\$35 Million Budget Adopted For Schools

W.A. Teague, consultant in business and finance, said in presenting the budget the school system might get yet another \$5 million into the contracted program fund, thus boosting the budget to \$43 million. No change is expected in the current 14.8 mill school tax

Operating expenses account for \$29 million of the total budget. This is \$10 million higher than last year. Salary increases for non-instructional personnel, and \$600 increases for starting teachers, will come from this section of the

budget, which is supported by 10 mills of the total levy. The board is hiring 114 full time teachers this year in an attempt to reduce the student-teacher ratio from last year's high average of 30-1. It is hoped the ratio will be reduced to 29-1 in high schools, 27-1 in middle schools, and 25-1 in elementary schools, said Teague.

The capital outlay budget of \$5.9 million will pay for new schools, renovation, and air conditioning. It is supported by the four mill tax levy voted for in the

The capital improvement budget does not at this time include an expected \$1 million from the state, nor about \$5.5 million due from the sale of state department of education bonds next January. It does include funds transferred from the operating budget of more than \$1.6 million, which will be used in







Chile Argues Over 3-Hour Revolt

Why would a Chilean army colonel lead 100 men in a few tanks and trucks on a three-hour attack against the presidential palace in Santaiago?... Most Chileans have an answer, but they do not agree.

The leftists, the Communists, Socialists and other radicals who support the Marxist government of President Salvador Allende insist that it was part of an ultrarightist plot to overthrow the

The rightists charge in turn that it was actually a leftist plot, a smoke screen behind which the Allende government hoped to suspend the constitution so as to be able to push Chile further down the road to socialism.

There would seem to be some logic in both versions.

But the full story has not been told yet. Once order was restored in Santiago, President Allende himself said that the small tank unit began shooting up La Moneda palace and the defense ministry shortly before 9 a.m., Friday, June 29. That was more than an hour before Allende ordinarily gets to his office.

Allende said that Col. Roberto Souper led the troops. Souper was to have been removed from his command that very day for alleged involvement in an attempt to forment an uprising within the ranks of Armed Regiment No. 2 the Wednesday before. The carabineros, national police, who were guarding the palace, refused the tank unit's demand to surrender, saying, "The Guard dies, but never surrenders," according to the president.

By that time, army Commander in Chief Gen. Carlos Prats and four ranking generals had mobilized six other regiments to begin their march on the palace and lift the seige, and the

Other Thoughts

The Bureau of Narcotics reports that methadone, a substitute drug used to treat herion addicts, has itself become a major object

of illicit drug traffic. Substituting one addiction for another is a doubtful approach to a drug problem to begin with. Now, methadone is creating new addicts who have never used heroin. The new drug is proving even harder to control since it can be made outside a laboratory

This could be a case of a "cure" being worse than the disease. Experience with methadone is a convincing argument for putting more emphasis on treatment programs tied firmly to eliminating dependence on drugs of any kind.



Foreigners Are Buying American

With many stock prices at bargain levels, purchase of U.S. corporate securities by foreigners reached a record high during the first three months of this year. While some people abroad have been dumping dollars in exchange for gold, others are using them to buy shares in what gives the dollar its real strength - the productivity of the American

This is not the only sign that worries about inflation, the dollar and the consequences of Watergate are being exaggerated when they are interpreted as signs that America itself is coming apart at the seams. While we may tend to think of mulit-national corporations mainly in terms of U.S. firms investing and expanding abroad, the fact is that oreign-owned multinationals are also stepping up their in-

Shades Of Yesteryear

This Invasion Is Well Anticipated

HONG KONG-The last time the Japanese invaded Hong Kong was during World War II and they came in the back door via the China mainland

British forces surrended after final resistance near the Repulse Bay Hotel, which served as an impromptu hospital. The current invasion of the British Crown Colony by Jaanese tourists- which in a single month exceeds the number of troops the Rising Run brought during World War II enters through the front door, Kai Tak Airport. Whereas in 1942, they came on foot or in ramshackle trucks and carried basic infantry weapons, today the tourist troops from Nippon arrive in glistening 747 jumbojets and are armed with sophisticated cameras and with suitcases bulging with yen

For every ten tourists that land at Kai Tak today, five are Japanese. The reason they come is that Japanese have money to spend-land prices are out of sight in their homeland and merchandise is also steeply priced-and they recognize that Hong Kong is still the place for shopping

The reports that Hong Kong is no longer the bargain basement of Asia are premature. Prices are rising, to be sure, especially real estate and wages.

But for the discerning shopper, Hong Kong still has it. I recently did some comparative pricing of stereo equipment, cameras, electronic calculators and tape recorders in Singapore, Hong Kong and Japan and found that Hong Kong still comes out lowest in terms of price and highest in terms The U.S. dollar devaluation has crimped the style of some

American tourists but the informed opinion here is that the setback is only temporary. International monetary adjustments are still under way. Meanwhile, savvy tourists are finding that the way to make their dollars go further is to stay at a hotel that is not quite so flashy.

