Social Security Program Reviewed By Club Speaker

"Social Security is a federally sponsored insurance program that came out of the depression days."

"Beginning as a lump-sum payment program monthly payments were made in 1940, he explained."

"Operated by payroll taxes and self-employment taxes which go into a trust fund, the Social Security program includes old age, survivors, and disability benefits," said Edensfield.

Describing the impact on Florida and other areas, Edensfield said that at present there are 332,626 people in Florida receiving benefits checks with total disbursements of \$18,370,000 a month or \$220,000,000 annually.

"Few people save from Social Security benefits," Edensfield commented, "because it is money needed."

In the five-county area served by the Central Florida Social Security Administration office there are 26,724 people receiving benefit checks for a total amount of \$1,464,857 a month.

And in Seminole County, Edensfield pointed out, 2,300 people receive benefit checks for a \$117,800 monthly amount. "This is \$14 million a year coming into Seminole County," he said.

"This is a big thing because it means a quality of security around which a person can plan his life," said Edensfield.

Edensfield, a representative from the Central Florida office of the Social Security Administration, was introduced by Bob Carnie, Carnie said "This is the current topic of current interest," as he quoted from a news article which brought out that "every election year since 1933 Congress has liberalized Social Security benefits."

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Comptroller Sending Man To Investigate Citizens' Complaints

A representative from the office of Ray E. Green, State Comptroller, will be in Sanford Monday morning to begin an investigation into the inequities and methods in the Seminole County Tax Assessor's office, John Krider, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, said today.

"I talked with Mr. Green this morning," Krider said, "and advised him of the action and resolution taken at the meeting of the Equalization Board yesterday."

Krider said "I told him that the resolution was a unanimous decision of the board in which the State Comptroller was asked to send representatives of his office here to investigate complaints."

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Local Headquarter For Better Schools Opens On Park Ave.

Seminole County Headquarters for Better Schools has been opened at 108 North Park Ave., according to an announcement from the Sanford-Seminole County Junior Chamber of Commerce today.

Mrs. W. F. Thorn will man the office from now until after the school bond election on Sept. 9, said M. L. Raborn Jr., chairman of the Jaycee School Bond Issue Committee.

Mrs. Thorn will be available to secure answers to questions anyone may have concerning the School Bond Election, give location of the polling places and coordinate the activities of other groups working for the passage of the School Bond election.

The county headquarters will be open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. each day, it was announced.

Those seeking information on any phase of the coming election are asked to phone FA1rfix 3-1960.

"Our main purpose in opening this office is to better inform the public of the need for school improvements and urge them to actively support and vote 'For Bonds' in the election on Sept. 9," said Raborn.

Sen. Holland Accuses Pepper Of Political Heresy Against Party

By United Press International The question of party loyalty has popped up again in the heated Pepper-Holland senatorial campaign.

This time former Sen. Claude D. Pepper was on the receiving end.

Sen. Spessard L. Holland, obviously angered at Pepper's attempts to pin the "Republican" label on him, accused his opponent of political heresy against the Democratic Party in 1946.

Holland, in a radio speech at Perry Thursday, quoted Pepper as advising a labor rally to "if necessary, leave reactionaries at home and elect liberal Republicans if you can find them."

He said Pepper made the statement in a speech before the 20th convention of the Railroad Trainmen in Miami Beach.

Pepper, meanwhile, repeated his charge that Holland has accepted "back door support" from race-baiting extremists while pretending that he wants no part of them. And he said Holland is violating the election law in doing so.

Pepper, campaigning in Orlando, accused Holland of publicly denying but privately accepting aid from such organizations as the Jacksonville Citizens for Holland Committee. The committee has been circulating pictures showing Pepper with Negro singer Paul Robeson, an admitted Communist sympathizer.

Equalization Meet Turns Into Personality Fight

The Board of Seminole County Commissioners yesterday, sitting as a Board of Equalization, unanimously adopted a request to call representatives of the State Comptroller in to settle the question of equalization.

Basic for the request was the decision by members of the board that they are not capable of handling the equalization problem which had grown "too broad and widespread."

"I do not want to certify these rolls," said Commissioner Lawrence Swafford "and I suggest that these complaints be held in abeyance until the State Comptroller makes a decision."

By roll call vote, each commissioner approved the move to ask State Comptroller Ray E. Green to send members of his staff in to investigate the problem of equalization on the basis of complaints which had been made.

