RAILROADS IN SOUTH TO BATTLE OVER LOW RATES

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13.—(AP)—A battle between railroads in the southeast over the rates to be charged for carrying coach passengers appeared imminent yesterday when it became known here that a group of railroads planned to file with the Interstate Commerce Commission a petition for a two-cent a mile charge.

One Group Wants Flat 2 Cent Coach Tariff, Other Asks 1 1/2 Cent

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13.—(AP)—The Southern, the first railroad to experiment with the low passenger rates in an effort to regain traffic lost to buses, showed in its most recent report an increase of 108 percent in passenger travel. In its application to the commission the Southern also stated that the two-cent rate had failed to provide as much traffic as expected but that the 1 1/2 cent rate had proved more profitable.

New Charge Hurdled At Associated Gas Firm

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13.—(AP)—A federal trade commissioner investigator charged yesterday that write-ups in the value of Associated Gas and Electric property were made by an appraiser supposedly independent but actually connected with the utility system.

The investigator, Judson C. Dickerman, named Edward J. Cheney, consulting engineer, as the appraiser. Dickerman said Cheney's New York office was located at 61 Broadway which he said was the same as Associated's New York address.

Appearing before the commission's utilities inquiry as counsel for Associated, Patrick J. Hurley, former secretary of war, denied "a financial arrangement" between Cheney and H. C. Hopson, vice-president of the utility company which operates in 26 states implied that Cheney was controlled by the power and light system.

Stranded By Receding Waters, Fish Are Dying

MIAMI, Apr. 13.—(AP)—Millions of tropical fish, stranded by receding waters, are gasping out their lives in the Everglades, while flocks of oiled birds stand a death watch.
