Jennifer Butler, 36, is going to prison for 21 years for the death of her baby born on Christmas Day 1996. The Casselberry woman placed the baby in a plastic bag where he suffocated. Thursday, Butler was sentenced after pleading no contest to second-degree murder in Sanford. Butler did not apologize or admit she killed the baby. "I know a crime has been committed," she said. Her sentence ranks among the harshest levied against a woman accused of killing her newborn. Butler will get no early parole. Most cases like hers end up with charges of manslaughter with a maximum sentence of 15 years.

Sanford Middle School student, 15, found with 'hit list'

SANFORD - An eighth-grade student who made a note with a hit list of teachers and students he wished to kill was arrested Thursday at Sanford Middle School, police said. Tyler Schmidt, 15, made a note with a diagram of himself blowing up the school and the hit list of teachers and students. A fellow eighth-grader informed a school official of the note, and Schmidt was discreetly pulled out of class, police said. On Tuesday, a 13-year old student at Rock Lake Middle School was arrested when a deputy found a map in his locker that included drawings of the school hallways and a note reading, "hide bomb in globe in science building." Investigators did not find a bomb or weapon at Rock Lake Middle School in Longwood. Brendan May, a seventh-grader, was arrested for threatening to discharge a destructive device, a felony. School officials said class activities were not disrupted. "We don't deem this as a copy cat incident," Sanford Police Department detective Kris Ziegler said. "We view this as a kid's desperate cry

for help. We recognize the need to take a more serious look at incidents like this." Schmidt was arrested at the school at 4:30 p.m. He is charged with three felonies, including conspiracy, threatening to throw or discharge a destructive device in a public place, and interfering with school administration, police said. Schmidt does not have a prior criminal record. "His family is very distraught," Ziegler said. "They are a church-going family, and they don't understand why this happened. They have been very supportive in the investigation." Sanford Middle School assistant principal Helen Goodson said Schmidt is a straight "A" student who had not been in trouble before this incident. "He is a good student," Goodson said. "As far as we know he is well liked by his peers." Goodson said the student found the note on the floor and brought it to a school official. Schmidt was pulled out of class without incident at around 11:11:30 a.m., Goodson said. "We went to his classroom and asked him to come out," Goodson said. "Luckily, we were pulling several other students out by coincidence for reasons that had nothing to do with this. I don't think most people were even aware that this was happening."

When the April 20 tragedy in Littleton, Colo., occurred, Goodson said that principal Bill Moore told students over the intercom that school safety is everyone's business. Goodson and Ziegler said they give credit to the student who had the courage to come forward with the note to school officials. Schmidt is being held at the Juvenile Detention Center. He is scheduled to make his first court appearance today. This is the second time in a week in Seminole County a student has been arrested for threatening to kill students. Prior to the tragedy in Littleton, Colo., on April 12, an Oviedo High School student's gun accidentally discharged on campus. No one was injured. However, statistics from the Seminole County schools office of secondary education show that school violence and violations involving weapons are decreasing over the last three years. There were 55 weapons violations in county middle schools and high schools in 1997-98, down from 81 in 1996-97 and 121 in 1995-96. In middle schools, there were 31 weapons violations in 1997-98, down from 33 in 1996-97 and 75 in 1995-96. Two firearms have been discovered on school campuses this year, and none were found in 1997-98. Four firearms were discovered in 1996-97, and two were found in 1995-96.

SANFORD - A Spring Festival will be held on Saturday in Sanford, with free food, games and music. The festival will be held at 94 Casselbrewer Ct. from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. to celebrate a week of clean-up efforts by residents of the Sanford Housing Authority.