Prior to the decision of the board, the afternoon session of the Board of Equalization broke into a personality fight when Mrs. Mary Earle Walker, during an attempt by Bralley Odham to speak, said "Suppose you take that nasty look off of your face and act like a decent man."

Odham replied "I'll look as decent as I can under the present circumstances."

In an argument over personal property tax, Odham told the board "I am confident that the form which requires full cash values will be upheld in court, and if it takes that action, I'll do just that."

Continuing his argument, Odham attempted to make a point when the Tax Assessor again interrupted and remarked "I wish you would take that look off your face and speak decently."

Again Odham replied and said "The look on my face that you are not decent might be a smile of joy to others."

Shortly after this point and following the reading of all protests filed with the board, Commissioner Swafford commented "I just wonder if we can make a decision on any of them."

Chairman John Krider admitted "I am not qualified to make a decision."

Commissioner Homer Little stated "I certainly know that I am not qualified."

"I would be willing to hire an appraiser," said Commissioner B. C. Dodd, admitting that he was not qualified to decide on the values of homes.

It was at this point that Commissioner Swafford proposed that Comptroller Ray E. Green be requested to send his personnel to Sanford to check the apparent inequities.

Explosions Shatter Calm In Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Two bomb explosions shattered Beirut's calm today in a grim reminder that antigovernment elements have not given up the fight.

Two persons were reported killed and four injured in one of the blasts.

The bombings were the second major explosions since the election of Chhab as president July 31. Last Friday, two persons were killed and 15 injured in a bomb blast.

The major opposition forces have been observing an "armed truce" since Chhab's election. It was believed the bombings were the work of some extremist group.

A police sergeant on the scene said ten persons were killed and four injured when one bomb exploded in the Ben Azza Cafe in the Place des Canaux, Beirut's main square.

However, no official confirmation was immediately available. No one was hurt in the other explosion in the Bab el Driss section of the capital.

Scattered shooting echoed on the edges of rebel-held sectors of Beirut Thursday night. But the gunfire was far less than was usually heard in the city before Parliament elected Chhab last Thursday to succeed Chamoun.

Beirut police Thursday began a campaign to disarm the population by collecting all policemen seize weapons they see being carried in public.

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Dr. Arthur Smith Dies This Morning

Dr. Arthur D. Smith, 70, died this morning at Orange Memorial Hospital in Orlando. Born Feb. 2, 1882, in Columbia, Pa., he moved to DeBary two years ago from his home in East Orange, N. J.

Dr. Smith practiced dentistry in Newark, N. J., for 45 years, retiring in 1946. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania Dental College in 1908. Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Magdalene Smith of DeBary; one daughter, Mrs. Madelyn Kuhn, Sanford; two sons, Arthur D. Smith Jr., New York City; W. Stewart Smith, Schenectady, N. Y.; nine grandchildren and four sisters.

Funeral services will be conducted at Brison Funeral Home at 2 p. m. Sunday with the Rev. T. C. O'Steen officiating. Burial is to be in Oaklawn Memorial Park.

Commission Candidates Address Jaycees

Candidates for two seats on the Board of Seminole County Commissioners spoke from the same platform yesterday as they appeared before the Sanford-Seminole County Junior Chamber of Commerce during yesterday's noon luncheon meeting.

The speakers were incumbent Fred Dyson and his opponent David Gatchel who are candidates for Seminole County Commissioner, District 3; and incumbent B. C. Dodd and his opponent Vernon W. Dunn, who are candidates for Seminole County Commissioner, District 4.

Each candidate was introduced by Everett Harper, program chairman for yesterday's meeting of the local Jaycee organization.

Gatchel concluded "Think of what is facing your county commission today. I feel you want a man that is qualified, has an open mind, and will not be a rubber stamp from any group. I think you want a man who has Seminole County at heart."

Commissioner Fred Dyson spoke briefly on his candidacy for reelection. He said "I am running wholly and solely on my past record." He pointed out that "there are a lot of things my opponent is for that I am for."

"Based on my past record, one of your county commissioners for the next four years," said Dyson.

Dunn said "I have been in your state for three years," and admitted that until he became an independent candidate.

One of the highlights of his career which Gatchel pointed to was the Jaycee "Good Government Aterated in civic affairs." "I was not very well known."

"When industry looks for a place to locate," said Dunn, "they look for a place where they can get a fair shake, where taxes are equitable. I can be a full time commissioner for a full time job," he said, and "in that capacity can be of assistance to other county commissioners."

