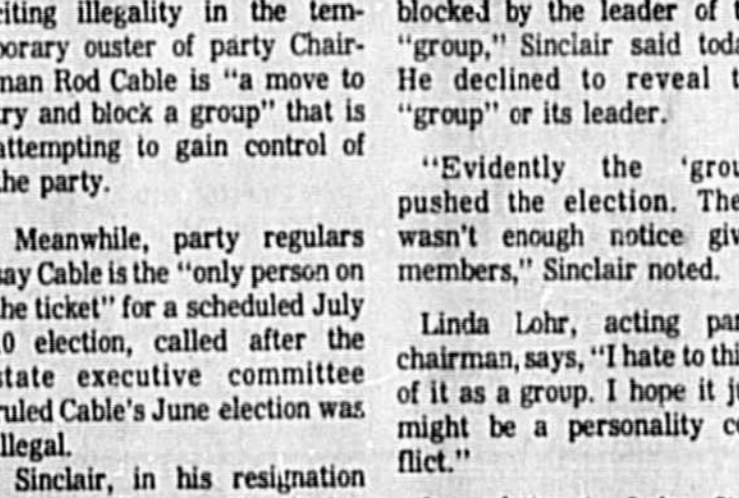

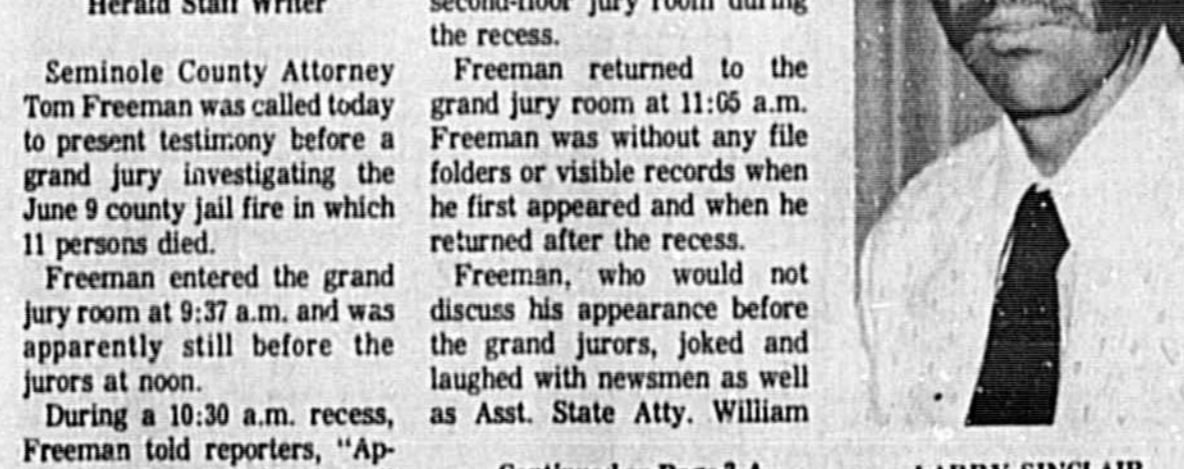

## FBI Holds Man As Witness In Pine Ridge Probe

PINE RIDGE, S.D. (AP) — The FBI says a material witness is being held under \$25,000 bond in connection with the fatal shooting of two FBI agents on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation.

An FBI spokesman identified the witness Tuesday night as David Sky. His age and hometown were not available.

The spokesman said Sky had been picked up by Bureau of Indian Affairs officials on another matter. The spokesman said the FBI later interviewed Sky and held him as a material witness in the slaying.

U.S. Atty. William F. Clayton of Sioux Falls said Sky appeared Tuesday before U.S. Magistrate James H. Wilson of Rapid City after his arrest and was being held to testify before a federal grand jury this month in Rapid City.

## Amy Threat Lessens

MIAMI (AP) — Tropical storm Amy is moving in fits and starts across the mid-Atlantic and seas whipped up by its 10-mile-per-hour winds are posing less of a threat to the East Coast, forecasters said today.

The National Hurricane Center in Miami said Amy's center was located near latitude 38 north and longitude 66 west, or about 110 miles southeast of Cape Cod, Mass., late Tuesday.

Amy was moving at about 12 m.p.h. toward the northeast, and was expected to continue on that course, perhaps gaining forward speed, through the day.