"This is a chance for people in the community to really enjoy themselves," Tony Taylor, a project director for the Sanford Housing Authority, said. "We're trying to bring the community together." 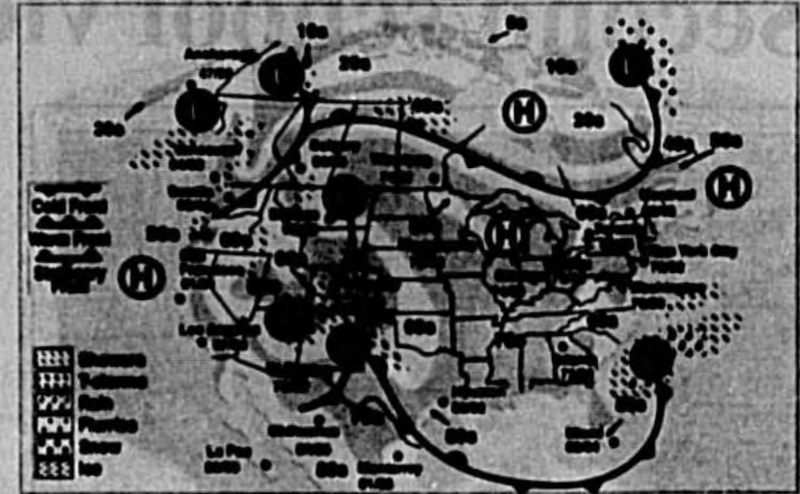

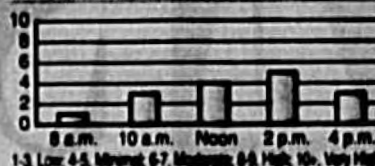

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Keeping a log of misdeeds

Readers of this publication have called to tell us how much they appreciate the daily police log that appears on page A-3.

Some say the log is their favorite material in the *Seminole Herald*.

Identifying the offenders is what makes the log even juicier, we've been told.

Each day someone from the *Herald* goes to Sheriff Don Ealinger's 17-92 encampment to record the misdeeds of men, women and some children.

Arrest papers are available to anyone who asks for them. They are kept on a long, L-shaped desk inside the first-floor Criminal Arrests office. There are four comfortable chairs to sit in and a telephone to use.

Whenever I've been in the place, I've had no company. I was there an hour on Thursday, amazed once again just how many new reports had arrived since the previous day.

It must take the arresting officers hours to do all the paperwork. Some of them do it in longhand, although most are type-written.

Atop the freshest stack of arrest reports was one made by Sheriff's Deputy Clint L. Gioielli at 10:36 p.m. on Tuesday, April 27. Incident # 9933002400.

Deputy Gioielli reported that he spotted a red Isuzu pickup traveling north on State Road 600 in Longwood. The vehicle did not have a proper Florida license.

When Gioielli had the driver stop, he began to quiz Paul Edward Czarecki, a DUI offender who had been ordered to take an alcohol treatment course. Czarecki, who is 39 today, wasn't pleased to be cuffed and taken to the county jail by Gioielli.

In his report, Gioielli said that the subject repeatedly banged his head into the left rear window of the patrol car. "I asked him to stop but he

said no, not until he started bleeding," Gioielli recorded.

Gioielli stopped the car, received assistance from another officer. Czarecki was asked to stop kicking and thrashing but he began to do so again when the car proceeded to the jail.

Gioielli reported that the suspect kicked at the left rear window and although he did not break it, he permanently damaged the window tract.

"He (Czarecki) said he wanted to kill himself," Gioielli wrote in Report #9933002400.

At the jail, Czarecki broke loose from the grasp of a Seminole County Corrections Deputy and ran his head into the sully port vestibule door.

"He (Czarecki) had to be contained," Gioielli said.

Carefully, Gioielli put down the play-by-play of the incident on the report that was just one of a thousand or more accumulated in recent weeks in Seminole County.

The reports aren't in any particular order - not alphabetized nor categorized. Czarecki was charged with operating a vehicle with criminal mischief.

Domestic violence reports are in the same stack with DUIs, grand theft and possession of cannabis. There's one there now for sale and delivery of lyseric acid, and another for false imprisonment. A man named Michael Carbal allegedly locked in his own mother.