Dodd said "I have made some mistakes during the three terms I have served as county commissioner."

As his pledge, Dodd said "If I have another four years I will try to do the same job for you that I have done before."

In answers to questions from the audience, all four of the candidates pledged themselves in favor of a reassessment program. Gatchel said "There are two plans: an outside appraisal; or for the personnel of the tax assessor's office to make the appraisal in a reasonable length of time. Either of these plans would receive my vote."

Dunn stated "An equalization program is the only solution."

Dodd stated that "After going through what we have experienced the past two or three weeks something must be done."

Commissioner B. C. Dodd, in his bid for reelection, told the Jaycees "I have served as a county commissioner for 12 years. I have done the best I could."

Top Spot Seen For No. Seven Man In Red China Today

HONG KONG (UPI)—He's only ranked No. 7 in the Peiping hierarchy, but the man to watch today in Red China is Teng Hsiang-Ping.
It may well be that Mao Tse-Tung has handpicked Teng as his eventual successor.
The notion that Teng is on his way up has been in observers' minds for some time. Recent developments have tended to strengthen speculation about his growing power in China's Communist Party.
Teng, who was born in Szechwan Province around the turn of the century, holds two key posts, Secretary-General of the party's Central Committee and Secretary of the all-powerful standing committee of the party's politburo. He also is a vice premier.
These jobs give him enormous power over the party's mechanism. And it should be noted that central committee secretaryship is the closest thing to the party job which the late Joseph Stalin held in Russia and never gave up. Mao has never held that title, probably because he hasn't tried to.
Diplomatic sources admit that evidence of Teng's growing importance is somewhat intangible. On protocol lists, he still is ranked No. 7 in the party.
But there have been instances of Teng's being held in Mao's confidence above Liu Shao-Chi and Chou En-Lai, the two most widely accepted candidates for Mao's chairmanship.
For one thing, it was Teng, and no one else, who accompanied Mao to face-to-face conferences with Nikita Khrushchev in Moscow last fall.
Then too, Teng has been making more and more speeches on Chinese Communist policy and campaigns. In May he delivered a lengthy speech to the party's National Congress. The speech has never been published, but it is believed that it dealt with "revisionism."
From that speech may have come the bitter attacks against President Tito and the Yugoslavs.
Teng first joined the Communist Party in Paris where he was a fellow student of Chou.
He did organizational work for the party on his return to Shanghai in 1925 and in 1927 helped organize the Seventh and Eighth Armies, one of which he commanded.
During the following years, he held a number of party posts, mostly in the southwest. In 1953, he served on the committee named to draft a constitution and took over several important government and party posts.
He made a big splash in 1953 when he delivered the report on the Kan Kung-Jao Chu-Shih conspiracy to overthrow the regime. In April of that year, Teng was elected to the politburo.
Chinese intellectuals describe Teng as argumentative and even arrogant toward his colleagues. He is nevertheless regarded as highly articulate and a clever politician.

195,414 Prisoners Confined In U. S. Jails Last Year

WASHINGTON (UPI)—There were more inmates in U. S. prisons last year than in any other year in the nation's history, the Federal Bureau of Prisons has reported.
But the number of women prisoners declined.
In a year-end review, Bureau Director James V. Bennett reported that there were 195,414 prisoners confined in state and federal jails and reformatories on Dec. 31, 1957.
Bennett's report showed the rise in the prison population last year was proportionately higher in

state prisons than in federal institutions. State prisoners numbered 174,994 at the end of 1957, up 5,563 or 3.2 per cent over the previous year.
The number behind bars in federal penitentiaries and reformatories totaled 20,420, an increase of 296 or 1.4 per cent.
The number of women in jail at the end of 1957 was 7,001, a drop of 74 inmates from the same period in 1956.
The prison bureau also said that 30 states recorded increases in persons serving time. Of those, the top seven included New Mexico with a 14.3 per cent increase; Florida, 11 per cent; Arizona, 10.7 per cent; Indiana, 9 per cent; Texas and California, 8.5 per cent each, and Wyoming, 8 per cent.

