Jacoby On Bridge

Jim has a problem for his father:

Jim: "Take a look at the North and East hands and the bidding. Your partner opens the four of spades. The ten has played from the mouth of the dealer. What do you do with the East hand?"

"Oswald," I think, then I think a little more. I finally decide to go against the normal rule of third hand high and play my five spot. If my partner has led from the ace and king I will really look silly but I figure at least 100 to one chance of finding at least one top spade honor in declarer's hand.

Jim: "You are right on all counts. Declarer does hold the ace of spades. If you put

up your queen he will have a sure spade entry for dummy's diamond suit, and a club for

at least nine tricks. If you play the ace you will kill the hand. He still can make the hand by unusual play but the chances are he will wind up getting a couple of tricks."

Oswald: "Let's look at the whole hand. If I play low on the spade I must also duck the first diamond. Then I will try a second diamond finesse. He will be shut out of dummy entirely."

Jim: "The play to make the hand is to assume both minor suits kings are misplaced. After winning one diamond trick you lead clubs. If you finesse to finesse. This way he loses only two club tricks and ends up with three club tricks plus two tricks in each suit."

Brian London's In Boxing Only For Money

LONDON (AP)—The odd thing about Brian London, the massive-chinned Briton who fights Cassius Clay Saturday, is that he has boxed only for money.
London, a 32-year-old veteran, freely admits that he's in the game strictly for the cash.
In 11 years as a professional boxer he has earned \$200,000 and lives comfortably in a luxurious house near Blackpool. The Clay fight will fatten his bank balance by a minimum of \$15,000.
"Fighting is a lousy business, but the pay is good," London says.
London is shorter than Clay, but almost as heavy and is built like a tank.
He is confident he can beat Clay by adopting a Rocky Marciano style of fighting.
"I'm just going to get in there and have a thump," London told a newsman.
"I seem to have better fights against people who are not number one fighters than against Clay can punch."
"Someone is going to beat him one day and it might as well be me."
"My best bet will be to close in and fight in Marciano style."

Marichal's 17th Win Puts Giants On Top

Juan Marichal and Manny Mota, whose last get-together gave San Francisco a big scare, have held a long distance reunion... and given the Giants a big lift.
Pittsburgh's Mota, a former Giant outfielder who inadvertently put Marichal out of action a week ago, doubled home an eighth-inning run Tuesday night that gave the Pirates a 5-5 victory over Los Angeles.
Marichal, meanwhile, made his first appearance for the Giants since Mota slammed the car door on his pitching hand and beat New York 5-4 for his 17th victory, tying the Dod-

gers' Sandy Koufax for the major league lead.
The combination of San Francisco victory and Los Angeles defeat sent the Giants back into first place in the tight National League race, one game ahead of the Dodgers and Pirates.

New Steel Price Boost A 'Big Surprise' for a peach of a put-up job

WASHINGTON (AP)—Inland Steel Co. of Chicago boosted its prices for strip and sheet metal by \$2 to \$3 a ton Tuesday and top White House officials immediately huddled to study the situation.

Gardner Ackley, chairman of President Johnson's Council of Economic Advisors, summoned other officials for a strategy session shortly after Inland's announcement — which appar-

ently caught the administration by surprise.

Asked later about the meeting, Ackley said the council is "studying" the situation but did not comment further.

Inland Chairman Joseph L. Block announced the price increase — described by company officials as "moderate" — at the end of the business day. It would amount to the widest steel price increase since 1963.

Earlier this year Inland became involved in a major clash between the industry and the Johnson administration prompted by Bethlehem Steel Corp.'s New Year's Eve announcement of a \$5-a-ton increase for structural steel.

Inland went along with the boost a few days later but after U. S. Steel — under heavy administration pressure — announced only a \$2.74 increase, both Inland and Bethlehem

backed down. The compromise, described by Johnson as "with- in his wage-price guidelines, set off a stock market surge.

Inland played a different role in the 1962 steel industry battle with the John F. Kennedy administration when it refused to follow a general price increase initiated by U. S. Steel — the No. 1 producer. Kennedy forced the industry to rescind its price hikes.

Tuesday the company specifically raised its price on prime grade hot rolled sheets and strips from \$5.30 a hundred pounds to \$5.45. Prime grade cold rolled strips were similarly boosted 15 cents to \$6.67; a hundred pounds. Secondary grades were raised 10 cents.

Based in the Mekong Delta, it supported U. S. and Vietnamese ground units. Its headquarters has moved to Pleiku, in the central highlands, and most of the sorties by its 20 pilots are against targets in North Viet Nam.

"The jet fighters have to roll in from 12,000 to 14,000 feet of altitude. We can see where we roll in from 8,000 or over targets and we can plaster less," said Maj. Bernard Fisher.

