Bush appoints Tanner to handle Wood case

income from the April 10 and 11 concert at Seminole Greyhound Park have been stonewalled.

The time for making excuses is past," said Mason. "It's time to answer some questions. The Human Society's leadership should be responsible. This arrogance is a dangerous thing. The Society is a wonderful organization that does tremendous good. Now it's time for us to do some house cleaning and move

forward."

The Society's executive director, Jeff Cashatt, says Mason is a minority voice and was against the concert fund-raiser from the beginning.

"It was a first time effort for us and we were disappointed in the outcome," said Cashatt of the rock-country double header. "We were expecting to make a substantial profit. It's time for us to move on and try something else."

Cashatt and Mason's disagreement over fund raising strategies dates back to the summer of 1998 when the concert fund raiser was first suggested. The majority of the board voted to enter into a contractual agreement with Forbidden Records, an Orlando-based promotions company to handle talent booking, advertising and promotion of the event.

At that time Mason was the lone dissenting vote. He repeatedly sent memos to other board members and Cashatt with pointed questions and concerns about whether the Humane Society should have become involved in such a risky venture, and whether the Society See Concert, Page 5A



Longwood police nab sexual offender

Law enforcement officials frustrated by registration loopholes

SANFORD - Loopholes in Florida state law regulating the movement and registration of sexual offenders and predators continue to frustrate municipal police agencies. The latest incident took place this week in Longwood.

Jeffrey Kevin Prescott, 37, was resisting a police officer with vio-

arrested Tuesday by Longwood lence. He was sentenced in 1991 police on charges of lewd and lascivious conduct in front of two children. According to police reports Prescott, who moved to Longwood from Orange County sometime within the last three to six months, exposed himself to two neighborhood children while they were swimming in their backyard pool. Prescott was watching the girls through a fence from the adjacent property when the incident took place.

His offenses date back to 1980 and include convictions for lewd and lascivious acts in the presence of a child, burglary, attempted sexual battery on a child and

to a total of 32 years in prison and 18 years of probation. He served only six years of that sentence, benefiting by being imprisoned prior to 1995, when state law changed, requiring inmates to serve at least 85 percent of their jail time prior to their release.

Longwood police chief Tom Jackson said the Prescott situation is a perfect example of loopholes that frustrate law enforcement officials.

"He was required to register with this police department when he moved to Longwood," said Jackson. "He had not done See Offender, Page 5A

county, schools could provide community parks

SANFORD - With a shortage of neighborhood parks, Seminole County officials are looking for ways to cooperate with schools for additional space.

Seminole County is seeking have a neighborhood park within walking distance of every resident, and a larger community park within a 10 to 20 minute drive of every county resident.

The county's 10-year parks, trails and greenways draft master plan calls for elementary and middle school facilities to be accessible as neighborhood parks.

The School Board on Tuesday hosted county officials for a work session to discuss ways in which the two government entities can cooperate on projects such as the parks.

Representatives from elementary and middle schools said

already receive active use as unofficial neighborhood parks after school hours.

"What's happened is your analysis is correct," Chairman Larry Furlong said. "There is a shortage of neighborhood parks, and the schools have been drafted into becoming substandard neighborhood parks. We are in a sense picking up the shortage of field space. We can't do much more with our facilities than we already do." Seminole County officials are making plans to build an interconnected system of greenways, trails and walkways. The County estimates that the total cost of the program will be \$56

Included in the proposal are new 40-acre community parks in the Lake Mary-Sanford area and Oviedo, plus expansion of Lake Mills Park with the purchase of an additional eight acres.

There would be 35.6 miles of paved trails and 20.3 miles of natural trails.

The plan also would include four sites for canoe launches and a 3,000- to 5,000-square-foot nature center.



Tom Hagood came by this week to sign up for the District 3 Seminole County Commissioner's Race 2000.

Hagood is challenging incumbent Grant Maloy.

At 37, Hagood is four years older than Maloy. He also has four children to Maloy's three. No chance for Maloy to play the family card.

As a four-term Oviedo City Councilman, Hagood is a familiar name in the territory. Definitely a viable commission candidate say most political insiders.

"There's an opportunity here," Hagood said Wednesday. "I'm not coming in out of the dark. I've got name recognition. The people who have been urging me to run say they're tired of Grant Maloy voting 'no' to everything that comes up."