## Levi To Decide On Charges

WASHINGTON (AP) — Atty. Gen. Edward H. Levi says he won't ask President Ford's permission if he decides to prosecute those involved in Central Intelligence Agency assassination plots and domestic wrongdoing.

Justice Department spokesman Robert Feldkamp said Tuesday that Ford has offered assurances that the attorney general will not decide whether to bring criminal charges against CIA personnel without presidential instructions.

"The attorney general has made clear to the President that he (Levi) will retain a prosecutive discretion," Feldkamp said. "They did discuss this and Ford had no problem with it."

# Public Could Use Facility

Residents of the Woodlands subdivision have been told by the Seminole County attorney that a proposed recreation facility for the subdivision would be open to the public, even though taxes to fund the facility would be paid only by the subdivision residents.

Attorney Tom Freeman said it would be a "major problem" if the facility is made available only to some members of the public. He used the example of Seminole County attempting to prohibit Orange County

residents from using a county-funded park.

He did say, however, that he would need to research the matter further.

A delegation from the Woodlands, on SR 431 near Longwood, appeared before the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) yesterday to hear the attorney's opinion on the creation of a special taxing district to provide funds for developing a 16-acre park with recreation facilities and also to provide landscaping and traffic controls.

Freeman advised the commission that the best route to follow on the creation of a municipal taxing district is to allow a straw vote among subdivision residents on whether they favor the creation of a special district. Depending upon the outcome of the straw vote, the BCC then would consider an ordinance creating the district.

taxing district. Also speaking in opposition to the plan was Dianne Green who said that "most people" are not in favor of the project.

The request that the special district be created was made last week by representatives of the Woodlands Civic Association, who said they have been working on the project for several years. Bob Sturm, president of the association, last week presented the BCC with a petition with signatures of 60 per cent of the taxpayers, which would be affected by the district, in support of the plan.

However, more opposition to the creation of the district surfaced in yesterday's meeting when one resident Pete Bove, told the BCC that he represented 200 registered voters in the subdivision who are opposed to the special

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Democrats Unable To Gather Votes

The big gains scored by Democrats in last fall's congressional elections raised the fear that a "veto-proof" Congress might endanger the traditional balance of power between the legislative and executive branches of the government.

The Democrats repeatedly have failed to translate their two to one congressional majority into enough votes to override vetoes of legislation which veers too far from what President Ford regards as a responsible course on major economic and energy issues.

The Democrats feared that they would be unable to raise the \$1.35 billion housing bill as the next candidate for a veto. So many Democrats share Mr. Ford's lack of enthusiasm for it — because it goes overboard with costly subsidies — that the veto probably would be sustained.

The record is discouraging. Disagreeing with Mr. Ford's approach to the energy crisis, Congress has been unable to agree on an approach bearing its own stamp. Faced with Mr. Ford's veto of a strip mining bill late last year, the new Congress ignored the President's objections and passed an almost identical one.

Seasoned Democrats know this, but the big class of freshman liberal Democrats who rode into Congress last year apparently do not. They engineered the unseating of three strong committee chairmen through their power in the House Democratic Caucus, and are now fixing their sights on veteran Speaker Carl Albert.

The free for all developing in the Democrat presidential race may be a clue to the problem afflicting congressional Democrats. The party's ideological compass is swinging wildly.

The Nuclear Power Threat Revisited

It is ironic that the Rosenberg case is being resurrected as a public issue at precisely the time that the nuclear threat is causing more world anxiety than it has in a decade or so.

The problem today is that there is no "secret" to nuclear capability. It is there for the development, or purchase, by those nations which have the necessary industrial, intellectual and/or financial resources.

Considering all those doomsday warnings of unrestricted proliferation back in the '50s, it is amazing how long the nuclear monopoly of a small group of more or less cooperative governments has been maintained.

Signs have been multiplying, however, that the dam may be about to break. And the pressure is not, as once feared, coming from power politics. It's economic.

As practicality of nuclear power has increased in recent years, helped along lately by the political manipulation of world oil supplies, the export of nuclear technology has become an increasingly profitable business for those nations who got into the game early.

The trouble is that nuclear power technology can't really be separated from nuclear weapons capability, as demonstrated last year when India, with Canada's unwitting aid, became the sixth nation to explode a nuclear device.