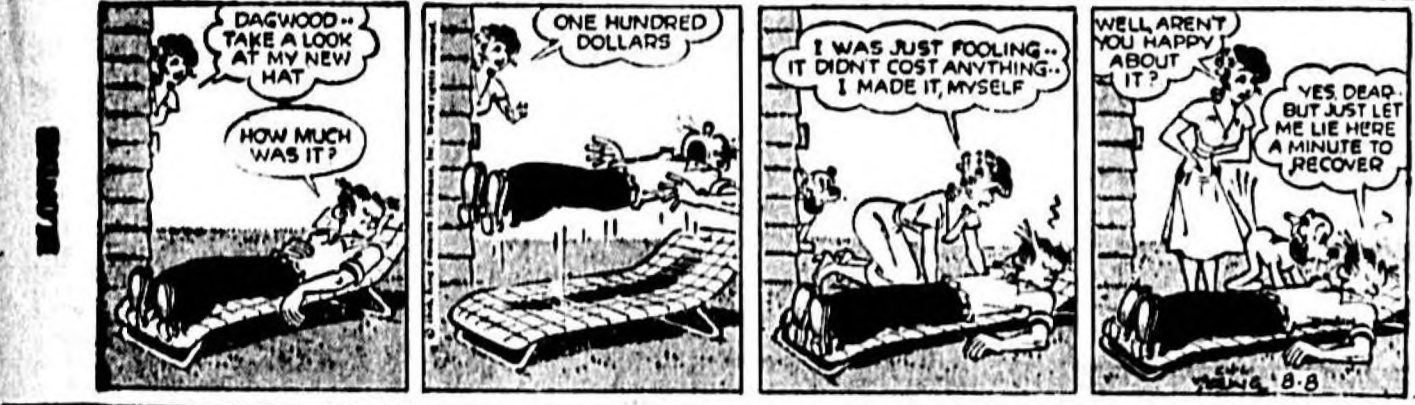
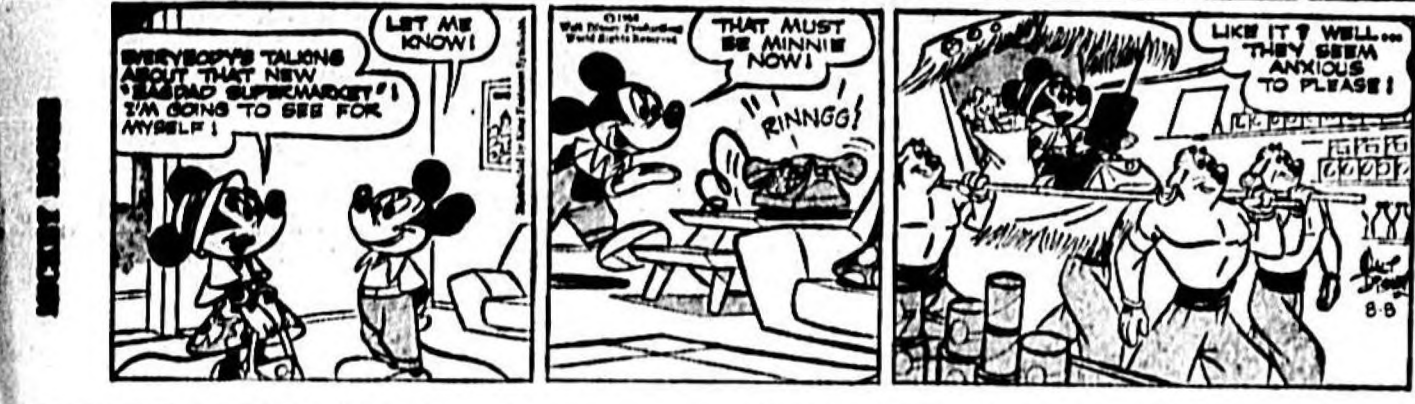

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Leonardo's 'Last Supper' Protected Against Nature

By HENRY MACLENNON
MILAN, Italy—(UPI)—It was about 50 years ago that a group of noted art experts stood before a large fresco-painting in the Santa Maria delle Grazie Convent here and sadly pronounced it lost to the world.

The painting was the 461-year-old masterpiece, "The Last Supper" by Leonardo da Vinci.

News of the loss swept Italy and the world. Italian poet-soldier Gabriele d'Annunzio dedicated an ode to its passing entitled: "To the Death of a Masterpiece."

But the experts were wrong. Soon, other experts came along and said they could repair the fresco. Slowly, painstakingly, work began on bringing it back to life.

The restorer was employed by Mauro Pelliccioli, who worked on the painting for seven years without pay.