Recently, Maloy nixed a proposal for the county to buy 80 acres of land near Oviedo. "There was money for it (\$1 million), and

it would have made a fine county park," Hagood said. "Now, it looks as though there's going to be a lot of little houses on that land."

Good for Hagood - he's joined the race

Naturally, Hagood has deep interest in the southeast sector but said his candidacy is for the good of the entire county.

"I've been on the Express Way Committee, I've dealt with the sitting county commissioners," he said. "We've dealt with many simillar issues."

Although a Republican, Hagood said he is not connected to either of the fractions that split the Seminole Republican Party.

"I've tried not to be involved -I've been non partisan while on the city council."

Maloy said Wednesday that he felt good about running for a second-term on the commission. He said he welcomed the challenge

by Hagood and that he expected there would be another candidate -- possibly two more in the District 3 race.

"I'm pleased that I have more volunteers than I did on my first run," Maloy said. "People who helped in the decency vote are with me. Because of this, I suspect the adult entertainment industry will be getting its candidates into the race. That's where the



had the financial wherewithal to promote the concert. Mason also questioned the relationship of some board members with employees of Forbidden Records, and wrote, "I have been told that the total outlay that the Humane Society will be responsible for is approximately \$250,000. Considering that we have roughly \$8,000 in the bank, this would appear to be a risky undertaking." In addition, Mason also ques-

In addition, Mason also questioned the board's wisdom in entering into a contract, since no board members had any legal expertise in the area of entertainment law. He also suggests that the board may have gambled with anticipated bequest money it expected in the future to help cover the cost of putting on the concert.

"At one point in a meeting I heard someone comment, 'We can't keep operating on dead people's money, we have to find new ways to raise funds," Mason said.

David Brodie, vice president of Forbidden Records says his company fully explained to the Human Society that concert promotion is a risky business.

"The very first thing we told them was that the budget for an event like this would run about \$150,000 and that with concerts you never know how many people are going to show up," Brodie said. "This is a ballsy business and Orlando is a fickle market."

Brodie said he, too, was absolutely shocked at the poor turnout. His recollection is that only 44 people showed up for the Saturday rock portion of the concert which featured artists such as Badfinger, The Fabulous Thunderbirds and others. A day later approximately 200 showed for the country portion of the concert headlined by popular artist Tracy Byrd.

"I was absolutely shocked. You can not advertise in this

market and still draw 500-1,000 people with names like that." Brodie said Forbidden Records acted as an agent for the Humane Society but ultimately it was the Society's event to promote.

"We had well placed media buys and began selling tickets in February at local outlets and Ticketmaster," Brodie said. "We began to track ticket sales and they were horrible. After the first day of the concert we advised the Humane Society to cancel day two. They thought the risk was worth taking."

Forbidden Records has confirmed the Society still owes the promotion company money for media buys, bounced checks, and other expenses it incurred on behalf of promoting the event. Brodie termed the sums "substantial," and said his company is getting pressure from Clear Channel Communications, owner of a number of Orlando radio stations, to pay the bills for radio advertising schedules assoclated with the concert promotion.

"We're going to have to deal with the financial situation between the Human Society and Csear Channel in a reasonable business manner," he said. "Where it leads, it leads. In a letter sent by Forbidden Records to the Human Society dated May 25, 1999, the promotions company accuses the Human Society of attempting to make Forbidden Records its "scapegoat" for the failed venture and demands payment of more than \$5,000 it claims the organization still owes it. A May 18, 1999, letter

Human Society still owes Frizell more than \$22,000 for booking artists Wade Hayes, Tracy Byrd, and The Fabulous Thunderbirds and that a negotiafor docum

tion for payment is being

attempted. "I've asked repeatedly for an audit with hard data that shows just how much we lost and where the money went." said Mason. "To this date as a board member, I've received nothing." Cashatt said the Humane Society is currently conducting an audit but that it is incomplete.

"We're waiting on substantiated documentation of some invoices from Forbidden Records," Cashatt said. "Then we'll have a better handle on a final figure."

Cashatt repeatedly denied requests for an estimated sum of losses associated with the concert. "We're a private organization, we don't have to provide that information," he said. "We were disappointed in the outcome of the concert, we expected to make a substantial profit. It was our first time. We'll

ido " learn from the experience and move forward."

paying our bills," he said. Mason said he is still waiting for documentation of expenses and income to determine exactly how much was lost on the concert promotion.