Too much madness to record it seems.

voucher to purchase a home, or the option of remaining in public housing.

Officials of the Sanford Housing Authority are holding meetings with residents to explain the program. Residents expressed concerns about finding replacement homes.

Several residents requested that a representative from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development be present at future meetings.

"We will work with you," Sanford Housing Authority Executive Director Tim Hudson said Thursday at the fourth meeting with residents concerning the program.

Hudson said that although HUD does not guarantee the purchase of a home, the Sanford Housing Authority "will ensure that no demolition will begin until housing has been found for every resident."

The Department of Housing and Urban Development will announce whether the Hope VI grant is awarded to the Sanford Housing Authority in October.

"Hope six is a tool that housing authorities can use to help families live outside these invariable four walls and live with other families in mixed communities," Hudson said. "It's a tool to improve your quality of life."

To make the voucher portable, residents must live in the issuing jurisdiction (Seminole County) for at least 12 months.

Under HUD regulations, residents will have at least 60 days after a voucher is given to find replacement housing. The Housing Authority can grant two 30 day exceptions.

If the grant is approved, a demolition company would be brought on board within six months. Then, the Housing Authority would have 18 months to do the demolitions, Hudson said.

"We're going to work with you all for the next 18 months," Hudson said.

Residents will receive "creative financing" from the government during the loan application to receive

approval on a mortgage for a home, Hudson said.

"We want to keep your payments at about \$490 (per month)," Hudson said.

The Housing Authority will establish a relocation budget with the grant, Hudson said.

The Sanford Housing Authority will build about 30-50 houses if the grant is approved, Hudson said.

The City Commission wants the Housing Authority to include a business incubator in the project, with cheap rental spaces for businesses that will train residents in job skills.

Meanwhile, repairs are underway at the complexes.

"We can not assume that we will get the grant," Hudson said.

Hudson said the program will give residents a chance to own property and leave public housing. He said the surrounding community will benefit from increased property values.

Treena Kaye, director of Central Florida Legal Services, said she is concerned about whether the handicapped and elderly will find replacement housing.

Residents at the meeting also expressed concern about a federal law, that takes effect Oct. 1, saying that any resident not working at least part-time must work for the Housing Authority at least eight hours per month, or face termination of the lease the following month.

The law exempts the handicapped, elderly, disabled, or certain people under a welfare to work program.

SANFORD - In the wake of the recent disaster at Columbine High School in Colorado, students throughout the nation have mourned, cried, feared and retreated. Yet, through the confusion and questioning, a local youth group decided to reach out to comfort the high schoolers with a message of hope.

Is Sunday the only day of worship?

What happened to the Protestant Church's idea to replace Sunday morning as the weekly day of worship?

Nothing. After the Catholic Church broke with Sunday tradition 40 years ago and instituted Saturday afternoon masses, there was some talk that the Protestants might follow suit. Many churches made it clear that from their point of view, there is nothing sacred about "Sunday morning at 11."

The success of the Saturday masses in the Catholic Church caused Protestant ministers to give serious thought to the idea of holding midweek services for those who preferred to keep Sunday free as a day of rest and relaxation.

"In the old days," one pastor said, "churches would notice a drop in attendance in the summer when people went to their cottages. But things were back to normal in September.

"Then people started keeping their cottages open till November. With the popularity of skiing and other winter activities, the weekend exodus became practically a year-round phenomenon. We decided we had to do something."

What his United Methodist congregation did was start holding Thursday evening services in addition to its Sunday worship service. But instead of the midweek service being a repeat of the previous Sunday's service, the Thursday service was new "from prelude to postlude," including the sermon and the choir selections.

The service was then presented again the next Sunday morning.

Some churches experimented with Monday evening services for those who wanted to reserve Sunday for R&R. But the weeknight service was never tried on a wide scale. Pastors doubted that many of their parishioners would consider it an improvement over Sunday.

