### What's Naughty In School Attire?

NEW YORK (AP) — The annual Fracas between school officials and students over classroom attire raged across the land today, spiced by glimpses of stocking tops, panties and even navel.

There was hot and generally unresolved controversy over a number of burning questions: At what point do a girl's culottes become so brief that they are, so to speak, more like sans-culottes?

Is a T-shirt underwear or outerwear?

Where is the torrid zone on miniskirts?

Should a girl wear a Nehru jacket with nothing underneath but panties?

What is a reasonable length for male sideburns?

School principals from coast to coast were bugged by love bonds, and rode off in several directions. Some insisted that the wearing of love beads by males would not do. Others held that love beads, if worn, must be tucked inside shirts. Others said go ahead wear 'em any old way.

Culottes, a sort of split skirt, were taboo last year in Chicago's Morgan Park High School. This term they are permissible if they extend to within two inches of the knee.

At Hollywood, Calif., High Culottes must be full enough to look like unsplit skirts, and three inches up is the limit.

On T-shirts, the official rule at Mandan, N.D., High School is: "They're underwear and not proper school apparel."

But at Radford High School, near Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, T-shirts receive the stamp of approval as long as they do not bear words or pictures.

Officially fixed miniskirt lengths range from two inches above the knee in Jefferson Parish, La., to four inches in Glendale, Calif. But there are other less specific views.

The Westport, Conn., school board ruled simply that skirts must cover the girls' "undergarments and their torso."

Principal J. H. Boucree of

Booker T. Washington High in New Orleans said: "When a girl sits you should not see the tops of her stockings."

The Phoenix, Ariz., High School system ran into Nehru jacket trouble and had to put its foot down.

Explained Mick Herzog, the system's community relations director: "The girls were wearing them with nothing but panties on underneath, which turned everybody on."

"The boys came to school with short Nehru jackets, no undershirts and open at the midriff, allowing their navels to show."

# Ambulance Service Cut-Off Oct. 31

Seminole County will be without ambulance service as of midnight, Oct. 31, unless county commissioners come up with a solution to the problem in the immediate future.

In prepared statements released to The Herald today by Grankow Funeral Home of Sanford and Niblack Funeral Home of Casselberry, who have been providing the service, it is stated that both firms will terminate the ambulance operations of their businesses as of that date.

In explanation, the statements read: "The discontinuance was precipitated by increasing operation costs and new federal regulations. Expense involved in providing comprehensive ambulance service is rapidly growing prohibitive.

"In order to maintain an ambulance service it is necessary to pay for the ambulances themselves, purchase modern and comprehensive emergency equipment and employ first-aid trained attendants to be on call 24 hours a day.

"With continually rising costs, it would inevitably become necessary to raise funeral prices to compensate for the expense of providing dependable ambulance service.

"Rather than do this, it is our opinion that discontinuance of our ambulance service is in the best interests of all concerned.

"Time previously given to ambulance service can now be given to our firm's first responsibility, serving the bereaved."

Although efforts by The Herald to reach County Commission Chairman John Alexander were unsuccessful, the commission secretary related that Alexander had stated he could "advise of no definite plan to provide county-wide ambulance service at this time. However, the county is in contact with several area firms in an effort to determine costs of a local program and how best it can be instituted."

Sanford City Manager Warren Knowles, in a telephone statement, said, "This is a county-wide problem that needs to be solved by the county so that everyone has a service available to him. If they do not do so, there is no doubt that the City of Sanford will undertake a solution for the residents of the City of Sanford only."

Commissioners Alexander, John Fitzpatrick and Robert Parker were told last month at a Tallahassee meeting with Joe Williams, director of the State Highway Safety Council, that available Federal funds to Seminole County for ambulance service are less than \$100,000 annually.

During budget hearings, commissioners were told by one ambulance firm that it would need an annual subsidy of \$40,000, in addition to fees collected from customers.

Authorities at Seminole Memorial Hospital estimate gross expenses for setting up an ambulance service in the county would be between \$60,000 and \$70,000.

Lee asked the board to finance the total \$13,000 for the representative for the 300 days required to build the facility.

This would be in addition to the low bid of \$2,795,000 recently awarded to Graham Construction Company of Orlando.

According to Lee, the use of a representative at the scene is usual practice if the project cost is over one million dollars.

## Development Co. Pays Dividend

Sanford - Seminole Development Company President Clifford W. McKibbin Jr. last night at annual officers and directors meeting announced the SSDC just paid out the sixth consecutive annual dividend of 60 cents per share of stock.

Speaking to the assembly in the conference room of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce, McKibbin said, "We think six per cent is not a bad return on anyone's money."

Commenting on the workings of the SSDC during the past year, McKibbin declared, "you will recall the formation of the SSDC from the former Committee of One Hundred, capitalized with the remaining one-half of the committee's pledged funds. For the purpose of continuing to bring payroll industry to Sanford and Seminole County."

The president said by taking advantage of federal and Florida statutes it was possible to arrange Small Business Administration loans up to 85 per cent for bona fide industries bringing more wages to local people.

While the original and continuing intent was to increase our industrial income for the area, we have been somewhat successful in making it a good investment for those civic-minded individuals who have in many cases made sacrifices in order to help the community.

McKibbin said facilities for Miami Brick and Stone were financed and completed in the past year and the plant is now in full operation and, according to a company executive, are having trouble keeping up with the demand for cement products.

"Construction was recently begun, after the SRA loan approval, for facilities for Pinebreeze Farms engaged in the processing and distribution of eggs for all outlets of Winn-Dixie Stores," McKibbin added.