"Would you empty your savings account and mortgage your house and future on something you've never done before?" he questioned. "The Human Society mortgaged its future on a whim. This concert wasn't just a bomb, it was a nuclear explosion. Management of the Human

that. But because laws restricting the movement and registration of convicted sexual offenders and sexual predators have changed since 1992, there's no system of checks and balances to keep track of people like him."

Jackson said because the state was not tracking Prescott, local police are often left behind the eight-ball.

"It was his requirement to notify this police agency he moved into our jurisdiction," said Jackson. "With loopholes in the law like this, a resident could have a sexual predator living on one side of them that is required to register with us and a sexual offender living on the other side who is not required to register because of the date of their conviction and legal 'grandfather-

s ing."

Jackson said police agencies are required to notify residents within a specific perimeter when a registered sex offender relocates to their area.


"Some people can be rehabilitated, some people can not," said Jackson. "Why do we have 'three strikes and your out?" Here's a guy with two strikes, why should he get another chance to break the law?"


Jackson said its frustrating for police to deal with similar situations.

Furlong and Suzie Goldman, director of leisure services for Seminole County, encouraged the schools to form proposals concerning ways the county can assist the schools in coordinating after-school activities. School Board member Bob Goff said that he is concerned about people using school grounds after hours without adding security.

Consultant Julie Scofield of Glatting Jackson, Inc. said that neighborhood parks normally do not have security.

"Yes, but it's different when you have a \$10-15 million (school) facility in the middle of the park, with all kinds of crevices," Furlong said.

The School Board in October will discuss the master plan conducted by Glatting Jackson, Inc. for Seminole County. The plan calls for developing an inter-local agreement for public use of school facilities.

Incapacity may lead to removal of rights

Under Florida law, when a person is unable to manage at least some of their property or to meet at least some of the their essential health and safety requirements, he or she may be judicially determined to be incapacitated and have a guardian appointed to act on behalf of their person or property or both. Such a determination necessarily leads to the removal of certain rights on order to assist the person on meeting the essential requirements for their physical health and safety, protecting their rights, managing their financial resources, and developing or regaining their abilities to the maximum extent of the incapacity.

When a court adjudicates a person to be incapacitated the court may remove the right: (a) To marry; (b) To vote: (c) To personally apply for govern-ment benefits: (d) To have a driver's license; (e) To Travel; and (f) To seek or retain employment. Again, whether some or all of the above rights are removed depends on the extent of the incapacity.

in addition to removing the rights listed above, there are a number of rights that may be removed and which may be



delegated to the guardian. These rights include the right: (a) To contract: (b) To sue and defend lawsuits; (c) To apply for government benefits; (d) To manage property or to make any gift or disposition of prop-erty; (e) To determine his or her residence; (f) To consent to medical and mental health treatment; and (g) To make decisions about his or her social environment or other social aspects of his or her life.

However, regardless of what rights are removed, a person who has been determined to be incapacitated retains the right: (a) To have an annual review of the guardianship report and

plan: (b) To have continuing review of the need for restriction of his or her rights; (c) To be restored to capacity at the earliest possible time: (d) To be treated humanely, with dignity and respect, and to be protected against abuse, ne-glect, and exploitation; (e) To have a qualified guardian; (f) To remain as independent as pos-sible, including having his or her preference as to place and standard of living honored, etther as he of she expressed or demonstrated his or her preference prior to the determination of his or her incapacity to as he or she currently expresses his or her preference, insofar as such request is reasonable; (g) To be properly educated; (h) To receive prudent financial management for this or her property ad to be informed how his or her property and to be informed how his or her property is being managed, if he or she has lost the right to manage property: (i) To receive necessary serv-ices and rehabilitation: (j) To be free form discrimination because of his or her incapacity: (k) To have access to the courts; (1) To counsel. (m) To receive visitors and communicate with others: (n) To notice

of all proceedings related to determination of capacity and guardianship, unless the court vends the incapacitated person lacks the ability to comprehend the notice: and (o) To privacy.

As noted above, when a per-son is adjudicated incapacitated he or she may have a number of rights removed. However, the purpose of such removal is to assist the person in meeting the essential requirements for their physical health and safety, protecting their rights, managing their flnancial resources, and developing or regaining their abilities to the maximum extent possible. In the coming weeks we will discuss some of the acts that a guardian may not perform on behalf of the ward without authority from the court as well as other aspects of guardianship and estate law.




