Reason Wanted!

There isn't any way to say it, in these troubled times, without offending what may be a vast majority of the American people-white and black, rich and poor, educated and illiterate. But we are troubled by the apparent disappearance of reason from the national societythe substitute of emotion for logic, of violence for persuasion, of fear for faith.

The American moderate has become a man without a country. He is disowned and despised, both by the militant radicals and by the closedmind advocates of a "return to the days of the

founding fathers." Both sides are assertive and positive—the leftist mobs in the streets, the rightist legions in their wealth and political influence. The theme of each is hate. Neither cares about the welfare of the "common man"; each considers itself uncommon disciples, ordained and anointed to save the nation. Both, in their separate ways, are destroying the nation.

The militants are, of course, wrong-deliberate lawlessness, for whatever motive, offers small chance for deliverance in a democratic republic based on law and justice. But the rightists err too if they conclude, in smug disdain of truth, that the law can be used as an instrument of suppression.

There is a better way to peace and progress and brotherhood. It lies in calm appraisal, in sensible analysis, and in amicable discussion of the problems that confront the country in this age of great stress. The time is late, but it is not too late. The price of failure may be disastrous. -Asheville (N. C.) Citizen.
