Needed: New Industries

For many years Sanford has been known as a crop town. The success or failure of its business men has for more than a quarter of a century hinged more or less on the quality of its celery and the condition of the market.

The fallacy of trying to build a city on one economic activity has been demonstrated again and again. The old silver mining towns of the west which once boomed into thriving cities only to disintegrate into deserted villages once the lodes played out furnish adequate testimonial to this mistake.

Sanford does not have to depend entirely upon celery for its economic existence. Outside of a seacoast it has every natural advantage which any other city in Florida has, and to offset this, it is one of the few inland Florida cities with water transportation.

Sanford could have developed as a tourist resort. It has everything to offer the northern visitor, as far as natural attractions are concerned, that Orlando has. The tourists who go to Eustis, Mount Dora, Lakeland, St. Cloud, Sebring, and other Central Florida towns might have come to Sanford.

Sanford might have been the site today of the University of Florida. Or of Stetson. Sanford is as well situated for a university city as either Gainesville or Deland. And if we had a flock of students coming here from all parts of the state, or from all over the country, spending their money with local merchants, business would not feel so keenly the vagaries of the celery market.

There are new industries coming to Florida all the time. One of them is now being located at Port St. Joe at a cost of millions of dollars. One was dedicated only recently at Fernandina. There will be others next month, next year, and the year after.

More than that, Sanford should make sure that the industries already here are provided with every encouragement to remain here and continue operations. The money which they bring into the community is new money from the outside furnishing employment to hundreds of our people who otherwise might be without work or on WPA relief rolls.

We should protect our home industries and we should go after others.

Dos And Don'ts For Fishermen

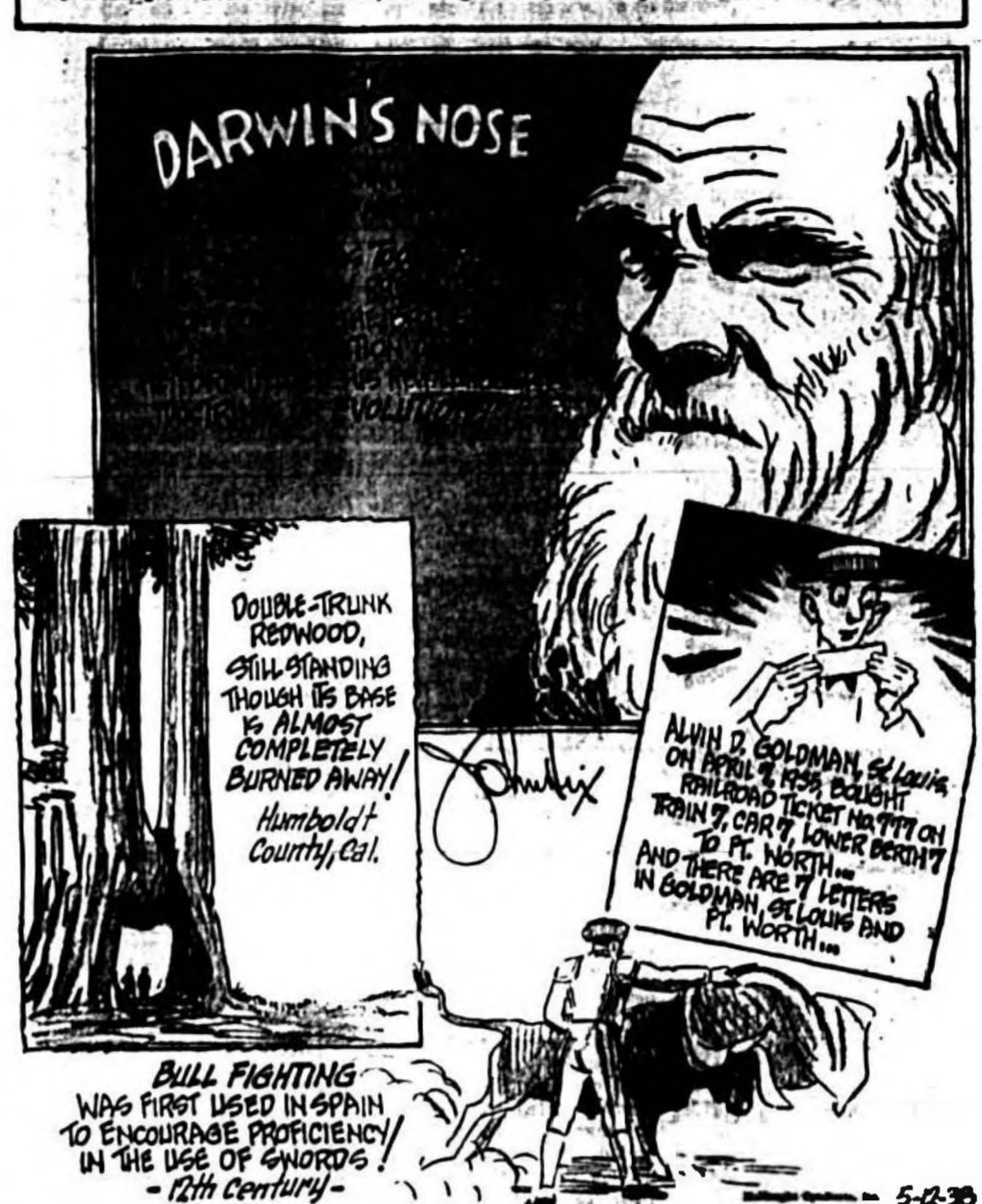
From the American Wildlife Institute comes a series of Dos and Don'ts for game fishermen which most of our local anglers know well enough already.