"Those who are too occupied on Sunday are usually just as involved on Saturday," said one skeptic of the proposed changes. Like most ministers, he stuck to Sunday.

"It's true," echoes one Lutheran pastor, "that, as our attendance figures indicate, many people want to spend their Sundays digging in the garden or reading The New York Times.

"There are other problems with holding duplicate services," he added. "When do you have Sunday school?"

Other alternatives to the "Sunday at 11" church service were suggested and sometimes tried. An abbreviated Monday evening service (40 minutes) was found to be successful in some churches.

But there were glitches. One church dropped the Monday evening service when members insisted on being home by 8:00 so they could catch "Laugh-In" on television.

Most pastors say there would be no theological objection to choosing another day than Sunday for worship. Sunday is traditional because that is the day on which Christ rose. While this is the chief reason, the church's Sunday observance has also been associated with the first day of creation and the birthday of the Christian church on Pentecost, seven weeks after Easter.

The earliest scriptural reference to Sunday as a day of worship for Christians occurs in the Book of Acts. Speaking of Paul's visit to Troas in Greece, the King James version says, "And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul preached to them."

Most modern translations, however, substitute "on Saturday night" for "the first day of the week." This could mean that the early Christians regularly held their worship services on Saturday night.

One clergyman is of the opinion that "no one particular hour of the week is more sacred than any other. On the other hand, I am not sure that changing our services from Sunday to another day of the week is the answer. It may be better to try another hour on Sunday."

How to face the myths of marriage

"And they lived happily ever after". Nearly everyone has been tainted by fairytales and dime-store novels about the truths of marriage. Many couples believe, at least in part, four myths about life after marriage.

Myth 1: You and your spouse expect exactly the same things from marriage.

But remember, you grew up in different households with different rules, expectations and roles. You can't assume that your partner will have the same "script" as you do. The expectations you bring to marriage can make or break your relationship. The more openly you discuss your differing expectations, the more likely you are to create a better partnership.

Myth 2: Everything in your relationship will get better.

Romance in the beginning of a relationship doesn't last forever. This illusion is what gets a lot of people in trouble. In reality, people tend to construct an idealized image of the person they marry. After you've

married for a while, you realize you've married a human being and not an image. The good news is that disenchantment enables you to move into a deeper intimacy.

Myth 3: Everything bad in your life will disappear.

Many people marry to erase loneliness or avoid unpleasantness. But marriage doesn't erase personal pain. People get married primarily to further their own well-being, not to take care of someone else. The feelings and traits you had be-

fore marriage will still be with you after you marry. Marriage is a way of living and you can't expect it to be all sunshine and roses, but given time, it can become a powerful healing agent. Good marriages take work.

Myth 4: Your spouse will make you whole.

People who believe this myth become dependent on their spouse in unhealthy ways. These couples rely on their spouse for continued support, assurance and wholeness. Usually this is coupled with low self-esteem and a sense of inferiority that is easily controlled by their partner. These people are not interested in nourishing a relationship but in being nourished by their spouse. They believe that simply by being married, they will be whole.

If you've ever held such fables to be true, don't despair. Successful marriages work patiently to challenge and dispel these myths.

Fighting the Good Fight. Research shows that how couples handle disagreements is far more important to the survival of a marriage than being in love. There are four omens in

conflict that will sabotage attempts to resolve things constructively. Steer clear of these to fight the good fight.

Criticism. Criticism involves attacking someone's personality rather than the behavior.

Contempt. Contempt involves intentionally insulting or psychologically abusing your spouse. It is aimed right at the heart and causes pain. Name-calling, hostile humor and mockery are examples of contempt.

Defensiveness. Defensiveness follows contempt. If a partner feels victimized, the natural inclination is to become defensive.

Stonewalling. If verbal attacks and contempt overwhelm a person, he or she eventually stops responding. Stonewalling conveys disapproval, icy distance and smugness.

By learning to fight fair, marriage can flourish.

