner got up, a second man came up and struck him on his head. He was led to the waiting cars, and a child's overcoat was placed over his head while he laid on the floor of the car.
The two automobiles had gone a short distance, Skinner said, when he heard the whirr of a motorcycle. The motorcycle officer drove alongside the car containing Skinner for a few moments and he called out to the auto driver to stop. When he failed to heed the warning, he said he would shoot Skinner and the car stopped.
The other car, containing three abductors continued on.
"Abductors Brought To Sanford" "What's this all about?" the officer asked the men, Skinner said. "We picked up this man back on the road," one of the men answered.
"They came and got me at my house," Skinner said he told the officer. "What are you doing with that blanket over him?" the county officer asked and he called on the men to hand over their guns. LONDON, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Private advices from Horta, on the island of Fayal, report a heavy earthquake in the Azores. First reports said much damage had been done.
A further report to a London business house from a point three miles outside the town of Horta said there had been an unusually severe quake. It was feared the island has suffered considerably but there was no definite information beyond the fact that the quake had occurred.

RESOLUTION NO. 317 A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE PAVING, RE-PAVING, HARD SURFACING AND RE-HARD SURFACING OF FOURTH STREET FROM LAUREL AVENUE WEST TO CEDAR AVENUE AND CEDAR AVENUE FROM THIRD STREET TO FOURTH STREET, A WIDTH OF 24 FEET.

Whereas, the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, deems it advisable to improve, grade, construct, re-construct, pave and re-pave, a width of 24 feet, with sheet asphalt on a rock base or with other suitable paving material, the following thoroughfares in the City of Sanford, Florida, to-wit:
FOURTH STREET, From Laurel Avenue West to Cedar Avenue and
CEDAR AVENUE, From Third Street to Fourth Street.
All of said improving, grading, construction, re-construction, paving and re-paving to be done in compliance with plans, specifications, profiles and estimates of said proposed improvement of Fourth Street from Laurel Avenue West to Cedar Avenue and Cedar Avenue from Third Street to Fourth Street, now on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Sanford, Florida, which said plans, specifications, profiles and estimates have been heretofore approved by the City Commission and constitute the plans and specifications for said work, therefore,
BE IT RESOLVED, That the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, deems it advisable, as a necessary public improvement, to pave, re-pave, hard surface and re-hard surface with sheet asphalt on a rock base or with other suitable paving material, Fourth Street from Laurel Avenue West to Cedar Avenue and Cedar Avenue from Third Street to Fourth Street, a width of 24 feet; that all of said paving, re-paving, hard surfacing and re-hard surfacing of Fourth Street and Cedar Avenue, as aforesaid, shall be done in strict compliance with the plans, specifications, profiles and estimates therefor, now on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Sanford, Florida, which said plans, specifications, profiles and estimates have been heretofore approved by the City Commission and constitute the plans and specifications for said proposed improvement of Fourth Street between Laurel Avenue and Cedar Avenue and Cedar Avenue between Third Street and Fourth Street, a width of 24 feet, and this Commission hereby declares the necessity for the paving, repaving, hard surfacing and re-hard surfacing of said portion of Fourth Street and Cedar Avenue as aforesaid, as a necessary public improvement.
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a total expenditure not exceeding Fifteen Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety and 65-100 (\$15,990.65) Dollars, is hereby authorized to cover the cost of paving, repaving, hard surfacing and re-hard surfacing of Fourth Street between Laurel Avenue and Cedar Avenue and Cedar Avenue between Third Street and Fourth Street, a width of 24 feet, which said sum of Fifteen Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety and 65-100 (\$15,990.65) Dollars, is the total estimated cost of said improvement; that the entire cost of the improvement aforesaid, shall be assessed against all property abutting and fronting upon that portion of Fourth Street between Laurel Avenue and Cedar Avenue and Cedar Avenue between Third Street and Fourth Street, to be so improved by the paving, re-paving, hard surfacing and re-hard surfacing of said portion of Fourth Street and Cedar Avenue, a width of 24 feet, and against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or abutting upon said improvement; that Fifteen Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety and 65-100 (\$15,990.65) Dollars is the total estimated cost of said contemplated improvement in the paving, re-paving, hard surfacing and re-hard surfacing of said portion of Fourth Street and Cedar Avenue, to be specially assessed against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon said improvement; the sum of \$6.61 is the estimated cost per front foot for said improvement.
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That it is the determination of this Commission that all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or

bounding and abutting upon Fourth Street between Laurel Avenue and Cedar Avenue and Cedar Avenue between Third Street and Fourth Street, will be benefited by the improvement provided for by this resolution, and that the special assessments to be made and entered against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon such contemplated improvement shall be made upon a foot frontage basis; that it is to say, that in the preparation of the special assessment roll covering the contemplated improvement, such special assessments shall be determined and prorated according to the foot frontage of the respective properties specially benefited by said improvement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Tax Assessor and the City Clerk of the City of Sanford, Florida, in accordance with the provisions of Sections 101 and 102 of the Charter of the City of Sanford, Florida, shall proceed without delay to make a special assessment roll, assessing the special benefits to be received as the result of the improvement contemplated against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon such improvement, and upon the completion of said assessment roll to cause a copy thereof to be published two times consecutively, once each week, in a newspaper published in Sanford, Florida, attaching to said special assessment roll so published a notice directed to all property owners interested in said special assessments, stating in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Sanford, Florida, a definite time and place where complaints will be heard and when said special assessment roll will be finally confirmed by the City Commission sitting as an Equalizing Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the special assessments provided for by this resolution to be made and entered against the property bounding and abutting upon said improvement shall be payable at the option of the property owners owning property bounding and abutting upon such improvement as follows; either in full within thirty days after said assessments shall stand equalized, approved and confirmed, or in ten, equal annual installments with interest at the rate of eight per cent per annum upon all deferred payments from and after the time said special assessments shall be and stand finally equalized, approved and confirmed, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution shall be and

become effective immediately from and after its adoption.
