Committed To Victory

Saturday night the Senate passed the British aid bill by a vote of 60 to 31, a majority of practically two to one, after nearly two months of debate since its introduction in the House. In favor of it were 49 Democrats, 10 Republicans and one Independent; and opposed, were 15 Democrats, 17 Republicans and one Progressive. Thus an overwhelming majority of the Democrats supported the bill, a majority of the Republicans opposed it.

Uppermost in the minds of all those voting for the bill was the hope, if not the belief, that it would keep this country out of actual warfare. It stands to reason that it sufficient aid in the form of armaments and supplies can be furnished the British to enable them to defeat the Axis powers, all danger, all possibility of attack, as far as the United States is concerned, will have been removed.

But by the same token, if the British cannot win even with all the aid we are able to give them as contemplated by the bill, we have made war absolutely inevitable for this country by its passage. To do any one of the things the bill authorizes is in itself an act of war. The only reason the Nazis do not immediately attack us is because.

only reason the Nazis do not immediately attack us is because as long as Britain stands they can't. We have, in effect, declared a state of "undeclared war" against them and they are for the moment unable to retaliate.

Thus it becomes absolutely essential to us that the British win. We have committed ourselves to a policy from which there can be no turning back. We have virtually underwritten a British victory and if the British cannot win with our material assistance alone, we will have to furnish whatever else may become necessary. For the simple fact is evident if Britain is knocked out of the war, we will be fighting the Axis alone. We have already provided them with whatever excuse for war against us may have been necessary. They will need no other,

At the parting of the ways, we might have taken the advice of the isolationists, tucked our heads in the sands, left the British Empire and Europe to their own fate, and entrusted ourselves to the benign hope that the war would never come our way. If we had it is perhaps within the realm of possibility that we would not suffer the fate of countless other nations which have followed the same course. But if the isolationists had guessed wrong and in spite of their assurances we were attacked, we would have found ourselves fighting the whole world alone and unaid-
