

of Agriculture thinks the family farm is so vital to the economy, prosperity, and military defense of the Nation that it is reviewing current farm programs and activities to make sure that they are serving the family farm welland to find out how they can
serve it better in the future.

The family farm is defined as
a farm (or ranch) which provides the main source of income for the farm family living on it, with the farm operator (owner or tenant) or members of his

Many family farms are too small, too poorly equipped or too lacking in essential resources to supply an adequate income to the farm families which occupy them. There is a real need to provide these farm families with better opportunities to improve their livelihood and to make a greater centribution to the national agricultural autput. 