Commenting on the recent fire at Blakely Paint Company, the president advised that the company had suspended operations for the time being and "it is hoped that Blake can overcome some obstacles and again be in operation in the near future."

McKibbin said the SSDC would be in a position to offer further financial assistance to Blake, if need be.

He continued with news that a small building had been erected near Casselberry for Water Bonnet Company, and the structure would be used for glass tempering. "They are looking to us for guidance and possible financing of a 100,000 square foot building," McKibbin added.

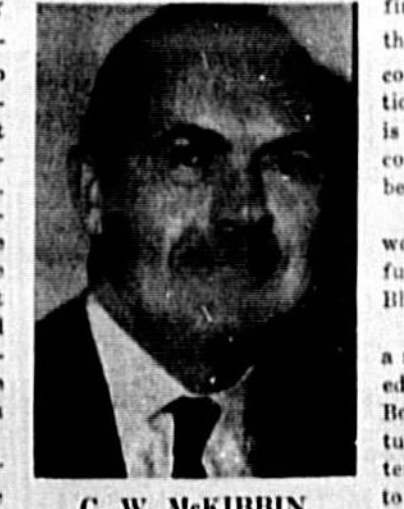

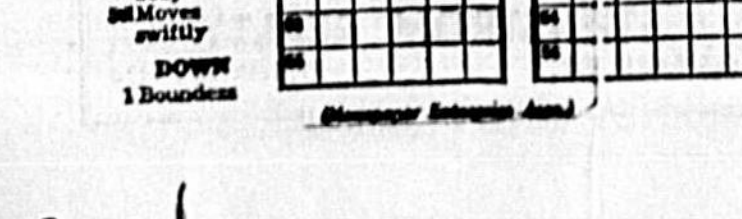

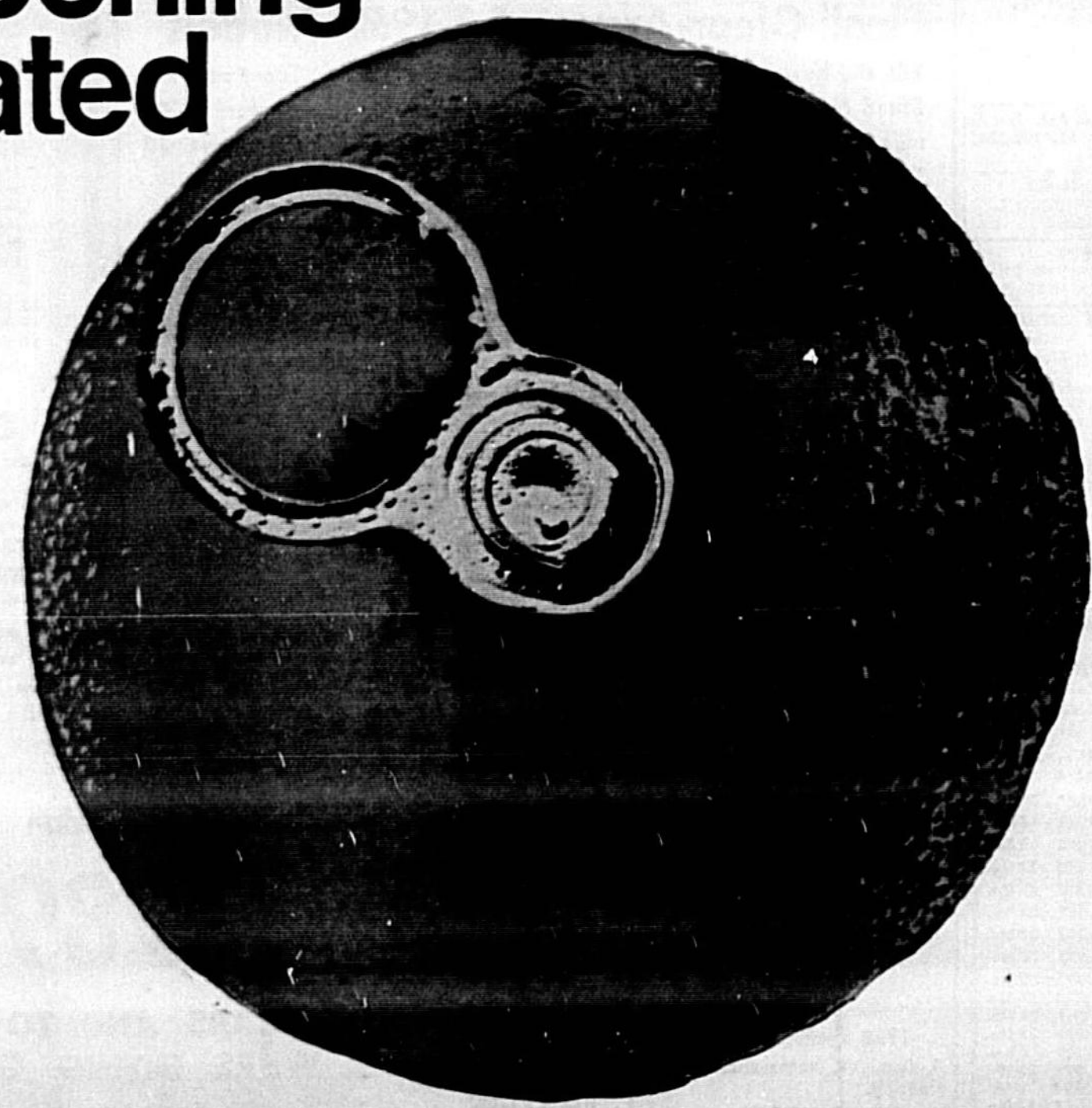