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Gandhi Wants Ford To Visit

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Strife In Lebanon Could Menace Peace Analysis

By WILLIAM L. RYAN AP Special Correspondent Lebanon's political schizophrenia, which has produced fratricidal strife three times this year, could menace the whole peacekeeping process in the Middle East with calamitous consequences for the industrial West.

The fighting between Moslem Arab extremists and rightist Christians has raised the possibility of civil war. That could produce widespread turmoil unlike the situation in 1956, when President Eisenhower landed American troops to restore order.

A point of view from the late Gamal Abdel Nasser's Egypt on one side and allied Syria on the other to force Lebanon into the Nasser camp provoked the 1958 crisis. This time the crisis is more of an internal one, though the volatile Libyan regime may be aiding the Arab extremists.

In any case, the situation is deadly dangerous. So few Moslems live in Lebanon, ancient land of the Phoenicians, has been independent only three decades. It existed as an entity by accepting a fiction — that the population of 3 million was divided precisely half and half so that power could be shared by Moslems and Christians equally.

Since 1948, Arab-Israeli hostility has been the foundation of Lebanon's woe. Camps on Lebanon's soil shelter some 300,000 Palestinian refugees. The rightist Phalange party, made up mostly of Maronite Christians and drawing support from the middle class, has a heavily armed private army of about 6,000 men drilled in urban guerrilla warfare.

Many Christians see the Palestinians as a state within a state, eroding Lebanon's sovereignty and threatening to draw her into an unequal military clash with Israel. Guerrilla use of Lebanon as a base for attacks on Israel and Israeli retaliation raise the prospect of steady escalation.

The dangers of a permanent state of turbulence are manifold. If recurrent urban guerrilla warfare should become a rout of civil war, the Moslems might rally against the Christians. Syria, which supplies weapons and other support to the Palestinian guerrillas, might intervene.

The balanced Moslem-Christian facade would be destroyed. Lebanon, a quasi-neutral in the Arab-Israeli conflict, would probably be swung into the anti-Israel camp.

That could mean Israeli action. The whole Arab East would be in an uproar. Another round of the Arab-Israeli war would be just about inevitable, with all its dire consequences in terms of another oil stoppage.

DEAR ABBY: Yesterday, a man had a heart attack at the ball park. The only member of his family present was his small son. The police and hospital were notified immediately, but it took them 20 minutes to arrive.

Meanwhile, about 30 people stood around, but nobody seemed to know what to do. The poor man hasn't regained consciousness yet, and it's doubtful that he will.

Abby, I took first aid in school and was taught what to do for bee stings and poison ivy, but I can't remember learning how to administer first aid to a victim of a heart attack. It doesn't make much sense that it isn't taught in first aid, considering that heart disease is the nation's No. 1 killer.

You would be doing a great service if you published information on what to do for a heart-attack victim until professional help arrives. I am sure many lives could be saved.

CONCERNED IN N.O. DEAR CONCERNED: I consulted one of the world's foremost authorities, Donald B. Effler, senior cardiovascular surgeon at the Cleveland Clinic. His reply:

"The victim should lie flat. Closed chest massage should be applied immediately. This is manually compressing the victim's chest 30 to 60 times a minute. Mouth-to-mouth breathing should be given at the same time if possible, so the complete first-aid treatment requires two people."

"If only one is present, these two procedures should be administered alternately. Victim have been known to be revived with this emergency treatment even after the heart has stopped beating."

"Victims of suffocating and drowning should be treated in the same manner. The two life-saving essentials, oxygen and circulation, can be provided without equipment in the above manner in an emergency situation."

