

Fans Take Heat Off Family . . . Here's How Rooms Can Be Kept Cool

· vague sort of way most of us anow why we let! cooler when the mir ruthes in through the open windows of our moving automobile on a hot day. The outside temperature remains the same, but the breeze makes us feel cooler. Why? Simply because the moving air increased the rate of evaporation of moisture from our skin. An electric fan in the home acts the same way as the air rushing in the car's windown. A fam of the right size, and prop-


erly located, maintains a constant circulation of air throughout an entire room. Fans circulate a given number of cubic feet of air per minute (CFM), and this data appears on their respective nameplates. So to get the right size of fan or fans you need you should know the cubic feet of air in the room to be cooled. and the rate at which you want the air circulated. The cubic feet of a room is determined by multiplying the length of the room x the width x the height. The rate of circulation required depends on the climate in which you live. If you reside in hot climates you'll want to circulate the air at least once per minute. In more moderate climates, a 2 or 3 minute air eleculation cycle may be ade-

quate. Day and night cooling operation vary. On hot days, close the windows and doors, and draw the shades to keep the cooler air induors. Then turn on the type of fan you have according to Figures 1, 2 or 3. For might cooling, warmer inside air must be exhausted and cooler outdoor air drawn in. The inlet for cooler air should be 2 or 3 times that of the outlet for warmer inside air. The outlet should be 1½ times the diameter of the fan blades. Figures 4. 5 and 6 show how night cooling can be accomplished satisfactorily.



Under Secretary of State Walter Bedell Smith warned recently that the Communist powers are now attempting to lull the free world into a fulse sense of security. Behind a screen of "soft line" talk, he said, they will continue to pursue their course of infiltration, subversion and propaganda to gain their ends. The aim of this strategy is to lure the anti-Communist powers into dropping their guards and neglecting their alliances.

In recent months the Reds have tried to make it appear that their quarrel is with the United States rather than with the other free powers. They have made an all out offort to cause trouble and expand differences Way Down South on policy within the Western world into serious rifts.

The Communist "soft line" is especially dangerous because it would be very pleasant to be able to believe that they have a sincere desire to settle their differences with the free world on a peaceful basis. The Reds are seriously troubled by the fact that their aggressiveness has brought a measure of unity to anti-Communist countries and if, by pretending to change, they can break down that unity they will be in a stronger position to strike again.

That is why we cannot "go it alone." why we cannot allow differences with our gilles to result in breaks with them. The danger hasn't passed and we dare not delude ourselves into thinking it has. We must stay strong and we must keep strong allies at our side






