(AP)-A man identified as ohn Dillinger led a machin gun raid on the Warsaw Police Station today, slugged a police-man, stole four bullet proof vests and two revolvers, and got away. Jud Pittinger, the slugged policeman, said he "is quite positive" that one of the two raiders was the Indiana "Wooden gun" desperado. He did not recognize the other, The raid, third such foray in small Indiana cities, credited to the Dillinger mob, put police and bank officials on edge. Similar raids at Auburn and Peru last October preceded bank robberies at Green Castle and East Chicago, Ind., and Racine, Wis. Pittinger said the two criminals hit him on the head in an alley near the police station. Because the United States has been blest by Nature with a particular abundance of these things, it has long been regarded as probably the richest nation on

During this depression a peculiar economic philosophy has developed among the people that a super-abundance of the products of our soil and of our factories was the cause of giant surpluses which were being piled high in granneries and warehouses all over the country and which could not be disposed of at profitable prices. This is just snother way of saying that over-production was the cause

The inference in this assertion is of course that the people have more of these things than they can use, that they have more than they want of the things which have been "over-produced." Warehouses are stocked with sur-plus cotton because the people already have more cotton, and more cotton goods than they need. Other warehouses aviation centers of the Miami area, are jammed full of shoes hats and similar goods, while factories are closed down, because these factories have pro-tent, producing no taxes.