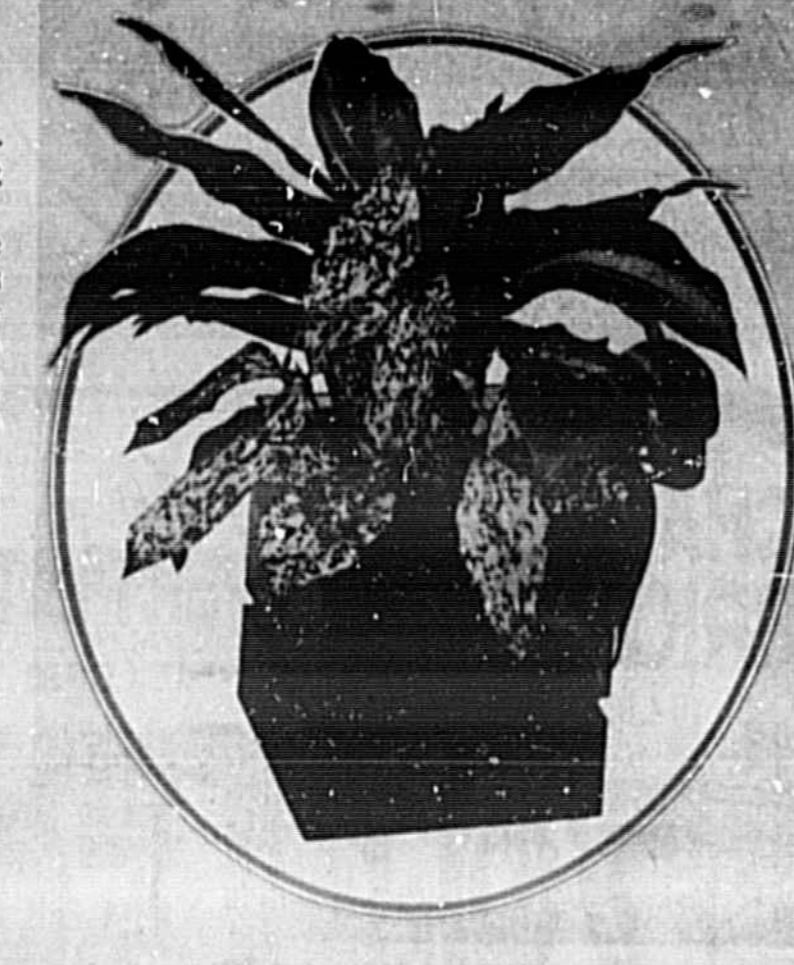

## Curiosity Led Him To Fame

In 1774 Empress Catherine of Russia received a 952-piece dinner and dessert service which she had ordered from an English potter.

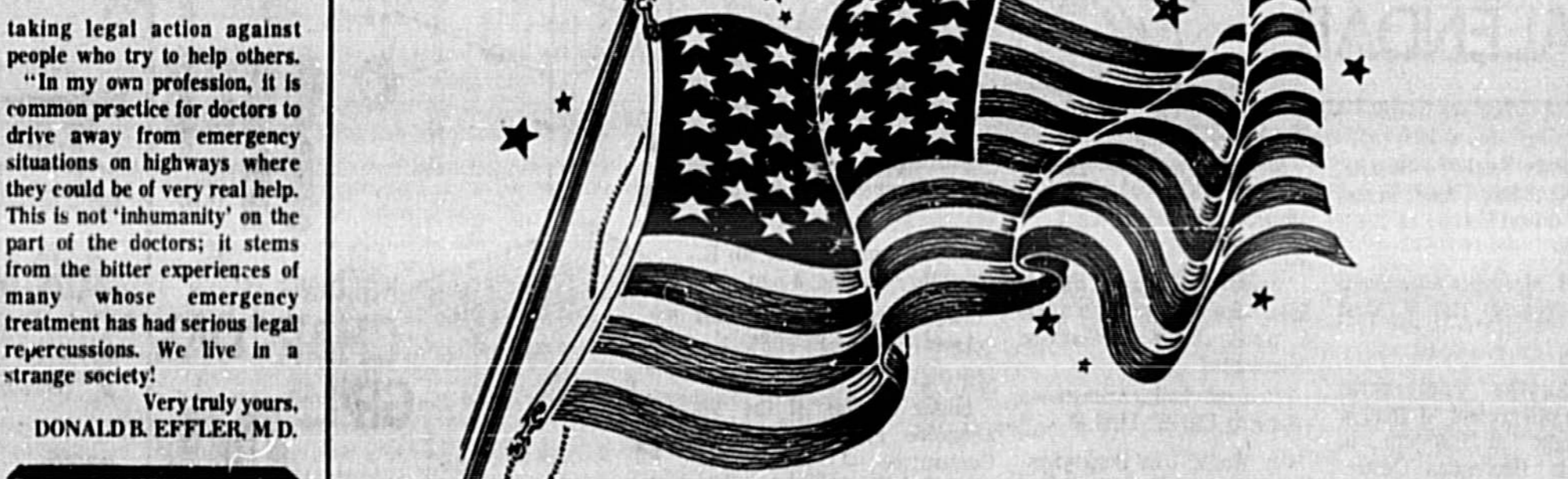
Each of these pieces was decorated with a handpainted view of the homes, castles and abbots of England. In all there were 1,244 views painted from sketches made by large corps of artists who ranged the British Isles to find the necessary scenes.