DEAR ABBY: The letter from "Mourning in Texas" prompted me to write. "Mourning" was disappointed about the small number of floral arrangements sent to his late wife's funeral.

You were correct in stating that many people donate money to charity in order that "something good" may come from the sadness of a loved one's death. However, we should all remember that floral arrangements sent to a wake or the home of the grieving are also "something good" - and useful.

Too often, people hesitate to send flowers thinking they'll be thrown out after the funeral. But what is important is the message of condolence that flowers convey to the grieving family during those extremely difficult few days. Flowers are for the living - they say, "We loved her, too. She had value to us, and we care that you are grieving."

This is not to say that making a charitable donation isn't worthwhile, but to remind people that sometimes flowers speak volumes.

May I share with you what my husband and I do at such times? When we attend a funeral or a wake, we take a card and a single rose. One week later, we send a "thinking of you" card. A month later, we send a colorful arrangement of flowers to the family of the deceased to let them know they are still in our thoughts and prayers. 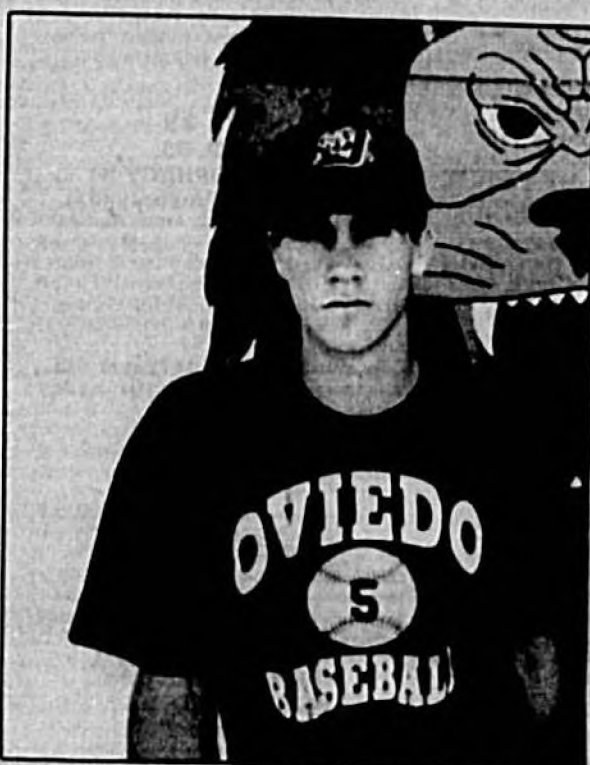