Today, Leonardo's masterpiece is completely restored to its former splendor, having narrowly escaped the ravages of war, nature and time.

But it will never be out of danger. A constant vigil is necessary to guard the work against deterioration. It could occur without warning.

However, everything humanly possible has been done to protect the fresco. Pelliccioli applied an adhesive substance to the crumbling wall around the fresco in the convent refectory. A kind of central heating system was laid in the floor to regulate room temperature and humidity.

In a way, it was Leonardo's own fault that his masterpiece stands in such constant danger. He neglected to use a water-color mixture that would resist time and weather.

But this was his only lapse. He spent nearly 18 years meditating on the idea for the painting, drawing countless designs and sketches before actually getting down to work.

He patiently examined every artistic and technical element involved and only when he believed every problem solved did he begin to paint.

Leonardo's "The Last Supper" is a masterpiece for its sublime spirituality and his technical skill. It differs from other "Last Supper" paintings in that every disciple shows an intense individual emotion.

The painter placed the 12 disciples in groups of three with the central figure of Jesus bathed in light from a window behind Him.

Leonardo never seemed to be satisfied with the models who posed as the disciples and he often went into the country districts around Milan searching for new ideas with the exact facial expressions he had in mind.

It was on one of these trips that Leonardo met a young peasant farmer who became the model for his Jesus. And it was not until he was ready to start to work on the painting years later that he found the face he wanted for Jesus: Itariot—the same peasant farmer.

Colonel Shows How Friends Are Won At Japanese City Air Base

TOKYO—(UPI)—Less than two years ago, the U. S. would have been hard put to find a friend in the big Japanese city of Fukuoka.

Relations between the 8,000 Americans of sprawling, strategic Itazuka air base and the 800,000 citizens of greater Fukuoka were bad — so bad, as one Air Force officer said sourly, "they couldn't have gotten worse."

But today, things could hardly be better at the keystone jet base in southwestern Japan. Itazuka, in fact, has become a model for military installations all over the Far East.

The chief reason for the startling change was a six-foot Irishman from Pottstown, Pa., Col. Frederick M. O'Neill, who left Japan for a new assignment in mid-July.

When O'Neill took command of the Itazuka base in February 1967, most of Fukuoka's residents were agitating bitterly to boot Itazuka out of their city.

Right-winger, middle-of-the-road or Communist, nobody liked the idea of a big American air base within the city limits or of supersonic jets whizzing the sound barrier at all hours of day and night.

Itazuka's top brass ignored the agitation. They ignored the local leaders of Fukuoka as well, with the result that a Communist-sponsored base relocation committee had won the support of the City Assembly chairman and most of Fukuoka's citizens.

The rearing of Itazuka's brass was simple: the base was too ugly a plum to give up, so no effort had to be made to keep Fukuoka's people happy. Itazuka's only air hour's flying time by jet to Vladivostok, Shanghai and Port Arthur, and within bomber striking distance of most of California's eastern coast.

O'Neill figured that if this kept up, two things were liable to happen: First, in the words of an Air Force analyst of the situation, he immediate military usefulness of Itazuka would be seriously curtailed.

Second, "the total position of the U. S. vis-a-vis Japan would be seriously affected."

The 46-year-old combat flier put together a staff of top-flight deputies and went to work improving abysmally bad Japanese-American relations.

He called on local officials — the first social calls paid by an Itazuka base commander in years. He visited the president of Kyushu University, who was particularly anxious to get the base out of Fukuoka because his classrooms — only four miles from the jet runways — trembled with every take-off.

O'Neill set up a community relations council, including the governor of the prefecture, Fukuoka's mayor and several business and cultural leaders.

Strange things began happening in the big industrial city. The women emerged from the cloistered walls of their "Little America" within Itazuka and met Japanese women socially. Jet pilots had firm orders to wait until they were well clear of the city before they broke the sound barrier.

The program was off to a good start. But two things happened on the night of Feb. 20, 1967, that could have wrecked it completely and plunged Japanese-American relations to a new low.

First, a C-47 transport collided in mid-air with an F-100 jet, showering debris on a crowded Fukuoka suburb. Three American airmen died, several Japanese were injured and half a dozen homes were demolished.

Within an hour, O'Neill had rushed food, blankets and perimeter tents to the scene of the disaster. He paid personal sympathy calls on the mayor and governor and spoke with the injured Japanese.