It was an impressive accomplishment for the potter, Josiah Wedgwood. But it is not for this that his name has survived more than two centuries. At the opening of the Wedgwood Museum in 1863 it was said that "Josiah was the youngest of 13 children and went to work for his brother Thomas at the Churchyard Works, becoming his brother's apprentice at a very early age. illness at 11 forced him to give up his work as a thrower and his attention was drawn to modeling and mold making which gave him an opportunity for research and experiment.

Wanting to continue his experiments he suggested a partnership with Thomas but it was refused. Josiah then entered partnership with John Harrison, turning out knife handles and buttons. A year later he became a partner with Thomas Whieldon who shared his curiosity and love of experiment. The invention of a green glaze brought about his first success — the famous pineapple and cauliflower tea sets.

In 1789 Josiah ventured out on his own, beginning experiments resulting in creamware which would make his name famous. Cream ware, light buff in color, was perfected by 1785 so that it could be produced in quantities large enough to meet a demanding market. From that time it was properly known as "Queen's ware" and Wedgwood was designated "Potter to the Queen."

Although the cream ware was virtually displaced earlier, heavier forms of pottery and was marketed around the world he continued his experiments. He gained additional fame through the introduction of Jasper and black basalt wares. Wedgwood died in 1795, leaving the works to his second son, Josiah II. Thus began the Wedgwood tradition which has lasted until the present day.

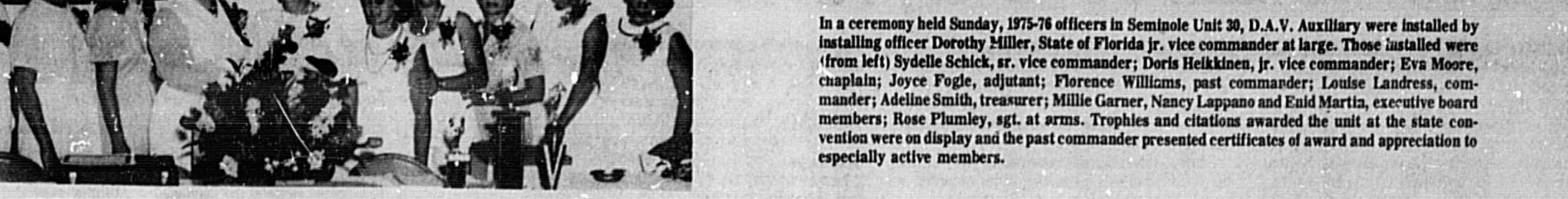

It will be a true "rockets red glare" Fourth of July in many communities throughout the country with the Bicentennial officially underway. Youngsters who want to set up their own special Independence Day parties can put their desserts to work, for example,

as part of the decorations. There will be no doubt that it is the Fourth with a table centerpiece of Stars 'N Stripes cupcakes.

**STARS 'N STRIPES CUPCAKES**  
For Batter:  
2 1/2 cups (each) milk  
1/2 cup melted butter  
1/2 cup margarine  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1/2 cup vanilla  
1/2 cup crushed peppermint candy  
For Frosting:  
1 1/2 cups shortening  
1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 egg  
1/2 cup vanilla  
1/2 cup crushed peppermint candy  
For Frosting:

1/2 pound marshmallows (about 28)  
2 tablespoons milk  
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar  
3 egg whites  
For Decorations:  
Assorted red and white candies (peppermint sticks, red hot, cherry whips, gumdrops, hard candy circles, licorice twists, Paper flags and cut-outs.)

Combine chocolate bars and 1/2 cup of milk and melt in a saucepan over low heat. Cool. Place shortening, sifted flour, sugar, baking powder and salt into a bowl. Add egg, 1/2 cup of milk and vanilla. Mix together at low speed until blended. Add remaining 1/2 cup milk and beat at high speed for 3 minutes. Stir in crushed candy. Pour batter into greased muffin cups until each cup is half full. Bake in a preheated 375-degree oven 15 to 20 minutes or until cupcakes test done. Let cool. Makes 18 cupcakes.