On this trip I chose the Lee Gardens Hotel in the Causeway Bay action of Hong Kong island. Like the Hong Kong Hotel in Kowlon, the Lee Gardens combines comfort and convenience at slightly lower rates than the posh Mandarin, Hilton and Peninsula. The Park, Hyatt, August Moon, and Empress hotels also have attractive rates.

The hotel building boom in Hong Kong is a staggering phenomenon. Besides the Lee Gardens, there is the newly opened 1,000-room Excelsior in Causeway Bay. Later this summer the 32-story Furama Hotel will open fronting the harbor, a stone's throw down the pike from a 55-story office building, Asia's tallest.

When I first visited Hong Kong in 1957, the Peninsula was "the" meeting place and you half expected to see Somerset Maugham or Peter Lorre sipping a pink gin at one of the

Alas, the Peninsula's era is about to end. Although its suites are still the epitome of comfort and elegance, the operators claim the hotel's limited facilities are not paying off like they should. So, when the parent firm's (Hong Kong and Shanghai Hotels) new 1.400-room Marco Polo Hotel is opened in 1976 across the street fronting the harbor, the old Peninsula will come down, memories, nostalgia and all. The old Repulse Bay Hotel, owned by the same outfit, is due to be expanded with the construction of a tower to augment the main building with its storied veranda where spics supposedly meet each sunset for cocktails.



Most high-ranking Air Force officers in real life are not like the ones you see in those Robert Taylor, Clark Gable and James Stewart movies on the late show.

Instead of jumping up every morning, kissing June Allyson goodby and rushing over to personally lead bombing missions over targets positively sheathed in flak and bristling with enemy fighters, they get in their cars and commute to work like anybody else. When they get there, they are much more likely to "fly a desk," as the saying would have it, than an

So why, Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., and Rep. Otis Pike, D-N.Y., wanted to know, should some earthbound Air Force colonels and generals and Navy captains and admirals be receiving flight pay?

Congress had decided last year that those officers serving n noncombat assignments should not receive flight pay and t passed a law that went into effect this June 1 to cut oft unds for such payments. But then Aspin learned recently that the Air Force chief of staff, Gen. John D. Ryan, signed an order that for all practical purposes ignored the law for a

One of the 65, as fate would have it, was a Gen. John D. Ryan said that those generals and 67 colonels were in jobs that might require them to fly, whether they actually flew or not, and that such officers as the commander of the Air Force Academy were in "combat assignments."

Aspin, charging that Ryan's action represented a "clear plation of law and utter defiance of civilian authority. oined with Pike to lead a fight against a House bill that would have prolonged the lame duck flight payments until at

Somewhat surprisingly, they succeeded. A motion was passed telling the House members of a Senate-House conference committee to stand firm on the June 1 cutoff date. And Aspin and Pike are to be commended for their role in grounding the financial ambitions of men whose bodies now have their feet permanently on the ground.


They did it in the face of a lobbying blitz from officers complaining they might not be able to keep up their house payments if they lost the flight pay supplement, which is \$245 a month for a colonel, \$165 a month for a general. And if it is upheld in the conference committee, their action could make certain that the \$14.6 million a year savings foreseen in the original cutoff bill will stay in the taxpayers'


The highest pay a military officer can aspire to is \$136,000 a year, which is not an unreasonable amount. But that does not include the numerous and lucrative fringe benefits received by high-ranking officers. And in any case, if military officers are not being paid as much as they deserve, the way to rectify the situation is not to pad their paychecks with extra pay that is of doubtful legality and is even more upset

Pike said in a floor debate that perhaps those Pentagon Air Force generals most concerned about the problem were just spinning in their armchairs so fast they thought they had taken off and really were entitled to flight pay.

But in a country increasingly concerned about inflation and increasingly concerned about the behavior of the people it pays with its tax money, the issue involved is not a trifling

Walter DeVries, political scholar and veteran campaign onsultant, told me once in the aftermath of the Goldwater

Nothing of importance that happens to a political party is ever entirely washed away. It was a comment on the oft-heard argument that the Republicans could make a clean break and a fresh start after having got the arch-conservative orgy of Goldwaterism


No way, said DeVries. First off, Goldwaterites still held political power in many state organizations, especially south-

Secondly, not only some GOP leadership elements but a sizable body of rank and file Republicans still clung hard to the attitudes which had given Goldwater his base support in 1964. Again, this was particularly true in the South, where

the new hero was Ronald Reagan of California. History strongly bore out DeVries. When Richard Nixon began his 1968 presidential campaign all-out in late 1967, he first wooed and won the southern Goldwater leadership, laying down a broad and significant foundation.