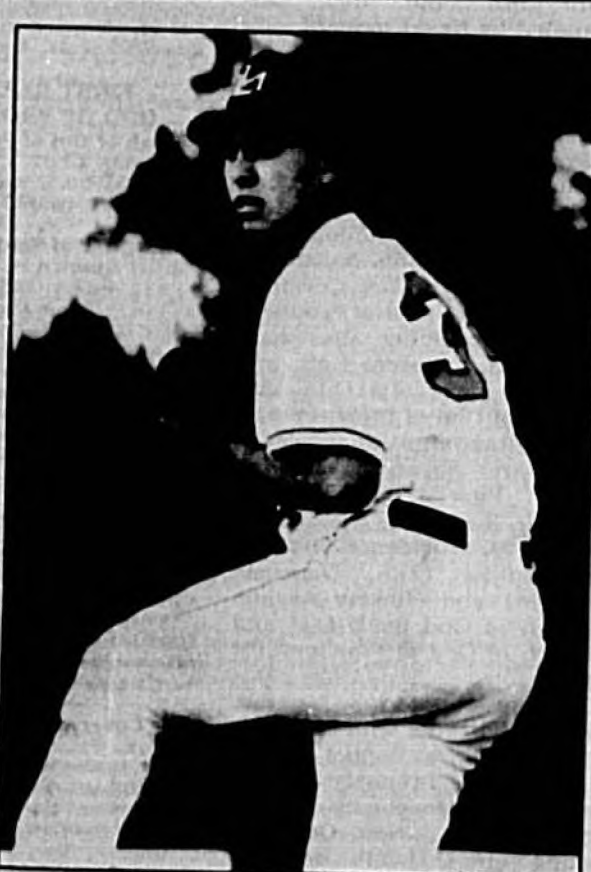

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WIN AT BRIDGE

The English day of fire

Today, the English commemorate their patron saint, St. George. He is renowned for slaying a dragon, but G.K. Chesterton seems to have had inside information on the famous day because he wrote, "St. George he was for England, And before he killed the dragon, He drank a pint of English ale, Out of an English flagon."

This deal occurred in a match between England and its westerly neighbor, Wales. How would you play in six spades after the lead of either the diamond eight, ducked to your nine, or the heart jack?

There are many routes to six spades. In this auction, South bids out his shape with four hearts, simultane-

ously expressing slam interest. (With no slam aspirations, he would settle for four spades.)

The diamond lead ducked to South's nine makes life easy. The declarer ruffs his queen-jack of diamonds in the dummy and loses just one spade trick.

After the more testing heart lead, it is tempting to assume spades are 3-2, when you can draw trumps and concede a club trick. Yet you must be careful. In case the spades are 4-1, win trick one with the heart king. Take two top trumps, but when the bad split is revealed, play a club to the ace, then lead the club queen for a ruffing finesse. (If East covers, you ruff; if he plays low, you discard.) With this layout, you win 12 tricks.

Perhaps you think that finessing against West for the club king is a better percentage play. Agreed, but even if the finesse wins, you still aren't home. Yet if the ruffing finesse works, you are.

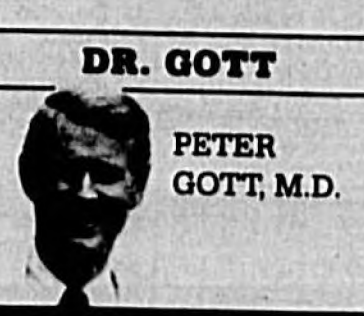
ASK DR. GOTT

Be honest about eating disorder

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 22-year-old woman with bulimia. I make myself vomit after eating and have been using laxatives for almost two years. Last year, my parents became concerned because I lost weight so fast. They took me to an internist. I was too ashamed to tell the doctor what I was doing. After a series of tests, he recommended exploratory surgery during which my gallbladder was removed. I really want to stop this destructive eating pattern, but I can't. What can I do?

DEAR READER: Bulimia is a common eating disorder related to anorexia nervosa. In your comments, you have provided a clear description of the ailment, which — if not treated — will progress to serious malnutrition and other health consequences. You have also communicated the feelings of helplessness, fear and loss of control that are central to the disease.

Obviously, you will not be able to obtain help as long as a sense of shame prevents you from being honest with your doctor and your family. Many illnesses — such as bulimia, anorexia, drug and alcohol addiction, and sexually transmitted diseases —



are embarrassing. But they are, after all, merely diseases that can be treated once they are diagnosed.

I urge you to adopt an attitude of scrupulous self-honesty. You seem already to be at the point where you can look at your problem objectively. At least you are willing to acknowledge you have a problem and are helplessly in its grip. You have, without knowing it, taken the first important step toward recovery. I congratulate you on the courage it took to write me.

Your next step is to seek professional help. Be candid with your physician and ask for a referral to a practitioner, preferably a psychiatrist, who is quali-

fied to treat eating disorders. You can be helped; however, you must ask for that help. Let go of your shame; it is nonproductive and will only stunt your emotional growth.

I might add that had you been honest with your doctor in the first place, you could have avoided unnecessary surgery.

DEAR READER: No, you will not. Psyllium is a form of indigestible vegetable fiber that will add bulk to your stools (thereby aiding evacuation), as well as lower your serum cholesterol level. Your use of psyllium is both helpful and appropriate.

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