To prepare frosting, melt marshmallows, milk and cream of tartar in a double boiler, stirring occasionally. In a mixing bowl, beat egg whites until frothy. Gradually pour marshmallow mixture into bowl of egg whites and continue beating until stiff peaks form. Use to frost cupcakes immediately. Let cupcakes stand about 30 minutes to allow frosting to set slightly before decorating.

Ideas for July 4th cupcake decorations:  
CUT out small stars from thin slices of gumdrops with a knife or small star-shaped cookie cutter. Arrange on top of frosted cupcakes.  
CENTER a star-shaped cookie cutter on a frosted cupcake, then sprinkle bits of crushed candy inside the cutter OR around the outside of the cupcake to outline the star shape. Remove cutter.  
CUT pieces of candy whips and lay on top of a frosted cupcake in a zig design.

# Quickie Ham Casserole

A quick ham casserole with broccoli and cheese is nice to come home to after a busy day at work or shopping. It takes less than 45 minutes to prepare or may be cooked earlier in the day, stored in the refrigerator and reheated so there is little delay sitting down to supper.

1 stick margarine  
6 tablespoons unsifted flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1/4 cup crushed oregano leaves

3 cups diced cooked ham  
1/2 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese

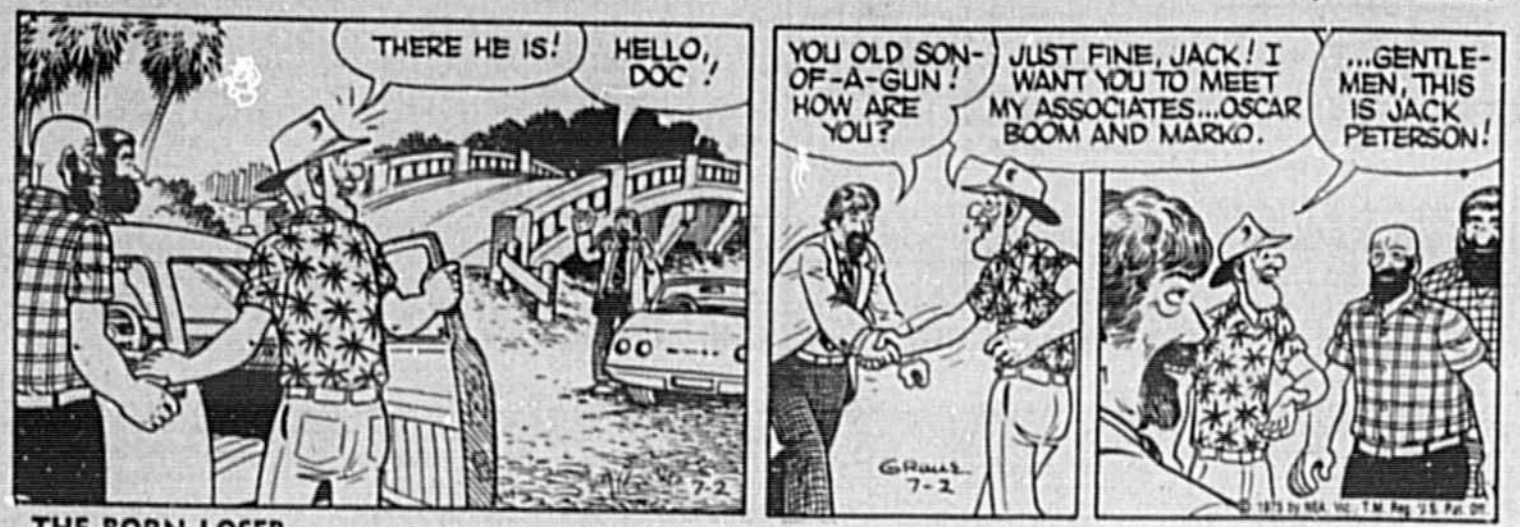

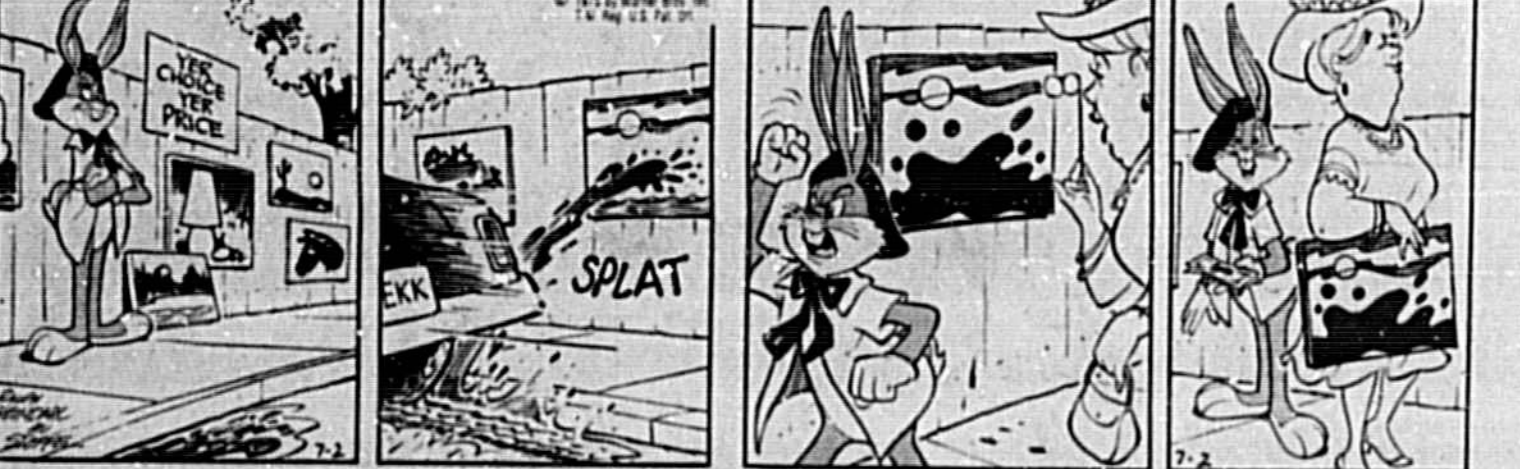

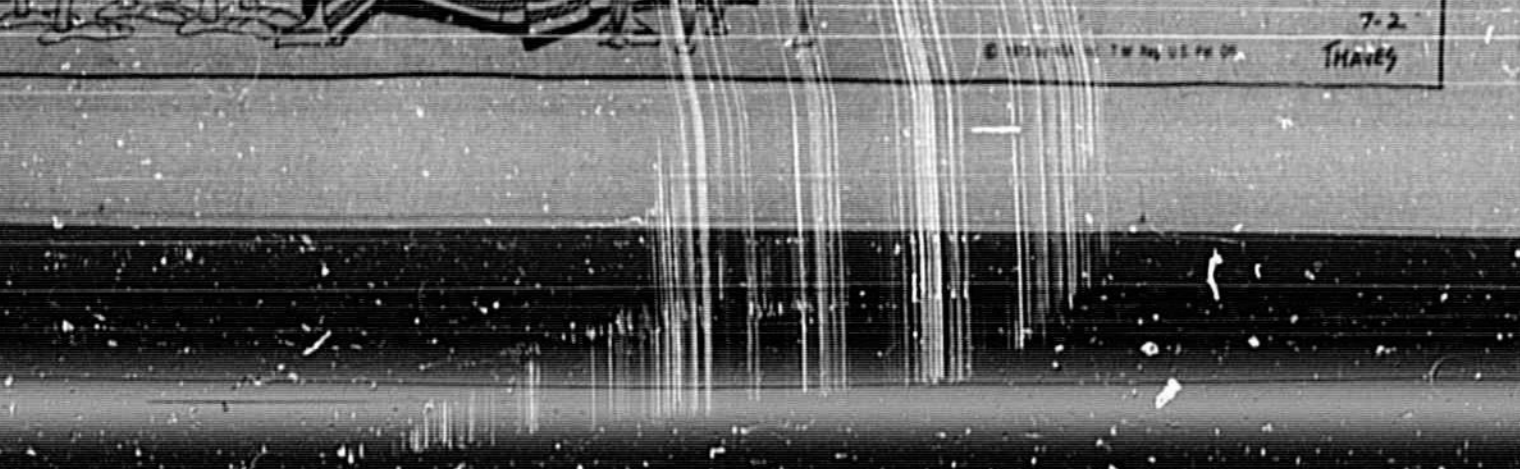