- 1. DO wet your hands carefully before handling under-sized fish that are to be returned to the water. A dry hand will remove a protective covering of lubricant, making the fish susceptible to attacks by bacteria.
2. DO handle under-sized fish gently and return them to the water carefully, so they will survive uninjured and provide better sport and more food for some other angler - even if it isn't you.
3. DO use barbless hooks whenever you can. Such hooks provide better sport and make it possible to return under-sized fish to the water with their mouths uninjured.
4. DO observe creel and size limits.
5. DO watch for tagged fish and report them to the agency doing the tagging. Only in this way can movements and growth rates be checked to help improve your sport.
6. DO watch your footing while wading. Even the best of swimmers are sometimes at a loss when hampered by heavy boots and clothing in swift streams.
7. DO study flashing streams and urge improvements.
8. DO take a militant part in the fight against pollution.
9. DO co-operate with your local game and fish agency in every way possible.
10. DON'T venture into the woods without a first aid kit and a knowledge of first aid in the outdoors.
11. DON'T be careless with fires or cigarettes. More than 90 percent of all forest fires in the United States are man-caused and, therefore, preventable.

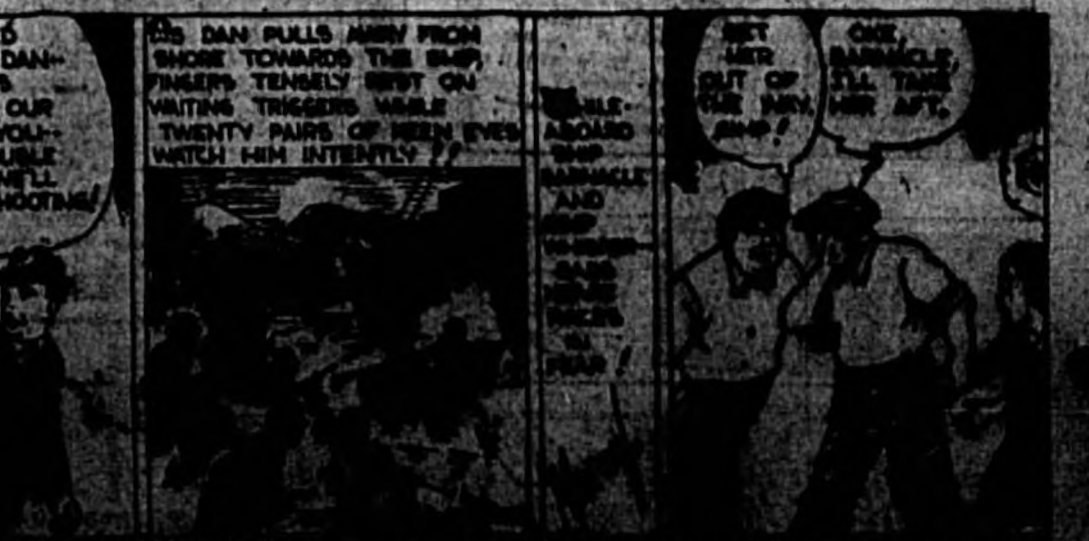
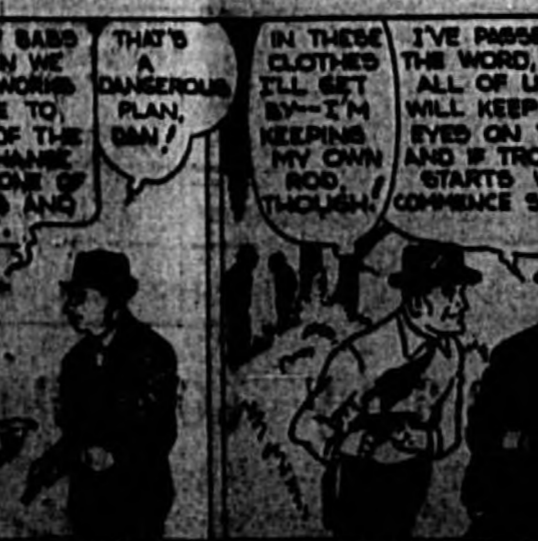