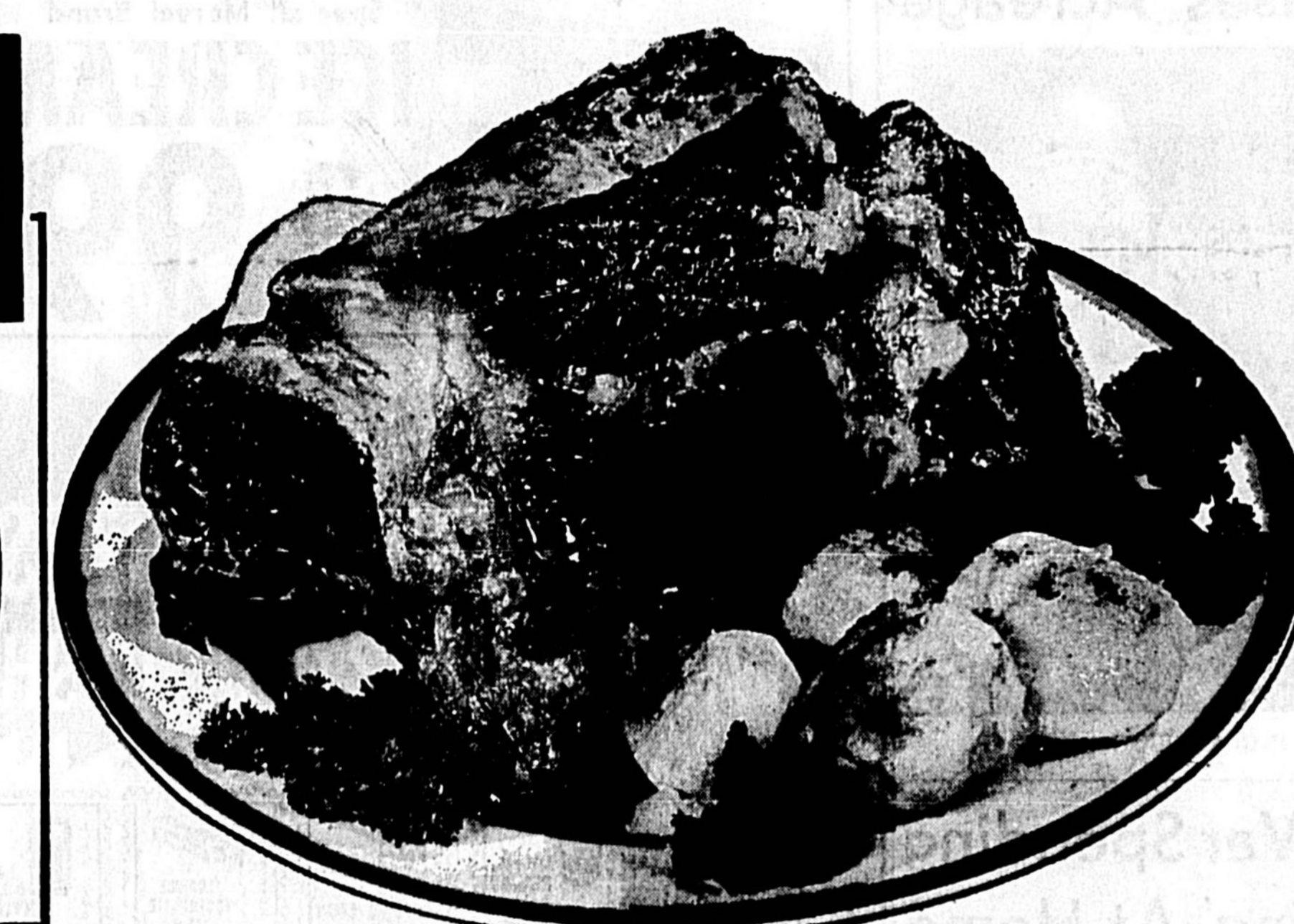

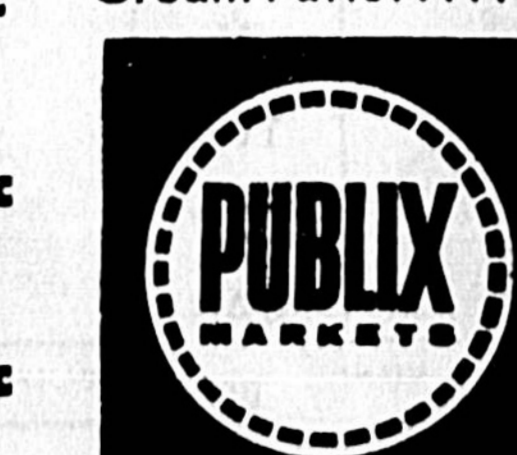