The next day, the Communists — whose local headquarters happened to be 10 yards from the edge of the crash scene — staged an anti-American rally that flared as stars of the rally, refused to go on.

That same night of Feb. 20, three American airmen raped a Japanese girl and beat an old man to death when he tried to help her.

Fukuoka's city council summoned an emergency protest meeting but O'Neill's executive officer, Col. James I. Webster, strode in during the middle of the session, expressed his sympathy and regret and promised swift air force action against the offenders.

The meeting broke up and the subject was dropped. Later, Japanese courts sentenced the airmen to two to five years in prison.

Unwanted Child Loses 2nd Mother In Plane Crash

LONDON (UPI)—Three-year-old Anthea Lycett, unwanted daughter of a British noblewoman, lay in serious condition in an African hospital today while her real and foster families discussed her future.

Anthea was one of 18 survivors of the flaming crash of a Central African Airways Viscount near Salisbury Rhodesia Saturday. The crash killed 20 persons including Anthea's new foster mother.

All Britain was following the case of the little girl who lost two mothers within a year. She was in the British military hospital in Benghazi, Libya, with a broken arm and severe burns.

Anthea was born Marzia Miller, daughter of 37-year-old Lady Diana Miller, wife of Robert Miller, a wealthy Rhodesian.

But the British noblewoman said she "no longer had any love for the child" and offered her for adoption to foster parents despite opposition from her own and her husband's family.

The foster parents were not identified publicly until after Saturday's tragedy. The airline disclosed that the foster mother, Mrs. Maira Lycett of Salisbury, was killed while taking Anthea to London for a brief holiday.

Lady Diana said through her lawyers she has no plans to take the child back, but her mother, the dowage Countess of Yarborough, told reporters "we shall have to investigate the legal situation."

The countess was so bitter when Lady Diana gave her daughter away she cut Lady Diana out of her will.

The child's foster grandmother, Mrs. Florence Miller, said "I shall try to get her back in the family."

The foster father, Michael Lycett, 30, an insurance broker, was on a canoe expedition on the Zambezi River when he learned of his wife's death. He was located by a plane which flew over the jungles in a day-long search and then flew him to Anthea's bedside Sunday night.

Also taken by the Sheriff and beverage men were Gay's automobile and 15-gallons of illegal moonshine.

Gay was brought to the Seminole County Jail where he was held until the still and other paraphernalia could be destroyed by the officers.

Accompanying Sheriff Hobby on the raid was K. J. Lester, acting district supervisor of the State Beverage Department in this area, as well as other state and federal officers.

Holland Says Will Stick To Record In Campaign

Sen. Spenard L. Holland said Sunday he would stick to the record in his campaign for reelection and that "name-calling has no place in a Democratic primary."

Claude D. Pepper, his opponent, countered that he was "delighted to hear" that Holland was going to run on his record. He said Holland's record was one "that brands him as a supporter of the Republican Party and with no record of support for the average working man and average citizen of Florida."

Holland, speaking in his hometown of Bartow, said if Pepper was returned to Congress, Florida would be represented by only one senator instead of two.

He said when Pepper was in the Senate before, he "strayed so far from the thinking of the people that he impaired the unity and effectiveness of the Florida delegation."

The senator added that "name-calling has no place in a Democratic campaign" and that he has "no intention of resorting to those tactics in this or any other election."

Holland said "the voters of Florida are intelligent people and I don't think they are interested in infectiveness. They are interested in what's on the record. When they have compared my record in the Senate with that of

my opponent, I don't think they will take a chance on him again."

Pepper told an audience in Crandon Park in Miami that "my accomplishments for Florida and for the country speak for themselves." He added "my main concern now is the future of Florida and this country—a program of assistance for our senior citizens, a realistic program of relief for the people in small business, industrial developments throughout the states, and the adequate and deserved benefits owed to our veterans."

The former senator also called for expanding Florida's port facilities. "All our ports need to be deepened to a depth of 40 feet to accommodate the largest ships which are now moving in general commerce," Pepper said.

In other areas, he urged the stepping up of Florida's flood control program. Pepper said the flood control set up is operating at only 25 per cent of the rated progress which was contemplated for it when it was authorized.

Holland left for Orlando today for a radio talk and two other addresses. Tonight, he tours Winter Garden and will spend the next two days in Jacksonville.

Pepper campaigned today in Okeechobee, Highland and Manatee counties. Tonight he will address the Democratic Women's Club in Bradenton.