Rank and file hearts in the South beat harder than ever for Reagan, by then governor of California and seen as Goldwater's natural heir. Mr. Nixon's managers helped the southern leaders keep the rank and file in leash, arguing Reagan would lose a fall election and also threatening them with the prospect that the alternative to Mr. Nixon was a liberal Nelson Rockefeller, governor of New York, whom they detested. Mr. Nixon also was plausible to many southerners and other Goldwaterites because, while he styled himself a centrist, he had been a good soldier in Goldwater's cam-

Playing that role came easier to the President than many now recall. I heard him in an astonishing October speech near Chicago, which literally had him "out-Goldwatering" Goldwater in certain dramatic assertions about U.S. nucle-



ture Department predicting farmers will harvest more corn freeze for predicted shortages in some food supplies. and soybeans this year is raising hopes in the Nixon administration that the rise in food prices can be slowed. No one says that grocery prices will go down soon, but the prospects of larger crops used to turn out meat, milk and

poultry could mean a more gradual rise. Larger crops also suggest that the United States may be able to let up in a few months on rationing soybeans and other protein feedstuff to foreign buyers. Export restrictions were put on those products recently by

the administration to assure enough for American livestock and poultry producers until new crops come in. Soaring export demand for wheat, corn and soybeans has helped boost feed costs here at home and has been mentioned

farmers on breeding stock for hogs and chickens, meaning that production of pork and poultry will be reduced soon.

Without substantial increases in grain and oilseed production this year, officials believe that American consumers would be headed for serious supermarket shortages by next winter and even sharper cutbacks in export ship-

The Agriculture Department says, however, that farmers fought off severe weather last spring and now plan to have 6 per cent more acres of corn and 24 per cent more soybeans

"This was a day that the optimist came out on top," Don Paarlberg, USDA director of economics, said Tuesday. "It there ever was a need for an abundant crop, this was it." The report said that record crops of corn and soybeans are likely this year if favorable weather continues. A record

Corn production could rise to nearly 5.9 billion bushels, a little less than Nixon planners had hoped .

A: Leave cheese in its original wrapper if possible. Cover cut surfaces tightly with waxed paper, foil or plastic to protect it from drying out. You could also store the cheese in a tightly covered container. If you want to store a large piece of cheese for a long time, dip the cut surface in melted paraffin. Any surface mold that develops on hard natural cheese should be trimmed off completely before the cheese is used. Cheese that has dried and become hard may be grated and stored in a tightly covered jar. Freezing is not recommended for most cheeses because they become crumbly and mealy when thawed.

Q: A full page ad specifically stated that a particular department store had a special on lube, oil and filter, and I arrived at the store the next day and was told that the special ran out on Sunday, the day before my appearance. How can this be? There was no date of expiration on the ad, and it plainly states this special to be on for weekdays.

A: We have contacted the regional office of the department store regarding your complaint, and you will be hearing from them. This session of the Florida Legislature passed a bill that says if merchandise is advertised in a store the merchant must have it available for sale. O: Is it true that natural organic fertilizers are not only

safer than chemical fertilizers, but produce healthier crops' Ans: Many people have falsely reached this conclusion. but in reality this is not true. Mr. Guyton Williams, Chief of the Bureau of Feed, Seed and Fertilizer of our Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, says that the only basic difference in natural organic fertilizer and chemical fertilizers is the rate at which the fertilizer elements dissolve in the soil and become more quickly available, but we have no evidence of a difference in the health of the crops. The important point to remember is that whichever you use it is necessary that all of the fertilizer elements necessary to the plant are supplied in adequate amounts. One advantage of organic fertilizers is that they keep the soil from compacting and help retain moisture.



Nixon's 'Gate Papers Cause Of Pressure

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Watergate committee and special prosecutor Archibald Cox are pressuring President Nixon to modify his tough stand against releasing presidential papers and avoid a constitutional confrontation. Committee members scheduled a closed session today to discuss the possibility of trying to subpoena the White House documents, but an aide said he does not expect any decision

Rufus Edmisten, aide to Chairman Sam J. Ervin Jr., D-N.C., said in an interview he doubts the committee will do more than "consider what course of action to take to obtain the materials the committee needs to do its job."

An Associated Press survey of all seven members of the Senate Watergate investigating committee disclosed no votes in favor of issuing a subpoena to the President to ap-

But it appeared a majority could be mustered for a vote Edmisten said the senators are "looking for signs. But so far we've seen no dove, no olive branch."

The committee has asked the White House for all documents relevant to the activities of staff members involved in the 1972 campaign. President Nixon wrote Ervin last week that to comply with eventual destruction of the indispensable principle of confidentiality of presidential papers." Edmisten said the only sign the White House might back away from that hard line was oral communications asking

for a more specific request. Meanwhile, it was learned that Cox has been quietly negotiating with the White House in an effort to avoid a similar

confrontation over presidential documents relating to Water-A White House spokesman acknowledged that discussions are going on with the prosecutor's office and that, so far, the

issue is unresolved. Cox has maintained he expects to have access to all documents necessary for his investigation and that he would make a public issue out of any lack of cooperation by the ad-






